Pecan Show Set Dec. 8-9 in Cisco

Queen Contest Is Thursday Night

The 15th annual Eastland County Pecan Show will be held in Cisco Friday and Saturday, Dec. 8-9. The show will be in the Chicken on the Run in the Doniels Hotel Building.

All pecans entered in the show must have been grown in 1967, and all entries of nuts must be entered by 12 noon on Friday, Dec. 8. They may be sent or left at either the County Agent's office in Eastland or at the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco or Ranger. The building will be open all day Thursday and entries will be accepted there. Entries should be marked with owner's name, variety and the grower's address.

Growers are limited to one entry of each improved or papershell variety, but there is no limit on number of entries of seedling or natives. Nuts must have been grown by the men and women showing them.

The first three place entries of nut may be sent to Abilene to be entered in the Regional Pecan Show and they will not be returned. First three place entries of the Regional Show will be sent to the State Pecan Show.

Nuts must be left on display until 4 p. m. on Dec. 9, and each entry must consist of enough nuts to fill a quart jar, at least 40 nuts. Best

centerpiece using pecans in various forms and other materials such as leaves, etc. will be awarded \$10, \$5, and \$3, and ribbons.

Other events connected with the pecan show will be the queen contest and a bake sale. The Cisco Junior Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the queen contest, and Charles Wilson, president of the Cisco Jaycees, has urged all organizations and clubs in Eastland County to enter a girl in the contest.

A queen contestant must be a single girl and her home must be in Eastland County. Organizations are asked to send the names of their contestants to Eris Ritchie, Cisco, by Monday, Dec. 4.

The contest will be held at 7:30 p. m. Thursday, Dec. 7, in the Cisco High School auditorium. The new queen will be crowned by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. She will serve as hostess at the pecan show and other special events as well as compete in the state pecan queen contest to be held in Brownwood in July, 1968. The 1967 Eastland County Pecan Queen is Susie Morgan of Cisco.

Fighting Bulldogs Taste Defeat At Hands of Clifton Cubs 10-0

All good things must come to an end, so it did Friday night in Stephenville as the Fighting Ranger Bulldogs were defeated by the strong Clifton Cubs 10-0 in Quarterfinal play.

The Bulldogs were undefeated and undefeated before the Friday night game. Ranger won the toss and elected to receive the kick-off, defending the north goal. The Bulldogs returned the ball to the 46 yard line as Quarterback Tom Golemon mixed the plays with Tom Fox III and Ricky Squires to pick up good yardage before they were forced to punt.

The Clifton Cubs took possession of the ball only to be forced to punt as they could not move against the strong defense of the Bulldogs.

The entire first quarter was a defensive battle as both teams tried to move the ball on the ground.

Early in the second quarter the Cubs had the ball on the Ranger 12 yard line where Bobby Golden of the Cubs, tried a field goal, which was wide and the Bulldogs again took the ball.

The Bulldogs, trying to pass for yardage and the option play could not move the ball and were again forced to punt.

Clifton took the ball and in two plays picked up five yards before Bill Watkins of the Bulldogs rushed in to recover a loss ball for the Bulldogs competition and had to give up the ball on the 32 yard line. Clifton started a drive which took them deep in the Bulldog territory and a pass from Rocky Rummel was intercepted in the end zone by Rudy Kenteria of the Bulldogs to give the ball to the Bulldogs on the 20 yard line. Again the Bulldogs tried to pass for yardage only to make two yards as Squires punted the ball for 47 yards as Clifton took possession.

The Cubs attempted a pass only to have it intercepted by Bill Watkins of the Bulldogs. On the first play Ranger fumbled the ball on the 46 yard line and Clifton again had the ball with 52 seconds left on the scoreboard clock. With time running out Clifton's quarterback Rummel passed to Wayne Prescher for the touchdown which covered the final 46 yards. Golden's extra point try was good and Clifton led at half time 7-0.

Clifton controlled the ball most of the third quarter as Prescher and Alnz played through the defensive line of the Bulldogs. Clifton moved the ball down to the five yard line to be stopped by the Bulldogs and another field goal attempt by Golden failed.

The Bulldogs seemed to come to life as Golemon started passing to ends Rudy Mendoza and Charlie Orms and sending Tom Fox plowing through the middle of the line. The Bulldogs drove to the Clifton 23 yard line then on a fourth down situation Golemon passed to Glyn Wilson which appeared to be a Bulldog touchdown, only to be knocked down by a Clifton defender.

Ranger's defense then stopped the Cubs and the Bulldogs marched downfield again. They got to the Cubs 39, and on fourth down a Golemon pass was intercepted by Clifton.

Clifton again took the ball and drove to the 12 yard line where Golden tried another field goal, this time making it good. With 4:30 left in the game the Cubs were leading 10-0.

Ranger took possession of the ball and tried for yardage by passing getting a long pass to Orms but could not move the ball into the end zone.

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Rangers Meet Ft. Worth Christian Here Monday In Local Gymn

The 1968 Ranger Junior College basketball squad hits home turf for the first time Monday night when they take on Fort Worth Christian College at 7:30 in the RJC Gym.

The Rangers are unbeaten in four outings this year and have already tucked the Oral Roberts Thanksgiving Tournament title under their belts. Two RJC players, Ulric Cobb and James McCloud, were named to the all-tournament team at Tulsa.

Cobb and McCloud are among six players picked as outstanding junior college prospects on the basis of their performances last year. The others are Robert Spivey, Solomon McMillon, Bob Tavernia, and Stanley Thompson. All six are back on the court this year.

Cobb has racked up 82 points in his four court appearances so far this year. McCloud is running a close second with a four-game total of 71 points.

Coach Ron Butler has an even dozen roundballers on his 67-68 lineup. Seven of them are sophomores, five are freshmen. The average height of the team is 6'2", and the average age is 19.

The lineup includes: Fred Clayton, a 19-year-old sophomore from Linden, New Jersey, who stands 6-2 and is majoring in accounting.

Ulric Cobb, a 20-year-old sophomore pre-law major from New York City, who measures in at 6-4. John Fairfax, a 6-1 freshman business major from

Linden, New Jersey. Joe Jackson, a freshman PE major from Fort Worth who measures in at 6-2. Kenneth Jackson, another freshman PE major, from New York City, who stands 5-10.

James McCloud, 19, a 6-5 sophomore PE major from Linden, New Jersey. Solomon McMillon, a 6-3 sophomore PE major from New York City.

David O'Brien, 6-6, 18-year-old freshman PE major from Woodcliff New Jersey. John Scarfo, an 18-year-old from Bradley Beach, New Jersey, who ranks as the "shorty" of the team at 5-8.

Robert Spivey, a 6-3 sophomore liberal arts major from New York City. Robert Tavernia, a 6-2 sophomore PE major from Yonkers, New York.

Stanley Thompson, a 6-4 sophomore PE major from New York City. Friday the Rangers took on Lubbock Christian College at Amarillo, and they were slated to tackle a Dodge City, Kansas, team Saturday night, also at Amarillo.

Tickets for the Ranger first home appearance will be available at the gym. Reserved seats are \$1.25. General admission tickets are \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students. A few season tickets at \$8 for the ten home games are still available from Coach Butler.

Ranger Soldier in Vietnam Asks For Gifts for Orphans

Pfc. Kenneth W. Seymour of Ranger has been serving in Vietnam for the past seven months and like other men serving in the Far East, he is concerned about someone other than himself — a group of Vietnamese orphans.

The soldier, in a letter to his aunt, Mrs. Charlie Isabell, has requested Ranger and area residents to send clothing and shoes for the children so they may have them for Christmas.

The childrens ages range from 3 to 8 years old. Their orphanage is in the Nha Trang Vietnam. The town weeks ago, inflicting heavy damage to the Special Forces Group. At present time the company that Pfc. Seymour serves in now helping protect this unit.

Upland Cotton Marketing Quota Referendum To Be Held Dec. 4-8

A referendum will be held by mail on Dec. 4-8 on marketing quotas for the 1968 upland cotton crop, according to Jesse G. Meredith, office County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Ballots will be mailed along with complete instructions on Dec. 1 to all known eligible voters. Eligible voters who do not receive a ballot by mail may obtain one at the ASCS office in Eastland. Ballots must be returned to the Eastland ASCS office not

LOOKING At Agriculture

By GILBERT MEREDITH

(This is one of a series of articles dealing with agricultural programs in Eastland County).

The 1967 marketing year for shorn wool, mohair, and unshorn lambs ends Dec. 31, 1967. All producers have until Jan. 31, 1968 to turn in their receipts to the ASCS office and file an application for incentive pay. Payments will be made in March or April of '68 for the 1967 marketing year.

There will be a referendum on cotton marketing quotas Dec. 4-8. The referendum will be by mail or you may return your ballot in person to the ASCS Office. Ballots will be mailed to all eligible voters Dec. 1. If quotas are approved in the referendum, price support will be available to all growers who do not exceed their 1968 cotton allotment. If the vote is unfavorable there will be no quotas or penalties for the 1968 Upland Cotton and no price support or diversion payments.

The lease or sale of cotton allotments will be in effect for the 1968 crop year regardless of the outcome of the referendum. Farmers desiring to sell or lease their allotment must file their transfer documents with the county office not later than Jan. 2, 1968.

Requests for cost-shares on winter cover crops are still being accepted by the ASCS Office. However, 1967 program funds have been depleted and all new requests will be charged to 1968 program funds. If funds do become available after Jan. 1, due to state underearnings under the Agriculture Conservation Program for 1967, the requests will be transferred back to 1967 funds. Requests will be accepted until Dec. 5 and all practices must be reported as done by Dec. 20 to be eligible for cost-shares.

If quotas are approved in the referendum price support will be available to all growers who do not exceed their 1968 cotton allotment. If the vote is unfavorable there will be no quotas or penalties for the 1968 upland cotton, no price support or diversion payment the ASCS manager said.

The lease or sale of cotton allotment is provided for 1968 crop regardless of the outcome of the marketing quota referendum, however, transfer documents have to be filed with the county office not later than Jan. 2, 1968, according to Mr. Meredith.

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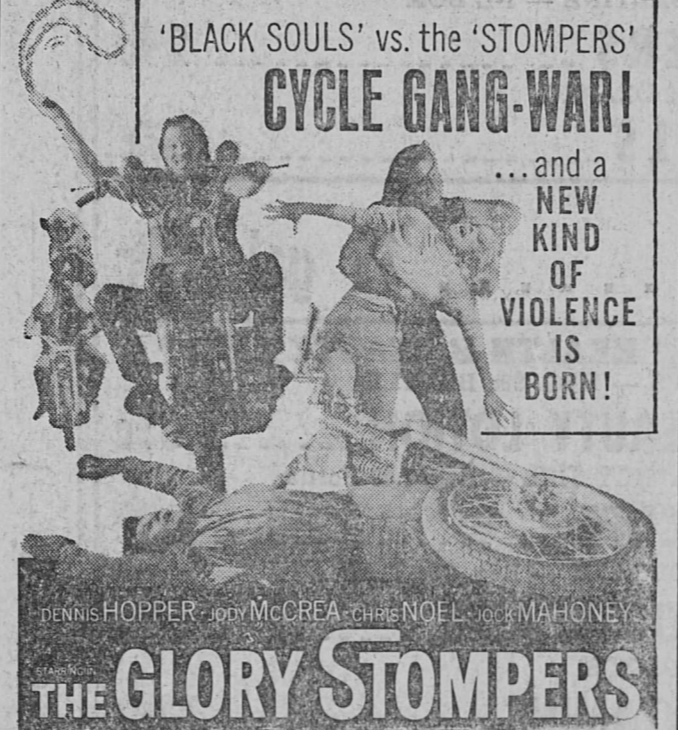

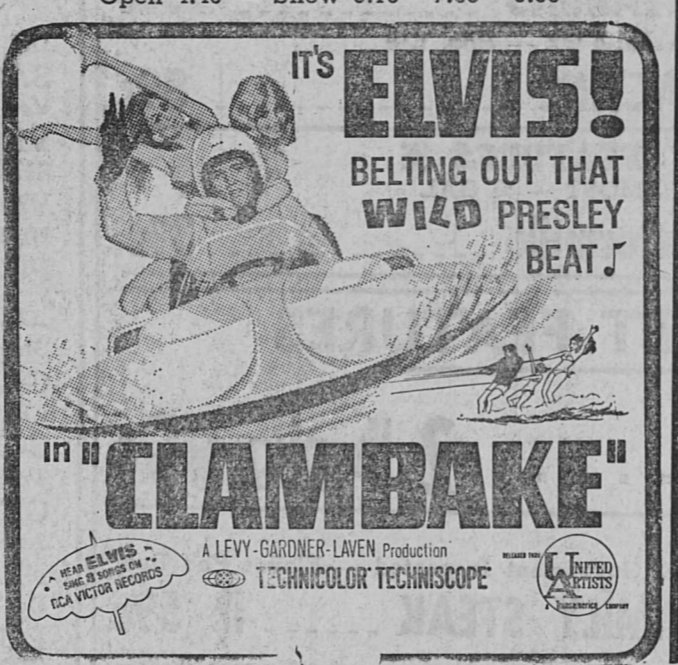

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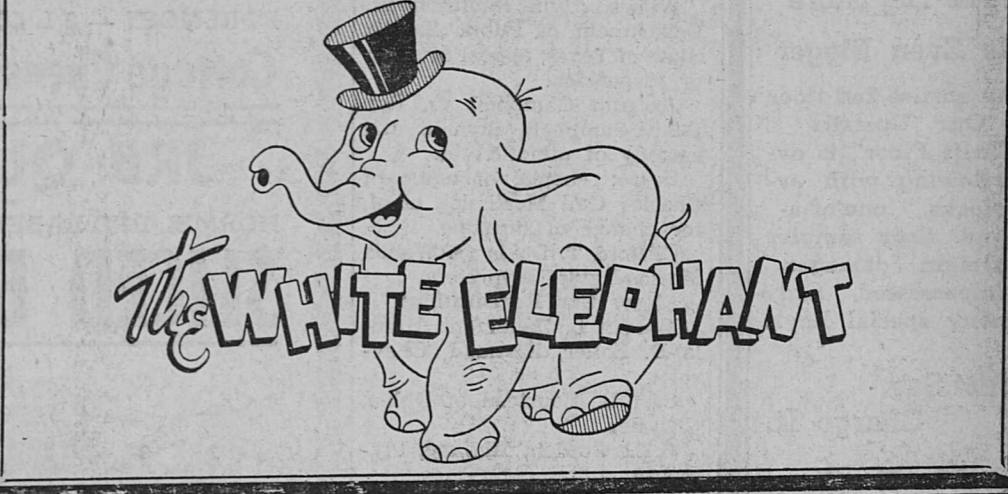

The Eastland Jaycees have received 11 "Thank You" letters from the men in Viet Nam who received Christmas packages from the club.

Since I am a "Viet Nam wife," all of these packages were very special to me. My husband said he felt like "a little boy with his first toys" when he received his package. I don't think any of us can fully realize just how much these packages meant to these men, not just the contents inside but the thoughts and the

love that went into making them.

A-1/C Richard C. Eaves wrote "My thanks seem trivial compared to the work and time all of you put into the project." And L/Cpl. J. P. Moylan wrote "I just wish that there was something to do for you."

I believe that just being in Viet Nam for 13 months is enough that anyone could do for Eastland County, don't you?

Sp-4 Frank G. Park felt "I don't guess there is anyway I can ever repay you for it but I'll remember it and I will do the same thing for some other GI some day."

Sp-4 Larry Monroe reacted this way about his package: "It sure gets lonesome over here sometimes and it really makes a guy feel good to get something from home."

And Skipper Ezzell said that "just knowing that people at home are thinking of me makes me feel better." "Over here, Christmas is just another day," wrote Billy E. Young. "You can't just lay your weapons down and celebrate it, but still inside we feel that we won't be forgotten on Christmas Day. This is a nasty war but someone has to fight it and it is being fought for America's freedom."

Surely, every young draftee and every military man must feel this way. During these times of riots and protests, it is good to know that the "best of America" is still proud of being an American.

L/Cpl. Don Buckmaster said in his letter: "It sure makes a

person feel good to know that there are good people who are supporting us in this war." And S/Sgt. Joe Martin wrote: "It's good people like you who are making our stay over here just a little bit better."

L/Cpl. Bruce Wyatt "appreciated the package very much and especially liked the hometown paper."

"You all must have spent much of your valuable time fixing up these packages," Pfc Gary G. Morris said.

Cpl. Steve Clark expressed in his letter what probably every man in Viet Nam would like to say: "Happy Holidays, everyone! Though I am not there physically, I am there in spirit."

Packages containing 22 articles were mailed November 1. Project Chairman Don Baird collected names and materials. The packages were prepared and wrapped for mailing by members of the Eastland Civic League and Garden Club.

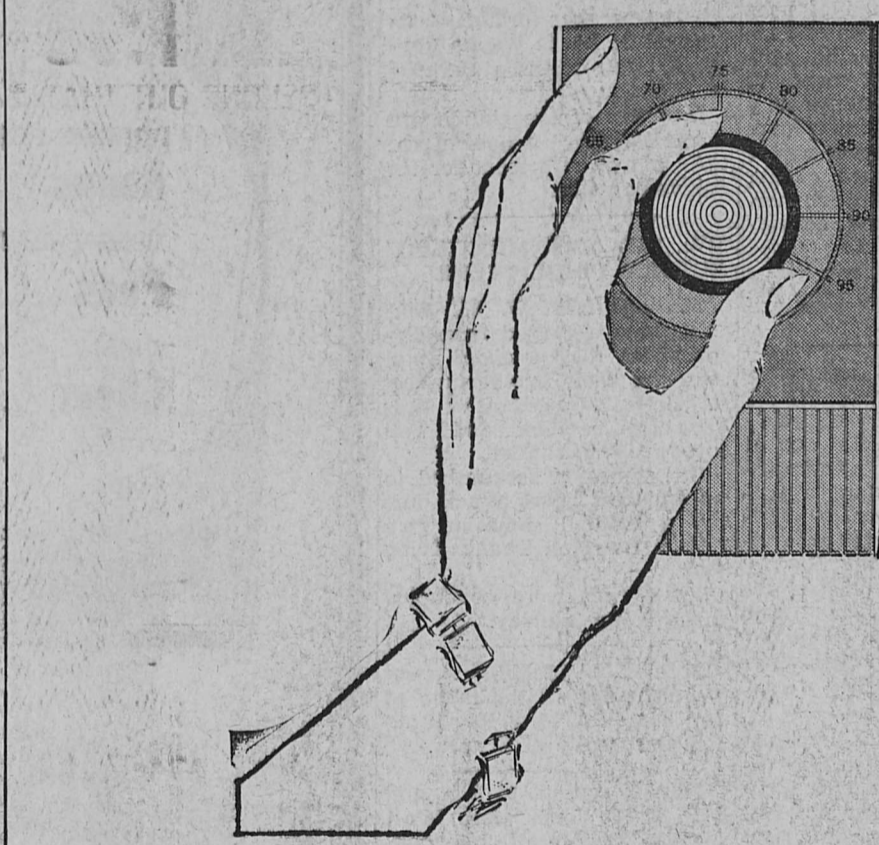

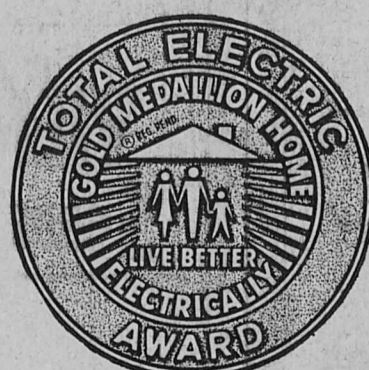
