A while back, Rockwell got to thinking about the New Deal and his editorials about it, and decided to reprint selected pieces in a little pamphlet. Apparently copies got into the hands of thee persons who count at Republican headquarters. They were pleased with "A Country Editor Views the New Deal," and evidently felt it represented the Republican point of view in a peculiarly effective manner.

Result: an order to Editor Rockwell from the Republican National Committee for 1,000,000 copies of his pamphlet. Though Editor Rockwell has a modern plant for a town of Murphysboro's size, a million copies was something else again. He had to turn the order over to a city printing plant and be content with a royalty.
