#### Spy Stories Might Be Thrillers In Movies

There seems to be some reason to suspect that an enthusiastic movie producer may hvae taken over the United States navy this summer for the purpose of giving us a good old international spy thriller.

A former yeoman gets jugged for parting with high naval secrets, and an ex-officer must answer charges that he sold vital documents to the Japanese in the dark of the

Slant-eyed tourists with cameras approach our seacoasts at their own peril, and, all in all, the E. Phillips Oppenheim school of foreign politics hasn't had such a good season since Mata Hari met a French firing squad.

Where there is a great deal of smoke you can usually find a bit of fire, and it is quite likely that someone has, in siber truth, been passing out stray bits of information to foreign powers.

That sort of thing has been going on in every great capital since the days of Queen Elizabeth, and it would be rather odd if it had stopped altogether.

In the first place, we might as well realize that most of the 'confidential information' alleged to have been peddled in the spy markets recently is the sort of stuff that any foreign naval intelligence office could get without stirring outside of its own bailiwick.

For one thing, it could go to the movies; surely the ordinary newsreels—to say nothing of those musical comedies with battleship backgrounds—could reveal about as much about the ordinary arrangements of guns, airplane catapults, and so forth as could any out-of-work ex-of-

Anybody with a few dollars to spare can buy a copy of that excellent British compendium, "Jane's Fighting Ships." In that book he will find complete, detailed descriptions of practically every warship afloat with full information about the amount of armor plate it carries and wherer it carries it, the size, number, and range of its guns, its speed and cruising range, the number of airplanes it carries, the place and date of its building, and the must give their names and addresses, but

On top of that, there are the regular reports made by all naval attaches. These men miss very little; indeed, no very great effort is made to make them miss much.

For the simple fact is that the navies of the world have Fort Worth. very few real secrets, in time of peace. Each one knows ast how the other is equipped and what it can do; what more is there to learn,

In time of war, of course, the picture changes. Then the spy's information can be vitally important. But we aren't at war now, and there is not much sense in getting nto a lather about the dark and sinister deeds of spies, who are merely collecting information that is common property, anyway.




