

WASHINGTON, April 4. — Speaker of the House Henry Rainey, calling the Wirt "brain trust plot" charges "silly," said today that the Indiana educator "can't name a man in the government who is fomenting a revolution.

Rainey predicted the house special committee investigating into the "red" plot charges of Dr. William Wirt probably would last only a few hours.

"He hasn't got any informants," Rainey said. "The whole thing is

too silly for words. "If all Wirt has is what he has given out, namely that men like Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace and other key men are allegedly leaning to communism, the investigation will end almost immediately."

### COTTON CONTROLLED BILL ENACTED BY SENATE

A showdown came at last on the Bankhead bill when the senate aproved the application of a 75 per cent tax on the value of all cotton in excess of 10,000,000 bales that may be ginned from this year's crop. Many amendments were tacked on the bill. Many critics of the measure declared these amendments would prevent enforcement but Bankhead, the Alabama senator and co-author, predicted the senate conference committee would straighten these out. It was a close vote-46 for to 39 against. Only one senator from a state that produces any considerable amount of cotton opposed final passage. He was Josiah W. Feb. 2 the commissioner of banking ordered the Peoples State Bank

On the morning of Feb. 8, at 6:10 o'clock, Jim Daniels, night patrolman, was shot to death on Homer street, between Cypress and Page streets, as he was on his way home. A manhunt resulted in which arrests were made and the body was exhumed to determine the calibre of the pistol used to kill him. A reward of \$1,000 was offered by the city and a number of citizens cooperating in an attempt to stop crime, but no one was ever sentenced for the murder.

Feb. 9 the "White Way" was opened along Main street. Feb. 15 the Ed Maher home was burned, with little saved. Feb. 23 a report was made that an attempt was made to kidnap Mrs. Dell F. Woodel and Mrs. Leonard Nolly. June 22 a similar attempt by a man and a woman was made against Bertha Deere, 14. Both attempts were unsuccessful.

April 20, 11 men were seriously burned when a gas line being repaired burst and ignited. None of the injured died. April 24 a new oil boom was predicted and after considerable drilling, on May 28, fire broke out in two wells near Ranger, seriously burning H. F. Chriswell, driller. June 5 Pat McGonical was burned to death trying to save his 3-year-old daughter, Patsy, from the flames in their home. The girl ived. June 8 Oris Wheeler, 16, died from burns sustained in a gas explosion in the West Texas Produce company building. Five others were

June 16 the Texas Drug Store was burned and the Paramount hotel

was damaged by the fire and smoke. On June 30 W. H. Lassater, night operator of the Texas & Pacific railway, was held up by a hijacker and the office robbed of \$99. The bandit escaped. Early in May jake sales had become prominent and on July 1, the grand jury blamed the crime wage in Ranger on these jake

July 20 the entire city was rocked by a gigantic nitroglycerin explosion at the warehouse of the Independent Torpedo company, two miles north of Ranger on the Caddo highway. No one was in or near the building at the time and no deaths occurred. It was blamed on hunters who built a fire near the building. But when, on Dec. 11, the building that replaced the blown-up warehouse was again demolished in a similar explosion which again rocked the town, it was thought to be vandalism. The year 1925 ended quietly, though murders, explosions and fires





# Connally Fights To Save Rights Of Texas Women

WASHINGTON, April 2.—Sen. Tom Connally (D), of Texas is prepared to continue the battle which he has been waging throughout his service in the senate to prevent wrecking of the Texas community property laws, when the revenue bill comes before the senate soon, he has announced.

Treasury recommendations for the new bill included one that would have taken from residents of Texas and seven other community property law now stands, it enables many Texans to effect substantial savings in income taxes by making separate income tax returns. Senator Connally appeared before the House Ways and Means committee in the hearings held last December, and opposed the provision. The bill was reported by the committee and passed the house without the objectionable provision, but efforts are being made to revive it.

The proposed change, according to Senator Connally, would be unconstitutional, and he cites numerous supreme court decisions to support his position. He further declared the Texas law was enacted 75 years ago, long before a federal income tax was levied, and that the state has not passed any legislation in an attempt to evade federal taxation.

"Texas is one of the pioneer states in the union which granted married women equal property rights with their husbands," Connally told the committee. "In other words, the earnings of the husband and the wife were treated as commonproperty under the theory of conjugal partnership, and half of that property becomes absolutely the property of the wife, and the other half becomes absolutely the property of the husband. Upon dissolution of the marriage relationship through divorce or death, of these two estates, one goes to the husband and one to the wife, or in case of death, one goes to the wife's heirs.
