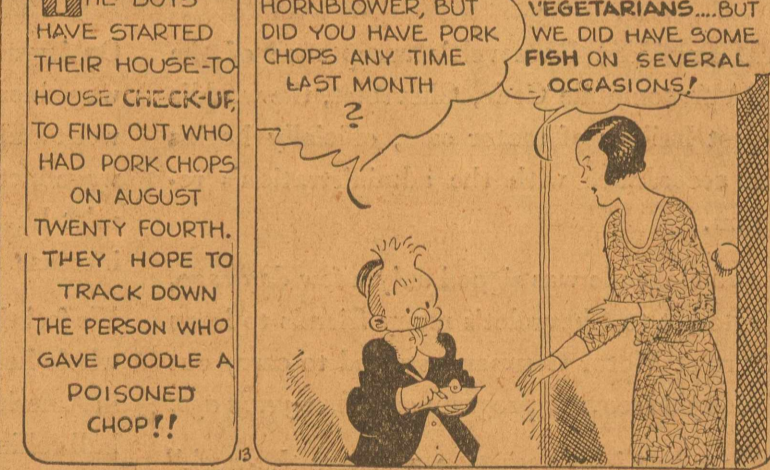

THIRTY THOUSAND HOME OWNERS ASK AID

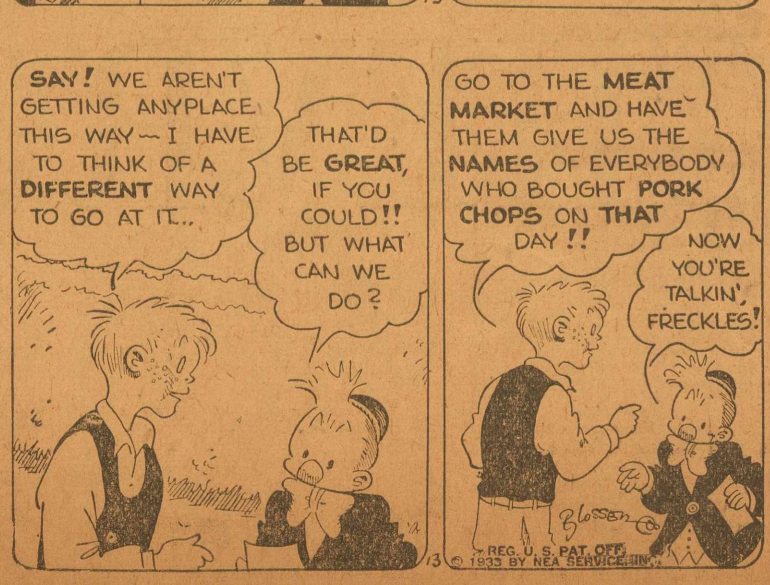
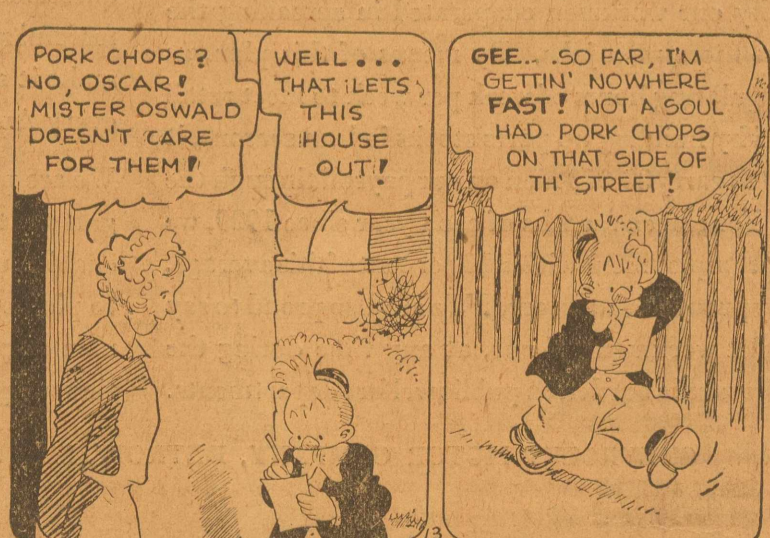
