"I am proud to have a man of Jeff's calibre to take the manager's position. We hope that Jeff will continue to be active in community affairs," Lowe said.

Lowe's stores include Pay-n-Save Food Stores, Thriftway Super Markets, and Jolly Roger Convenience Stores. The Bovina store will become a member of the Pay-n-Save group.

Affiliated Foods will continue to be the main supplier for Bovina Supermarket. "We are dedicated to Shurfine products and the Shurfine label," Lowe stated.

The store also will continue to feature its variety and hardware items, and will cash payroll checks as it has done in the past.

"We would like to thank our friends and customers for their support and friendship for the past 18 years," Whitecotton said.

"We are happy that our employees will remain with the store, and we wish the new owner all the best. We hope that the area residents will continue to support the store as they have in the past," Whitecotton said.

The Whitecottons said they had no definite plans, but expected to

take it easy for awhile and visit their children.

Lowe started in business in 1963 in Olton, and grew from there. He has Pay-n-Save Food Stores in Muleshoe, Earth and Littlefield. He has lived in Littlefield since 1947, graduating from high school there.

The Whitecottons have been in the grocery business in Bovina since 1961.

and if the price was right. Members of this committee are to report back to the Chamber.

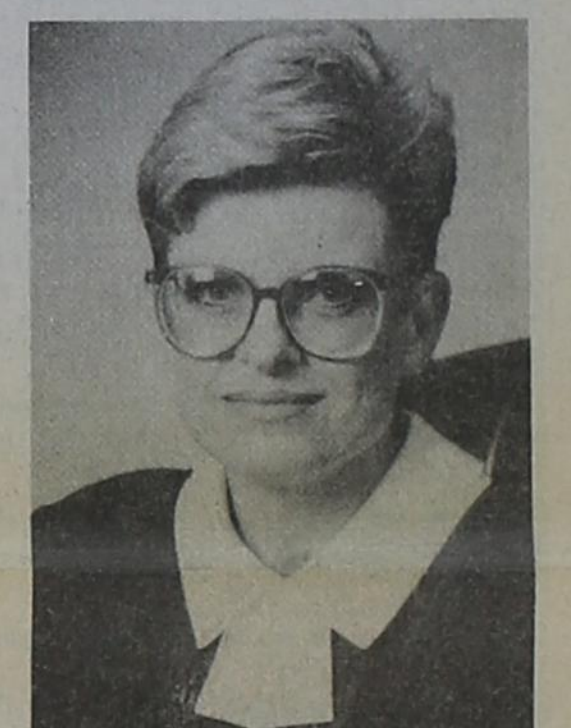

## TAX

The way employees report reimbursed expenses on their tax return for 1989 will be treated differently from prior years. Generally, if the employee substantiates his expenses for reimbursement from his employer, they won't be reported on his W2 at all. This same treatment holds true for travel reimbursements using per diem amounts within certain limits.

If an employee doesn't substantiate expenses or is not reimbursed, and needs to file Form 2106 for Employee Business Expenses, these amounts will be reported on Schedule A as itemized deductions, subject to a reduction by 2% of gross income.

These methods for reporting are different from the past and careful attention is required to receive the most beneficial tax treatment for both employee and employer.

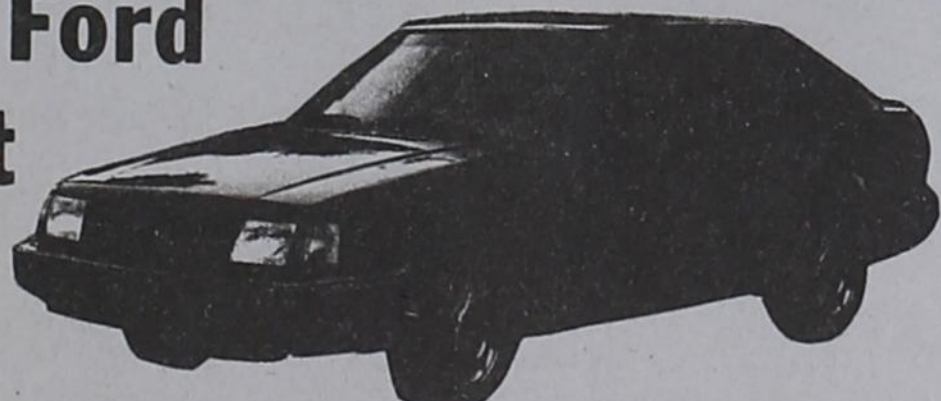

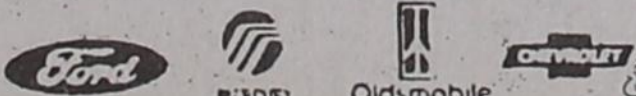

## STATEMENT OF NON-DISCRIMINATION JANUARY 10, 1990

West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. has filed with the Federal Government a Compliance Assurance in which it assures the Rural Electrification Administration that it will comply fully with all requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Agriculture issued thereunder, to the end that no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the conduct of its program and the operation of its facilities.

Under the Assurance, this organization is committed not to discriminate against any person on the ground of race, color, or national origin in its policies and practices relating to applications for service or any other policies and practices relating to treatment of beneficiaries and participants including rates, conditions and extension of service, use of any of its facilities, attendance at and participation in any meeting of beneficiaries and participants, and the exercise of any rights of such beneficiaries and participants in the conduct of the operations of this organization.

Any person who believes himself, or any specific class of individuals to be subjected by the organization to discrimination prohibited by Title VI of the Act and Rules and Regulations issued thereunder may, by himself or a representative file with the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250, or the Rural Electrification Administration, Washington, D.C. 20250, or this organization, or all, a written complaint. Such complaint must be filed not later than 90 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. ## From The Chief's Desk

This week I would like to discuss "Operation Identification" with you and show you how helpful this method of crime prevention can be to all of us.

Operation Identification is a citizen's burglary prevention program for use in homes and businesses. The Operation I.D. program involves marking property with an identifying number as a means of discouraging burglary and theft.

The Operation ID program has two parts: first, valuables are marked with the owner's driver's license number and the abbreviation of the state in which you reside (Tx.). Second, a sticker is displayed in windows of the building where the marked property is kept.
