Ranger has a 7-1 record, its only loss being to Wharton, winner of the Temple Junior College Tournament.

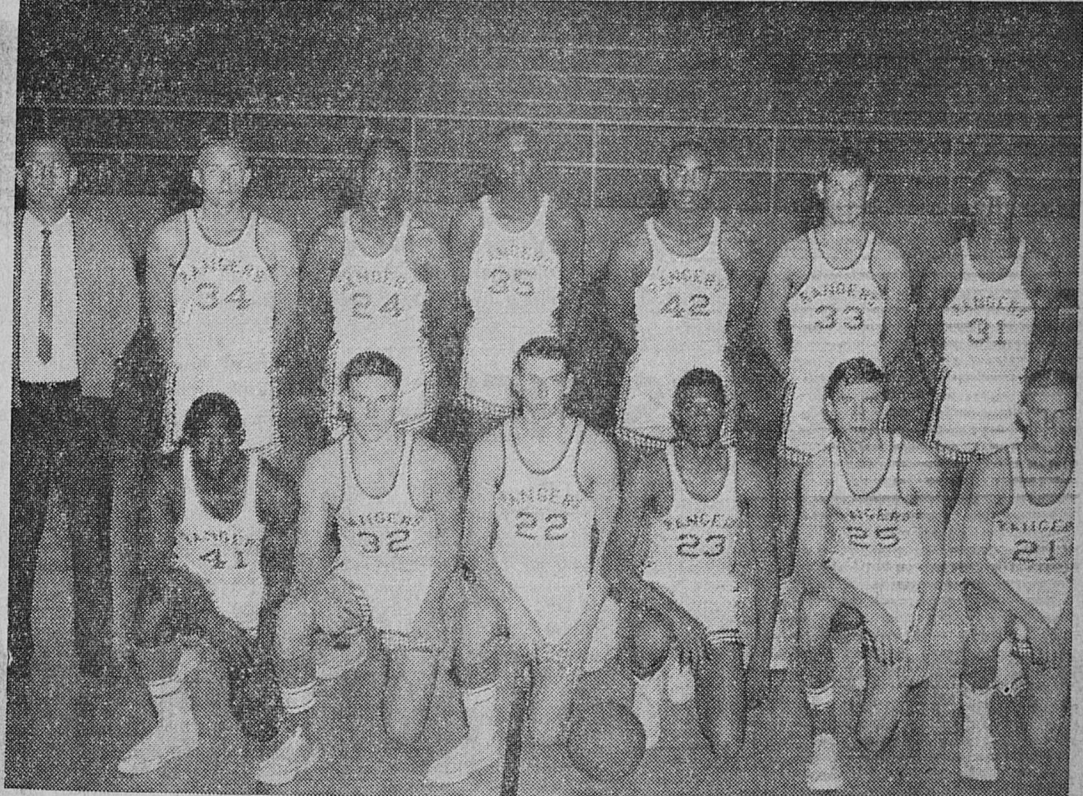
Oscar McClelland of Crockett is high-point man for the Rangers, with Freddie Marshall, Bob Hughes, and Larry Robertson running close behind.

SCHOOL BUS OVERTURNS; RHS CAGERS LUCKILY ESCAPE INJURY

Sixteen members of the Ranger High School basketball squad miraculously escaped serious injury Friday afternoon at 3:20 p. m. when the school bus in which they were riding overturned four miles southeast of Gorman.

The RHS femme athletes, accompanied by Coach Dan Mitchell, driver of the bus, and Mrs. Dena Rhodes, chaperone, were enroute to the Gorman invitational basketball tournament at the time of the mishap.

Supt. James R. Clark, head of the Ranger school system said that only two of the 16 girls received any injuries — one of them received a scratch, the other a bruise. Both were minor.

About four miles from Gorman, Mitchell thought he might have a flat on a rear tire. As he was braking the school bus to a stop, the left dual back wheel shot off the axle and careened into a bar ditch.

'WRITE CLEARLY' ASKS RANGER POSTMASTER TO SPEED MAIL FLOW

One of the biggest problems postal employees face is illegible handwriting. At Christmastime, when mail volumes skyrocket, this can become a major problem, Postmaster Max Ohr said Wednesday.

"The use of ZIP Codes by mailers does help speed up the process because often if the city and state are unreadable the ZIP Code will direct the mail to the post office from which it will be delivered. Clerks in that post office, being more familiar with local residents, may be able to figure out the person to whom the mail should be delivered.

Another significant problem is the number of parcels delayed or actually undelivered because of poor wrapping or packing. Postmaster Ohr urged that special care be taken to see that each package is tightly stuffed and that nothing rattles around inside.

Parcels are generally shipped in bags and often heavier items rest on top of smaller, lighter packages. The postmaster encouraged mailers to be a bit cautious and insure all packages.

All parcels should be addressed on only one side and should have the address written somewhere on the inside of the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off. It is a good idea to also enclose a list of the contents.

Poor packaging and illegible or incorrect addressing accounts for about half a million undelivered parcels each year.

Expansion Seen For Farm Loans Program in U. S.

More than a million people in rural America may benefit from an expansion in financial support for rural community facilities and family farms authorized by recent legislation, L. J. Capleman, Farmers Home Administration State Director for Texas, reported this week.

Private investors will provide the bulk of the funds on an insured basis through USDA's Farmers Home Administration.

The legislation signed into law by President Johnson on October 7:

1 - authorizes an increase from \$200 to \$450 million in the Farmers Home Administration's ability to insure loans in any one year for rural community facilities including water supply and waste disposal systems, and for the development and purchase of family farms.

2 - provides, for the first time, this type of credit for rural waste disposal systems.

3 - authorizes, for the first time, grants to supplement this type of credit for rural water disposal systems. Grant authority may not exceed 50 per cent of the construction of a project nor a total of \$50 million a year.

4 - authorizes, for the first time, grants totaling \$4 million a year for comprehensive planning of water and sewage systems.

5 - increases from 2,500 to 5,500 the size of towns eligible for such assistance.

6 - increases from \$1 to \$4 million the maximum size of a loan, or a combination loan and grant for water supply or waste disposal systems.

The 1,600 field offices of the Farmers Home Administration are being notified to accept applications under the expanded credit authorities. Grant assistance will not be available until funds are appropriated by Congress.

Applications for rural community facilities loans may be made by public bodies and nonprofit private organizations.

The \$450 million in insured loans plus the \$55 million in

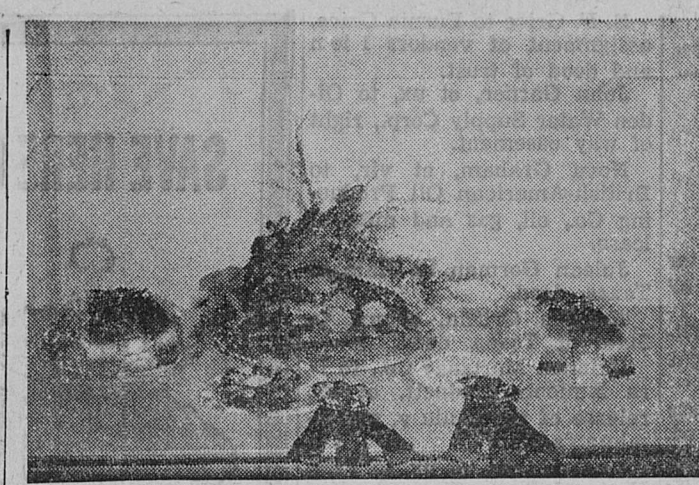

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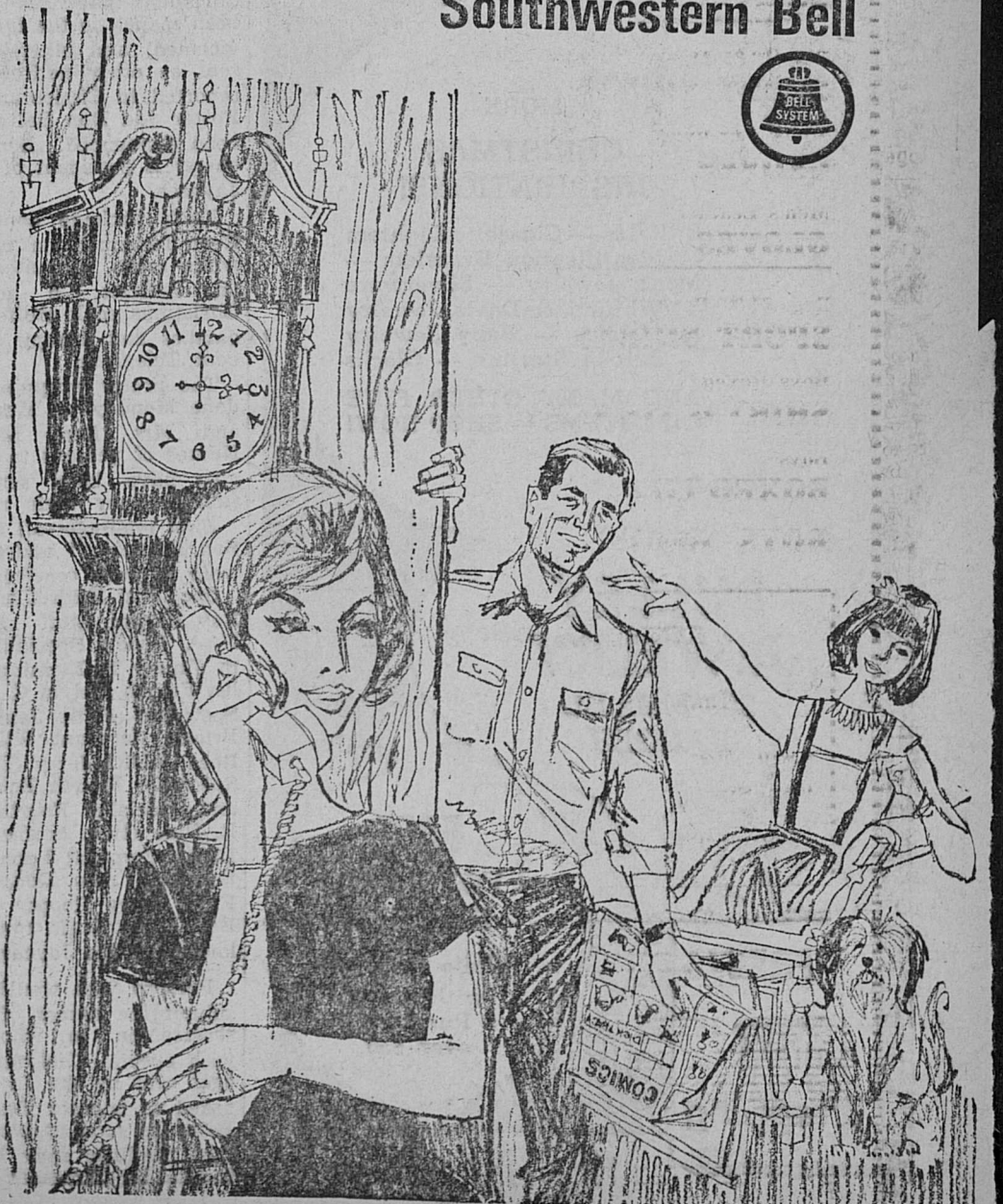

"To all but a few relatives and intimate friends, their names are not important.

13 In Vietnam Will Receive Jaycee Gifts

At least 13 Viet Nam servicemen are going to know that people in Eastland County appreciate what they are doing there, and want them to have a nice Christmas.

In a late-starting Eastland Jaycee project, that many Christmas packages have been mailed to the far-off servicemen, and others will be sent as other addresses are reported to Chairman John Foster and Don Baird, it has been announced. Ben Lancaster is president of the Jaycees.

Each package contains a New Testament, a pair of white socks, a fruitcake, toilet articles, a miniature Christmas sock stuffed with candies and a copy of a recent Telegram.

The pretty wrapping was done Monday by Mrs. Foster and Mrs. Ben Lancaster. Names of persons to whom gifts have been sent were submitted by their relatives.

First mailings—all to "APO San Francisco" addresses—were to these servicemen:

Specialist Fifth Class Fred Ray Harper, Staff Sergeant N. A. Rody, Specialist Fourth Jimmy F. Fleming, Specialist Fourth Melvin C. Brown, Specialist Fifth James H. Brown, Sergeant William R. What is important is that they are young Americans, wounded in Southeast Asia and now on the road to recovery in military hospitals in the United States.

"All along the rugged way—in Vietnam, at Clark Air Force Base in the Philippines, at Travis Air Force Base in California, and at the stateside hospital which was their destination—they had a friend beside them who helped to ease the path, and that is what this is all about—that friend is the Red Cross."

Tracing the journey of the wounded servicemen from the field of battle, Mrs. Lamb noted that in the station hospital in Saigon he would receive a Red Cross comfort kit, containing shaving equipment and other articles. In Clark Air Force Base Hospital the Red Cross would offer to wire his home-town chapter information for his family. He could participate in Red Cross recreation activities. Stopping in Hawaii, and also at Travis Air Force Base Hospital, passengers in the medical evacuation plane would be served free refreshments. Arriving at Walter Reed Hospital in Washington, D. C. the serviceman may help pass the hours before surgery or treatment by playing cards in the Red Cross lounge or taking part in other recreation activities. Library carts with current books and magazines are also available to the returning servicemen.

"It's a long way from Southeast Asia to the east coast of the United States, but staff and volunteers who provide Red Cross services to installations, at hospitals, and the armed forces at military in local chapters are prepared to help American servicemen out there—and all along the way," Mrs. Lamb said in conclusion.

The American Red Cross is included in the Community Chest Fund, and a contribution to the fund will be a contribution to wounded servicemen from the field of battle until his arrival home.
