DATE IS SET

Old Age Assistance Revenue To Be The First Topic Submitted

By United Press

AUSTIN, Sept. 10 .- Governor Allred today announced that he would convene a special session of the Texas Legislature Sept. 28.

Allred said that the first topic he will submit to the special session will be financing of old age assistance. He has not determined if he will submit the question of an unemployment insurance act. Allred still is awaiting a report on whether a valid act can be passed and made effective this year.

Allred said he is not prepared to estimate how much additional money will be required.

"There will probably be three times as many persons qualify for old age assistance as has been estimated on the reports from the percentage in other states," he said. "That is because the Texas law is more liberal than that of other states.'

When estimates were made by director Orville Carpenter, the figure was placed at 60,000. proximately 72,000 were on rolls Sept. 1.

The state democratic platform, adopted this week at Fort Worth, with the governor's approval, called for "substantial" increases in the taxes on natural resources.



Benefits Of Public School Worth Cost

Figure sharks in one or another of the federal departments in Washington have been taking a look at the cost of public education, and they have just emerged with the announcement that it costs \$9.18 to give a city child a year's education in the public schols. For rural children, the cost is a good deal lower.

The figure is worth remembering. Considering what we get for our money where the public schools are concerned, it is remarkably low.

For the plain fact is that today's schoolma'am does a great deal more than teach her youngsters the traditional three R's. Year after year we have been unloading on her shoulders much of the work which previously had been performed by fathers and mothers.

When Junior trudges off to school nowadays, he is not merely setting out to learn how to read and write and cipher. He is also going to be taught how to avoid the dangers of city raffic, how to keep his teeth and ears clean, how to read the newspapers and find out what is going on in the world, and how to get along with his fellows.

He will acquire those fundamental ideals of honesty, good conduct, and co-operation which, a generation ago, he would have got in the home or nowhere.

He will learn about the Boston tea party and he will also be taught those little details of local history which old-time schools considered beneath their dignity. If he has any special talent in the way or drawing ability, a knack of working with his hands, or a flair for music, the school will find it out and develop it.

If he has bad tonsils, defective eyes, or poor teeth, the chances are that the school will learn about it before his paernts do. If he is underweight, the parents are apt to learn about it from the school.

Now all this is the sort of thing that used to be considered entirely outside the school's province. It was the parents who took care of those things.

The school was strictly a place for specialized instruction which the father and mother lacked the time or the skill to impart. It aimed to take the child and make him literate; anything more would have to come from his

The schools, in other words, are doing a lot of Papa's and Mama's work for them. Whether they are doing that work better or worse than Papa and Mama would do it is beside the point; they are doing it, Papa and Mama seem pleased with the arrangement, and Sonny Boy apparently is making out very well.


With all that taken into consideration, it must be admitted that \$96.18 is a low price for a year's course in the public schols. And—to repeat—at a time when it is increasingly important to cut public expenditures, that fact is worth remembering.

Wherever we may need to economize, we should cut the school budget just about the last of all. We're getting a lot for our \$96.18.







World Supply of American Cotton

WASHINGTON.—The smallest prospective world supply of American cotton since 1929 was reported today by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

Latest crops reports plus trade estimates of world carry-over as of August 1 indicate a present total world supply of about 19,600. 000 bales of American cotton. Last year's supply was slightly larger. The peak of the supply-26,-000,000 bales-in recent years was in 1931. Stocks continued burdensome until 1934 when the crop totaled less than 10,000,000 bales, and the world supply of American cotton was about 20,000,000 bales This supply about equalled the 1923-32 ten year average.

A sharp improvement in price coincident with the declining supply and increased consumption during the recovery period was also reported. For instance, the average price at 10 spot cotton markets in the United States in 1931-32 was 5.89 cents per pound of cotton. The price thereafter advanced to an average of 12.36 cents in 1934-35, and this year a seasonal high average of 13.08 cents was reached in the week ended July 18.

Prices have tended lower since mid-July, the decline being attributed by the bureau to August 1 prospects for a somewhat larger crop in the United States, the relaively low price of foreign growth cotton, increased obstacles to the mportation of American cotton by Italy and Germany, and to the civil war in Spain.

But the bureau reported that domestic cotton mill activity continus to be "very high," and that European mill activity is "fairly high," although conditions vary in different countries. Mill activity yarn production and cloth exports n Japan were reported at "high levels," but the bureau said that in Japan, American cotton is being replaced to a large extent by foreign cottons, especially Indian and Brazilian.




