NRA Committee Warns Against Unauthorized Price Boosting Under Blanket or Local Codes

The local NRA committee today issued the followng statement on unauthorized raising of prices in

"It has been brought to the attention of the committee organized for the purpose of administering the National Recovery Act in Ranger that there seems to be a tendency on the part of some groups of business and industry to take advantage of the President's Na-tional Recovery Act in raising prices collectively, in some instances to what seems exorbitant.

The blanket agreement signed by firms in order to display the Blue Eagle, does not give anyone the authority or privilege of raising their prices to where it will work a hardship on the community, nor does the signing of a local code give any line of business permission to act under that code until such time as it has been approved by the Director of the National Recovery Act.

The Blanket Agreement, as we see it pertains only to hours and wages, and the price adjustment should come when the particular code for any group has been approved by the Presidnet.

As yet there is no more money in the country than there was 30 days ago, and so far very few people have secured positions here who have not been employed. The committee thinks it unfair at this time to shoot the prices of commodities or service so high that they will be exorbitant and work a hardship on the community.

Those firms or groups who insist on increasing prices beyond a fair profit to cover fixed charges will be reported to the director of the National Recovery Act, and we can assure them that their right to the display of the Blue Eagle will be forfeited.

This act was not meant to permit anyone to profiteer nor to bring prices back to boom-day standards, but we intended to get the unemployed back to work and thereby increase the circulation of money, making it possible for all to benefit by an increased volume of business which should come within 30 or 60 days.

The President's re-employment program is inaugurated in order to help everyone, and the man yet unemployed is unable to buy and pay for the commodities or service until he secures a position. The Executive committee of Ranger takes this method of warning firms and groups against such practices as the raising of prices unreasonably, and ask the full cooperation of the citizenship of Ranger in carrying out the orders of the

This great program cannot fail with the whole-hearted cooperation of the citizenship of the United States, and we wish to commend our merchants, firms, and professional men for their voluntary wholehearted subscription to the blanket code as suggested by President Roosevelt.

SAM RAYBURN AND HIS RED RIVER PROJECT

Cong. Sam Rayburn of Texas will appear before the cabinet board administrering the public works program to *urge approval of a \$31,000,000 hydro-electric flood control project on the Red River near Denison. It is a selfliquidating project, according to the Texan, as the dam is to develop water power, flood control below the dam, and aid in navigation above the dam.

His argument is that the drainage area above the dam includes a portion of Texas, southern Oklahoma, and a small portion of New Mexico. He predicts that in sale of power alone it will amortize itself in 60 years and that it will develop water power to take care of industry in a wide radius where six million pople may live.

Moreover, to clear the land for the reservoir would employ 1600 men for three years, while wrok on the main dam and structures would employ from 1500 to 2000 men for the same period. This former speaker of the Texas legislature is very insistent that the daming of the Red River at Denison would be one of the greatest agencies for flood control of the Mississippi that could be adopted and also it makes possible navigation of vessels of shallow draught.



New Texas Laws To Go in Effect On August 30

By GORDON K. SHEARER United Press Staff Correspondent AUSTIN .- A new set of laws will be added to Texas statutes Aug. 30 with the expiration of the 90-day enacting period for acts

passed by the 43rd legislature. Greater liberty is provided by most of the new laws but some will restrict citizens.

For instance, wild flower pickers who have loaded their cars with shrubbery, wild flowers, moss and branches taken from countrysides must beware. No longer may they invade the enclosed land of another without permission nor property set aside by the state as a park or animal preserve. Unfenced private property still may be invaded. Violations are punishable by first ranging from \$1 to \$10. Children under 17 may pick wild flowers at will.

After four years' restriction lovers get a break. The "gin marriage law" will be repealed in part. No longer will it be necessary to file "intentions to wed" three days in advance of issuance of a marriage license.

Prize fighting, banned in the state since 1895, becomes legal under regulations. Pari-mutuel wagering at licensed race tracks, without posting of odds, will be permitted Sept. 1. If the vote is favorable on revision of state prohibition, 3.2 beer sales will be legal after Sept. 15.

Oil regulation violations are made punishable under a law becoming effective Aug. 30 and after that date tapping of a tank or pipe line containing oil will be punishable by a penalty of one to five years imprisonment. Oil tax charges from 2 per cent of value to two cents a barrel when oil is worth less than \$1 a barrel.

With the passing of the 90th day following the last legislature owners of natural gas wells in fields of 300,000 acres may use the gas for extracting gasoline if no other market is made available.
