AUSTIN, Tex.—Total supply of cotton in the United States on January 1 was 14,812,000 bales, compared with 15,891,000 bales last year, or a decrease of 1,079,-000 bales, according to Dr. A. B. Cox, director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research and well-known cotton economist. American cotton in European ports and afloat to Europe totaled 164,000 bales more than on this date last year. Net declines in these items of supply equal 915,000 bales.

No. The fertilizer would ordinarily dry out the roots and the leaves of the plant would turn yellow and appear burned. A better plan would be to work in ordinary top soil or garden soil around the roots of the plant. The soil should be tamped carefully leaving a slight depression around the plant. Water should be applied to settle dirt and remove air spces. When the water is soaked in, the depression can be filled. Fertilizer can then be added to the top of the bed, as a mulch, being sure that it is not allowed to touch




