





As a citizen of a free country, it is your solemn duty to vote in every election. You can help defend your freedom, but ONLY if you are armed with a poll tax receipt or exemption certificate.



If all of the banks in the sun-scorched areas of the West and Southwest were asked by President Eisenhower to make a fifty percent reduction in interest rates on their loans to farmers and ranchers, it would be considered most unusual.

Or, if all of the merchants of the area were asked to make a fifty percent reduction in the prices of one or more of their basic items, as an aid to the farmers and ranchers, that, also, would be considered most unusual.

Either of these requests by the President of the United States would make front page news, stimulate editorial comment, and create extensive public

But when the railroads are asked by the President to make a fifty percent reduction in their rates on hay, or other feedstuffs, it is not regarded as something unusual.

Thus when President Eisenhower on three different occasions in the past four years asked the railroads of the West and Southwest to make a fifty percent reduction in their carload rates on hay, or other feedstuffs, it hardly created a ripple on the sea of public opinion.
