An election has been ordered for Tuesday, Jan. 23, on the proposition of passing a one per cent sales tax in the City of Cisco...

A legal notice in connection with the election will be published in The Press on Thursday, Dec. 28, and again on Thursday, Jan. 4.

The question in the election will be for or against an ordinance providing for a local sales tax of one per cent (1%) within the city limits.

Under the law, cities are permitted to levy and collect a general sales tax not to exceed one per cent.

City officials were running a survey to determine an estimate of the yield of a one per cent sales tax.

Breckenridge, Abilene and other area cities have recently adopted city sales taxes.

Master Plan Shows County To Be Center For Junior College Area

A master plan of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, for the next 20 years, shows Eastland County as the center of a ten-county area.

Discussed at the Austin meeting was a draft of the board's proposed policy statement which attempts to set down what the role of the junior college is, how it will develop and how that development will be financed.

The state, in the next 20 years, is expected to educate four times as many students on nearly twice as many campuses.

The board envisions bringing Taylor, Jones, Shackelford, Calahan, Stephens, Erath, Comanche, Brown and Coleman counties into a region with Eastland County to support Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges.

Dr. Jack K. Williams, commissioner of higher education, reported that at stake is the future of the state's junior college system, the segment of the overall higher educational structure which in the next two decades will experience the largest amount of change.

Junior college enrollment by 1985 will increase almost four fold from the present level of 70,000 to just over 300,000 students.

Total junior college enrollment, which currently is only 22 per cent of the state's student population, will increase to become about 40 per cent of the total.

## Chocolate Fudge Recipes Given

The following recipes for chocolate fudge were submitted by Mrs. Earl Horton:

### SIX MINUTE CHOCOLATE FUDGE

Use 4 1/2 cups sugar, 1 large can condensed milk, 1/4 teaspoon salt, three six-ounce packages semi-sweet chocolate chips, 1 1/2 cups finely chopped pecans, 1 1/2 sticks oleo, 2 teaspoons vanilla.

In large mixing bowl, combine chocolate chips, nuts, vanilla, and thinly sliced oleo and set aside. Combine sugar, milk and salt, cook slowly for six minutes after reaching boiling point. Stir constantly while cooking. Pour over ingredients in bowl and beat only until chocolate and oleo are melted. Pour into a well greased pan, chill until firm and cut into squares.

### PEANUT BUTTER FUDGE

Use 3 cups sugar, 1 1/2 tablespoons condensed milk, four tablespoons plain peanut butter, 1/2 stick oleo, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Combine sugar, milk and peanut butter in sauce pan, cook slowly, stirring constantly, to soft ball stage. Remove from heat, add oleo and vanilla, beat until it thickens and pour into well greased platter. Set in cool place until firm and cut into squares.

#### HOLIDAY SPINACH RING

Mrs. J. E. Matthews  
3 packages frozen spinach  
2 eggs  
1 tablespoon melted butter  
1 heaping tablespoon flour.  
Salt and pepper

Prepare spinach according to directions on package. Drain reserving liquid. Beat eggs add salt and pepper to taste, add butter, mix flour with small amount of water to form a paste; add to spinach and pour into a buttered ring mold. Pour 3/4 cup spinach liquor over mixture, place in shallow pan of water and bake in moderate oven until solid. Unmold on attractive plate, fill center ring and garnish with tiny pickled beets.

#### CORN CASSEROLE

Mrs. Lee Russell  
1 No. 303 can cream style corn.

- 12 medium oysters (canned)
  - 1/2 cup evaporated milk.
  - 2 eggs.
  - 1/2 cup cracker crumbs
  - 1/4 stick oleo.
  - Salt and pepper
- Beat eggs, add milk, salt and pepper to taste. Fold in corn and oysters. Pour into one-quart casserole, dot with butter and bake until set and well browned.

#### SAVORY BEANS

Mrs. Bill Marslander  
3 cans Blue Lake Beans  
1/2 medium onion.  
1/2 cup brown sugar.  
1/2 cup vinegar  
Bacon drippings  
Cook and drain beans. Saute finely chopped onion in bacon drippings, drain and stir into beans. Combine sugar and vinegar, pour over beans and simmer until thoroughly heated. Flavor improves for second day serving.

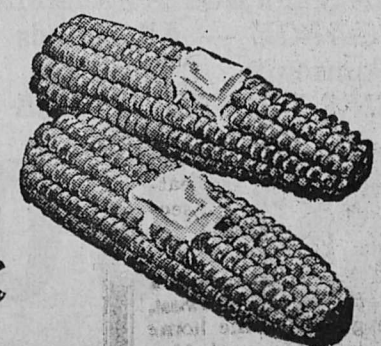

# Postage Rates Due To Go Up On January 7th

Increased rates for all classes of mail except parcel post and international mail will go into effect January 7, the local postmaster reminded postal customers today.

"Even with the new rates of six cents for first-class mail and 10 cents for air mail postal service is still a real bargain," the postmaster said. "For six cents you can send a letter to any of the 50 States, to any United States territory or possession, to Canada or Mexico, or to an American serviceman stationed anywhere in the world."

The postmaster pointed out that the new rate for post cards will be five cents and for air mail post cards eight cents.

He said the added cent in the letter rate is a 20 per cent increase compared to a 24 per cent boost in the rates for mailing newspapers and magazines and a 34 per cent hike for advertising circulars, "occupant" mail, and other material in the third-class category.

The new rate of six cents per ounce for first-class mail applies up to 13 ounces and the new rate of 10 cents per ounce for air mail applies up to 7 ounces. Under the new rate structure all first-class mail over 13 ounces and all air mail over 7 ounces will be merged into a single category.

These heavier pieces of

first-class and air mail subject to the single rate schedule will be delivered by the fastest available means of transportation.

A flat rate of 80 cents will be charged for all mail in this category up to one pound. For all mail weighing more than one pound, the present air parcel post rates will continue to apply, except that the postage on matter weighing between one and five pounds will change at half-pound intervals rather than one-pound intervals.

The postmaster said that the new rate structure will mean a reduction of postage on some parcels.

Another rate change that will affect the general public is the increase from four to six cents for the first two ounces of individual pieces of third-class mail. Unsealed greeting cards may be sent at this rate, the postmaster said.

He emphasized that the new cards will not go into effect until Jan. 7 and until then they can be mailed at the old rate of four cents.

The postmaster also noted that effective Jan. 7 special handling will be available on third-class parcels weighing between eight and 16 ounces. Special handling has been available on these parcels since 1958, when packages weighing between eight and 16 ounces were transferred from 4th to 3rd class mail.

There will be no changes in the charges for special delivery, special handling registered mail, certified mail, cash on delivery or insurance, the postmaster said.

"We have an ample supply of one-cent stamps on hand," the postmaster said, "for all those people who have five-cent stamps and need one-cent stamps to make up the postage required under the new rates."

Higher rates also will go into effect Jan. 7 for all categories of second-class mail, bulk-rate third-class mail

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Congress has finally adjourned after a Session of eleven months and six days. There will not be much time before adjournment and the beginning of the 2nd Session of the 90th Congress in January.

It had been our hope and desire to have enough time between Sessions to visit old friends back home and to make new friends and acquaintances in the counties added to the 17th Congressional District by the last Session of the Texas Legislature. It is a disappointment that the time will be so short.

As heretofore constituted, the 17th District was composed of 24 counties. To this has been added seven more to the south; namely, Burnet, Lampasas, Llano, McCullough, Mason, Menard and San Saba. Under lines now drawn candidates for Congress in 1968 will run in the newly created Districts and when elected will begin representing the new area officially at the beginning of the 91st Congress in 1969.

The 31 counties composing

the 17th Congressional District have a population of approximately 440,000. It measures 220 miles north and south and 260 miles east and west. It covers an area of almost 30,000 square miles. In these bounds could be placed the States of Maryland, Delaware, Massachusetts, New Jersey, and Rhode Island, with another 1,000 square miles left over. The area has 68 newspapers, 185 Post Offices, and 13 lakes with over 1,000 surface acres each. In spite of its size and far reaches, there is a strong community interest and compatibility. Each county shares in all or many of its varied resources. It is really "Big Country."

It is farming country with an annual farm income of in excess of \$195 million.

It is oil country, producing in one recent year more than 68 million barrels, and a total to date of over 1,800,000,000 barrels.

It is cow country, with a cattle population of over 930,000 head.

It is a sheep and goat country, with an estimated 2,800,000 sheep and goats.

It is cotton country, ginning a quarter of a million bales a year.

It is peanut country, producing some 60 million pounds a year.

It is pecan country, the annual production being 800,000 pounds.

**Expanded Texas Travel Book Is Offered Public**

AUSTIN — An expanded edition of the popular Texas Travel Handbook has been released by the Texas Highway Department.

First issued last year as an aid to pleasure travel in Texas, the enlarged second edition now lists nearly 400 cities and towns, and includes more than 2,500 individual items of interest. The 208-page handbook also contains 112 photographs which provide travelers with previews of such attractions as the aerial tramway in El Paso, and Presidio La Bahia near Goliad.

Handbook subjects are as varied as the state itself, ranging from the melancholy Empty Saddle Monument in Dalhart to the humorous Popeye statue in Crystal City.

With the Texas Travel Handbook as a guide, travelers may discover dinosaur tracks, Indian pictographs and buried cities. They will learn the locations of little-known ghost towns, and follow specific directions to the most popular attractions of modern Texas cities.

Special sections are devoted to recreational facilities in the Texas national and state forests, and in more than 55 state parks. Summaries of Texas hunting and fishing regulations are provided, as well as information on visiting Mexico.

Like all Highway Department travel literature, the handbook is free. Since its initial publication last year, the guide has become a major item among more than four million pieces of travel material distributed annually by the Texas Highway Department.
