each man who has paid in \$150 will have his money refunded, and the original 65 men who have already bought the land will decide what they want to do with it, and dispose of it in some manner, and forget the whole thing.

If the needed 160 new men are secured by June 30, making the sought for total of 225, the Land Company will then have something like \$35,000, more or less, on its hands.

With this money, The Land Company will rough out an 18hole golf course, build all roads. and docks, build a swimming pool, and erect the shell of a club-house, with nothing in it. At this point the second part of the Lone Cedar Country

Membership in this organization will cost \$150, with total membership being limited to 300. It is presumed that the ori ginal 225 investors in the Land Company will also take mem-bership in the Social Club, re-sulting in a total outlay for them of \$300. That would leave memberships open for 75 more in the Social Club who would have no interest at all in the

Land Company. If these 300 members in the So cial Club are obtained at \$150 each, the Social Club would then find itself with something like

At this point, it is proposed that the Social Club rent the land from the Land Company, on which more than \$40,000 in improvements will already exist, counting original purchase price of the land. The Social Club would then take its money and complete nine holes of the golf course with watered fair-ways, and complete the club house

and furnish it. It is pointed out that since the Social Club is paying rent to the Land Company, the original 225 members of the Land Company will soon receive their \$150 back and at the same time still hold membership in the Land Company. Rent paid by the Social Club would also eventually restore their \$150 investment for initiation fees into the Social Club. Dues of all mem-

bers would be \$6 a month. That, then, is the sum and substance of the proposition as it stands today. Another 160 members are being sought to add to the original 65 members in the Land Company. Already, many of these 160 have been secured and pledged, but they have not paid in their \$150. Efforts will be made to get in these payments at the earliest possible date, since the money cannot be spent, anyway, unless the entire 225 members are

Many of the most influential men in the principal towns of the county already belong to the Lone Cedar Country Club project. The 129 acres of land that have been secured for the club cannot be surpassed anywhere in the country for beauty, or for ideal location. 





as a man and his family, or a boy and his date. We read this stuff in a book, once.

President Eisenhower, still grasping for any kind of a straw that will save his neck, has sent out word that everybody should save more money to help keep down inflation. That is something we are perfectly willing to go along with whole-heartedly. And we are perfectly willing to start right this minute by saving seven or eight hundred dollars that Uncle Sam wants us to send to Washington between now and April 15. We will give our unreserved cooperation by putting the money right here in the Commercial State Bank in Ranger and saving it just as long as the president thinks it would be inflationary if it were turned

The Pool Bill, which would have required a run-off in the present U. S. Senate election if none of the candidates got more than 50 per cent of the vote on April 2, failed to pass the Texas Senate by four votes. Twelve senators voted against the bill, and 17 senators voted for it, but 21 votes in favor of the bill were necessary for its passage.

It is an unwholesome thing and a dangerous thing when four State Senators can deny Democratic voters the right to elect a U.S. Senator with a clear majority over all his opponents.

How much better it would have been if the Herring Bill had passed, calling off the election entirely, with an interim senator filling out the unexpired term, until a regular U. S. Senator could have been elected under due process in a democratic country, in which the majority should always rule.

### **Driving Tips** For Women

The old label "woman driver" is fast slipping into oblivion. Traffic experts say there's no doubt that 21,000,000 women drivers are gaining skill and self-assurance

But it is acknowledged that many women (and men, too!) still have certain car-handling problems that keep driving from being the complete pleasure it should be. One of the biggest problems is parking the car, according to an article in the March issue of Better Homes & Gardens magazine.

Don't try to parallel park too quickly, the article advises. If you back in too fast, you'll just have to pull out and try again. Smooth, tight turns are another problem for many women. On right turns, never swing left before making the turn. Be sure you stay in your own lane. On left turns, turn before, not after, you get to the middle of the crossing. This makes it possible for the driver coming toward you also to make a left turn at the same time. Women who make poor turns often do so because they don't know how to overlap hands as the wheel turns, the article says.

To become a better driver, practice is the answer. Find an empty lot, deserted parking lot, or recreation field on weekends and practice two things: getting the 'feel" of the car, and working out special problems.
