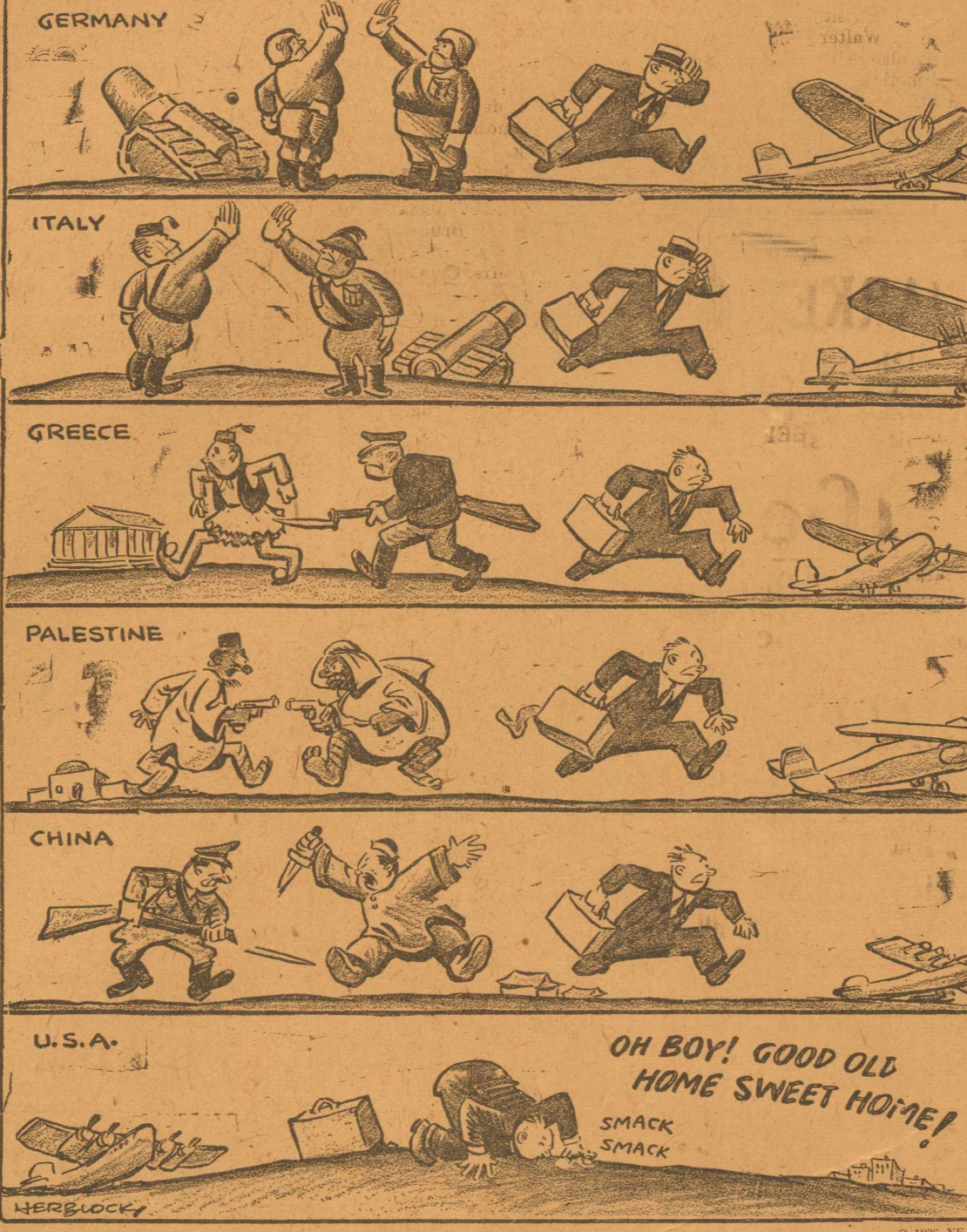
Germany is getting liberal—one of the American boys was arrested for smuggling the marks they set at the Olympic games.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. — Given time and excuse enough, the wolves howl for a football coach's head. Oftentimes they do not need much excuse.

PIERRE, S. D.—A. M. Jackley, snake expert, says that hunting rattlers is as simple as the ABC's—"if you know your business."

"The veteran uses a leather noose on the end of a stout stick to pick up snakes and put them in a sack for safekeeping."

"For instance, the myth about a horse's rope around a tent being protection against rattlers is foolish. Hundreds of rattlesnakes have been photographed crossing ropes."

"Rattlesnakes are born and bull snakes are hatched, so interbreeding is a biological impossibility."

And the much heralded feud between the rattler and the bull snake amounts to nothing, Jackley said. It is true that they sometimes battle to death, he admitted, but this is the exception rather than the rule.
