Multipurpose Center Moved To Cisco - Food Pantry & Clothes Closet Stays In Eastland

Peggy Roberts, Director of the Eastland County Multipurpose Center, reported Thursday that the Center has moved to 1611 W. Highway 80 in Cisco. The location is on the east side of the E.L. Graham Hospital Building. The new telephone number is 442-4522.

Speaking at the County Resource Association meeting in Eastland, Mrs. Roberts said that the hours of her office would remain the same: 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. Monday through Wednesday, 8 a.m. - 3 p.m. on Thursday, and closed Fridays.

The local Multipurpose Center is part of Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., and offers a number of services. Mrs. Roberts listed some of these as help with energy bills, services for the homeless, a weatherization program, medical transportation, Family Planning, and commodities distribution.

The Multipurpose Center will have an Open House at its new location in August.

The former location of the Center was 204 N. Lamar in Eastland. The County Food Pantry will remain in this building, and will be run by volunteers only, Mrs. Roberts said. The clothing closet will also stay in this location.

At the present time this facility will be open from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

The new phone number for the Food Pantry is 629-2132. More volunteers are needed there, Mrs. Roberts said.

Lois Robinson, one of the volunteers, sent a report about the work. She said that 25 families with 76 household members had received emergency food supplies during May. The Food Pantry can use more canned goods, Mrs. Robinson reported. Staples are needed, and also cleaners and paper goods.

A freezer is still needed in the Pantry, so that perishable food can be stored.

Other discussions at the County Resources Association meeting included ways of assisting people who need to travel for cancer treatments. Lesa Oswald, President of the Eastland County Chapter of the American Cancer Society, brought ideas on this topic.

Corrie Cowley, Director of the Resources group, gave information on a Travel Fund for ill and disabled children.

The County Resources Association will not hold meetings in July and August, but will resume regular sessions on Thursday, Sept. 12 at 12 noon at Eastland Memorial Library.

There will be activity reports and plans made for the fall and winter season.

Mingus Baptist Church To Celebrate 100th Anniversary

Mingus Baptist Church will have a Homecoming Celebration on Sunday, June 23, to mark the One Hundred Year Anniversary of the church's organization. The all day services will begin at 10:30 a.m. to 12 noon, and the afternoon program will be from 2 to 4 p.m. The program will include: recognition of all former pastors and missionaries present, a brief church history, a memorial service in remembrance of deceased members, visiting speakers, special gospel music, and a display of pictures and other church memorabilia.

Mingus Baptist Church has a lot of history as it has given the people of Mingus a place to worship for one hundred years. Upon the yellowing, broken and brittle pages of a disintegrating book of church minutes this entry was found: "Organization of Pleasant Hill Missionary Baptist Church, on the twenty eighth day of March, 1891. At this time with God's guidance, fourteen souls banded together by a common faith, set forth on a journey of service to their community, their descendants and their God." Church services were first held in a country school, known at the time as "Pleasant Hill" near Rocky Creek, located just to the northwest of the present town of Mingus. Beverly Coleman Harris became the first pastor in October 1891.

There have been good times and bad, prosperity and depression, rain and drought, fair weather and tornadic winds, times of joy and times of sorrow but through it all, it has led us to a place of worship and given us a vision on which to build and serve the Lord from generation to generation. There were some members who spent their lives in this community and whose children have remained and carried on the work of the church.

Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, which was the predecessor of Mingus Baptist Church was admitted to the Palo Pinto Baptist Association on August 15, 1892. On March 3, 1900, the name of the church was changed from Pleasant Hill Baptist Church to Mingus Baptist Church. It is a Southern Baptist Church and was from the time it was organized.

By 1905 the church showed increased interest and growth with a membership of fifty. Plans were made to build a frame church on a new location in Mingus. Guy B. and Lucile Willson gave the land and the new church was built on the present church site at a cost of \$693.00. By 1928 the building was needing repairs. A committee was appointed to study and present plans for remodeling. On April 4, 1928, the day before the remodeling committee met, a storm all but demolished the building. To build a new church was the only solution. Contractor John Kern, who was a member of the church, built the new church, using Thurber bricks, at a cost of \$2,500.00. January 7, 1929 was a big day for Mingus Baptists. The new church was completed and the first service was held in the building with an

offering of \$10.10 taken to apply to the building fund. Dr. Jackson Leslie preached the first sermon for the Rally Day service in the new church.

Some interesting facts found recorded in the church minutes include: In April 1893, the church voted to practice foot washing in connection with the Lord's Supper. During the early years, the church found it necessary to apply the rod of discipline for non attendance, trying to show discord, visiting a saloon and dancing. During an evening service in the 1920's, the Ku Klux Klan-visited the church. Bernice Bearden, Thelma Speegle Foote and Lurley Choate Cowan remember that several white robed members marched into the church, strode to the pulpit, put some money there, then walked out. Not a word was spoken to the terrified churchgoers. The reason for the visit was never known. Annually the church sent gifts to Buckners Orphans Home in Dallas. Gifts included money, canned food, bed linens and one entry recorded the shipping of crates of live chickens. The Women's Missionary Union would sometimes have all day meetings where they would quilt and make children's clothes and mail them to the home.

During the days of the Great Depression offerings were poor and attendance was low. People were without more than bare necessities, but through these trials the congregation held fast to their faith and continued keeping the church alive and the church doors open. World War II brought about a loss of spiritual enthusiasm, but it seemed to effect the whole nation. Through this, too, the church survived and a new spiritual awakening spread over the church and it continued to serve as God's light-house to the community.

Mingus Baptist Church has provided a place of service for several Associational Missionaries and a valuable place to serve the Lord for young preachers attending Southwestern Seminary. It is impossible to know and evaluate its influence and worth in the community.

This small church has never grown large in this sparsely populated area, but many faithful people have been a part of what Mingus Baptist Church is today. The church has one hundred eleven resident and non resident members. We have a full time ministry with two services on Sunday and a mid-week prayer service. We support the home and foreign mission programs, assist in community activities, help meet the needs of our people in the community, and have visitation in the area nursing homes. A very important part of our ministry is an active youth program for the young people in Mingus.

As we look to the future, our purpose is to glorify God and be an example of Jesus to the community. The town of Mingus along with Mingus Baptist Church has changed throughout the years, but we can be assured as Hebrews 13:8 tells us; Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, today and forever.

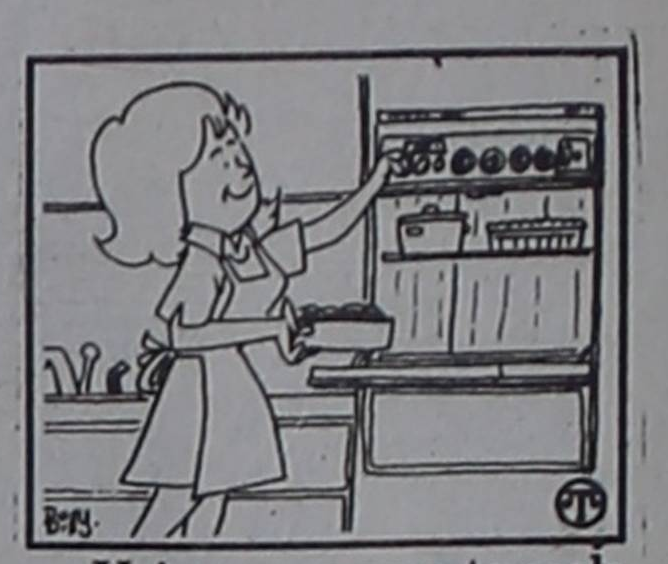
The room was set up appropriately and decorated with a basket of blue and yellow silk flowers from Ranger Florist. Above the flowers hovered

Several of our club members will be fishing at the Anglers Choice Team Tournament on Twin Buttes this coming weekend and we wish them good luck.

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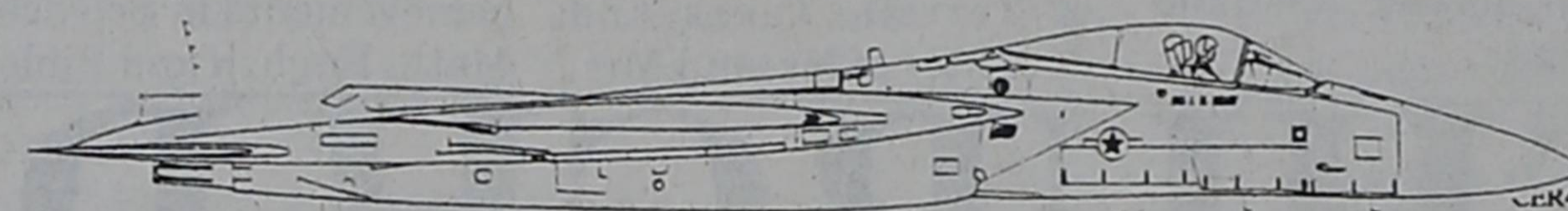
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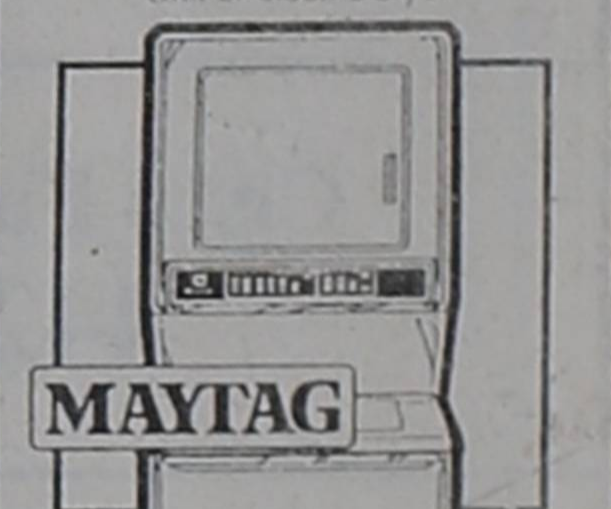

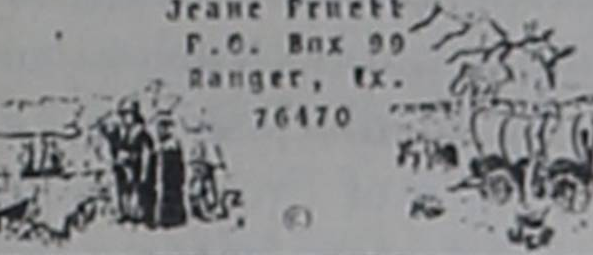

Information for each entry contains the following (when known): name of the bride and groom, date of intention and/or marriage, ages, family relationships, the individual who served as security, and witnesses. Over 3,000 entries are given, listing whites, slaves, and free Negroes. This work 18 on of the series compiled by Barber which are very handy references for the historian or genealogist in addition to being just fascinating reading. During his short tenure in the industry, Carroll's

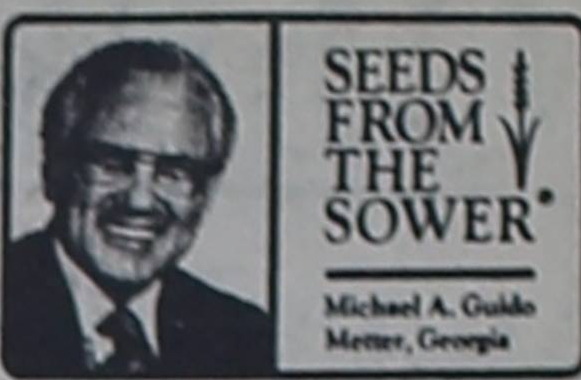

Open Records: Cover For Business Espionage?

A few years ago some Japanese firms were caught red handed spying on IBM. Industrial espionage! They spent a lot of money doing it and suffered embarrassing publicity when they were found out. Did that stop them? No. They haven't stopped spying, but they've discovered a better way: the Texas Open Records Act! And they are not alone.

The Texas Open Records Act is a law passed in 1973 to open up government to the people - in the words of its champions, to expose the affairs of government "to the sun-

shine." But it also exposes business secrets to the Rising Sun and others, including business competitors of the company or business you own or work for, no matter how small it is.

Texas isn't the only state that enacted so-called "sunshine laws," but its law has been interpreted in a way advantageous for business spies, thanks to the "Opinion Committee" of the Texas Attorney General's Office.

The Opinion Committee of the Texas Attorney General is currently composed of twelve lawyers (Assistant Attorneys General.) The twelve write the official Open Record Decisions (ORDs) and Open Record Letters (ORLs) that the Attorney General issues - or that the Opinion Committee issues in his name. Open Records Decisions and Open Records Letters always involve particular information that somebody is trying to get from a state, county, or city source, or from some other local governmental unit - information that somebody else questions their right to have. They are bureaucratic orders that can give away the store.

Sometimes the city or the governmental body asking for a decision of the Attorney General wants to protect the information for reasons of its own. Schools, for example, object to releasing test answer sheets before the test is given. (Since the Open Records Act says all information collected, assembled, or maintained by or for governmental bodies in Texas - including schools - is "public information" with certain exceptions only, students, not surprisingly, have sought test information more than once - unsuccessfully.)

Decisions and Open Records Letters decide questions involving information about private citizens and businesses that happen to be in governmental files but which the agency or office has no special interest in protecting. That is when businesses must be alert.

IBM was recently awarded a contract by the City of Austin on the basis of a proposal it submitted. Hitachi Data Systems and Amdahl Corporation submitted proposals that weren't accepted. Now, the losers are demanding under the Open Records Act that the city give them IBM's proposal which contains, that company claims, information about methodology that it developed over a number of years and that is unique to it. The whole thing is pending before the Attorney General's Opinion Committee, but if IBM can't find a stout exception to hang its case on, and do it with precise and supported-in-detail objections, its "proprietary" information may soon become public information in Japan as well as here! Under the statute, the Japanese are as much entitled to it as anybody else.

KPGM Peat Marwick, another disappointed bidder, wants the University of Houston to turn over to it not only the proposal of the successful company, but the proposals of the four others who were in the running. Ernst & Young, Price Waterhouse, Arthur Andersen, Coopers & Lybrand, and Deloitte & Touche must now go quickly into legal battle. The Opinion Committee in the past has had little sympathy for prominent firms that don't respond in what the Committee considers the appropriate manner. (Or for prominent firms, period.)

Don't think such intrigue is limited to the world of high tech or giant corporations. A veterinarian in Lubbock asked that city to disclose the customers of the other animal doctors in town (and information about their customer's pets). Fortunately for the other veterinarians, they got notice of the request and hired an attorney to defend their interests. That gave them a chance, but a letter from the Opinion Committee in April ordered release of the information.

The Legislature included exceptions in the Open Records Act that it probably thought would give businesses several ways to expeditiously protect their secrets. But what the Legislature giveth, the Opinion Committee can taketh away.

If you have business secrets to guard, either make sure they don't get into governmental files or find a way to put the squelch on their release. If may be business harkiri to depend on the Texas Attorney General's Office or its Opinion Committee to do it for you without the pressure of timely and pertinent legal arguments.

understand that their co-workers, fellow missionaries, are not the perfect people they thought them to be. Still again, others fade away as the glow of the romance of missions begins to ebb. Whatever it is, that old Serpent is sure using it to club us to death!

So, what do we do about all this? Do we fold our tents and slink away? Do we throw up our hands in despair and quit? Do we throw in the towel and say "No Mas?" Do we say, "O.K. Satan, you've won," and go away whimpering and blubbering about how awful we've been treated? Never! Never! I'll tell you what we do. We fall on our knees and remember from "whence we've been digged," (Isaiah 51:1). We will remember that Jesus said He would build His church on the great strata of our faith in Him and that the gates of Hell will not be

able to withstand the onslaught of the army of God! We will remember that we have already read the last chapter and we know who wins! We will remember our commitment is not to a cause, however worthy; nor to an organization, however well funded; nor to a need, however desperate. We will remember that our commitment is to Him whose Name is above every other name, to Him who was and is and ever shall be, to Him who was killed and buried to show us how to die and then raised to show us how to live, to Him who says, "I have the keys of Hell and Death", to Him who never tells a lie and cannot fail. The same commitment which brought me to Africa 30 years ago sustains me now, and when my short time here is finished, I will not resign...I'll simply accept reassign-

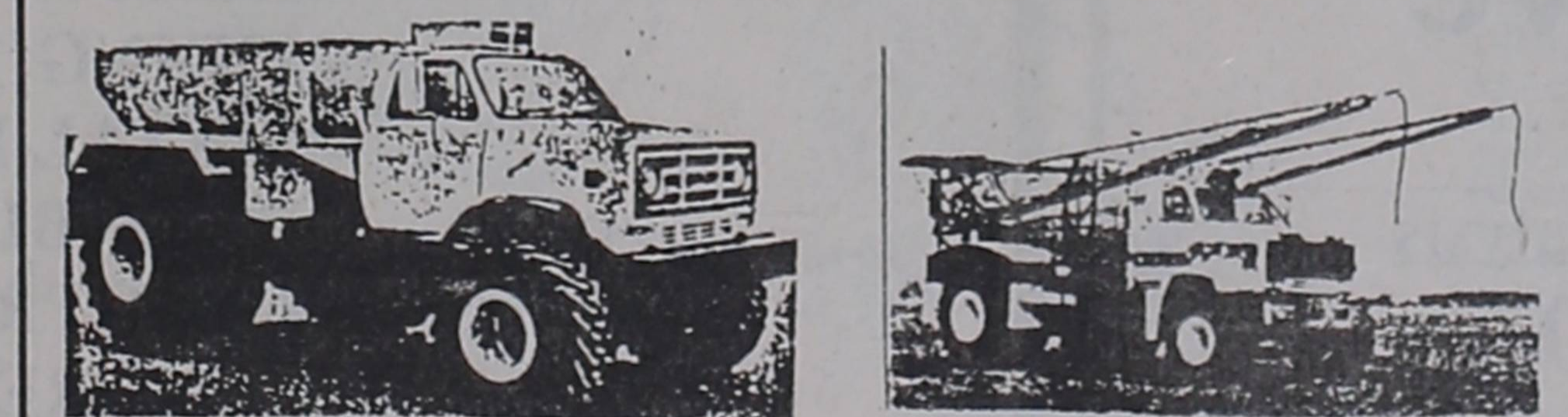
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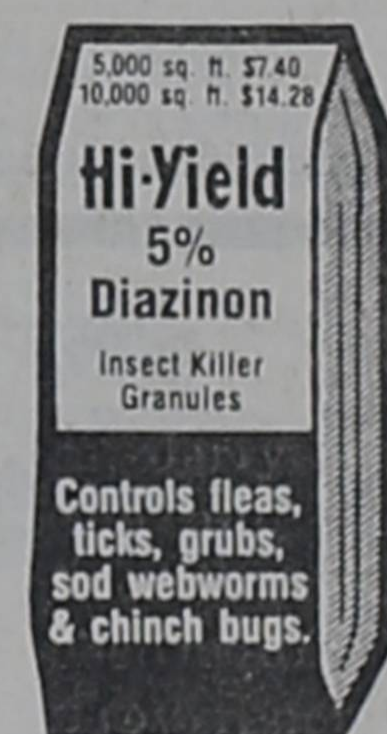

Brides Should Include Name Changes In Wedding Plans

June brides should keep Social Security in mind when making their wedding plans. It is very important that a new bride report her change of name to Social Security. Unless the new name is reported, her earnings may not be posted properly to her Social Security record.

Failure to report a change of name to Social Security is one of the most frequent causes of errors in wage records. Since eligibility and benefits for Social Security retirement, disability, and survivors insurance are based on the earning in the records kept by Social Security, incorrect records could mean lower benefits, delayed benefits, or ineligibility for benefits.

To change a name in Social Security records, a

bride must complete Form SS-5 (Application for a Social Security Card) and submit supporting evidence which identifies her under her old and new name. An original marriage certificate is the best evidence, but the application lists other acceptable evidence.

To obtain Form SS-5, a bride should contact her local Social Security office. The staff there will tell her how to apply and will send her the application form. In most cases, the entire process can be handled by phone and mail. If she prefers, she can call toll free 1-800-234-5772.

Women who have had a name change, but do not file an SS-5, should do so regardless of the amount of time that has passed.

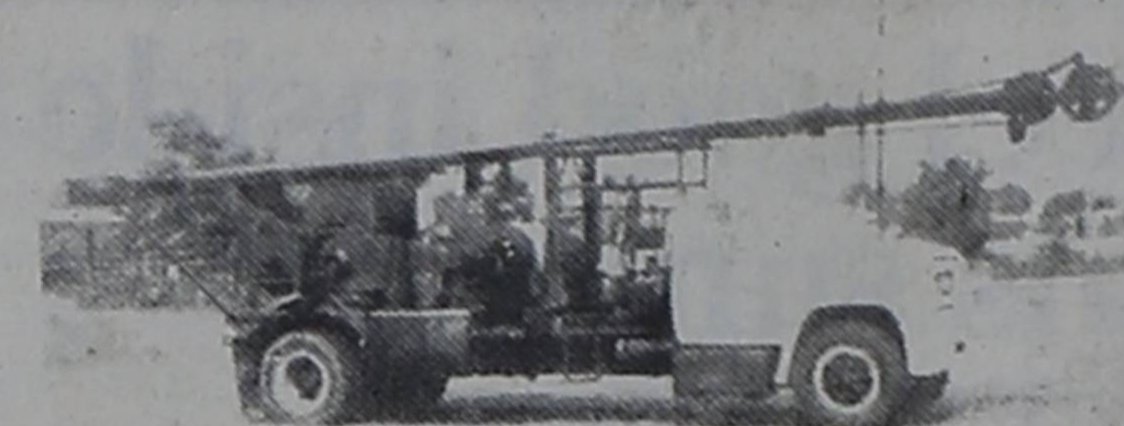

GROUNDWATER PROTECTION IS EVERYONE'S BUSINESS

Over the last five weeks the paper has run a special five part series on water quality and conservation. This has been a follow-up of programs conducted by the Eastland County Extension Program Council Economic and Community Development Committee over the last six months. Today there is much debate about the control of this valuable natural resource called water.

How important is groundwater in Texas? Approximately 52 percent of the water used in Texas and nearly 72 percent of the state's water used in agriculture comes from underground water supplies. As these figures indicate, underground water is an important resource in Texas both for drinking water and for agriculture.

Texas landowners have historically held the right to capture and use groundwater beneath their prop-

erty. Groundwater rights have been an inherent part of property ownership.

Increasingly, there has been more interest to control underground water as a way to manage it. One such method used to manage underground water is through groundwater districts.

The 1949 Texas Groundwater District Act gave underground water conservation districts the authority to conserve and preserve the underground water supplies and develop more efficient methods of water use.

Underground water is an important resource in Texas. Locally controlled underground water conservation districts with rules, programs, and activities specifically addressing the local problems and opportunities have generally proven to be useful vehicles for managing groundwater.

Underground water conservation districts have been granted flexibility in determining which powers and duties they will exercise. This allows them to be more responsive to local needs.

Currently, there are four methods of action of the Legislature, petition by property owners, direct action of the Texas Water Commission in designated critical areas, and annexation by an existing district. In each case, a confirmation election is required for district creation.

If you would like more information about groundwater districts, there is a publication entitled, "Legal Authority and Existing Underground Water Conservation Districts" available at the County Extension Office. The office is located in the basement of the County Courthouse.

Points To Ponder

As I stated last week Sharon, and I were going to the Annual Conference of the Central Texas United Methodist Church which was held in Fort Worth. It is composed of three and one-half days of work and worship. One of the highlights of the Conference is the ordination of new ministers. All prospective ministers are asked questions that John Wesley asked ministerial candidates in his day.

One of the questions they asked is, "Are you going on to perfection?" Now, that is a hard question. What does going on to perfection mean? It doesn't mean being faultless. It's not like scoring 100 percent on a true-false test, it's not the same as perfect flower. No one can be perfect in judgment, knowledge, or insight.

To be perfect is to share the nature of God. If you want to be perfect treat people they way God does. People are to be loved, treated with good will. This kind of love is more than emotion. People are to be loved, and object used. So often we love objects and use people. Love causes us to treat people responsibly, with good will, for this is the way God does.

God has no favorites! Jesus said: "He makes His sun rise on the evil and on the good and sends rain on the just and the unjust." Sometimes during a summer drought someone will say, "Your not paying the preacher enough." I hope no one thinks the preachers are getting paid too much now. At any rate Jesus tells us that God treats us all alike. A bad man or a good man on the golf course has an equal chance of being hit by lightning if a sudden rain storm comes up.

This has been a difficult lesson for the human race to learn much of the old Testament has the concept that one is rewarded in accordance with one's behavior. Job is one powerful example of that. He is suffering greatly. His friends drop by and tell him how concerned they are to see him suffering the way he is. "Some sin

has caused this," they say. "Repent your sin and every thing will be OK." To this Job replies that he cannot believe that his sin has caused all the suffering to come upon him.

It is helpful to us to remember we are all sinners none of us have a special claim on God's love. None of us deserve any particular blessing. "But while we were yet sinners Christ died for us." What God feels for people is no more revealing than that.

If I am going to be perfect. If you are going to be perfect, we must learn to care about people, all people, good and bad, friend and strangers. God's demands are that we love one another. Jesus said: "This is my commandment that you love one another." We can only earn to be perfect by regular church attendance, regular study of scripture, and regularly helping other people. Take your family to church this week.

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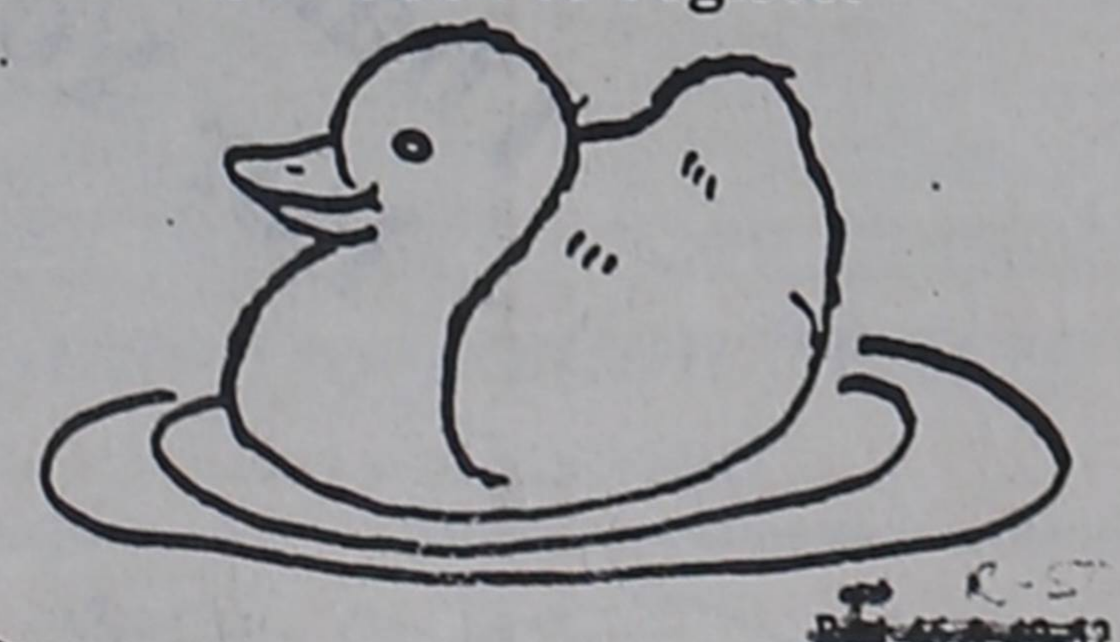

NOTICE OF AN APPLICATION TO APPROPRIATE PUBLIC WATERS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

App. No. 12-3471A
Notice is given that GYLYNN A. WILSON, Route 3, Box 198U, Ranger, TX 76470 applicant, seeks to amend Certificate of Adjudication No. 12-3471 pursuant to §11.122, Texas Water Code, and Texas Water Commission Rules 31 TAC §§295.1, et seq.

Certificate No. 12-3471 was issued to Glynn A. Wilson on April 5, 1985 and authorizes owner to divert and use not to exceed 50 acre-feet of water per annum from an existing, exempt (Texas Water Code Section 11.142), dam and 115 acre-foot capacity reservoir on an unnamed tributary of North Colony Creek, tributary of the Leon River, tributary of the Little River, tributary of the Brazos River to irrigate 70 acres of land out of a tract described as the east 50 acres of the north 100 acres of the West 1/2 of the HT & B RR Co. Survey No. 123, Abstract No. 79 and the northeast 1/4 of the aforesaid survey, save an except the northwest corner of the northeast 1/4 of said survey. Diversion is authorized from the perimeter of the reservoir at a maximum diversion rate of 0.77 cfs (344 gpm) and the time priority of the owner's right is October 11, 1977. Special Condition 4.B. indicates that authorizations under the certificate shall expire and become null and void as of December 31, 1990, and thereafter, owner may use the reservoir for domestic and livestock purposes, unless prior to that expiration date owner applies for and is subsequently granted a renewal in whole or in part. Special Condition 4.C. authorizes the owner to place groundwater in the reservoir for subsequent diversion and use for the purposes authorized in the permit.

Applicant seeks to amend the certificate as follows:
1. To extend the term of the certificate.
2. To delete Special Condition 4.C. which authorizes the owner to place groundwater in the reservoir for subsequent diversion and use for the purposes authorized in the permit.
3. To divert irrigation water which is presently authorized from an additional exempt 125 acre-foot capacity reservoir created by a dam located on North Colony Creek (referred to as Dam and Reservoir No. 2). The dam is located in the J. J.

Maxwell Survey, Abstract No. 1706, Stephens County, Texas. A point on the dam at the stream is located at Latitude 32.52° N, Longitude 98.73° W, also being N 75° E, 1400 feet from the southeast corner of the aforesaid HT & B RR Co. Survey No. 123.

4. To add authorization to divert water from the perimeter of Reservoir No. 2 at a maximum diversion rate of 0.7 cfs (300 gpm). Water diverted will be conveyed via pipeline to Reservoir No. 1 for subsequent irrigation purposes. Water at times may also be diverted from Reservoir No. 2 directly to the fields.

5. To increase the annual appropriation from 50 to 100 acre-feet of water per annum from the reservoirs.

6. To redescribe and increase the overall tract of land out of which irrigation can occur and to increase the acreage authorized for irrigation from 70 acres to 150 acres of land per year out of which 50 acres will be leased land. Applicant is the owner of 826 acres of land in said HT & B RR Co. Survey No. 123; the T & NO RR CO. Survey, Abstract No. 218; the J. F. Oakley Survey, Abstract No. 2040; the G. C. Conway Survey, Abstract No. 1880 and the aforesaid J. J. Maxwell survey, Stephens County, Texas. Said land was conveyed to the applicant in two Warranty Deeds recorded in Volume 349 and 356, pages 55 and 535, respectively, of the Stephens County Deed Record.

The 50 acres of leased land is located in the aforesaid T & NO RR CO. survey. Said property is leased from the W. F. Pierce Estate and is described in the lease agreement as being out of a 110-acre tract.

7. To increase the maximum diversion rate of water from Reservoir No. 1 from 0.8 cfs (344 gpm) to 1.6 cfs (725 gpm).

Application No. 12-3471A was received on December 12, 1990, and accepted for filing on April 1, 1991. The Executive Director has reviewed this application and declares it to be administratively complete.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless a person that may be affected requests a public hearing. Any such request must be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and telephone number of the requester; (2) the application number or other recognizable reference to this application; (3) a brief explanation of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester would be adversely impacted by the granting of this applica-

tion; and (4) a clear statement of the objections of the requester or represented persons.

This application will be presented to the Commission for final decision on July 17, 1991 at 3:00 p.m. in Room 118 of the Stephen F. Austin State Office Building, 1700 North Congress Avenue, Austin, Texas unless a sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of this notice. If a hearing request is filed, and the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue relevant to the decision on the application, and/or that a public hearing would serve the public interest, the Commission will remand the application for public hearing. If this application is remanded for hearing, no further notice of the hearing or hearing date will be issued other than advising all interested persons of the time and place where the hearing is to convene. Therefore, all individuals who wish to be notified of the setting of a hearing must submit a written request for notification to the Texas Water Commission.
