RAILS FAILURE IS BLAMED ON

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.-A senate interstate commerce subcommittee today blamed a group of "stock market ventures operating on a shoe string" for mismanagement which led to bankruptcy of the Chicago Great Western railroad company in 1935.

Asserting that the group operated through the Bremo corporation, a holding company, the subcommittee reported to the senate that facts disclosed in hearings illustrated the need of legislatioon "to prevent railroads from becoming the victims of holding company speculation.'

"The public interest requires that the management of railroads should be in responsible and con-scientious hands," the report said, "and not under the control of speculators."

"Railroad regulation is seriously hampered, unless holding companies and similar interests which control many roads are eliminated or carefully regulated. At present there is no effective means of even ascertaining the identity of the persons or companies which own railroad stocks. Legislation is necessary to deal with the whole problem of railroad holding com

It included the salaries paid to all courts, the prosecutors, sheriffs, jail costs, etc. Such a figure is obviously out of all reason.

Let's examine our own county records:

THE COST OF OUR LEGAL MACHINERY IN EASTLAND COUNTY LAST YEAR WAS IN ROUND FIGURES \$40,000. The income from beer licenses and taxes during the year its sale was legal was approximately \$8,000.

In arriving at the \$40,000 figure the following costs are lumped:

Salaries of the two District Judges.

Salary of the District Attorney.

Salary of the District Clerk.

Salaries of the Sheriff and Deputies.

Cost of feeding and care of prisoners.

Income from fines and forfeitures, etc.

All of this amounts to \$40,000 in round Courses.

DO WE NOT STILL PAY THESE OFFICIALS AND

THIS JAIL COST? ARE NOT THESE OVERHEAD COSTS (with the exception of the income from fines which is revenue and not a cost still being paid?) HAVE WE REMOVED THIS COST BY VOTING BEER SALES ILLEGAL? IS THIS TELLING THE TRUTH ABOUT CRIME COSTS IN EASTLAND COUNTY?

Moreover, the county auditor's records show that two-thirds of the salaries paid for judges, prosecutor, district clerk and other court costs are chargeable to civil litigation and is not under any stretch of imagination to be chargeable to criminal costs. The crime bill in Eastland county during 1939 was only a small fraction of the \$40,000. As a matter of fact fines and forfeitures for the period were only \$1,524.00!

AND THE COST OF DEALING WITH CRIME IN EAST-LAND COUNTY NOW IS JUST ABOUT THE SAME THIS YEAR according to the records.

The county still has two district courts which cost as much to operate now as in 1939:

The county still has its district attorney whose salary is the

The county still has a district clerk, whose salary is the same

same as in 1939;

The county still has a sheriff and sheriff's deputies, whose number and pay are still the same;

The county still has its jail and all other legal machinery to deal with crime;

WHAT IT DOES NOT HAVE IS THE \$8,000 IN LICENSES FROM THE SALE OF BEER WHICH IT HAD WHEN THE SALE OF BEER WAS LEGAL, TO HELP PAY THE COSTS OF COUNTY GOVERNMENT!

This \$8,000 is coming out of the pockets of the people of the county. It is another burden on business, which, added to the loss of revenue to business in the county, is helping to make business conditions more intolerable and to drive payrolls out of our towns!

This is in addition to the loss of revenue which legal beer would bring into our communities in the form of trade that is sorely needed. The loss in this business is a fact that cannot be ignored. It is reflected from streets and business houses. It is reflected in less employment, delinquent taxes, unpaid bills, and a hundred other manifestations of the normal business life of our community. The income from beer licenses to our cities would enable them to keep W. P. A. projects going that are now about to be closed!

While beer is still being consumed in large quantities we have robbed ourselves and our business of the benefits its legal sale would bring under the mistaken assumption that we can make people abstain by passing a law! We have undermined respect for law and business, too!

Instead of keeping the sale of beer under practical regulation by keeping it open and confined to legitimate, respectable places of business in our communities, we have driven it into the shadows where it would take an army of gestapos to keep people from drinking it. And we have sent thousands of dollars a year into the tills of merchants in competing cities where beer is sold to give those cities the benefit of a revenue that belongs to us and would help make more tolerable the conditions from which we draw our livelihood.






