The Texas Game and Fish Commission is getting ready to turn loose several million small mouth black bass in various fresh water streams and lakes over the state, the first to be released in the South Fork of the Llano River over a 15-mile stretch extending from Junction to Telegraph in Kimble County.

These fish will be obtained from the Federal Hatchery on Lake Texoma, and we wonder if some could be secured for Lake Leon.

Marion Toole, chief aquatic biologist of the Texas Fish and Game Commission, has said that even the scrappiest of the large mouth bass are slow and sluggish compared to the actions of a small mouth battler, and when a fellow hooks one of the little fighters weighing even as much as two pounds he's got a "mighty lot of fish" on his line.

The small mouth bass project is being handled under the Dingell - Johnson Act whereby the Federal government pays twothirds of the cost and the state one-third. And do you know where this money comes from? It comes from the excise taxes levied against the fishing tackle you buy.

If it is not against the rules

of the Lake, we would like to see somebody get behind the move to secure several thousand of these fish, and we suppose full information could be had by writing Marion Toole, Chief Aquatic Biologist, Texas Game and Fish Commission, Austin, Texas. If none are available now, we could at least get our name in the pot and on the waiting
