

GOOD TURNOUT EXPECTED

SATURDAY IS election day in Parmer County, and a good turnout of voters is expected in the area, due to some contested races on the county level, and also the first-ever Presidential primary for Texas voters.

Although it has been a quiet race, the race for County Sheriff will perhaps draw the most attention of voters across Parmer County, as the office is contested for the first time in a number of years.

Former Bovina City Marshal Bill Denney is making a run for the office, and folks in his old home town are expected to give him a passing grade as he vies for this important county office. Denney was born and raised in the Bovina area.

Denney served as City Marshal here from 1962 through 1967. He has been employed by the City of Friona since leaving Bovina, and has served as the Chief of Police at Friona since 1973.

We feel that the voters of the Bovina area owe it to Denney to make a good turnout and give him a boost in his countywide venture.

VOTERS IN Precinct Three have quite a race shaping up involving four candidates for commissioner.

We believe that longtime civic leader Wendol Christian deserves the voter support from that precinct. We have been associated with Wendol for a number of years, and believe he would represent the county well.

THIS YEAR'S PRIMARY has received more than the usual attention, due to the state's first presidential primary, which was set up as a "trial run" by the last state legislature.

Due to this being the first presidential primary, and to the special manner of voting for delegates rather than the candidates themselves, voters need to be aware of the procedure when they go to the polls.

On the Democratic ballot, for example, slates of delegates will be listed for three candidates: Lloyd Bentsen, Jimmy Carter and George Wallace. There are three delegates listed for each candidate, and voters may vote for all three delegates under any one candidate's name.

For the Republicans, there are two candidates, Gerald Ford and Ronald Reagan, with four delegates listed for each one. Voters may vote for the entire slate of four delegates for either Ford or Reagan.

The First State Bank has sponsored the publication of the two ballots. Voters who wish to study the ballots prior to going to the polls may do so. They are printed on Page 2 of this issue.

Some voters may wonder why Senator Lloyd Bentsen's name is still on the presidential primary. Senator Bentsen's son made a stop in the county about a week ago, and he explained the reason to us.

Bentsen supporters hope that his "favorite son" candidacy will carry a majority of the Democratic votes in the primary, so that he will be able to help shape the Democratic platform at the national convention in New York, in return for his delegate votes.

In other words, Bentsen would control a number of "uncommitted" votes, which he would carry to the national convention.

By having these votes, he might be able to have the Demo's election platform include items that would be of direct benefit to residents of our state, in return for his support.

From this standpoint, we personally believe that a vote for the Bentsen delegates on the Democratic primary would be a good move for Texas voters.

THERE STILL seems to be some confusion as to whether primary voters can vote for Ronald Reagan, and still vote in the county races on the Democratic ballot. The answer is no. They will have to choose one or the other before voting time.

Powell Recipient Of JCI Senatorship

About 100 Jaycees, Jaycee Wives and guests attended the annual Jaycee Installation and Awards Banquet Saturday night in the Bovina Schools cafeteria. Incoming officers were installed and special awards presented, including a first for the Bovina Jaycees, an international award. Guests were

George Powell, Southwestern Public Service Company representative here, was presented a Jaycee International Senatorship. Fewer than 22,000 such honors have been presented internationally

Democratic and Republican primary elections will be held in Bovina and Parmer County Saturday with a better than average turnout of voters anticipated.

Several factors, including races for county commissioner in several precincts and contested races in several county positions, are expected to lure voters throughout the county.

First is a race for County Sheriff in the Democratic primary, the first time the office has been contested in a number of years. Bill Denney of Friona is challenging longtime incumbent Chas. Lovelace, who has held the position since 1949.

Also countywide, there is a race for County Attorney between incumbent Johnny Actkinson and John Black.

And on the district level, longtime District Attorney Jack Young of Muleshoe is being challenged by Doyle Elliott of Friona. Young has held the office continuously since 1960, and has not been opposed since he won the office in a race with Bill Sheehan, then of Friona.

Voters in Parmer, Bailey and Lamb Counties will decide this race.

Commissioner's races spice up the ballot in the Friona area, and also at Farwell-Oklahoma Lane. Four names are on the ballot for each of the commissioner spots up for election.

In Precinct 1, involving voters in the Friona-Black-Lakeview boxes, four men are vying for the spot being vacated by four-term commissioner Tom Lewellen.

The four candidates are W.L. Edelman, Lloyd Rector, Ernest Anthony and Raymond Euler. Of the four, only Edelman has an elective political background, having served two terms as mayor of Friona.

The Farwell-Oklahoma Lane precinct may produce the closest race, with incumbent Cecil Atchley being challenged by two political veterans plus a newcomer.

Atchley, who won his spot on the commission four years ago from the late incumbent Guy Cox, is challenged by former county judge Archie Tarter, and longtime political leader from the Oklahoma Lane community, Wendol Christian, who has served as precinct chairman for a number of years. Christian also is a member of the county school board.

The fourth candidate in Precinct 3 is A.N. Walls of Farwell.

Most of the election campaigns to this point have been "low key" in nature, although this is typical of county politics.

Statewide, Democratic primary voters will find two major races that are contested. They include the U.S. Senate post held by Lloyd Bentsen, where three adversaries challenge, and the railroad commissioner spot, where no less than eight candidates will vie for an almost sure runoff race.

If runoff races develop in either the county or state races, they will be held the first week of June.

State representative Bill Clayton and state senator Max Sherman are unopposed.

Also expected to draw additional voters for the primaries are the races for presidential delegates,

both on the Democratic and Republican ballots.

In fact, the presidential primary, first ever conducted in Texas, might draw more voters than usual into the Republican primary, due to the Gerald Ford-Ronald Reagan race, which has generated more interest statewide than has the Demo race.

primary, supporters of Sen. Lloyd Bentsen's "favorite son" candidacy have been actively seeking votes for Bentsen so he can control Texas' delegate votes, and perhaps play a major role at the National Democratic convention, where the Demo candidate will ultimately be decided.

In addition to Bentsen, two other Democratic hopefuls are on the ballot—Jimmy Carter of Georgia and George Wallace of Alabama.

In the Republican camp, delegates for Ford and Reagan, plus an

uncommitted delegate appear on the ballot.

Voters are cautioned that they are voting for delegates rather than the presidential candidates themselves, and in each case, they may vote for the entire slate of delegates for their favorite candidate.

(Sample ballots for both the Democratic and Republican primaries may be found on Page 2 of this issue of The Blade so that voters may familiarize themselves with the ballot prior to going to the polls. The ballots are presented courtesy of First State Bank of Bovina.)

Outside of the presidential race, only one contest appears on the Republican primary ballot, where three men vie for the U.S. Senate nomination. The candidates are Hugh Sweeney, Alan Steelman and Louis Leman.

The GOP ballot also contains five voter referendums, which merely represent a public opinion poll for possible future legislation.

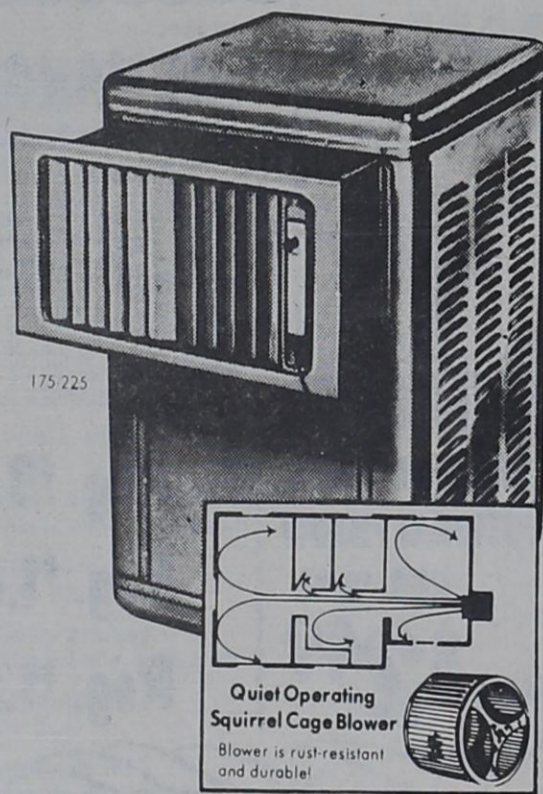

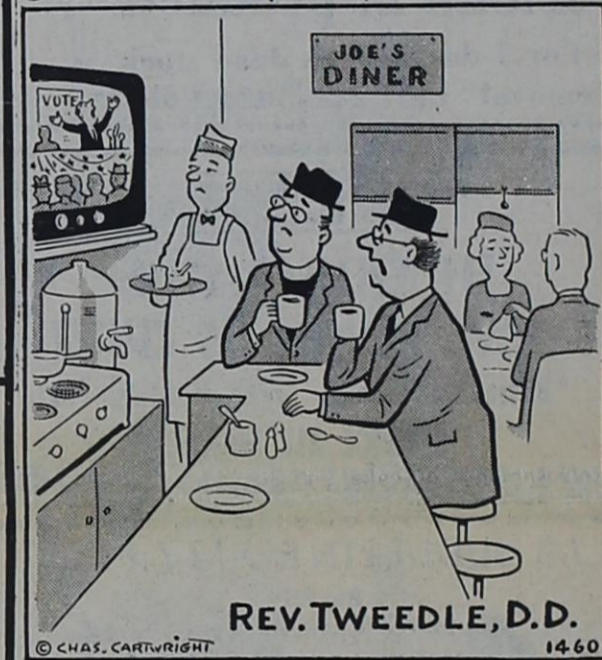

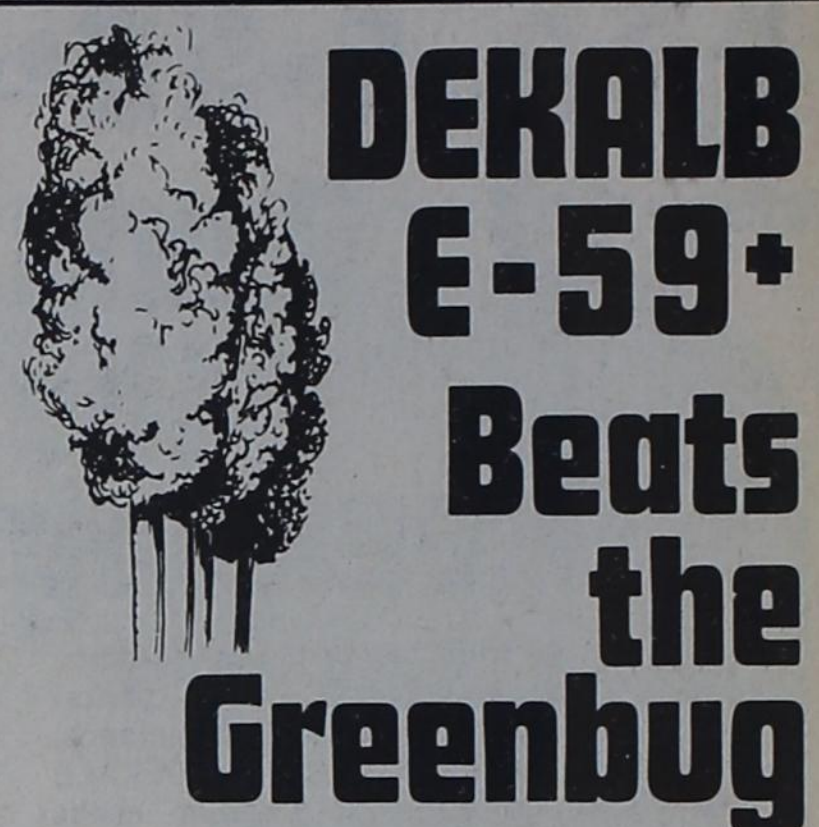
Jack Kassahn Elected To WTCC Board

Soil Stewardship Week is May 23 through May 30. This is a national observance for both city and country folks. The theme this year is "We Begin Again."

The purpose of the week is to bring to everyone's attention our dependence on the soil. We use the soil for a place to build our homes, to grow the timber we use for constructing our buildings and to grow the food we eat.

Have we ever created an inch of top soil? Impossible, but we have all seen top soil blow and wash away. Bearing this in mind, if we can't create soil we should take care of, or be good stewards of the soil we now have.

For the farmer--he knows the soil was on his farm when started farming. His goal is to maintain or improve the condition of the soil--not to harm it. For town people--their goal is to control erosion to improve living conditions. Blowing dust is unpleasant. Each one of us has a stake in stewardship of the soil.

Soil Stewardship materials, purchased by the Parmer County Soil Conservation District, are being distributed to all churches in Parmer County this week. If your church has not received the materials contact the Soil Conservation Service, Friona.

Also, the SCS personnel in Friona are available to bring soil stewardship programs to civic and church groups.

Intensifying the inspection of grain destined for export markets is being classified as a number one priority by several top officials in the USDA. Under Secretary John Knebel is one of those who has detailed what the Agriculture Department is going to be doing during the next several months. According to Knebel, inspectors will be increasing the number of unannounced shipboard inspections. United States Attorneys will be acting to suspend licenses of those indicated by local grand juries, and a special team will be working out a system for following up on complaints from export customers concerning grain quality. Officials say the crackdown is especially necessary at this time because of the abuses in the system during the past year and because of the record volume of export tonnage to be shipped during the next several months.

Bovina's Mustangs have qualified five thinclads in four events for the Region 1-A track meet to be held Friday and Saturday at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

The District 3-A track meet was held Tuesday of last week at Hereford with Lonnie Phillips of Hart serving as meet director. The first two place finishers in each event will go to the regional meet.

Springlake-Earth piled up 152 points to win its sixth straight district title. The Wolverines were followed by Farwell with 115 1-3, Hart with 93 1-3, Bovina with 59, Kress with 46 and Vega with 24 1-3.

George Villarreal took the only first place ribbon for the Ponies, winning the 880-yard run with a time of 2:07.5.

Also qualifying for the regional meet were Clint Cox, second with a time of 17.0 in the 120-yard high hurdles; Tommy DeLeon, third with a time of 44.0 in the 330-yard intermediate hurdles; and the mile relay team of Villarreal, DeLeon, Ruben Salazar and Tommy Serna, who finished second with a time of 3:40.4. DeLeon, although finishing third in the 330 hurdles, will go the regional meet because the first place finisher does not plan to compete in that event at regional.

Others garnering points at the district meet included DeLeon, fourth in the long jump; Martinez, sixth in the discus; Serna, sixth in the 220-yard dash; Billy Espinoza, fourth in the mile run; and the 440-yard relay team of Martinez, Serna, Cox and DeLeon, fourth in

the 440-yard relay.

In the junior varsity division, Vega racked up 157 points, followed by S-E with 108, Kress with 83, Farwell with 66, Bovina with 58 and Hart with 17.

In the JV division, George Guillen took first places in the 100-yard dash and 220-yard dash; Danny Harris third in the long jump; Ronnie Cary third in the mile run; Randall Ritchie third in the discus; the sprint relay team placed fourth; Richard Villarreal placed fifth in the 880-yard run; Eddie Isaac placed fifth in the 120-yard hurdles; Mike London placed fifth in the mile; Ritchie placed fifth in the shot; Pat Ware placed sixth in the discus; Dan Cox placed sixth in the mile; and the mile relay team placed sixth.

The annual elementary track meet and picnic will be held Friday, according to Jim Noyes, Bovina Junior High principal.

Classes at Bovina Schools will be dismissed at 2:45 p.m. that day. The Junior High Pep Club will operate a concession stand during the afternoon.

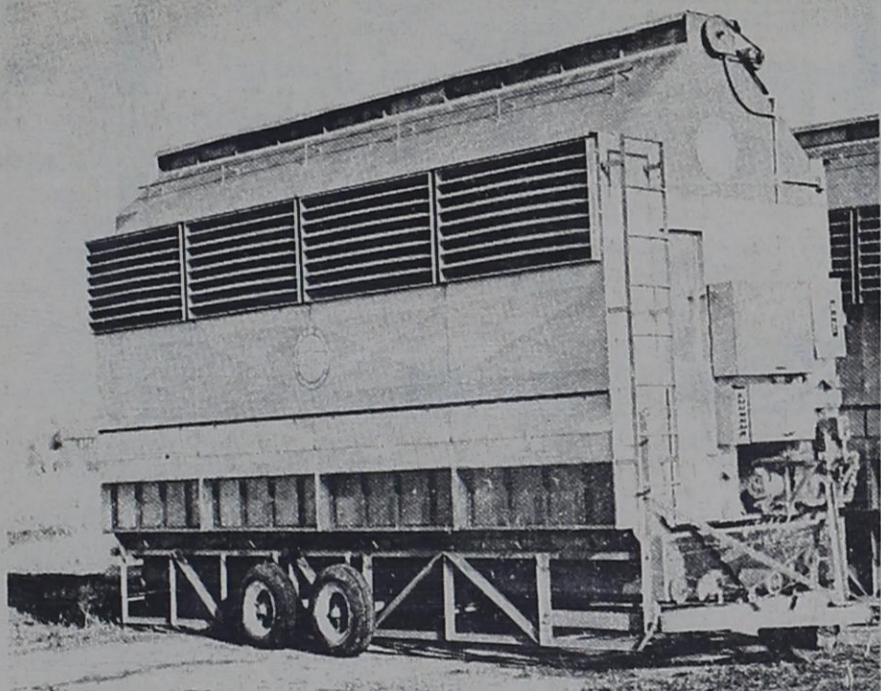

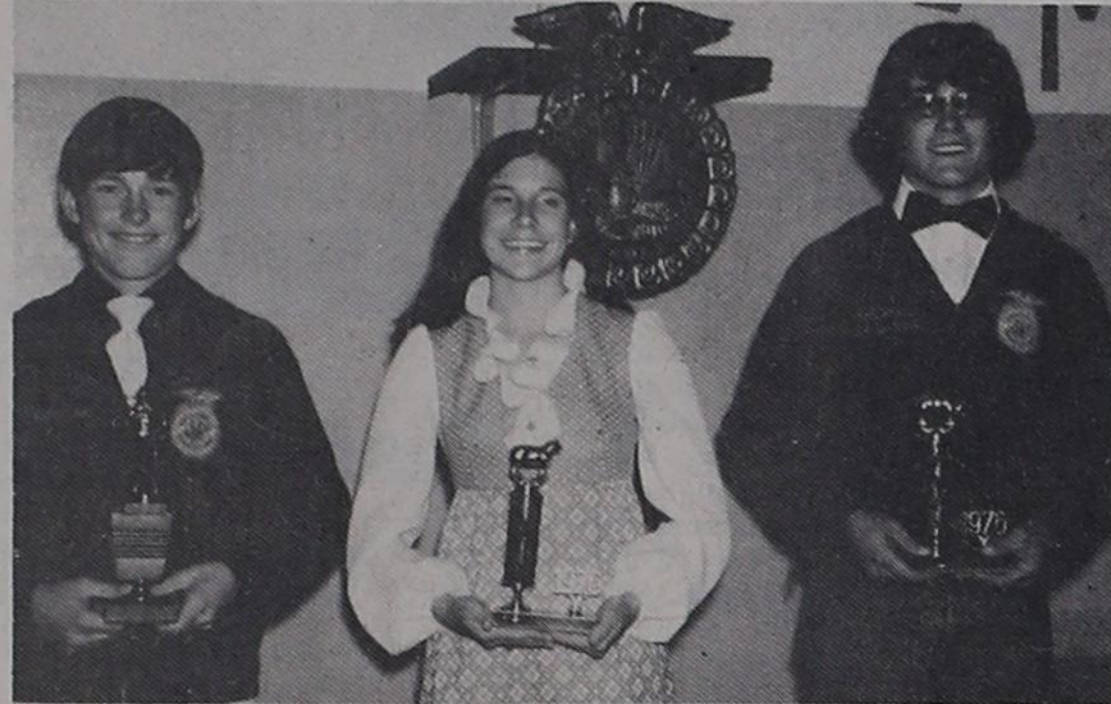

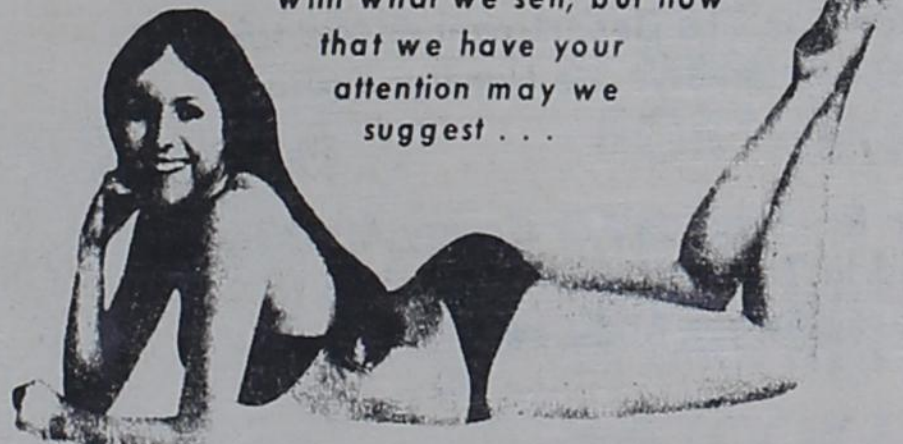
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REASONS FOR REAGAN

He has common sense answers to America's problems.

- Inflation.** "The one basic cause of inflation is government spending more than it takes in. When Washington runs in the red, year after year, it cheapens every dollar you earn; it makes a profit on your cost-of-living wage increases by pushing you into higher tax brackets; it borrows in the capital market to cover its deficits, cutting off business and industry from that capital which is needed to fuel our economy and create jobs; it robs your savings of value; and it denies retired people the stability they need and expect for their fixed incomes."

"The cure: a balanced budget. The federal government must set a timetable, a systematic plan, to balance the budget — and it must stick to it."
- Unemployment.** "If a recession causes you to lose your job, or makes it hard for you to find one, you need help. Unemployment aid is one way. An expanded job data bank is another — a computer-linked system to make it possible for you to walk into your local employment office and get information about jobs requiring your skills anywhere in the country. We need to explore other ideas to alleviate problems for those out of work, but the long range solution to unemployment is to bring an end to inflation which, in turn, causes recessions."
- Welfare.** "For years there has been a group of people calling for a Federal takeover of welfare. Actually we should do the opposite — and decentralize welfare."

"If Joe Doaks is using his welfare money to go down to the pool hall and drink beer and gamble, and the people on his block are paying the bill directly, Joe is apt to undergo a change in his lifestyle — or get off welfare."
- Social Security.** "Social Security must be strengthened and improved. The program needs to be reformed. But any reform must have as its first priority the guarantee that all those counting on Social Security will continue to receive their monthly check and that their

benefits won't decline in purchasing power, but will keep pace with inflation.

"There are inequities that must be corrected affecting women, people 65-and-over who want to continue to work, and younger workers. But reforms must be made with care so that they don't jeopardize those already retired, those now working, or those who will enter the work force in the future."

Energy. "The one thing we shouldn't forget is this: If we relax government controls on natural gas, nuclear plants and domestic sources of oil, we won't have to worry any longer about being dependent on the Middle East and other oil exporters."

Crime. "We must remember that the principal reasons for locking up criminals are punishment and isolation — to keep them from hurting law-abiding citizens, and to serve as a deterrent to others. It does no good to take guns from the law abiding. The most effective gun control is mandatory sentences for those who commit crimes with guns in their possession. When a would-be lawbreaker knows he can kill without facing the ultimate penalty, when he knows that parole or probation may come easy for him, we cannot say we have effective deterrents to increased crime."

Détente. "Through détente we have sought peace with our adversaries. We should continue to do so, but must make it plain that we expect a stronger indication that they also seek a lasting peace with us. Too often we act as if a concession on our side — with none by them — is automatically helpful to the process as a whole. Détente will work only if it is a two-way street — something for something."

Defense. "A decade ago we had military superiority. Today, we are in danger of being surpassed by a nation that has never made any effort to hide its hostility to everything we stand for. As a nation, we must commit ourselves to spend whatever is necessary to remain strong. To be second is to be last."

Six Fillies Earn Trip To State Track Meet

A team of six girls, including one alternate, will be representing Bovina High School at the Class A state track meet May 7-8 in Austin following the Region 1-A track meet at Texas Tech University in Lubbock Friday and Saturday.

Coach Joel Nelson's Fillies picked up one first place, five second places, one fourth place and one sixth place at the regional meet to tally 73 points, good for second place behind Paducah with 93 points. The Filly tracksters will be competing in six events at Austin with Paducah competing in five events.

Earning trips to the state meet were Debra Gilbreath, Sandi Sides, Dianna Naegle, Diane Gilbreath and Pat Shepherd. Pam McCormick will serve as alternate on the relay teams.

Seven of nine records fell in the Class A regional meet this past weekend with Bovina figuring in several of the record-breaking events.

The mile relay team copped first place in the finals with a time of 4:02.4, followed by Rankin with a time of 4:04.5. Kress, the other District 3-A representative who had nudged Bovina in the district meet, finished fifth in the finals with a time of 4:06.4. However, Kress set a new record of 4:01.6 in the preliminaries. Dianna Naegle ran the opening lap in 61.3, followed by Sandi Sides with a 60.1, Diane Gilbreath with a 61.8 and Debra Gilbreath with a 58.9.

The 440-yard relay team, composed of the same four girls,

took second place with a time of 48.9 behind Paducah with a time of 48.7, a new meet record. The Fillies' time equalled the time set by Paducah in the preliminaries, which was a new record at that time.

In individual events, Debra Gilbreath earned a trip to state, finishing second in the 220-yard dash with a time of 25.3, her personal best. Nodia Vaughn of Paducah set a new record in that event, winning in a time of 24.7. Sandi Sides took a second place in the 60-yard dash with a time of 7.3, one step behind Cindy Watson of Lorenzo with a time of 7.2. Shepherd tossed the discus 116-1 in the preliminaries to set a record and then came back Saturday with an identical toss. However, in the finals she was topped by Jennifer Perdue of Sanford-Fritch, who set a new record of 120-0. Naegle took second in the triple jump with a leap of 35-3, a personal best. She was topped by Kathy Brozowski of Abilene Wylie with a leap of 35-5/2, also a new record. Naegle's leap also broke the old record of 34-11.

Also picking up points at the regional meet were Diane Gilbreath, sixth in the 100-yard dash with a time of 11.8, and Shepherd, fourth in the shot with a heave of 36-2.

Other District 3-A representatives making the trip to state will include Sue Slutz of Vega, who won

the 80-yard hurdles in the record time of 10.7 and took second in the long jump with a leap of 17-2/4.

"We just had a fantastic effort from the girls and we think we have an excellent chance at the state meet," said Nelson. The coach pointed out that Paducah and Bovina had each broken the existing state record in the 440-yard relay.

Nelson will take the state qualifiers to the Bluebonnet Belle Relays in San Angelo Saturday. The meet is for state qualifiers.

Point totals at the regional meet were as follows: Paducah 93, Bovina 73, Iraan 52, Rankin 39, Stanton 28, Stratford 22, Vega 19, Stinnett 18, Clarendon 17, Lorenzo and Knox City 14, Sanford-Fritch, Kress, Albany and Abilene Wylie 12, Spur and New Deal 10, Canadian 9, Sunray and Silverton 8, Crowell 7, Shamrock, Springlake-Earth, Farwell and Shallowater 4, Clint 3, Ralls, Aspermont and Haskell 2, McLean and Wink 1.

First game of the 1976 season is set for May 20, according to Powell.

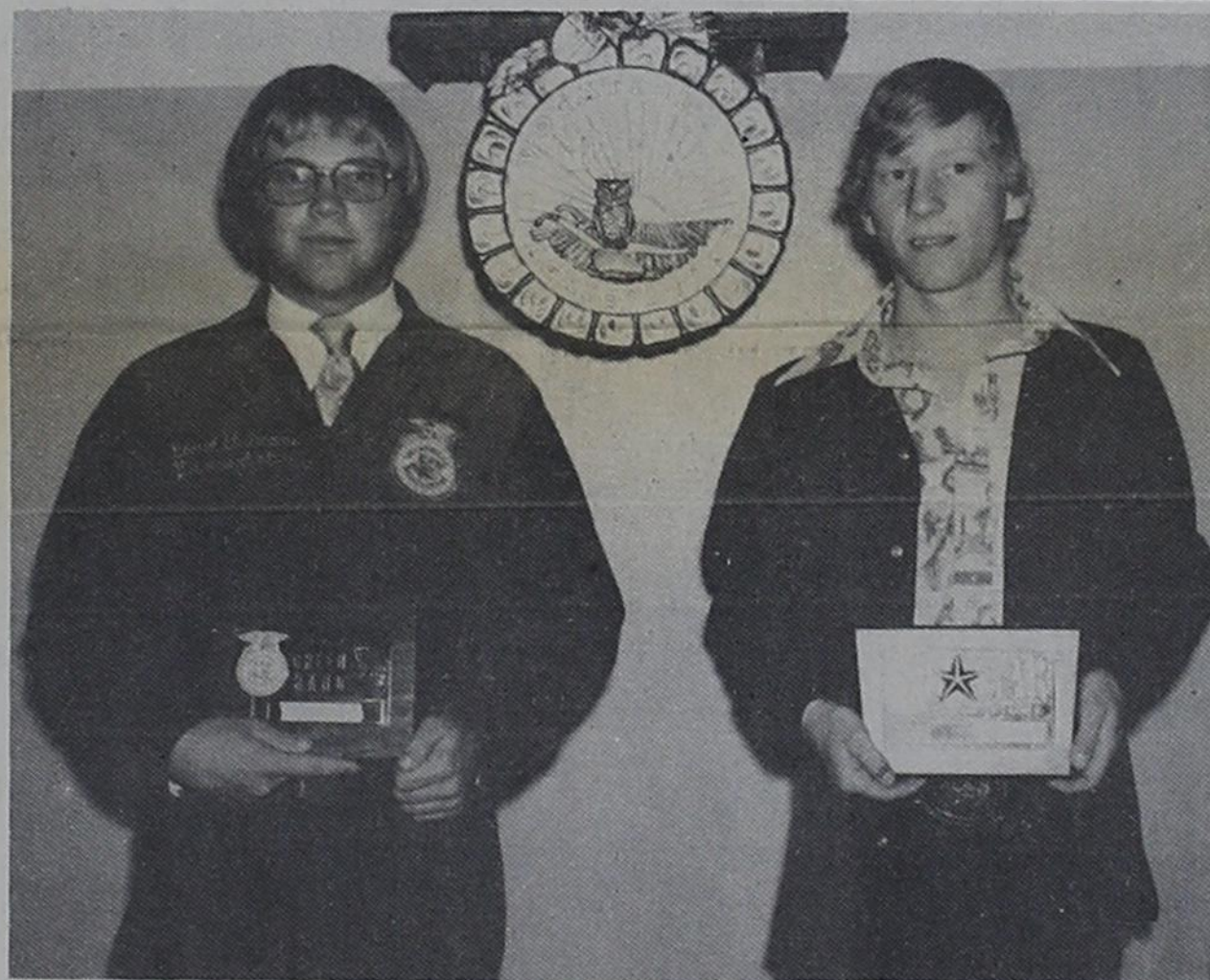

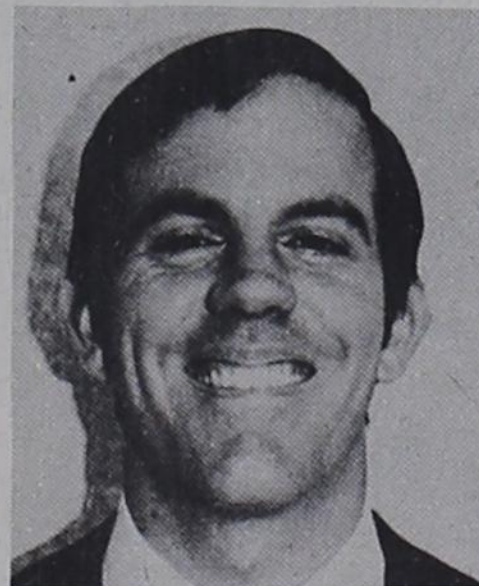

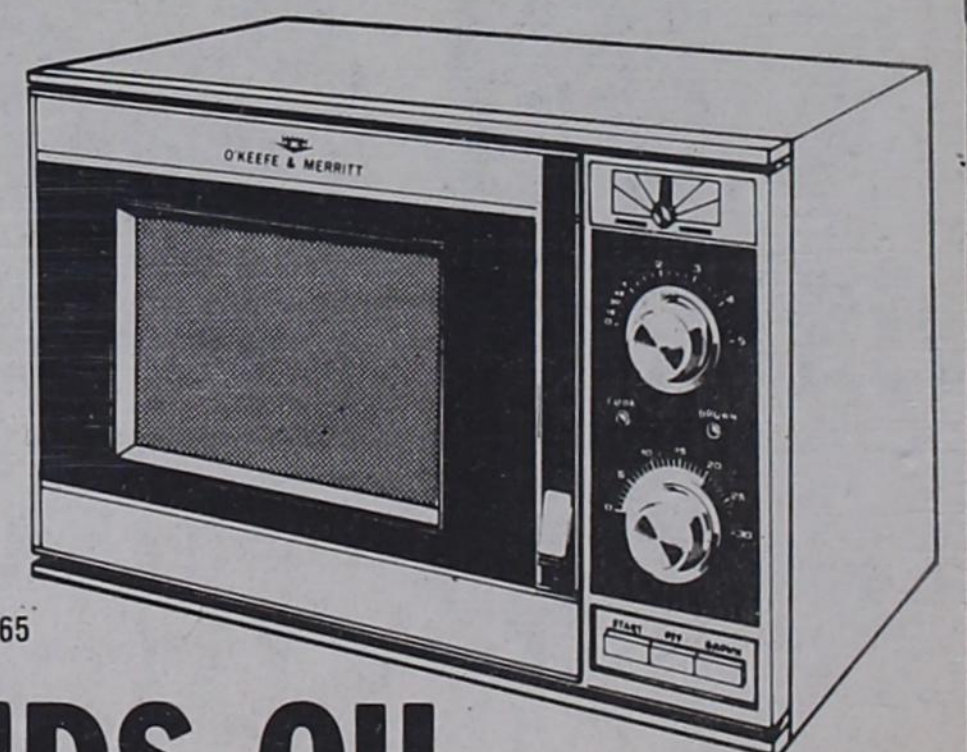
