ily above cropland to intercept outside water and prevent damage to lower areas. These are designed to carry runoff in excess of what could be carried by standard field terraces. Diversions are also used to divert water in or out of farm ponds.

Seventeen landowners constructed waterways on their farms. Waterways provide the natural way to dispose of excess water from cultivated fields without causing gulches and unnecessary soil loss. Waterways, where needed, are the foundation of a good terrace system. They aid in maintaining the value of your investment in cultivated land and can be used for grazing and grass seed production. Cover crops of rye and/or small grain and vetch were seeded by district cooperators on 2200 acres for the first time. Approximately 26,000 acres of cropland in the work unit area was seeded to cover crops. Cover crops help hold soil and water in place and serve as an excellent soil improvement crop.

Another cropland practice closely related to cover cropping is crop residue utilization. This is the management of crop residues or other plant material so as to leave a protective cover on the surface of the soil during the critical rain and blow period of the year. District Cooperators of the work unit managed residue on 2278 acres of cropland for the first time and approximately 9000 acres of properly managed residue was reported

for the work unit as being maintained over a period of time. Proper use on rangeland was reported on 11,370 acres for the first time and an estimated 31,000 acres of range land was properly used last year. Proper use may be defined as grazing at an intensity which will maintain adequate cover for soil protection and maintain or improve the desirable grass species.

Closely connected with proper use of rangeland is the practice of range deferment. This is the resting from grazing for a definite period to improve forage vigor or to insure the production of grass seed. Three thousand seven hundred and fifty-three acres of range land was given a deferment during last year.

Range seeding was applied on 504 acres last year. Range seeding is the establishment of perennial forage grasses on either depleted range or former cropland.

Farm ponds were constructed or

97 farms and ranches of the Eastland Work Unit area last year. Ponds are built primarily to furnish livestock water and improve grazing distribution.

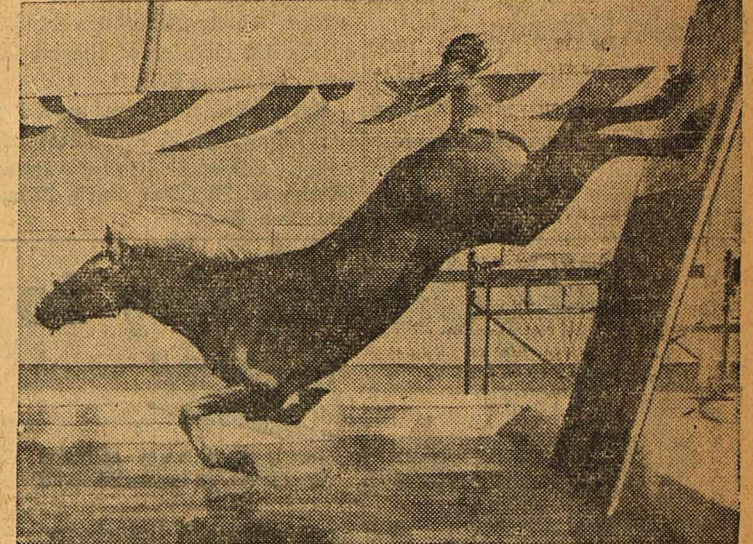
Fis were received to stock 25 farm ponds of this area.

Many of the above conservation practices such as farm ponds, field terraces, diversion terraces, waterways, range seeding and cover cropping are County Agricultural Conservation Program practices as selected by County ASC Committee, Soil Conservation Service technicians, County Agricultural Agencies, Soil Conservation District Supervisors and others. Necessary site selection, layout, supervision and final checks and certifications of practices are made by Soil Conservation technicians. These practices are certified to the County ASC Committee for cost share payments as set forth in the County Agricultural Conservation program handbook.

In most instances dirt moving contractors of this area have constructed a high percent of all mechanical practices. These men realize the needs of the land and are anxious to construct practices that will meet these needs. In a true sense of the word they are "conservationist" and are regarded as an important member of the team in getting all land used within its capabilities and treated in keeping with its needs.

The County has a good ACP program for next year, 1957. Conservation farmers and ranchers are encouraged to continue to apply conservation practices to their lands "for our soil is our strength" a spokesman said.
