

#### Spoils System, Halting Progress, Must Go

They tell a story about the immigrant who was applying for citizenship papers and who was being tested as to his knowledge of American government. He was askedl. "If you wanted to be a postmaster, whom would you ask for the job?"

The answer, of course, should have been "The president" — the idea being that the prospective citizen was supposed to know that the president appoints postmasters. But this immigrant knew his way around a little better than that. His answer was, "My district leader'."

In that little story is the whole case for civil service reform. The immigrant was technically wrong, but practically right.

Government in America is a matter of favors, and the imigrant knew it. If you want to work for the government, it is far better to know the right man than to possess the right qualifications.

This, of course, is old stuff. Everybody knows it even the immigrants who have been here only a few years. Bue we are rapidly getting to the point — if, indeed, we haven't got 'way past it — where this time-honored system is simply too expensive to be put up with any longer.

We seem to be fated to live in a society which entrusts more and more of its jobs to the government—city, state or federal. It is infinitely more important than it was a generation ago to have these jobs filled on the basis of merit. They touch our lives so much more closely than they used to. It is so much more necessary to get competent work out of the job holders.

She finally despaired of Long's return and made her way, nearly starved, to Austin's colony in Fort Bend county, where she died in 1880 in her 83rd year.

A. It was organized in 1856 with O. B. Miles, chief justice (county judge); William Curtis, sheriff; P. Pool, county clerk; Irvin F. Carter, tax assessor and collector. The first store, also used for a postoffice, was erected there in 1855 by August Klappenbach.

A. Johiah Wilbarger, in 1828. Q. Was James Bowie in the battle of Concepcion in October, 1835? H. G.

A. He rendered distinguished service in that battle, in which he was second in command.

## 10,000 Years Ago Certainly No Sissy

CLOVIS, N. M. - The Folsom man, who roamed the high plains of Texas and New Mexico 10,000 years ago, was certainly no sissy. Members of a joint expedition

from the Academy of Natural Sciences at Philadelphia, the Carnegie Institute at Washington and the University Museum of Philadelphia, found traces of the pre-historic man's prowess in Blackwater Draw between Clovis and Portales, N. M., this summer.

Several speciments of the longtoothed elephants uncovered carried the stone head from a Folsom's spear. At least one showed evidence of having died from a thrust of the human's crude wea-

Dr. Edgar B. Howard, associate in paleontology at the Academy, said the discovery of elephants killed with a spear were the first ever made.

"The bone points apparently are the first of their kind to be found with pre-historic elephants," Howard's announcement said. "Evidence of the early hunters' beautiful workmanship may be seen in the carefully chipped stone spear points, which are leafshaped in appearance and in perfect condition—some 10,000 years later.

"One can picture the ponderous mammoths, bogged in the swamp that once covered the site of the present excacations, being finished off by the deadly spears of the Folsom hunters.

"The occurrence of so many weapons and tools in place with the elephant bones precludes any doubt that man existed on this continent at the same time as the mammoths. The date may be estimated as approximately 8,000 B.

This summer's expedition was the second made by Dr. Howard and his associates. He visited the Blackwater Draw area three years ago. Last year, excavations were made in the Scandinavian countries of Europe in an effort to find if the Folsom man ever inhabited those regions.
