By United Press MEXICO CITY, Sept. 25. -Heavy damage and possible loss of life was feared today from a hurricane which skirted Yuctan, struck with force at Tampico and traveled northwestward across the State of Tamaulipas toward the Texas border.

It was the second disastrious storm to strike Tampico in little more than a week. All communication was interrupted. It was feared the region was hard hit.

Officials of the National Railways announced two rivers had flooded low-lying sections of Tampico with an indefinite number drowned and many homeless.

### TEETH TO SPARE

The question, as to code agreements, "can they make them work?" will have an emphatic answer, if a state law written by Sen. Walter Woodward and Rep. Holland Bradley is enaced at this session.

This bill, patterned after the model recommended by the national government, would give the effect of state law to the codes of fair competition, and set up damage Hability up to \$5,000 per day, for violations.

It would give any man in business, who adheres to a code, the right to go to court to enjoin a competitor for violations. The attorney general and all district and county attorneys also could take the injuncion case to court.

The bill has the unusual legal proposal that even where no actual damages are proven, a violator still would be liable for punitive damages.

The bill, to escape obvious unconstitutionality, has no penal provisions, but actual and punitive damages, and the mandatory requirement for injunction, and the enforcement power's extension to the bands of competitors, amply would make up for that.

This law would be in effect for the same period as the national industrial recovery act, that is, to June 16, 1935, unless the national act were earlier terminated by proclamation of the president.

The law leaves the anti-trust statute in effect, as to any combinations in restraint of trade not embodied in approved codes of fair competition; but provides that proof a business man is acting in compliance with the terms of an approved code as to the matter complained of will be a complete defense to any anti-trust proceeding in any

People during the voluntary period of the blanket code operation, have been asking whether, in the absence of definite police powers, recalcitrants or "chiselers" could be made to abide by the terms of the agreements. This bill, if enacted into law, will be a complete answer, so drastic that anyone who expected to stay in business would comply with it as an elementary act of self-preservation. The bill has teeth. It is all teeth.

## INSURANCE LEGISLATION

Foreign life insurance companies, unwilling to do busiress under the state compulsory investment law, always send groups before the legislature trying to repeal the Robertson law. They claim repeal of the law alone will attain the end for which it was enacted, or having insurance reserves invested in Texas land notes.

· There is agitaion to get the old question up at this session.

Many of the foreign companies came back and are operating under the Robertson law. A few other foreign companies came in after the law was in effect. A number of substantail Texas insurance companies have been built up under the law. Only a few large eastern companies insist they wil stay out until a regulation offensive to them is repealed. Apparently Texas is an attractive field, for they have spent much money in lobby activities trying to strike down the law.

This question is unnecessary in the present session, since it is sure the same old group that walked out of Texas will have their same old group on hand at the next regular session—and the next, and the next.

The question of repealing the compulsory investment law because it displeases certain insurance companies is entirely distinct from the regulation and taxing of insurance companies and the insurance business generally, and despite efforts to confuse them, has been kept disinct in legislative minds so far.




