





Since phosphorous insecticides tend to reduce the cholinesterase enzyme, entomologists advise regular handlers of such chemicals to have cholinesterase tests at 10day intervals while working with the material. Your local doctor can tell you about these tests.

It's a good idea to bathe and change clothing immediately following a highly toxic job and not enter a field for two or three days after it has been treated, the specialists point out. Always wear gloves and freshly laundered proective clothing during handling, and stop working if a toxic insecticide is spilled on skin or clothing or a thorough bath and a change of clothes, they advise.


