

ITHACA, N. Y .- The draft and defense industries are causing ar increasing shortage of men teach ers, now needed more than ever for the rearmament effort, according to Lewis Eldred, chairman of the Educational Service Bureau at Cornell University.

The shortage will soon be acute he adds. However in fields usually dominated by women, such as strike against 25 steamship lines. English, languages and social studies, there is still an adequate

supply.

The need for men teachers is intensified in the fields in which they usually specialize: Science, mathematics, agriculture, physical education, industrial arts and technical subjects. The reason is the greater demand for graduates trained in these subjects.

Another factor in the scarcity of men teachers, according to Eldred, is the reluctance of education boards to hire men teachers unless they can produce evidence that they will not be called in the draft for at least one year. "The latter," Eldred explained, "often being impossible, curtails the effective supply of men teachers almost as much as actual selection for service.

"The relatively higher wages paid by defense industries are attracting men and women who would otherwise be entering the teaching profession. General freedom of money and relatively easy employment has increased the number of marriages, and, therefore, decreased the number of was men available for teaching posi

Most Truckers Are Observing Law On Higher Load Limit

AUSTIN, Texas-Texas truck drivers on the whole are comply-

From May through July, the first three full months after the old 7,000 pound load limit law Weight Division filed 1,111 cases for violations, compared with 5,-634 in the same period of 1940. Most of the violations, Garison said, are comitted by out-ofstate truckers.

"There has been some criticism wholesale violations of the 38,000 pound gross weight law, but diligent enforcement efforts fail to reveal any such conditions. We recently checked fifty lumber trucks in one day near the Corpus Christi Naval Base and found that, despite the appearance on enormous weight, every one of the was within the legal weight and size," Garrison said.

Fines and costs under the old law usually amounted to \$14.50, and the operators did not mind risking being caught. Minimum fines under the new law are \$25 for the first offense, \$50 for the second, and \$100 for the third, plus court costs.

Try This One, Just for Size

The putting of shoes on other feet is always a good way to get a line on the last. Ambassador von Thermann, Germany's gift to Argentina, is quite plaintive in his reply to the Argentine Congress' demand that he get out. He won't, he says, until ordered out by his chief in Germany, and further, he has done nothing but what ambassadors of all belligerent countries do in war-time, that is, make propaganda for his side.

That's true enough. The ambassadors of all countries in the war are naturally trying to present their side of the story. Though technically wrong, that is accepted within

But the limits are important. To see why Argentina is sore about von Thermann, let's put the shoe on the other foot and see how Hitler would like the fit of it.

Suppose that in Nazi Germany there were thousands of Argentines. Suppose that they had been drilled for years to believe that even if they became German citizens, that it was just a gag; secretly they were to maintain first loyalty to Argentina. Suppose Argentina got in a war. Suppose the Argentine ambassador to Germany then proceeded to organize all Agentine-Germans into phony Argentine cultural groups whose real object was to overturn the German government and set up a new one, Argentine style. Suppose those groups drilled and armed themselves. Suppose the home government of the Argentine put pressure on all Argentine-Germans such as to command their loyalty even if they wanted to become good Germans. Suppose Argentina spent millions of marks in Germany through swollen consular staffs to bribe the German press and carry on constant agitation to overturn the German government and set up one controlled from the Argentine. Suppose great communities of those Argentines in Germany insisted on having their own schools and in speaking Spanish only.

Suppose—but why go on? It is obvious that Hitler would not tolerate any such monkey-business for one holy

Yet his ambassador, who has done all those things and tion that he was only making a little propaganda for his

When you conceive such a complete change of shoes as this, it immediately becomes apparent why Nazi Germany can't get along with a single country in the whole world. It is because it assumes that rules which apply to others do not apply to Nazi Germany; that in some strange way which the world stubbornly will not understand, the Germans are above the rules that other peo-

How long it will take, what terrible measures it will take, to show the Germans that they are just another of the earth's peoples, we do not know.

- To such position in the world as their peaceful accomplishments may gain for them, they are entitled. To a position of dominance gained simply by terror and force and brass, they shall not climb. Slowly, but with overwhelming potential power behind it, the whole world is making that decision.



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


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
