## School Doors Swing Open Monday Morning

### 1936 AND 1937 SESSIONS EXPECTED TO BE BEST YEARS; NEW TEACHERS TAKE UP DUTIES

School Doors In Ranger Will Swing Open In The Morning at 8:30; Most of the Day Will Be Consumed In Organizing Classes

Registration in Ranger Junior College and Ranger High School will continue all day Monday beginning at 9 o'clock in the morning. The formal opening of both institutions will be observed with a general assembly in the high school auditorium at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, September 8th. A program of general interest has been arranged and Dr. Harry A. Logsdon, Mayor of the City, will make the main address. Classes will begin regularly at 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The ward schools will each have opening exercises on Monday morning at 9 o'clock. After the opening program the pupils will be enrolled and the books will be issued. Regular class work will begin in these schools Tuesday morning.

### NEW TEACHERS IN HIGH AND J. C. WELL TRAINED

New Teachers Report for Duty; Trained in Special Field of Work

The 1936-37 session of Ranger Junior College and High School finds several new teachers reporting for duty. Mr. J. N. Crawford will be head of the department of mathematics. He is a graduate of Trinity University, holds the M. A. degree from the University of Chicago, and has most of his work off for the doctor's degree. Mr. Crawford is an experienced band leader and will have charge of the Ranger Band this year.

Miss Mary Grace O'Bannon will be head of the modern language department. She holds both the B. S. degree and M. A. degree from C. I. A., and has had teaching experience in some of the good high schools of Texas.

Mr. Baker Wright, head coach and instructor of physical education, is a graduate of the University of Texas. He played four years of football with Austin high school and lettered repeatedly in this and other sports during his years at the university. His major for his degree was physical education.

Mr. O. L. McGahey is co-ordinator and instructor for diversified occupations. He has taught a number of years in Texas, is a graduate of Daniel Baker College, and has had special training in the A. & M. College of Texas.

### MANY SCHOOLS REPRESENTED ON FACULTY

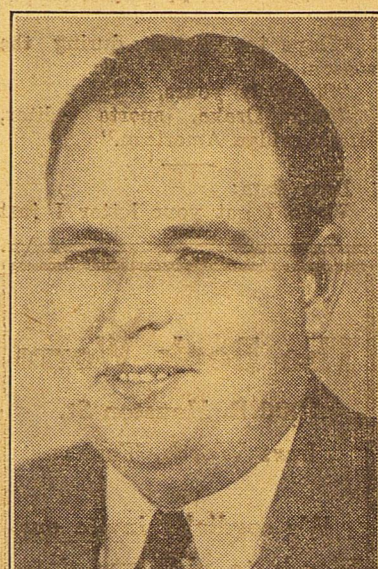
C. I. A. Leads Others; Much Enthusiasm Present; Students Anxious for New Studies

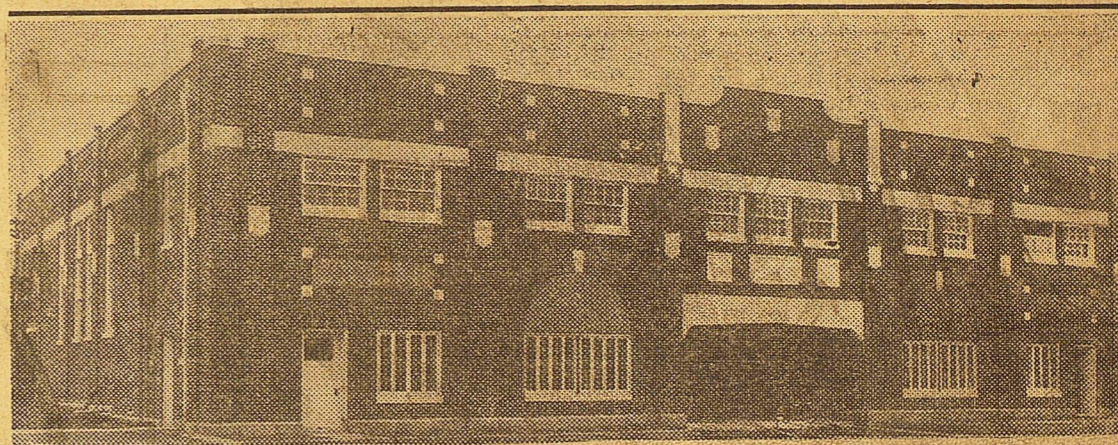

### Cooper Schools Preparing For a Big Year Again During 1936-37

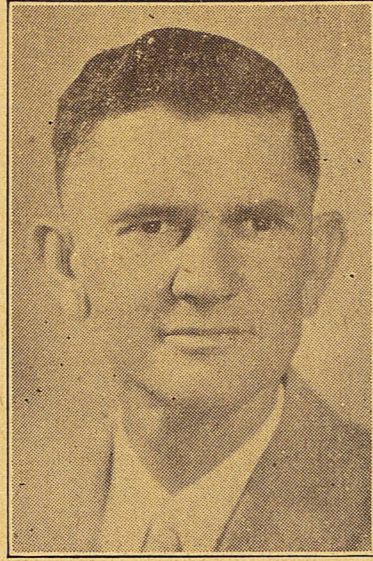

### Investors In 1408 Home Financing Groups Insured

WASHINGTON. — Continuing its steady growth in coverage of eligible savings institutions, the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation reports that up to August 15 the protection of insurance of investors' accounts had been granted to 1408 thrift and home-loan institutions located in almost all the states of the country and in the District of Columbia and Hawaii.

Illustrating the steady growth in numbers of the institutions taking advantage of this additional safeguard for their investors, in the past month alone 44 applicant associations were approved for insurance. Almost 45,000 more investors are thus given the benefit of insurance, bringing the total of insured savers to more than 1,100,000. The combined assets of the 1408 insured associations now total upward of \$961,000,000.

Each shareholder and depositor in these units, which include savings, building and loan associations, cooperative banks and home-stand associations, is safeguarded against loss of his account up to \$5000. Such insurance was made available by Congress in June, 1934, as a part of the National Housing Act. The Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation was set up as a government agency to administer the insurance.

Insurance of accounts is open to all institutions of this type which apply for insurance and are approved as to their soundness. All federally chartered savings and loan associations are required to be insured. To date, state-chartered institutions numbering 268 have become insured. In addition, 517 associations that have converted to

Federal charter in the past three years are so protected. The other insured institutions are Federal Savings and Loan associations that have been recently chartered.

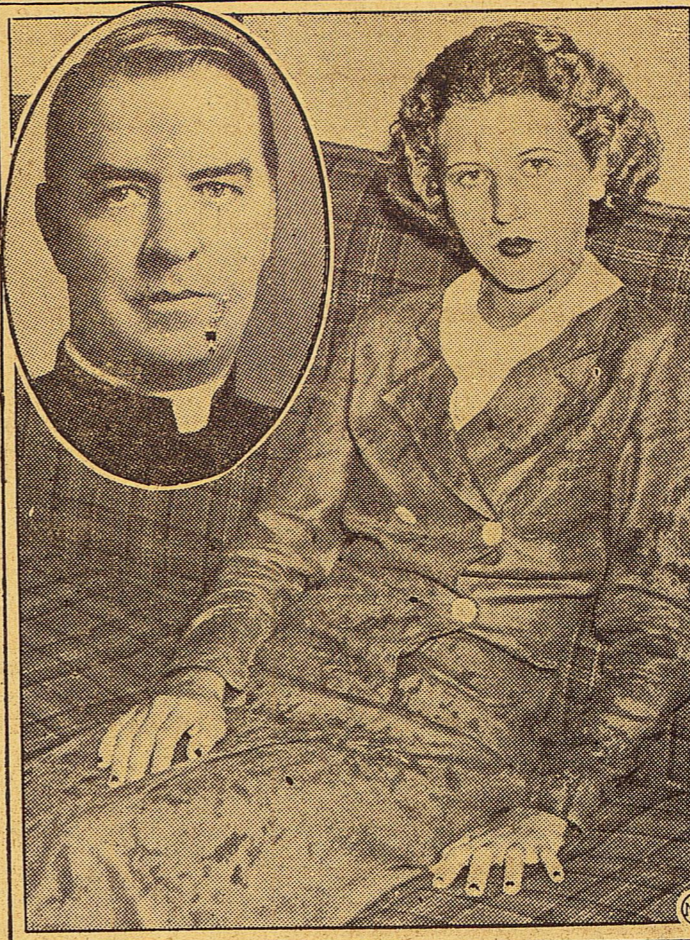
By strengthening public confidence in associations of this type, which are leaders in the small home mortgage field, the insurance feature serves to attract an increasing flow of private capital into home-financing channels. Accordingly, loan funds are made more available locally for potential home-owner borrowers at moderate interest rates.

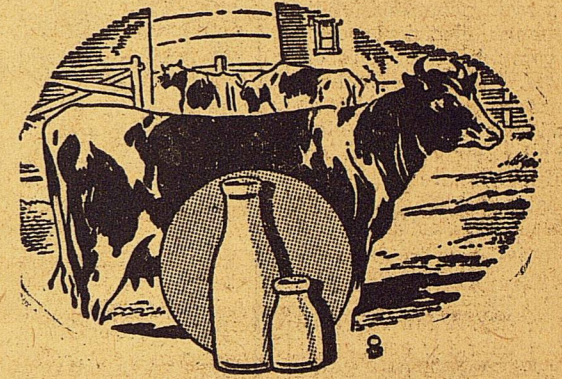
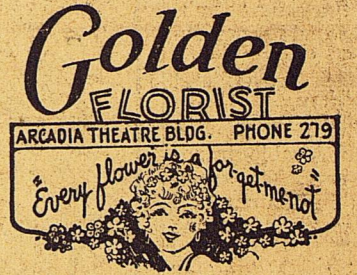
### Row Over Girl Praying in Slacks

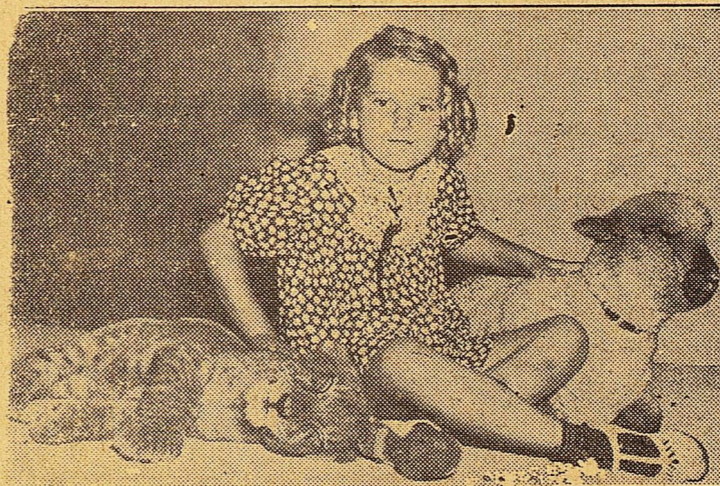
