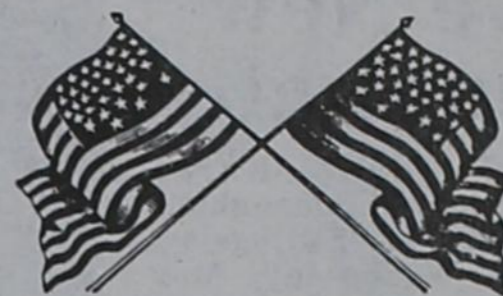


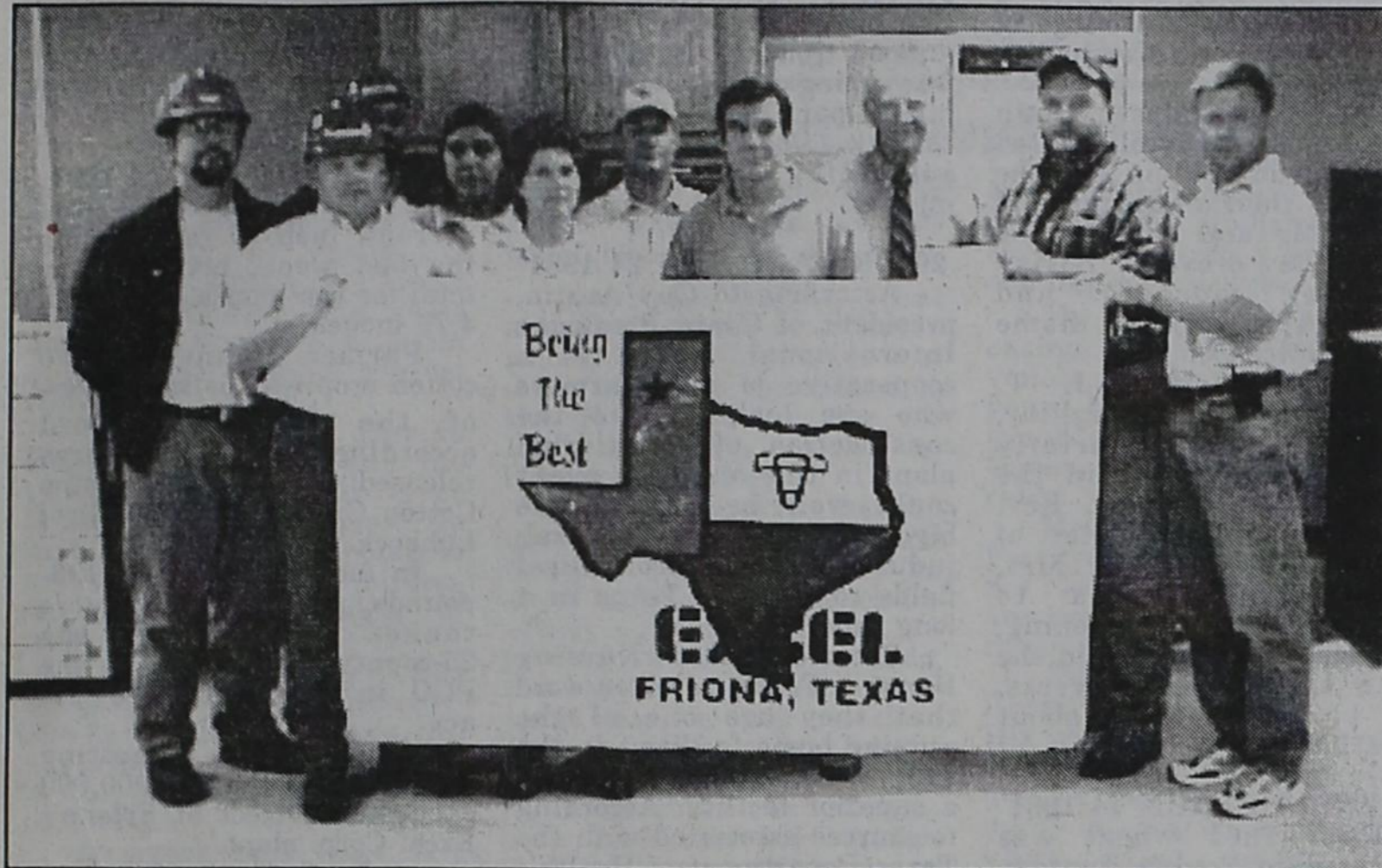

Excel Presents Gift For Hospital Building Fund

Parmer County Community Hospital's building fund benefitted this week with a \$25,000 gift from the Excel Corporation and its parent company, the Cargill Foundation of Minneapolis.

Steve Thompson, Excel's Friona General Manager, made the presentation to hospital administrator Bill Neeley.

It was the second gift from Excel, which has now contributed \$75,000 to the hospital. Work is well underway on the hospital addition, since Excel's previous gift.

"We were most happy to receive this gift. We appreciate the folks at Excel for supporting our hospital the way they do. This goes to prove that Excel is an

integral part of our community, and is interested in its well being, and we appreciate their continued support," Neeley said.

"Excel Friona is proud to be a member of the community. This is a small token of our friendship and willingness to help where and when needed," Thompson added.

"We recognize the importance of health care to every citizen in the area. We are pleased that the Cargill Foundation also recognizes how important local and accessible health care is, not only to our employees, but the community at large," Thompson added.

On hand besides Neeley on behalf of the hospital were board members Danny Kendrick and Mike Hutson.

Members of Excel's management team present besides Thompson were Dwayne Jakob, Brad Churchill, Rick Jones, Sandip Lalli, Margaret Robinson and Rick White.

Wiley Hicks Construction of Amarillo is the main contractor for the hospital addition, has the construction well underway, having begun early this year.

The addition will amount to around 5,000 square feet of floor space, with an overall cost of at least \$500,000. The new space will allow the hospital and clinic to meet the healthcare needs of the communities it serves, with more outpatient-oriented services. Plans are to have an expanded Emergency Room, a new laboratory, and more X-Ray space.

Scroggins' Valedictory Address Is Presented

(Following is the text of K'Leigh Scroggins' valedictory address to her classmates of 2001. We wish K'Leigh and all 2001 graduates the very best in their future endeavors.)

Ralph Waldo Emerson said "Do not go where the path may lead, go instead where there is no path and leave a trail." Now that we have come to the end of one

path in our life, it is time we begin the next trail. With every beginning there is an ending and so it must be that way with life. To prepare for "Life" we must have a plan. Month Ends Dry After Wet Start

The month of May ended on a dry note after an unusually wet start, but the way the weather in the area went the past week, with golfball-sized hail and tornadoes around the Panhandle, farmers, gardeners and lawn buffs may have been just as glad they missed out on a raincloud.

As it was, Wednesday evening's promising raincloud contained possible tornadoes, as residents in the country could see funnels dipping and darting downward to the west of Friona.

The Hereford area was placed under a tornado warning, and the cloud that came across the county from Broadview, N.M., through the Rhea community and on past through the Lazbuddie community into Lamb County drew the watchful eye of the National Weather Service and Amarillo TV meteorologists.

Fortunately for the area, no tornado ever made it to the ground, but unfortunately for Parmer County farmers, no appreciable moisture was received, and it has become terribly dry after May started off with a 4.6-inch rain in the month's first week (May 4).

Thanks to another shower that measured .87 inch on May 12, the month's total moisture at the official weather station in Friona came to 5.95 inches. This more than doubled the year's moisture total, which now stands at 10.99 inches.

While the underground moisture is still way above average, the young crops could use some moisture. In addition, an outbreak of thrips in the area has growers concerned.

"The thrips have definitely invaded the county, and they are much earlier than usual. We ordinarily don't see thrips until after the wheat harvest, when they come out of the left-over straw and invade the cotton," a representative of the Parmer County

Extension Service commented this week.

Jerry Butman, manager of Friona Co-op Gin, said farmers are beginning to spray for the pests. "It's about the normal situation. It's gotten to where we have thrips on a regular basis. Since the wheat has dried considerably, the thrips come out of the wheat into the cotton," Butman said.

The small insects have even invaded the towns. If

you've been out in your yard to speak of, and especially if you wear white, the small insects will get on you. They will also give you a bite, if you don't swat them or get them off, we understand.

Pallbearers will be Paul Beck, Paul Quintana, Paul Estrada, Elmer Shuster, Phillip Box and Frank McKinnley.

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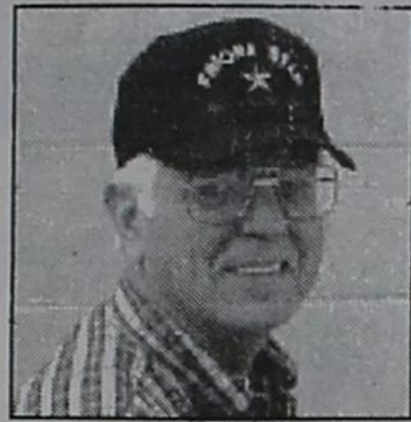
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Out Here

McDonald's is what it is. Fast food restaurants that are not as fast anymore. They are burger joints, not a deep religious drive-thru.

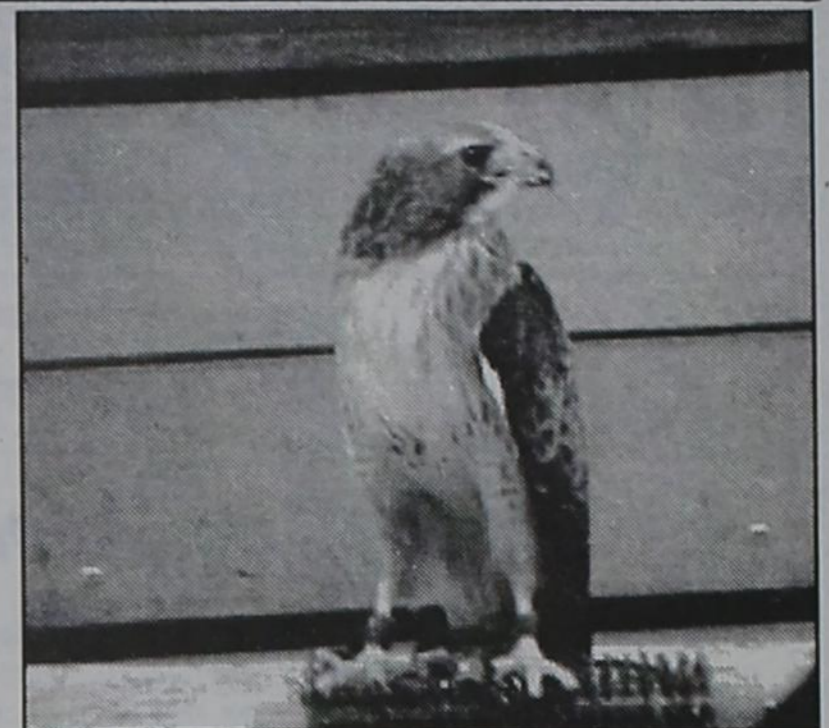
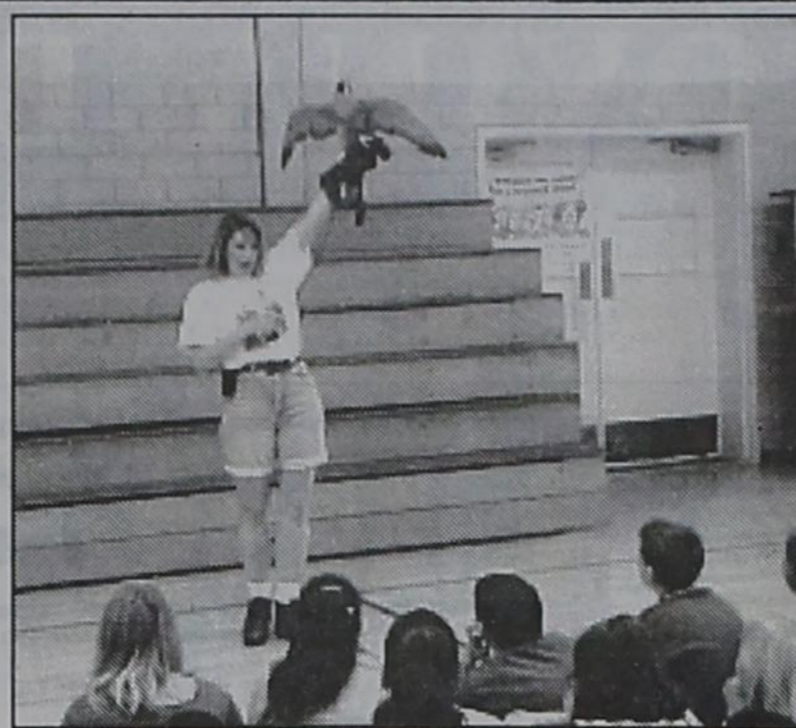

Beef Quality Program Set June 9 in Canyon

A Texas Beef Quality Producer Program is scheduled for Canyon, Texas, on Tuesday, June 12, at West Texas A&M University, Agriculture and Natural Science Building from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The Texas Beef Quality Producer program is a collaborative effort among Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, the Texas Beef Council and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, with input from the Texas Veterinary Medical Association.

It is an expansion of previous Beef Quality Assurance educational efforts which give Texas cow-calf producers and stocker operators, and their employees, the opportunity to get in-depth BQA training related to beef safety, beef quality and the relationships between beef production and the environment.

Topics to be covered include injection site management, residue avoidance, foreign object avoidance, record keeping, breeding and genetic selection, processing/cattle handling, nutrition, culling management, forage management, pesticide use, water quality and much more. Attending this meeting is the first step towards becoming a Texas Beef Quality Producer.

Participants will receive a truck decal, certificate of completion, a comprehensive handbook of information and one general CEU for a
