Justice Takes a Holiday

Hitler discovered early in his regime that the courts could be turned into an effective instrument of totalitarianism. World opinion cast an aura of sanctity around the courtroom. There was a general feeling that Justice was an absolute and that anything that happened in a court of law necessarily had the blessing of the blind goddess with the scales in her hand.

Hitler took advantage of this popular feeling. A dictator could, if he wished, plunder, persecute and murder without any higher authority than his own decree. But even dictators must acknowledge the weight of world opinion.

In enlisting the formality of courtroom procedure, the Nazi leader started something.

The Reichstag fire trial was probably the first instance in which Der Fuehrer used his new weapon.

All the trappings were there—the judges, the lawyers, the uniformed attendants, the routine procedure. Only the public was locked out. The public and the goddess of justice. Yet, when it was all over and the victims had been beheaded or put safely out of the way, it didn't look quite so much like outright persecution and murder. Instead there were "convictions" and "executions" and "sentences," and that didn't sound nearly so bad.

So Hitler just kept on, and Russia got the idea. Several thousand people who didn't see eye to eye with Stalinist policy were "sentenced" to death. Not murdered, mind you. There were "trials" and that took the sting off the official massacre.

When France's share of the war was over, the Vichy government decided something had to be done to cleanse the soul of France. So the former leaders of what was once a great republic were brought to trial and charged with war guilt.

Next in the chain of trials may be that of Mme. Magda Lupescu, the unpopular friend of former King Carol of Rumania. There is some talk among the Nazi Iron Guards of asking Spain and Portugal to extradite Mme. Lupescu and Ernest Udareanu, former Rumanian minister without portfolio.

To the dwindling democratic world, where justice still means something more than a dress rehearsal for murder, governmental trials in continental Europe no longer mean anything. Americas have long since ceased to be deluded.

Germany sends troops to guard Rumanian oil wells. While they're at it, they send a motorized division but they're not fueling anybody but themselves.

"If I pass the test satisfactorily and a bomber is ready to go to Britain, then I'll make my first airplane trip across the Atlantic." Alexander has been a pilot for 12 years. He would receive the

ranking of a captain and \$8,000 per year if he is accepted in Britain's service. He expected here that his main duties would be ferrying planes from one English airport to another, but he hopes to get into the thick of fighting as soon as possible. Seven Suggestions About Colds Given By Health Officer

AUSTIN, Tex.—With open season for colds at hand, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, suggests ways by which they can be avoided or reduced to a minimum. Here they are:

No. 1: Keep yourself as fit as possible. Substitute the simpler and more nourishing foods for rich mixtures. Eggs, milk, and other dairy products, fruits and green vegetables are rich in the vitamins that are a protection against colds. Add them to your diet. Drink several glasses of water daily.

No. 2: Dress according to the weather. Keep comfortably warm. Have a sweater handy or a warm coat to slip on when the days turn cold suddenly. Light a fire or turn on the heat if your house is damp and chilly. If you are a housekeeper, get your warm bedclothes out—and use them.

No. 3: Avoid sudden chilling. Change as quickly as possible to dry shoes and dry clothing if you are caught unprepared in a freezing rain.

No. 4: Get some exercise in the open air every day—a brisk walk, if you can't do more than that. Hold your head up and breathe deeply as you walk. Keep your sleeping quarters and your working rooms well ventilated, and get plenty of sleep.

No. 5: Colds are catching. Don't

go where people are coughing or sneezing. Wash your hands before eating.

No. 6: If your powers of resistance have been lowered and a cold "catches" you, don't fight it. You will save time and strength and get well more quickly if you go to bed, eat lightly, drink plenty of water and stay in bed until your physician says you may get up. Don't wait, either, until you are seriously ill to send for your doctor. Send for him promptly, and follow his advice.

No. 7: Don't give your cold to others. Have your own towel and drinking glass. Don't broadcast your germs. Don't sneeze or cough in your neighbor's face. Keep yourself well supplied with paper handkerchiefs and destroy them after using. Postpone visits to friends until your cold is non-communicable.

90-CENT SEARCH BY SOCIAL SECURITY NETS WOMAN THOUSANDS IN BENEFITS

WASHINGTON—Because the Social Security Board kept 20 clerks and accountants busy for two months hunting a missing 90 cents, a Maryland widow stands to gain several thousand dollars.

The widow is Mrs. Thomas Bruce Holland, of Riverdale, Md., and her story is a striking example of the importance a little bookkeeping can have.

Her husband died last January and she applied for social security benefits for herself and her four small children.

The law says that a woman in such a position may draw benefits for herself and her children if her husband has paid social security taxes on as much as \$50 in each of six calendar quarters spread over the preceding three years.

SEARCH BEGINS FOR 90 CENTS

When the records were checked it was found that Holland had paid properly on the minimum sum for five quarters—but that for the sixth quarter he had paid taxes only on \$49.10.

Mrs. Holland remembered that he had worked briefly in that quarter for two firms not listed in the record. The Social Security Board went on a hunt for them.

SMALLEST AMOUNTS SHOULD BE RECORDED

The board's workers found a former fellow employe who recalled that Holland had worked for this man. His testimony refreshed the ex-employer's memory and he checked back through his books—and found that he had paid Holland \$5 in wages. He said he thought the sum was so small it just wasn't worth reporting.

When that went on the Social Security Board's books it put Holland over the minimum. As a result, Mrs. Holland will draw benefits until her youngest child, now five, is 18. It will mean several thousand dollars to her.

Moral, says the Social Security Board, is just this: the tiniest payment made to a worker should go down on the books in Washington. If it isn't, it may make all the difference to the man's family years later.

During the year 88,917 vehicles stopped at the 7 year-round stations and in the three summer months, 19,175 vehicles stopped at the 6 summer operated stations.

MARFA, Texas—Cattlemen in West Texas were aglow with optimism over the results of the Highland Hereford sale at Marfa at which a price indication for calves and yearlings was established.

Over 2000 head of choice Highland cattle were sold for a top price of approximately \$125,000 at the 10th annual sale, but this was considered secondary in view

of the price indications. Cattle experts present said that the national defense program is expected to create a new and large demand for beef cattle—a market which is expected to hold up well for at least a year. Willingness of feeders to pay \$1 a hundred more for calves than ranchmen expected to receive, indicates a shortage of desirable livestock for shipment to feeding areas. Another indication of the desire to obtain calves and yearlings from this section was the effort of feeders, who were unable to buy during the sale to deal with individual ranchmen.

Most of the calves in this area have been contracted for with some contracts dating back to late spring and early summer for all at good prices. Feeders said that drought conditions in some sections of the corn belt will tend to force the price of market cattle higher. Iowa and some parts of Illinois and Indiana have suffered serious corn production declines because of the hot weather.
