## Jo Blackwell Wins Weekly Contest

Nineteen additional contestants picked nine games right and 11 others had scores of eight for the week.

Mrs. Kerby used her score to hold onto first place in the overall contest standings, with a score of 59. Jerry Roach is two points behind at 57.

Will Bell, Hattie Burnett, Susan Kerby, Kay Roach and Ella Jo Stormes are tied with scores of 56; Judy Hromas, Frances Johnson, Al Kerby, Jr., A.M. Wilson and Mary Jane Wilson have scores of 55.

Five more contestants have scores of 54, four are at 53 and four at 52.

Contestants are vying for the grand prize of \$100 cash to be awarded at the conclusion of the contest.

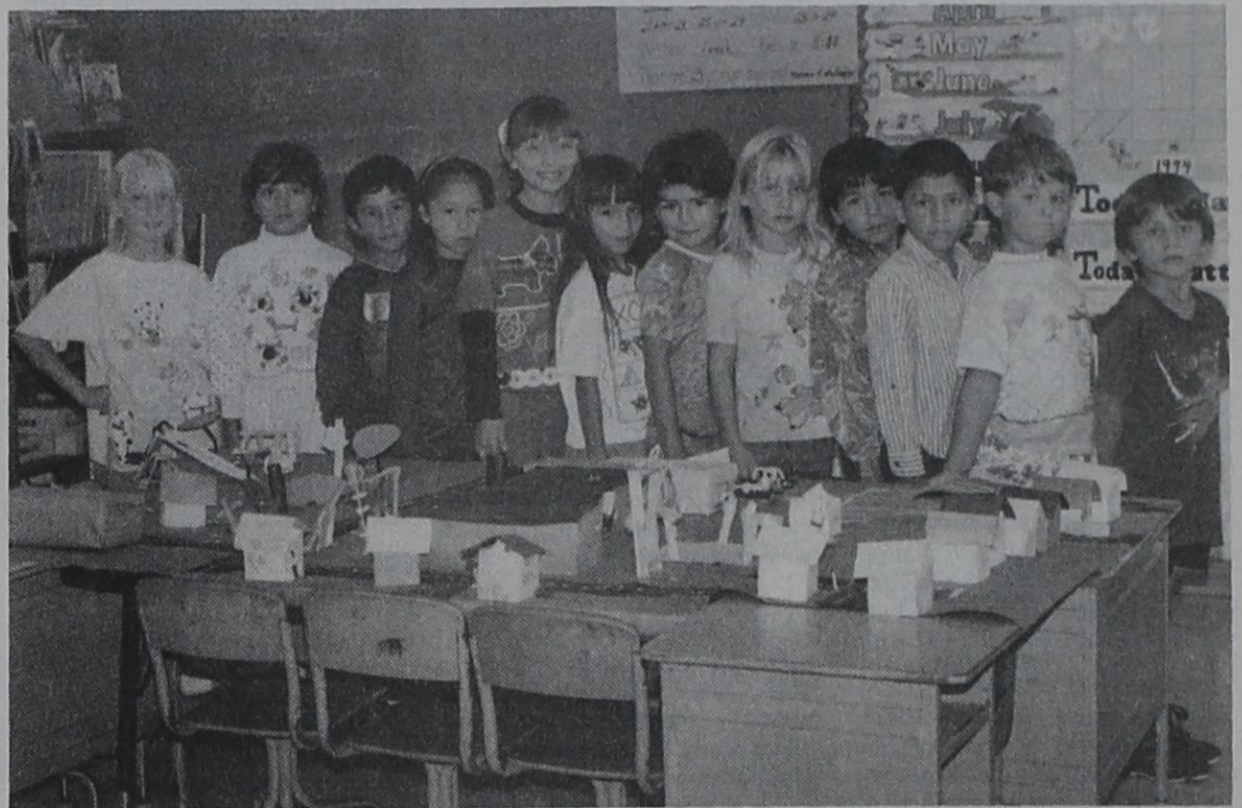
## Early School Commodities Dismissal To Be Given

Mrs. Debbie Widner's second grade class has recently constructed a model of the school, playground and the area surrounding the school.

To begin with, each member of the class went outside and drew a map of their school and the streets surrounding it. This was the most difficult part of the project according to Victoria Carrillo.

Then, they modeled the school buildings, playground equipment, basketball court, tennis courts, and surrounding houses out of construction paper, pipe cleaners, milk cartons and various other products.

This project enabled the students to learn many varied subjects and concepts, including:

Social studies--learning about their surrounding community.

Math skills and proportions--measuring and making the buildings to the proper scale.

Traffic--they learned about intersections and stop signs.

## Sid Lloyd And Daughter Tour Washington D. C.

On August 25, 1994, my mother (Sid Lloyd) and I left Amarillo to visit my brother, her son, his wife, Myrna and daughter Pam in Alexandria, Virginia.

While there we spent eight and one-half days of touring and sight-seeing some of the great places in and around our nation's capital city.

We started out with some of the concerts presented by the U.S. Navy and U.S. Marine Bands, on the grounds of the Sylvan Theater. While there, we went on a night tour of the national monument and the lights of the capitol building.

We rode the elevator, 555 feet to the top of the Washington Monument, to view the city of Washington D.C., parts of Maryland and Virginia. This monument was erected in memory of George Washington, the nation's first president.

The capitol building, house of representatives and the senate chambers was such a beautiful building as were the carvings and all the statues of the great people who had a part in the building of this nation.

While there we ate lunch at the Senate Restaurant. It seems just about anywhere we were, we could always see the beautiful dome with the 19 foot High Statue of Freedom standing tall on top.

We went on to see the Lincoln Memorial, 19 foot high marble sculpture of Abraham Lincoln; Library of Congress, which houses over 14 million books and 36 million manuscripts; The Old Post Office Building, 315 foot tower and

viewed the Bell Chamber; Arlington National Cemetery, changing of the guard at the tomb of the unknown soldier, the gravesite of John F. Kennedy, Jacqueline, and two of their children and also the gravesite of his brother, Robert F. Kennedy.

From the National Cemetery, we rode the metro train to the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial, the polished black granite wall, with over 58 thousand name to honor the Vietnam War's dead or missing.

The Smithsonian was so much to see, we just had time to see parts of the National Museum of American history; National Air and Space; Museum of the Natural History; National Gallery of Art; Sculpture Gardens; and we walked through the beautiful gardens of the original Smithsonian building.

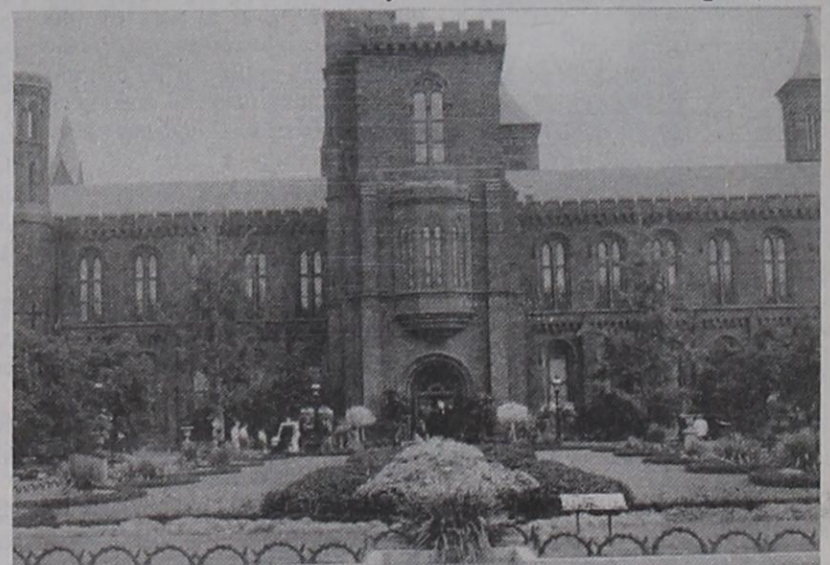
We toured the Treasury

Department (the money factory) and watched the printing of one, five, ten, twenty, and fifty dollar bills, (so close but so far from so much money!)

The Washington National Cathedral houses the tomb of president Woodrow Wilson. In addition to it's twelve hundred regular services each year, there are services for other denominations as well as for many national, civic and governmental organizations. It is administered by the Episcopal Church, but is also a house of prayer for all people.

We drove out to the Great Falls Park where the Potomac River builds up speed and falls over the steep, jagged rocks and flows through the narrow gorge, then levels off to the Clam River that separates Washington, D. C. and

A View Of The Original Smithsonian Institute

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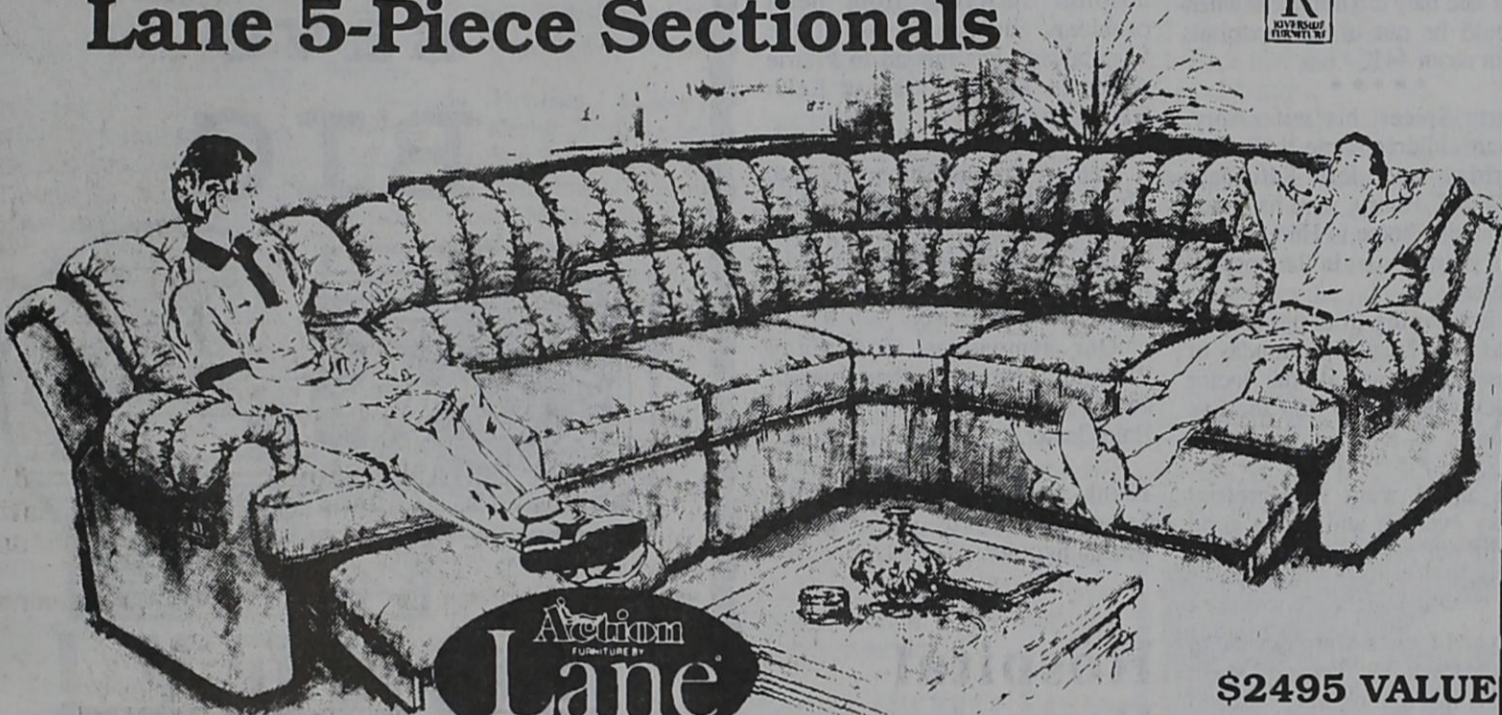
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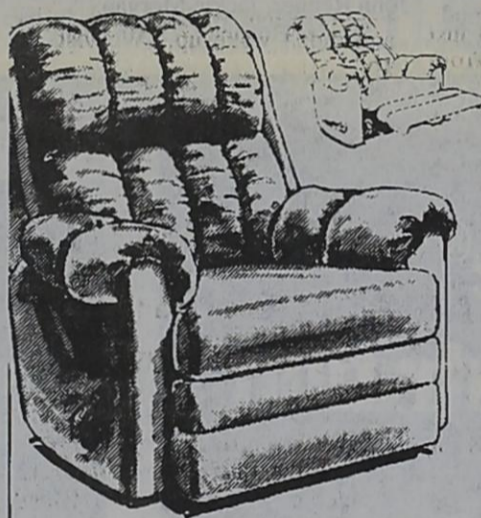
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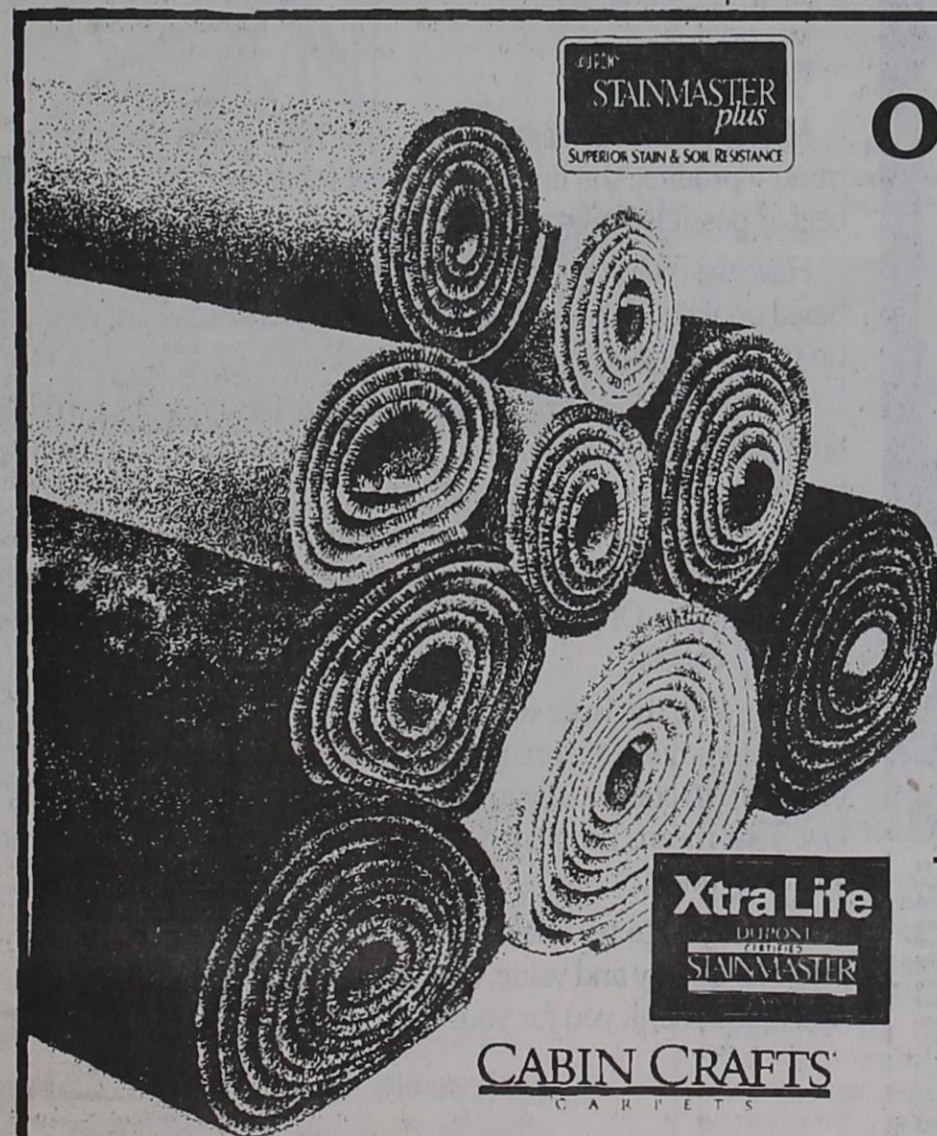
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# Scooter's Scoops

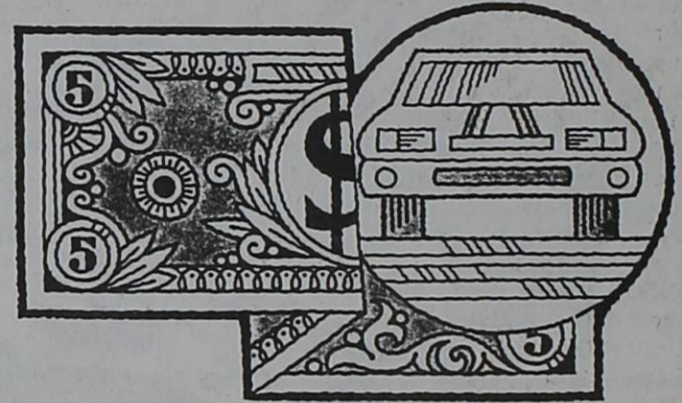
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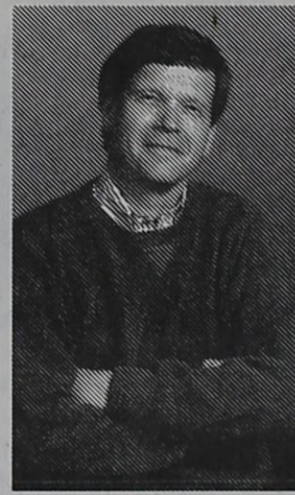

## B. Caldwell Is Buried On Sunday

Memorial services for Edmund Bedford Caldwell, 82, of Bovina were held Sunday afternoon, October 9 in Bovina United Methodist Church with the Revs. J.B. Fowler, a retired Methodist minister, and Steve Venable, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Bovina Cemetery under direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Caldwell died Thursday, October 6, 1994, in Lakeside Care Center in Lubbock.

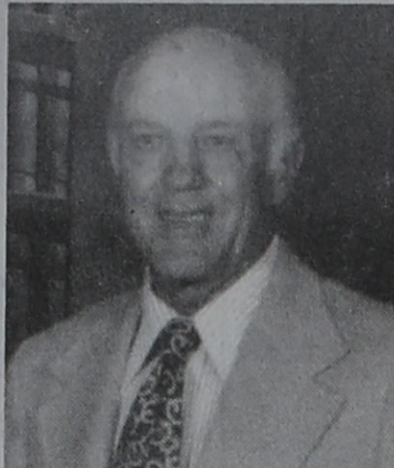
He was born November 16, 1911, in Valley View. He graduated from Oklahoma Lane High School and attended Texas Tech University, where he was a member of Alpha Tau Omega fraternity.

Caldwell married Pauline Phillips on October 16, 1938, in Lubbock. He served on the Bovina School Board. He was a member of the City Council, the Chamber of Commerce, the Masonic Lodge, the Boy Scout Area Council, Administrative Board and Board of Trustees of Bovina United Methodist Church.

Caldwell was named Man of the Year of the Boy Scout Area council in 1964, and he received the Heritage Award from the Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture in 1993.

He worked for J. K. Applewhite Implement Co. in Tahoka, Brownfield and O'Donnell, and he farmed and owned the Bovina Implement Co. He served as mayor of Bovina for four years. A son, James Wayne, died in 1951.

Survivors include his wife; four sons, Dr. Philip Caldwell of Duncanville, Don Caldwell of Boston, Mass., Bill Caldwell and Bruce Caldwell, both of Lubbock; four brothers, Bob of Canyon, Ralph of Lewisville, Charles of Houston and Tom of Bovina; a sister, Ruth Coates of Wichita, Kansas; and ten grandchildren.

**IRMA STARK'S COTTAGE CHEESE SALAD**  
1 package lime Jello  
1 small can crushed pineapple  
1 cup marshmallows, diced  
1 cup cottage cheese  
1/2 cup chopped nuts  
1 cup whipping cream  
1/2 cup water

Mix Jello, water and pineapple. Bring to a boil and boil one minute. Let cool. Add diced marshmallows, cottage cheese, nuts and whipped cream. Pour in long Pyrex dish. Chill in refrigerator. Serves 10 to 12.

**HEAVENLY HASH**

4 egg yolks  
4 tablespoons sugar  
4 tablespoons vinegar  
14 ounces marshmallows  
1-#2 can pineapple chunks, drained  
1-8 ounce jar maraschino cherries, cut in small pieces  
1 cup chopped nuts  
1 pint whipping cream  
Beat egg yolks until light. Add sugar and vinegar. Cook, stirring constantly until like custard. Remove from flame and place in refrigerator. Add cherries and juice to marshmallows and pineapple. Add nuts. Mix custard with fruit, nuts and 1 pint whipping cream. Mix well and chill before serving.

**ORANGE SHERBET SALAD**

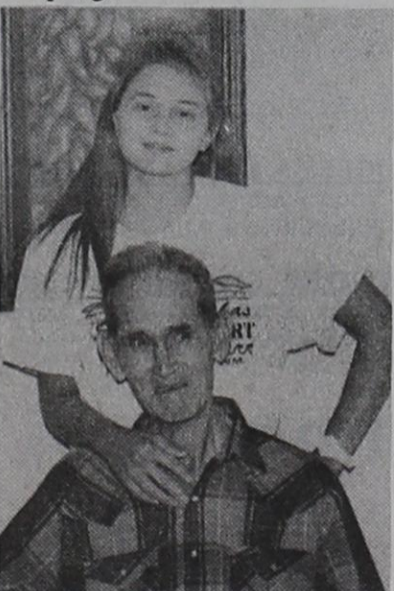
1-6 ounce package orange Jello  
1 cup boiling water

1-11 ounce can Mandarin oranges, drained

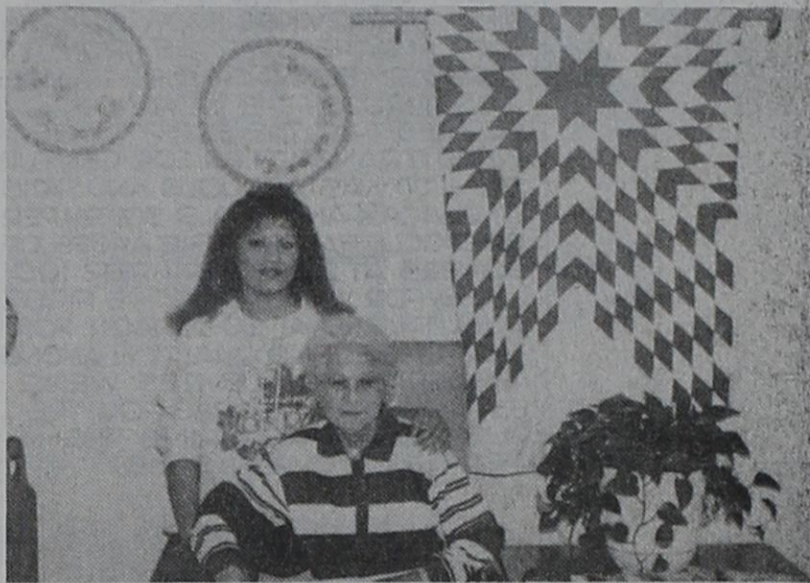

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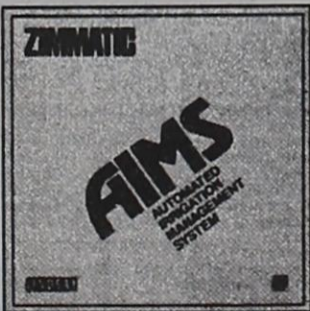

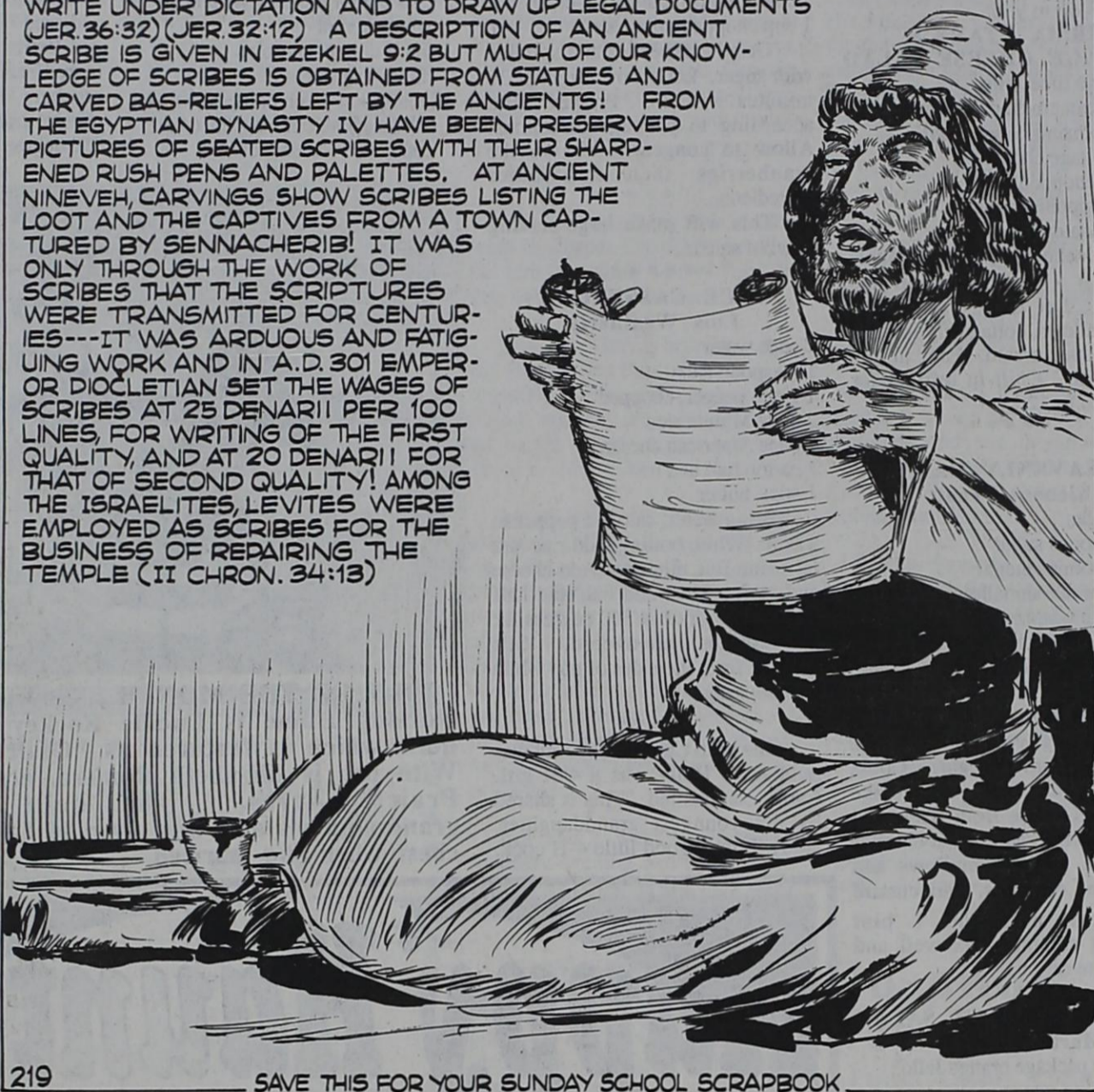

### JENNIFER EARLY J. Early Is Honored

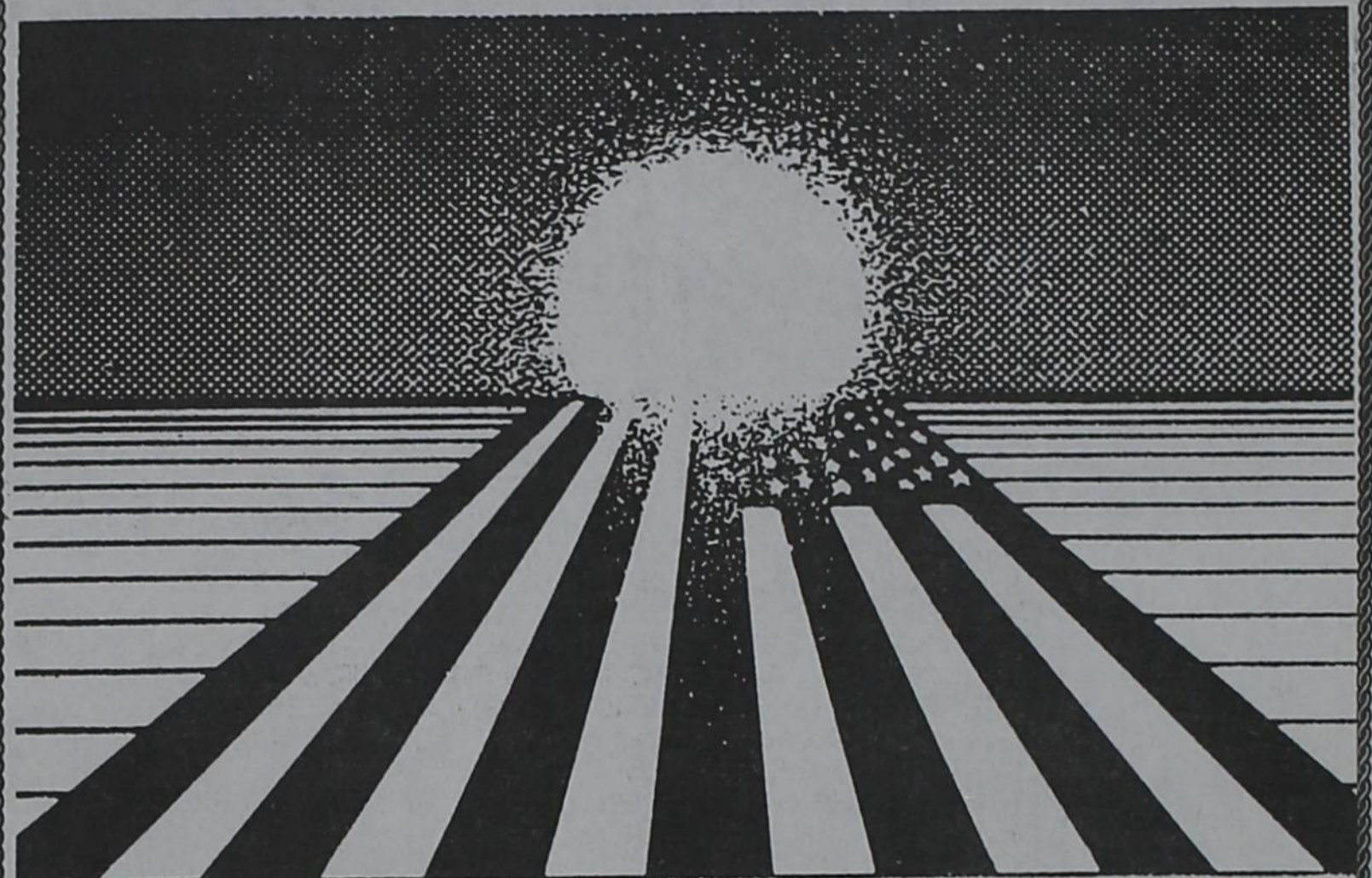

# Happy Homemaker

By JUNE FLOYD



Before beginning cucumber pickle recipes from Carrie's Cooking this week, we're going to present a highly recommended pickle recipe submitted by Vuthill Loafman, who reported, "This is Jo Blackburn's recipe that I have been using for many years and it is one of the easiest and best I've ever tried."

## JO'S CUCUMBER PICKLES

2 quarts vinegar  
2 quarts water  
2 quarts water  
1 cup canning salt

Combine these ingredients and bring to a boil. Add 1 tablespoon white mustard seed, 3 red hot dry peppers, 1/2 teaspoon alum, 3-4 bay leaves and one bunch of dill.

Pack cucumbers in jars and pour hot liquid over them before sealing. Leave six weeks before eating.

## LYDA'S SWEET CRISP PICKLES

(Over 100 years old)

Wash medium to small cucumbers and put into a crock or quart jars. For each quart add: 1 tablespoon salt (not iodized) and 1 teaspoon alum

Fill container or containers

with cold vinegar and let stand at least six weeks before making sweet pickles.

For sour pickles, leave them as they are and use as needed. This is a good idea if you're using a crock. Put cucumbers in as picked and add the vinegar solution to cover. These do not have to be sealed.

For sweet pickles, slice and add syrup made as follows, combining: 1 cup water  
1-1/4 cups sugar  
1-1/2 teaspoon pickling spice

Combine ingredients and boil before pouring over cucumbers. Let stand at least 12 hours before using.

## DEMOCRATS SWEET CRISP PICKLES

(This is very good)

Slice seven pounds of medium sized cucumbers 1/4 inch thick. Cover with a solution of 2 cups of slaked lime in two gallons of water. Soak 24 hours. (Slaked lime is available from your lumber dealer.)

Next day, rinse cucumbers well and cover with fresh water. Soak three hours longer. Drain and cover with mixture made as follows:

2 quarts vinegar  
4-1/2 pounds (9 cups) sugar  
1 teaspoon celery seed  
1 teaspoon whole cloves  
1 teaspoon mixed pickling spices  
1 tablespoon salt

Soak cucumbers overnight then boil four minutes. Pack in sterilized jars and seal. This recipe can be used for green tomato pickles and for watermelon pickles. A variation calls for 1 tablespoon each of celery salt and pickling spices and no whole cloves.

## FOURTEEN DAY SWEET PICKLES

(This is a very old recipe but has proven to be great.)

Into a clean stone jar, place 2 gallons of medium size cucumbers, which have been washed and sliced lengthwise. If not sliced, they will shrivel. Dissolve two cups salt in one gallon boiling water. Pour, while hot, over cucumbers; cover and weight down. Let stand in brine one week. On eighth day, drain and pour 1 gallon of boiling water on cucumbers. Let stand 24 hours. On ninth day, drain and cover with one gallon of boiling water to which one tablespoon powdered alum has been added. Let stand another 24 hours. On tenth day, drain again and put 1 gallon boiling water over cucumbers. Let stand 24 hours. On eleventh day, you are ready for the mixture made by combining:

4 pints boiling vinegar  
6 cups sugar  
1/2 ounce celery seed  
1 ounce stick cinnamon

Heat to boiling point and pour over pickles. On twelfth day, drain, heat and add 1 cup sugar. Once again, pour over pickles. On 13th day, add another cup of sugar and repeat process. On 14th day, drain, heat, add sugar and put cucumbers

in jars. Cover with hot mixture and seal. Each quart, add 1 head fresh dill, 1 small red or green hot pepper and 2 to 3 cloves fresh garlic.

Bring two quarts water, one quart vinegar and 1 cup non-iodized salt to a boil. Pour over cucumbers while hot and seal.

## PICKLED RINGS

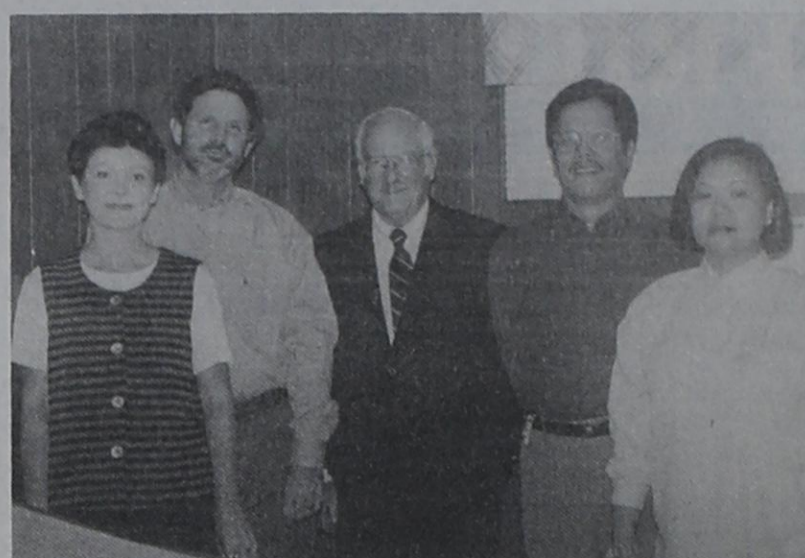
Wash and peel 8 to 10 large cucumbers. Core center and cut like apple rings. Soak overnight in: 2 cups lime  
2 gallons water

Drain next morning and let stand 3 hours in clear water. Drain and cover with:

1 cup vinegar  
1 bottle red food coloring  
1 teaspoon alum

Enough water to cover  
Boil 1 hour. Let stand overnight. Drain. Make syrup of: 2 cups vinegar  
10 cups sugar  
2 cups water  
2 teaspoons salt  
12-14 red hots  
8 cinnamon sticks

Heat syrup and pour over cucumbers. Let stand overnight. The next three mornings, drain syrup, heat and pour over cucumbers again. The fourth morning, heat syrup and pour over cucumbers, which have been placed in jars, and seal. When you stir, be sure to do it carefully so you will not break the rings--especially while they are in the lime solution.

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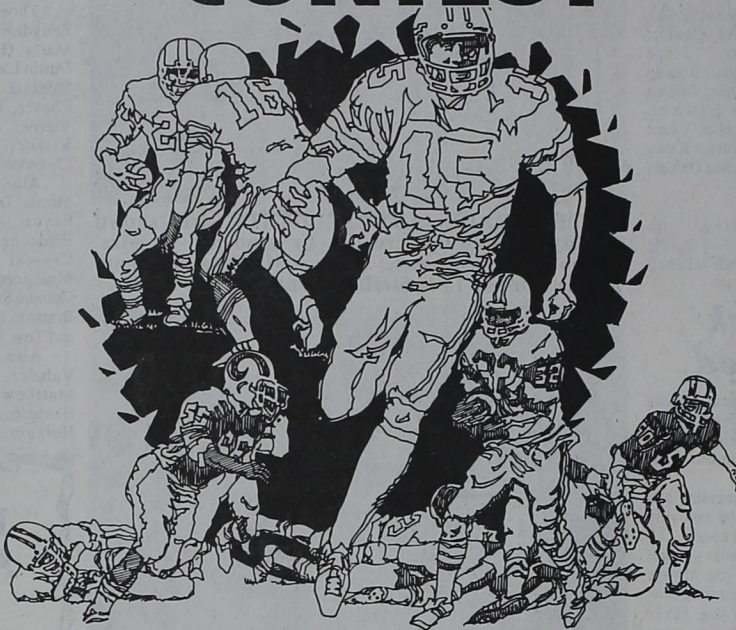

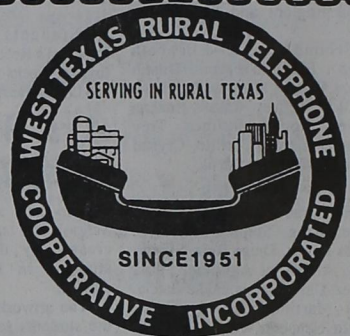
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
