Crockett, District Priorities Manager at Dallas The new repair work plan represents an effort by the Division of Priorities, OPM, to keep American defense industries and certain essential industries running at full speed, and to prevent any break in the increasing tempo of defense production, Mr. Crockett said.

Set up along simple lines, the plan provides machinery under which priority status for repair work in 20 industrial classifications can be obtained easily, so that the firms and agencies in these classifications may obtain repair parts promptly.

Hitler's armies officially were reported today to be smashing the Russian positions in an unprecedented battle for Leningrad and were pressing a big scale offensive in the Ukraine today.

The Red Army claimed gains on the Central Front.

Tremendous aerial bombardment, tank-led attacks and fierce hand-to-hand fighting was reported as the Germans threw their full weight into the direct assault upon Leningrad, said indirectly to be in flames. Crack troops of both sides appeared to be locked in a battle of steadily increasing

On the Central Front the Red Army reported driving the Germans back 35 miles northeast of Smolensk, after inflicting 10,000 casualties and opening the way for "investment" of the ruined town of Smolensk.

In the south the Germans said big offensive was in progress toward the Crimea and the big Ukraine industrial areas. Nazi dive bombers were reported to be leading the attacks. Moscow made no mention of the Ukraine in toay's war communiques.

In the Baltic the Russians said they had defeated two Nazi attempts to seize an island off Estonia with naval and parachute orces, sinking two enemy cruis-

The explosion of three modern wedish destroyers near Stock-olm, apparently had no direct onnection with the war on the north. It was believed that careless handling of a torpedo might have set off the explosion on one destroyer and the flames spread to The Defense Mediation Board to the other two. War, Not-Quite-War, Limited War

Is it war? Not necessarily. This is 1941, not 1917. This is a different world in many respects; the very word war does not mean what it used to mean.

Certainly the "shoot-first" orders may mean fighting, and may mean loss of the lives of American sailors, Marines, civilians. It might not even then be war, unlimited war, war to the finish in every field.

Early in this conflict Germany drew a line around a large chunk of the North Atlantic, including some of the Western Hemisphere, and said, "This is a war zone. We will not permit shipping within it. We wll sink ships which violate our order."

That has nothing to do with old-fashioned rules of blockade. That is roping off a large chunk of the high seas as a battle-ground. Is anybody else bound to accede to it? You need only ask: suppose the German "war zone" had been made to extend right up to the American three-

Certainly we would not have acceded to that. Why? Because it would have infringed clearly on our rights, and definitely menaced our safety and welfare.

In the meantime, events have made it desirable to establish an American outpost in Iceland. We have decided that Atlantic waters west of Iceland are vital to us. Some of those waters are in the zone "roped off" by the Germans earlier in the war as their "war zone."

Who is going to say that waters of the earth shall be used by whom? Hairsplittings about old international precedents do not matter now. The Germans say, "You shall not use certain waters." We say, "We have the right to use them, it is vital to us to use them, and we shall use

There trouble may easily lie. We must face it and we will face it. Two things might yet happen short of what we used to thing of as war.

Hitler might quietly order his submarines and raiders out of the disputed area, without ever publicly announcing it. Without ever publicly admitting that he was wrong and that we are right, he could judiciously avoid trouble as a matter of policy. A lot of things are being done that

Or we might resolutely embark in a naval war to clear the disputed areas without committing ourselves to the general outcome of the war or its consequences, for we are in the happy position of being able to go to war as far as

we wish and our interests demand, and no farther. Is it war? It depends on what you mean by war.


