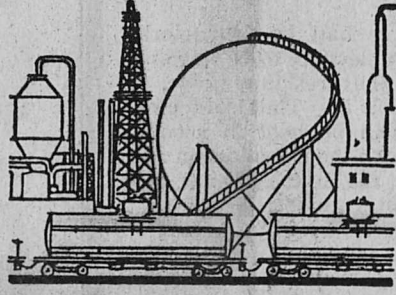

## W. J. (Bill) Herrington Final Rites Held Friday

Funeral services for W. J. (Bill) Herrington, 76, prominent Ranger resident, were held at 3 p. m. Friday in the First Baptist Church of Ranger with Rev. Avery Sullivan, pastor of the First Baptist Church and Rev. Thomas Tribble, pastor of the First Methodist Church, officiating. Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery with Killingsworth Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Herrington was born Dec. 26, 1891, in Falls County, Texas and died Thursday, Dec. 28 in the Ranger General Hospital.

He was married to Susie Addie Tompkins on Oct. 21, 1923, in Haskell. She preceded him in death Oct. 19, 1961.

Mr. Herrington was principal at Tiffin School and taught at Ward School, holding these capacities for 14

years. He was a former tax assessor - collector and tax consultant for Eastland County for 15 years. He was also a former owner and operator of a variety store in Rising Star for 16 years.

Mr. Herrington had served for the past six years as hospital administrator for the Ranger General Hospital. He was a member of the Ranger Lions Club and the IOOF Lodge.

Survivors include one sister, Mrs. Max Ohr, of Ranger, and a number of nieces and nephews.

Pallbearers were George Allison of Sweetwater, James Rutherford of Rising Star, Earl O'Brien of Eastland, D. C. Singleton, Lloyd Bruce, Oris E. Littlefield, H. H. Oliver and Dick Jones, all of Ranger.

## Postage Rates Increase Effective January 7

Nearly 10,000 postage machines, including the one at the Ranger Post Office, will be converted over the next three months to reflect the new postage rates. Postmaster Hodges said today.

New postage rates go into effect Jan. 7, 1968, the postmaster said. New rates raise first class postage to 6 cents an ounce, air mail to ten cents an ounce and postal cards to 5 cents.

The job of converting the thousands of vending machines found in post office lobbies from coast to coast is so massive that it will take several months to complete, the postmaster said. Five different types of machines are involved, he noted.

Most of the machines now provide 5 cent and 4 cent stamps for a nickel, quarter or dime. After the conversion, the machines will provide 5 cent and 6 cent stamps.

The postmaster said that the vending machines located in the lobbies of post offices are not to be confused with the commercial stamp vending devices found in many stores. Such machines provide a margin for profit and are not controlled by the Post Office Department.

"Post office vending machines can be a big convenience to postal patrons," Hodges said. "The devices permit mailers to buy stamps and mail letters after the windows have closed."

## Supt. Clark Reminds Public Of New UIL Award Rules

Now that award time is near for football and band, Supt. James R. Clark reminds the public of the award rule which the schools in the Intercollegiate League have passed and live under.

No award shall be given any student that costs more than \$15. Neither may a school act as a purchasing agent if the student desires a patch to go on his award jacket or sweater. Neither may the school purchase an \$18 award jacket and let the student pay \$3 of the amount.

Students themselves may buy anything they wish for the sleeve but the school cannot be a partner in the affair. The school purchase order must be for only a \$15 award

sweater, jacket or blanket as the rule might be.

Even a printed certificate of Award cannot be larger than 9x12 inches in size and must not be framed or laminated.

After the student is given a \$15 award in one sport or completion, another award in another sport may be given if the cost does not exceed \$2.

Schools may not give anything to an athlete that other students do not get also.

This means a school cannot give athletes vitamin pills, flu shots, and the like. This is a parent's responsibility.

Meals for students while out of town on school business may be paid for by the school if it is financially able but clubs or individuals may not pay for these meals. They may donate money to the school athletic fund so that the school can do so.

Schools and other organization cannot send a team to the Cotton Bowl as this is a special award above the basic \$15 award rule.

Banquets after the close of a season are not a violation of League rules.

Students may not take pay for teaching most skills used in school. If a student teaches twirling or any music contest event, then that student is ineligible in music contests for one year from the date of the violation. The student is still eligible in sports, however.

Students may not give lessons for pay for swimming, diving, and other events in which the League has contests.

Schools may buy protective heavy duty frames for glasses for athletes but may not buy the lens or contact lens. Schools may buy face guards or mouth guards as it is considered school equipment.

Clubs who wish to give any student an award should give it to the school with the student's name engraved on it and the school must keep

permanent possession of the award. Schools may not hold awards until the student graduates.

The award rules are very comprehensive but also tricky Supt. Clark said. He asks that clubs or individuals who wish to give awards to certain students to contact him or the high school principal first.

An example is that if a student accepts \$2.50 worth of golf balls as a prize in a tournament.

nament in the summer, he is ineligible for one year. Golf balls are saleable and of value.

A student can accept a \$40 belt buckle or trophy though if it is not saleable, tradeable or of any use to anyone else. Engraving on such an item usually make it worthless to anyone but the owner. No one would buy a trophy with someone else's name on it and if it is not saleable, then no rule is violated.

The District Athletic Committee is the final judge of any rule violation as long as it affects district play only, Clark said. This is why any question is always brought before the committee before the student is played in a contest.

The University Interscholastic League can give a school advice but they rule only on matters above district contests unless a committee requests a State hearing.

The Ranger basketball individuals now playing were approved as all being eligible, based on information given the committee.

### CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF RANGER

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Ranger, Texas, on the 9th day of January, 1968, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said city, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST the adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held within the City of Ranger, at the City Hall of said city. The presiding judge shall be A. E. Crawley.

There shall be four clerks at such election, to be appointed by the presiding judge.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Ranger, Texas, shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection 6, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

#### OFFICIAL BALLOT

**INSTRUCTIONS:** Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

( ) FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

( ) AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, words, or word of this Act or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or applications, and to this end the provisions of this Act are declared to be severable.

Section 7. The fact that the rapid rise in urban population has created an urgent need for expanded municipal services, and that the City of Ranger is in dire need of additional funds to provide needed services, and that the existing taxing authority of the City of Ranger is extremely limited resulting in a very heavy tax burden on the home owners of our city, and that the cherished ideal of local self-government demands that local problems be met and solved by local action create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the ordinance be read on more than one occasion be suspended, and this charter provision is hereby suspended, and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so ordained.

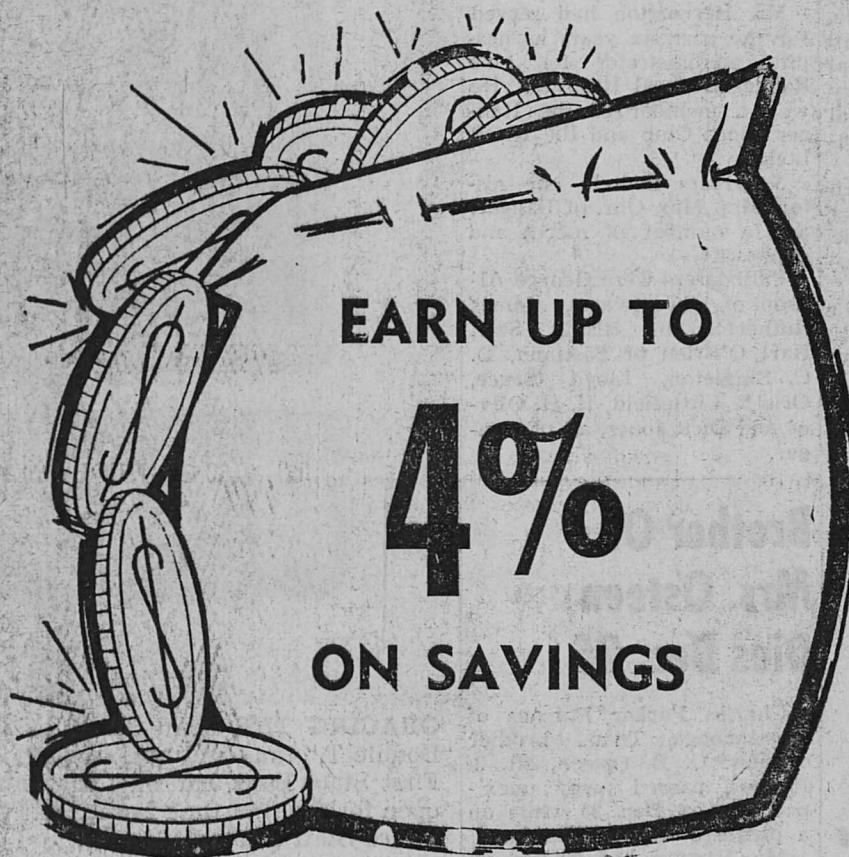

Company Science Demonstrator

**Science Demonstrator Will Present  
'The Magic Of Communications'**

Feats of telephone legerdemain will embellish the performance of Glenn Scott, phone company science demonstrator, when he appears before the Cisco Junior College on Jan. 3 at 9 a. m. and at Ranger Junior College at 2 p. m. Jan. 4.

Scott, a veteran of almost 6,000 public appearances in Texas, will have a few sleight-of-hand tricks up his sleeve as well as factual scientific material, when he presents his program, which he titles "The Magic of Communications."

The speaker will trace the evolution of the telephone instrument, showing working models of early phones, some recent but successful experimental phones, and the latest "pushbutton" style. Then in the spirit of Houdini and Blackstone, he will produce three telephones from thin air, extract a 30-foot banner from an apparently empty tube, and make a few things disappear.

Among his scientific feats of "magic" he will demonstrate a helium-neon laser, using it to transmit music over its ruby-red beam.

Asked what magic has to do with telephone service, Scott said, "There's nothing magic about the Bell System and its telephones. Today's telephone service is the result of thorough research, careful planning and hard work. But the wonders of telecommunications are such that they seem almost to be magic, and they lend themselves to magical interpretation or demonstration. Even Merlin, the magician of King Arthur of olden times, would marvel at today's telephone wonders that exceed his ancient wizardry."

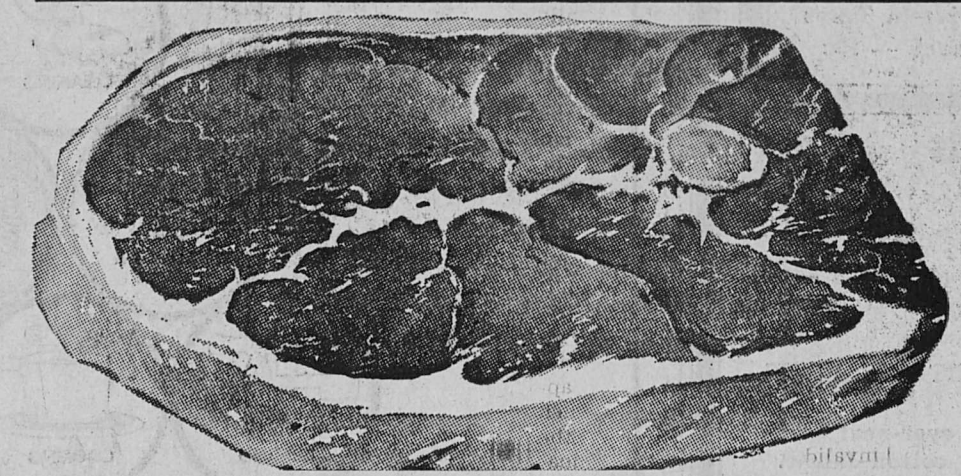
