The country of Denmark is about the size of New Mexico and has five million people. The crops they raise are wheat, corn, oats and a few cattle are being raised there. The fishing industry is popular. Lars said there are lots of islands along the shore line and the climate is much cooler than here. The rainfall is heavier in Denmark than in Texas.

Cafeteria Prices Are Established

The Bovina School Board voted to charge \$3 for meal tickets at the school cafeteria for all outsiders who choose to be at the school at meal time. This is with the exception of open house during the school year.

The charges for youngsters are: kindergarten through sixth grade, 90¢; grades 7-12, \$1. Teachers and school personnel, \$1.50.

The country is governed by Queen Magrete. The Protestant and Catholic Churches are combined and Lars said not many people attend church. His family did not and said it was not unusual to have about twelve people in church for the services.

His hobbies include soccer, tennis, badmitten and he will be playing football for the first time. He enjoys music, television and really enjoys swimming.

The young man speaks Danish, English and some French. He wanted to come to America to learn more English because when he gets out of college he wants to live in an American speaking country.

This is his first trip to America. He is having a good time and enjoys being with the Walters family.

The Bovina Ambulance Service was chartered in October of 1978. This service was brought to town through the efforts of Dick Richards and Don Spring, doing most of the legwork, assisted by all the members.

D.A.R.E. Project Implemented Here

Parmer County's four school systems will participate in the D.A.R.E. project, a joint project of local law enforcement agencies and local school districts and communities to prevent substance abuse in children and youth.

Karen Britten has been employed as a sheriff's deputy for Parmer County, and will be the instructor for Project D.A.R.E. in Parmer County schools.

The program emphasis for Project D.A.R.E. is to help students recognize and resist the many subtle pressures that influence them to experiment with alcohol and drugs. In addition, program strategies are planned to focus on feelings relating to self-esteem, interpersonal and communicative skills, decision making, and positive alternatives to drug abuse.

In order to teach the D.A.R.E. course, a person has to be a licensed, certified police officer. Ms. Britten, a native of Groom, attended Texas Tech University and Amarillo College, and then enrolled in the Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy, graduating in May of 1988.

She was serving as assistant director of security at the Excel

Corp. plant at Friona prior to accepting the county's D.A.R.E. assignment.

The program is designed for grades five and six, and has had many positive results in those schools in which it has been implemented.

Teachers and principals report fewer in-classroom disciplinary problems, decreased absenteeism and tardiness, and a higher respect for authority. Also, there has been a marked decrease in school vandalism in many of the participating schools.

Ms. Britten's instruction also will focus on resisting peer pressure, building self-esteem, managing stress without taking drugs, alternatives to drug abuse, and taking a stand.

The classes will be 45 minutes in length, and will be a part of the school curriculum. Various classes will devote their class time to the D.A.R.E. project.

The project is to be funded through a joint effort of Parmer County, the City of Friona, and the school districts of Friona, Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie.

In addition, a grant for the program has been received from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC).

Patrolman Wayne (Butch) Schultz has resigned his position as patrolman for the City of Bovina.

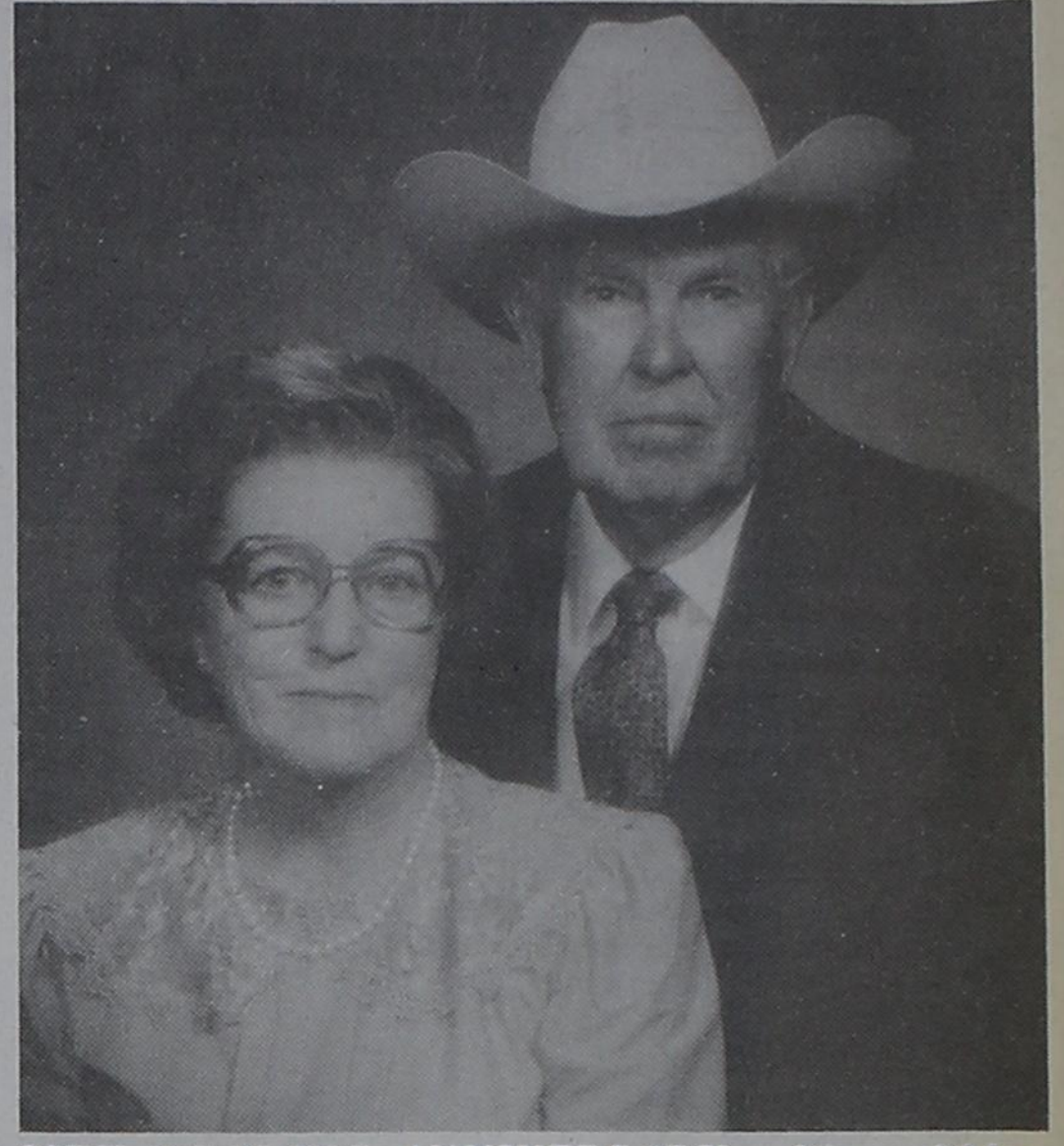
Wiley Lide celebrated his birthday at the Senior Citizens building with a party in his honor.

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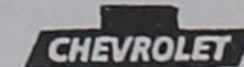

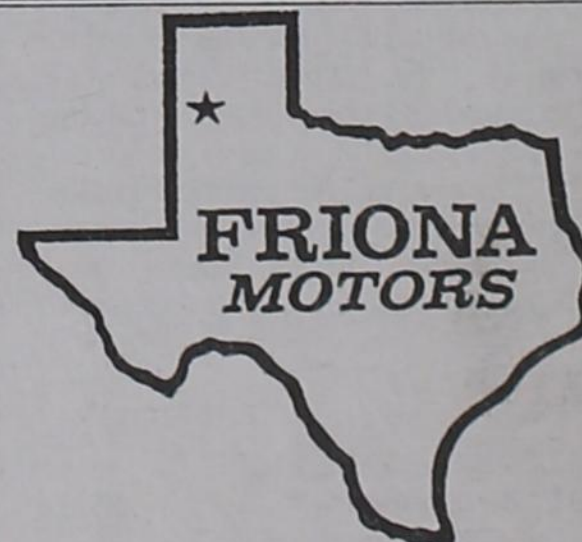

Angler's Corner

As fall approaches and many folks prepare for harvest or a late vacation, knowledgeable bass anglers try to squeeze in a few days of fishing as this time of year presents a unique opportunity. For the handful of diehards that search for that five to ten pound plus largemouth bass, the fall season is trophy hunting time.

While a five pound bass isn't much in east and south Texas, in the Panhandle, it's a wall-hanger. A seven pounder is considered a monster. The culprit is the shorter growing season. A month or two difference can mean several pounds difference over the lifespan of a bass. Growth stops in water lower than 50 degrees. In northern lakes, a largemouth may live to be 12 to 15 years old. In the warmer southern lakes, 10 years is about maximum.

Females outlive their male counterparts and therefore account for the vast majority of trophies. In one study only nine per cent of the males reached five years or more while thirty per cent of females lived for over five years. The balance of bass to forage also effects growth as over-populated lakes force the fish to compete for food.

The world record bass weighed in at a heart-stopping 22 pounds, 4 ounces. In just the last few years only two bass weighing more than 21 pounds have been certified. Today 20 pound class largemouths are rare. That makes the world record even more spectacular when you consider that it was caught over 58 years ago in June of 1932, by George Perry at Montgomery Lake in Georgia. Little did Mr. Perry realize when he cast a wooden Creek Chub crankbait that he would turn the bass fishing world on its ear for more than half a century.

California, Florida and Texas are believed by many fisheries biologists to hold a few lakes capable of producing the next world record. For the Panhandle basser, this means heading out of town, way out of town. If your heart is set on a 10 pound plus fish, head south and don't stop until you get to Lake Fork near Dallas. Choke Canyon near San Antonio is another contender for the title. Both are expertly managed and fairly new lakes. There are a handful of other hopefuls in the south but these two remain the most consistent.

For the Panhandle angler that simply doesn't have the time for a long trip, a 5 pounder from an area lake can be as elusive as the next world record. Knowing where the bass are and why they are there are the key elements in trophy hunting.

The summer feeding reduces the forage bass forcing the bass to cruise the shallows for prey. Cooling of the water combined with the sun lower in the sky allow the fish to stay in shallows longer. It would seem that all one would need to do is locate a forage school on one's sonar unit and work the area.

This is easier said than done. The shallower water reduces the size of the sound cone emitted from the sonar's transducer. In water less than five feet, the cone of a transom mounted unit may not reach the front of the boat. While a front mounted trolling motor transducer can show you what lies beneath you, positioning your boat that close to shore will spook any fish in the vicinity.

Your best bet is to fish shallow water adjacent to deep drop-offs or ravines. Rip-rap is also an excellent fall location as the rocks hold some of the day's heat attracting forage and predators. On our area lakes, outcroppings of rock, shallow shoreline brush and isolated shallow cover are top choices.

Live crawdads rank as the best choice, followed by frogs and large waterdogs. Soft plastics such as the grub or worm are good choices in lures. Large spinnerbaits are another top choice. It would be advisable to attach some type of trailer to the spinnerbait such as a pork frog or eel, or plastic split tails.

As winter approaches, the largemouth goes into a feeding binge to gear up for the approaching cold weather. If you want that once in a lifetime fish, fall is definitely the time to ply the waters.

The white bass have been hot at the marina at Meredith as well as

the smallmouths. Local authorities point to Bugbee Canyon as a hot spot for crappie, whites, largemouth and smallies. The fishing at Meredith takes a nosedive on the weekends, more than likely due to increased traffic and fishing pressure but really picks up as the week goes on.

On the night of July 29, the white bass were close enough to the top to watch them take live minnows suspended a few inches under the surface. For several minutes, the whites hooked up with bait as fast as you could get it back to the water. A small inch and a half clear/sparkle tube lure also enticed the whites to strike. Some jigging was necessary after the first hook-up.

I used an underwater fishing light called the starlight. It is an extremely bright light that draws baitfish by the hundreds. This in turn brought the white bass and crappie. This light can be obtained through tackle dealers or ordered from Bass Pro Shops.

R.B. Riley joined me for a couple of days at Meredith after one of the recent rains and caught more fish out of the back of the boat than I could take from working the docks. The fishing was good as evidenced by the fact that I'm not sure I ever saw him get out of his chair except when he had to haul in fish or bait the hook. In the short time he was there, he caught whites, crappie, catfish and smallmouth bass.

Anyway, keep that line tight and be careful on the water. Good luck.
