later. Gene Boeding, buyer for Ranger Manufacturing Company and Louie Goosmann, plant mechanic of Dallas, visited the company here Monday and said they were well satisfied with the way the schedule

s going here. Boeding is just back from a buy ng trip to New York where he purchased materials for all the new arments to be manufactured in he Spring line, and Goosmann put all of the machines in the Ranger plant in order for the heavy schelule to come.

The Sports Shirts being made now, according to Miss Vernon Hargett, plant manager, are the brand new styles featuring Italian collars, button down collars, and all the other new styling that has been developed for the Sports Wear Line. Materials being used

here include Dacron, Dan River Plaids and Prints. In addition to Sports Shirts the company also manufactures ladies blouses, men's and boys' pajamas, and dress and work shirts for men

and boys. According to Miss Hargett, they get into the manufacture of these other lines as orders come in from salesmen in the field. As the volume of orders for Spring merchandise increases as the salesmen further along in their coverage of the trade, the work here will pick up accordingly, and it is expected that the plant will reach a high degree of employment as it gets further into the season.

Operation of the Ranger plant has been placed on a streamline basis and efficiency has been greatly improved. 

More U. S. oil is being demand ed these days to make up for the oil shortage brought on by the blockade of the Suez Canal.


