ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY LEGISLATORS

From the Houston Chronicle.

Chronicle specials from Austin carry the information that the custodian of the capitol is at work preparing the halls of the house and senate for the approaching session of the legislature, and that it is necessary to provide additional seats in the hall of the house of representatives, for the reason that the number of members has been increased to the constitutional limit of 150.

Such increase of membership will not be promotive of the best interests of the people.

The membership of the house is far too large and unwieldly. It should be reduced to 62 members, or two to each senatorial district, from which districts they should be elected at large; in other words each district of the 21 should send a senator and two representatives.

If every one of the 150 members was an experienced and skillful legislator, the number would be far too great, and where a large proportion consists of new members wholly without legislaticve experience the situation is nothing short of calamitous.

The senate formulates and passes two bills to one passed by the house, simply because the views of 31 men can be expressed and formulated in one-fifth the time that it takes 150 men to reach a decision.

HEALTH BULLETIN

Is big business going to continue to pay the malaria and dengue toll levied year after year, without protest or action?

Mr. J. S. Cullinan, president of the Texas Chamber of Commerce, at the Houston Mosquito Control Conference expressed some doubt as to the forthcoming results unless the citizensh'p of the state would awake to the gravity of the situation.

Col. H. H. Haines of the Houston Chamber of Commerce, declared that a mosquito control campaign should e carried on in conjunction with a campaign for drainage for agricult 1-

Prof. A. C. Chandler of the Rice institute expressed the opinion that chools should pay more attention to sanitary methods. Instructions in sanitary methods before public cani-

paigns would be entirely effective. Mr. J. A. LePrince, the right-hand man of General Gorgas in the Panania Canal Zone sanitation work; declared that the human waste through malalaria. Careful government surveys in supposed. He stated that, while he had no definite statistics for the whole of Texas, some counties in the state howed a 25 percent infection of maaria, Careful government shurveys in arious parts of the South show that n some farming areas the economic loss due to malaria amounts annually from \$4 to \$11 per acre under cultiva-

Dr. W. C. Garrison, state health officer of Arkansas, stated that mosquito control must come through wellorganized local units which co-operate through a state agency. He declared malaria the South's greatest liability.

Mr. R. E. Tarbett of El Paso stated that the business men got behind the move to eradicate mosquitoes in the irrigated area below El Paso and spent approximately \$60,000 for that purpose and were highly pleased with the investment.

Mr. E. E. Sands, president of the Texas Section of the American Society of Civil Engineers, declared that mosquito control was principally a problem in drainage, while George Ryark, city manager of Beaumont, stated that the weapon used by Jefferson county was their million dollar drainage system and that the partial construction of this system had already reduced malaria 50 percent.

The Houston conference, composed thorities and students on the subject were unanimously agreed that the mosquitoes would not leave the fertile waters of Texas of their own accord; that the problem was an enormous one which could not be solved in one season, but which should be immediately tackled on the unit basis, co-operating through a state agency, expanding gradually from year to year until the desired goal has been attained.

The memorial constructed by the conference embodied uniformity of action against the mosquitoes by all the Southern states and the providing of funds by each of the states for a central directing agency. Congress was also included in the request for co-operation.

As the train comes to a stop, prize winning sheep, hogs and cattle of huge proportions are led into the open platform and speaking cars for inspection by the crowds during the lecture period. Here for a short time the purpose of the train is explained, the slogan of pure bred stock and scien tific farming sounded, the doors are opened at a given signal and the interested visitors file through the long aisles of the train of Southern Pacific passenger coaches.

In one car may be seen a model dairy exhibit, including Jersey and Holstein prize milk producers. Ten gallons of milk a day is the record of these valuable animals. Either produces more than 600 pounds of butter a year. They are fed only on feed produced on Texas farms. Latest devices for the production and handling of milk are on display.
