Jefferson To Conduct Historical Pilgrimage

The East Texas town of Jefferson is one progressive community that can point with more than a touch of pride to its rich historical background.

Located at the intersection of Highways 49 and 59, the town boasts 46 buildings that have the official historic Texas Medallion. Once the largest inland shipping point in the entire state, the impressive Big Cypress River still flows gently past the business section.

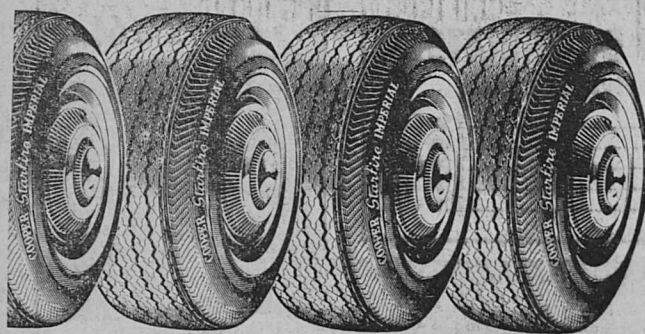

HOMEMAKERS' HINTS

By JANET MEYERS

Home Demonstration Club women throughout central Texas are looking forward to the District Texas Home Demonstration Association meeting to be held in Stephenville on April 13 and 14. Some 20 counties will be represented at this time. All the meetings will be held on Tarleton State College campus during the two day convention. Delegates attending from Eastland County are: Mrs. W. V. Fenter, Rising Star; Mrs. Genoa Brown, Eastland; and Mrs. Kay Gordon, Ranger. Eastland County delegates along with the delegates from Comanche County will conduct the recreation workshop during the session. Mrs. W. V. Fenter of Eastland County is chairman of the recreation workshop.

One of the most revolutionary ideas on the clothing industry today is paper apparel. The ultimate goal in easy

care is the disposable garment. Imagine a label which says wear but don't wash, just throw away. Shorten with scissors. Press with a cool iron.

Disposable apparel is made from a thin netting of rayon or nylon sandwiched between layers of specially processed cellulose. The materials, before being made into apparel, can be treated to make them fire-retardant, water and abrasion resistant — or even luminous, as in jackets for highway workers.

You might be wondering exactly how these garments are being used. Women and girls enjoy the novelty of disposable garments as well as the ease of care. Some women are using them for maternity apparel. Others find them ideal to wear while doing messy household chores etc. For the bride, disposable bridal gowns are available as well as bridesmaid dresses and flower girl dresses. It is thought that dresses

which are copies of original Paris designs will soon be available.

Men and boys are also enjoying disposable garments. Probably the biggest success story is the disposable swim suit for men. It is available at many hotels which either sell or give them to the traveling man who would like a swim but hasn't brought his suit. These garments are made of Olefin and resemble lightweight vinyl.

One of the greatest potentials for disposable merchandise is in the medical field. Medical people like disposable textiles not only for convenience, but also for hygienic reasons.

Large paper manufacturing companies calculate current expenditure for disposable

goods at \$50 million per year. The success of disposable-textile merchandise rests primarily on the convenience factor. As of yet, cost has not played a dominant role. Disposable clothes at the present time cost about \$1.75 for a shift dress, \$5.00 to \$15.00 for an evening gown, 40 cents for a child's pinafore.

In the future, disposable garments may be taken for granted. But for the present, many disposable items are available only in certain areas and others are available only in large department stores.

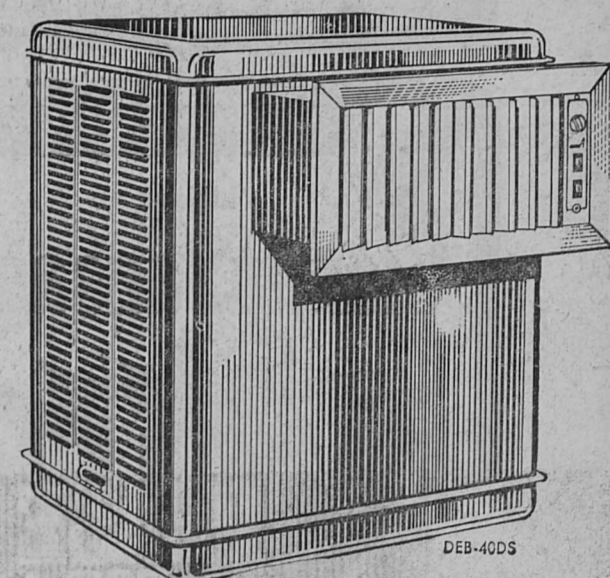

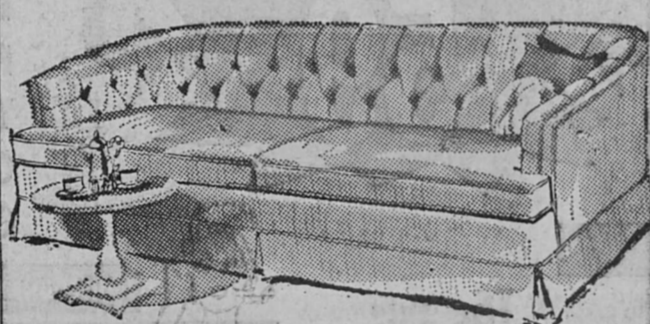
