

Numerous Under Local Option Law

By RAYMOND BROOKS AUSTIN .- Counties and precincts that voted on local option for beer will have a hard time changing their minds now.

Future local option elections are but one of numerous intricate questions of law affecting the sale of beer after Sept. 15.

Many local officials are now concerned whether those who live n local option dry areas may go outside and buy beer and legally transport it back to their homes.

A uniform procedure will be worked out to govern this. Under the old local option law before staetwide prohibition ,it was legal to take your liquor with you—for your own use-into local option dry territory.

The attorney general's department has construed this question: "Whether, when a whole county voted dry by local option Aug. 26, a precinct in the county may call another election."

Hereafter, the election can only e on a county-wide unit; and under the beer law, the next election cannot be held within less than six months of the first. Elections may be called every six months, but will be county-wide in each instance.



BACKING THE CODES

Sen. Walter F. Woodul of Houston has answers from fellow-lawmakers that seem to show the state act to modify anti-trust laws to conform to the national recovery act will go through easily in the session starting this week.

Senator Woodul-who by the way, has not remotely held out as an administration man-has asked house and senate members about their attitude on reshaping the anti-trust law.

He announced out of Houston that 67 members of the house have aeclared themselves in favor of the change. 17 doubtful and none on record against it. 
