





The "Dark Chapter" in the History of the Ranger Post Office

The People of Ranger and vicinity are thoroughly familiar, in the main, with the history of the Ranger Post Office. However, there is one chapter in this history-the dark chapter-which has attempted to be suppressed

The citizens of Ranger well remember when the Post Office was located in a frame building on North Marston street, just back of the present location of the West Texas Clinic. This building was sold by the owner in the later part of 1919 and it was necessary for Ranger to secure a new Post Office building. George J. McManus, of Dallas, who cwned a quarter of a block in front of the Masonic Hall in Ranger, conceived the idea of building a Post Office building on part of his land. He proposed and represented that he was going to construct a three story building, with offices above, and the Post Office on the first floor. He entered into a written contract with the Government, renting the first floor of the proposed three-story building for a period of 10 years at \$1.00 per year. In order to secure the money to construct this building, McManus secured subscriptions or donations from the business men of Ranger who owned property and who had business establishments in the vicinity of the proposed Post Office site. These donations aggregated several thousand dollars. McManus started the building, but constructed only one story. In fact, the first story was not completed at that time. The first story of the building remained in an incompleted condition for a period of some four or five years. However, due to the fact that the old frame building on North Marston street had been sold and was being torn down, the Post Office was moved to the present building, even though it was not completed at that time and was not finished until several years later. McManus refused to complete the building and the Government withheld the \$1.00 per year rental until the building was completed.

About this time, Congressman Blanton entered on the scene and introduced and put through Congress the following Bill:

AN ACT FOR THE RELIEF OF AGNES McMANUS AND GEORGE J. McMANUS

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to pay out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, and in full settlement against the Government, the sum of \$14,400.00 to Agnes McManus and George J. McManus, covering rental on their building in Ranger, Texas, at a reasonable rental thereof of \$1,800.00 per year from June 5, 1920, to June 5, 1928, the United States Government having occupied the said building as a Post Office since June 5, 1920, without having paid any rental therefor; and should the Post Office Department desire to use such building after June 5, 1928, the rental therefor shall be at the rate of \$1,800.00 per annum for such time as occupied by the Government. Approved May 29, 1928.

During the 20 long years Blanton has been in Congress, he has continually prated about stopping "waste, extravagance and graft." Also, "Honesty in Government" is one of his favorite cries. Is this his conception of stopping "waste, extravagance and graft?" The Government of the conception of stopping "waste, extravagance and graft?" ernment had the present Ranger Post Office building under written lease for 10 years at \$1.00 per year or a total of \$10.00. By this Bill, introduced by Congressman Blanton, the Government was forced to pay \$18,000.00 rental on the Ranger Post Office building for the 10 year period when the Government had it under written contract for \$10.00 or a net loss to the taxpayers of \$17,990.00. This is an example of his stopping "waste, extravagance and graft" in action.

The people of Ranger are interested in knowing why Blanton picked up Geo. J. McManus of Dallas, a life long Republican who voted for Hoover in 1932, and who is supporting Landon at this time, and handed him \$14,400.00 on a silver platter and finally paid McManus \$18,-000.00 rent on the Ranger Post Office building for a period of 10 years, when the Government had the building under a binding lease contract for the ten year period at \$1.00 per year. Does Blanton believe that "honesty in Government" is a lip-service only?

If Blanton had been as diligent for the people of Ranger as he was for McManus, his Dallas Republican friend and client, Ranger would have had a Federal Building years ago.

If Blanton wanted to be fair with the citizens of Ranger, instead of a two-way split on the \$14,400.00, why didn't he provide in his bill that the \$14,400.00 should be prorated among the citizens of Ranger whose money built the present Post Office Building? Why does he prate so much about "honest in Government", and refuse to practice it?

This is one of the four Bills Blanton has introduced in Congress in. the last 20 years. This bill is his child, but he now tries to disown it. He even refrains from mentioning it. Another of his four bills, is the '83-page Blanton Bill", which he talks about, but refuses to disclose its contents. Who has seen a copy of the "83-page Blanton Bill"?

This is one chapter—the dark chapter—in the history of the Ranger Post Office Building that Blanton has diligently tried to keep un-


