Stephenville Man Injured

A 41 year old Stephenville man was injured in an explosion and flash fire in the science laboratory of Ranger Junior College Friday morning.

Dr. Christopher King, assistant professor of chemistry at Tarleton State University, was burned on both hands and his left thigh. He was treated in the emergency room of the Eastland Memorial Hospital for about three hours before being released.

King was reportedly getting rid of some dangerous chemicals at the college. He said he believed he was more capable of handling excess

sodium that needed to be disposed of than students. The sodium he was removing combined with hydroxide forms hydrogen gas, the same gas that ignited in the Hindenburg dirigible disaster.

The gas somehow ignited and King's pants and shirt caught fire. He suffered first degree burns on his legs and second degree burns on his hands before he could get a 'fire blanket' around him to smother the flames.

Firefighters were warned not to put water on tiny fires on the floor. The fires burned themselves out, and firefighters removed smoke with fans.

Beniefel, Others Sentenced In Federal Court Friday

Steve Beniefel, 39, alleged leader of a drug ring, was sentenced in Federal Court in Lubbock Friday, June 7 to 12 years in prison. Beniefel received his sentence for conspiracy to manufacture and sell methamphetamine, and for the laundering of money.

Beniefel was fined \$100, and must serve five years supervised release after he leaves prison. Also sentenced was Deborah Dawn Simmons, 31, who received 4 years in prison for using a telephone in relation to a drug trafficking crime. Simmons was fined \$50, and must be supervised for one year after her release.

Another individual sentenced in Federal Court Friday was former Eastland County Sheriff Dee Hogan. The Judge handed down a 3-year prison term for Hogan, who was fined \$50, and must be supervised for 3 years after his release.

Hogan had filed an objection to his pre-sentence report which is closed to the public - and was going to contest statements made there. A plea bargain was approved, however, by U.S. District Judge Sam Cummings, in which Hogan agreed to drop his objections in return for a 3-year prison sentence. He also agreed to enter a guilty plea to a state charge of aggravated perjury in connection with an Eastland County Grand Jury.

Hogan will serve any state sentence he receives concurrently with his Federal sentence, reports U.S. Assistant Attorney General Dick Baker. Beniefel has remained in jail since his high-profile arrest Jan. 4 at his

Wrecker Service in Ranger, said to be the headquarters for the conspiracy.

At that time 12 individuals in all were arrested on charges of illegal drug manufacture and distribution. Most have since pled guilty and have been sentenced.

Four others also pleaded guilty Feb. 12 to charges connected with this operation. On April 22 Federal officials announced the arrest of 14 other individuals, with 2 more in custody.

Sheriff Dee Hogan was arrested Jan. 11 on the charges of obstruction of justice. He has spent most of the time since in jail in Lubbock.

In February Weights and Measures Trooper Acey Van Steel was arrested on charges of aiding the Beniefel organization. Steel admitted in a Feb. 12 guilty plea that he ran a license check on an undercover car for Beni-

fiel, and that he provided Beniefel with sensitive law enforcement information. He has since been sentenced to a term in prison.

Federal authorities are proclaiming victory in this widespread case, which has resulted in 30 convictions. They still indicate there will be more arrests in the case, but do not say whether the arrests will be in Eastland County. The organization is said to have involved 16 drug labs and have sales as far as Florida.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Dick Baker says the case has had a more significant impact than any he has prosecuted in 18 years.

These arrests by the F.B.I. and Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Force has reportedly been cited in a U.S. Department of Justice report titled "Toward a Safer America: The Justice Department's Record of Accomplishment In The First Two Years of the Bush Administration."

other counties, and 10 Eastland County prisoners.

Sheriff Ronnie White reported that lightning had recently damaged electrical wiring on top of the jail, and that an electrician was out repairing it.

The Commissioners heard a request from Sheriff White to allow for a line-item adjustment of \$650 in his budget to pay for schools for employees to maintain certification. This item was approved.

On another agenda item, the Commissioners agreed to allow the Cisco Chapter of the Veterans of Foreign Wars to operate a concession stand at the County Auction June 22 at the Precinct 4 barn.

The Commissioners named Roy K. Parker of Gorman to serve on the Child Protective Service Board, filling a position previously held by Dr. Charles Barnes of Rising Star.

The court approved a policy of pre-employment drug testing as a condition of county employment. Situations which indicate drug use on the job might also result in a drug test.

In other matters, Commissioner of Pct. 2 Calvin Ainsworth reported that two county jail prisoners had been used for court-house maintenance recently, and they had worked well. Trees have been trimmed around the courthouse, windows washed, and a lot more cleaning and roof repair is underway. A long-range plan for lawn improvement is also being carried out.

County Commissioners, Ambulance Taxing District Petition Prepared

Eastland County Commissioners Monday continued to discuss setting up a county-wide Taxing District to fund Emergency Medical Services.

District Attorney Leslie Vance brought the court a petition he had prepared, a document that an election be called on setting up the district. He said this petition met all the state requirements.

Vance said he was not sure how many signatures are required to make the petition valid, but indi-

cated around 200.

The petition and a fee of \$150 would allow the Commissioners Court to call an election where voters could decide whether they are willing to be taxed to pay for the county wide service.

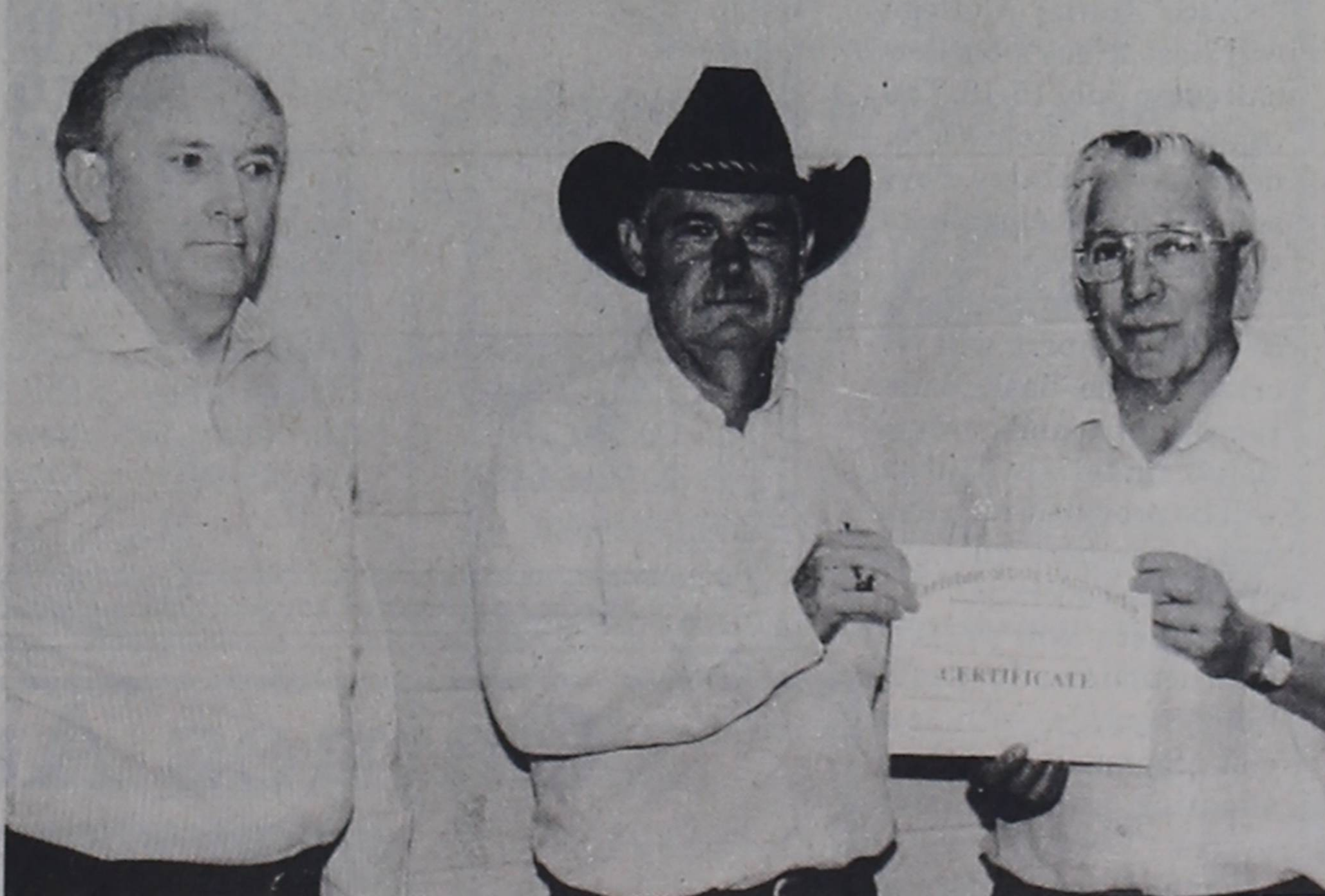
Vance said that each signer of the petition must own taxable real property, and each municipality must approve the petition.

The Commissioners handed out an open letter to the public, explaining their view of the situation.

That letter is published in full elsewhere in this newspaper.

On other matters, the Commissioners heard a letter from the Texas Jail Standards Commission stating that the county jail was found to be in compliance at the annual inspection May 27. Bob Dearing made this inspection.

Pct. 4 Commissioner Reggie Pittman reported that 22 prisoners were currently in the jail - 6 for TDC, 4 on "Blue" or state warrants, 2 being held for

Commission Approves Fee Increases

Four area two person teams made the haul to Lake Twin Buttes this past weekend for a little West Texas bassin'.

This was the 5th of seven qualifying events held in the Northwest Texas Region of Anglers Choice Team tournaments. Anglers accumulate points and pounds in an effort to finish in the top 15 places at the end of the year. Those who qualify will be competing in a \$100,000.00 classic event in October at Lake Texoma.

Taking top honors at Twin Buttes were the team of Faron McCain and Tom Oliver of Sweetwater these gentlemen brought in a 5 fish stringer weighing 20.31 pounds.

Area teams who placed included James Fullen and B. J. Johnson with 2 fish 3.83 pounds. Finishing in 5th place and second place big bass a 5.73 was Bobby Maynard.

The top finishing teams all reported worms in deep water working best with a few fish coming from shallow water about 4 feet deep. Low lake levels and severe weather has kept the fishing at Twin Buttes below normal for a number of weeks.

Congratulations to Tom and Faron for their impressive win and to all the teams who have competed in some tough events this year in Anglers Choice.

Unofficial word on the Anglers Choice Pro Draw Classic is this event is heading just south of us to Lake Brownwood. And with current flooding this

old lake should just about be ripe for the pros to pick in August.

Locally Leon's bass in the 2 to 4 pound range are biting like crazy. The rise in lake level has moved some hungry bass into the shallows. Top baits have been worms and slugs that worked near the dead willows.

June 22 and 23 a number of area two persons teams will be heading out for Twinn Buttes once again to compete in the Honey Hole Team Circuit. We wish all these anglers good fishing and safe boating. This will be the last event for anglers to qualify for the classic at Richland Chambers were anglers will be fishing for entry fees and sponsor prizes July 13 & 14.

Reports from Richland Chambers are showing the water clear 80 degrees, normal level with black bass good to 6 pounds on worms in 8-20 feet of water. Some early morning fish are biting on Strike King grass frogs.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission approved higher fees for park visitors, hunters and fishermen during a pub-

lic hearing May 23 in Austin.

Park fees will affect the most people - an estimated 21 million people visited Texas state parks last year. Park entrance fees will range from \$2-\$6 depending on the popularity and facilities at individual parks. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials will present the commission a list of particular fees for each park prior to implementation of the new fees on Sept. 1.

Campsite fees will range from \$4-\$16 depending on utilities offered and/or the site's desirability. Commissioners approved a yearly recreational vehicle fee of \$5-\$25 for small pop-up campers to self-contained motorhomes, and screened shelters will increase from \$12 to \$15-\$20 instead of the proposed \$20. Andy Sansom, TPWD executive director, also received authorization to discount or waive fees.

Resident hunting and fishing licenses will increase to \$13 each, a \$3 increase in the hunting license and \$5 increase for fishing licenses. The combination hunting and fishing license will increase from \$15 to \$25.

Motorboat registration fees will increase from \$6 to \$9 for livery boats; \$12 to \$18 for Class A boats (under 16 feet); \$18 to \$27 for Class 1 boats (16-26 feet); \$24 to \$36 for Class 2 boats (26-40 feet); and \$30 to \$45 for Class 3 boats (more than 40 feet).

"The fee increases will allow the Parks and Wildlife Department to reduce its small dependence on general revenue funds," said Andrew Sansom, TPWD executive director.

Some other changes were made from the department's original fee proposal. The annual park permit, originally scheduled to be scrapped, has been modified and reinstated for some parks. The cost will increase from \$25 to \$25-\$50. Selected parks that will qualify for an annual permit and the exact cost also will be decided later this summer. Also, the menhaden boat permit, originally scheduled to increase from \$2,000 to \$5,000, instead will cost \$3,500, and the alligator hide tag will remain at \$5 instead of increasing to the proposed \$7.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION
AUGUST 10, 1991

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

Letter To The Editor

(ED NOTE: The Eastland County Commissioners have issued the following statement, and it is carried here as a public information statement from them to the public.)

An Open Letter To The Citizens Of Eastland County: On June of 1989, Eastland County joined the City of Eastland with Eastland Memorial Hospital and the City of Cisco with E. L. Graham Hospital in an arrangement to provide ambulance service to the two towns and the outlying areas around them.

Our reason for doing this was: We had a privately owned business providing excellent service to these areas at that time but the owner was constantly threatening to leave if each City and the County did not pay him a subsidy.

In order for the county to spend tax dollars in these two locations, to be fair, an equal amount had to be allocated in the other two precincts.

Ranger used their funds toward the purchase of a new ambulance the first year.

Rising Star, Gorman and Carbon used their first year funds for fire fighting equipment, instead of ambulance service. Rising Star has an almost new ambulance and a volunteer service second to none.

Gorman is dependent on Eastland, Ranger, or DeLeon.

We also helped purchase equipment with Eastland County paying half the cost of two ambulances for Eastland and are paying part of the lease cost in Cisco.

In the two years we have been involved in this, we have spent almost three hundred thousand dollars on emergency services. This has depleted our reserves until we are having to postpone scheduled highway projects.

Our present tax rate was not set to provide for emergency medical service.

We had hoped that if we helped to get it started, it would eventually almost break even. This has not happened except in Eastland. However, Eastland Memorial Hospital is not willing to use ambulance service profit to reduce the amount the City of Eastland and Eastland County are paying.

The cities say they can't continue to fund the ambulance service without the county helping. In order to try and keep what we have, plus providing a service for the Gorman area, petitions are now being circulated to call an election to see if the citizens want to establish a county wide Emergency Services District. Every voter in the county will have an opportunity to vote.

The County is operating for approximately a thirty-three cent tax rate. If we continue to participate in these ambulance services, the tax rate will have to increase to approximately thirty-six cents (A nine percent increase). This would just relieve the county from deficit spending. The cities involved would have to increase their revenue by some means.

A six cent tax rate would be sufficient and would relieve the cities and the county of having to increase taxes substantially. If this fails, we do not know what the end result will be. Maybe one ambulance for Eastland, Ranger and Cisco. Or maybe none.

The Case of The \$500 Big Mac

Now what makes Eastland so attractive as a pit-stop for travelers from the Big Country to Dallas/Fort Worth is its array of fast-food restaurants, central location, and friendly folks. What now appears distracting though is a squad of DPS Officers stalking travelers and probably locals for inclusion into 29 categories of violations. And for those of you, and me on this recent Memorial day, who can't be plugged into any of the 29, there is an allinclusive "other" category if there bag limit for the day has not yet been met.

While this forum does not allow a show and tell, imagine if you will exiting onto the Eastland exit in search of some burgers and fries only to realize that those familiar golden arches still loom further down on the horizon. To avoid the hassle of racing back onto the Interstate, merging with the on-going traffic, and whipping off again, you opt instead to travel along the access road for the short distance to the next exit. Wrong. The road continues for over a mile or so past another bridge until, guess what, a dead end. Now with your options clear you take the last among several dirt roads onto the Interstate with the next exit leading to MacDonalds. Unfortunately, hunting season is on and you are the prey of the DPS.

As reasonable as it may seem to you, and I am sure many of you have been there before, the DPS Officer seized the opportunity for a quick kill, offering no quarter. "The dirt road you traveled on to Interstate 20 is used by county vehicles. The public is prohibited from using it", said Officer Foster. In fact, in a follow-up call, Officer Foster's supervisor, Sergeant Matthews, immediately identified the service road as having an access problem that the county could do some work on, but at the same time stated "We are aware that a lot of people cross over to the Interstate and we cite as many as we can."

Now what troubles me is that Officer Foster gave the ticket to begin with. Was business so slow or

was he just short on judgment and reasoning power. Maybe, in fact, the well known Rodney King police brutality tape really does merit some consideration, accentuating the checks needed throughout the law enforcement community to normalize officers powers and make them more accountable for "bad calls". Unlike the business world where a call to the manager or customer service representative will evoke, at a minimum, some satisfaction in the way of a review of the employees actions, Sergeant Matthews "rubber-stamped" the action of Officer Foster by stating that his men do not make unreasonable citations and, if they do, the courts will probably dismiss them.

Unfortunately, that's all fine and good if you have about \$500 in time and money to retain an attorney. Otherwise, as the DPS knows all too well, you will probably privately curse the Officer, cut a check for the amount shown on the menu of county violations, and get on with life.

Skin Cancer Symptoms

The natural aging process can disguise the symptoms of skin cancer in the elderly. A dermatologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston says what appears as a liver spot may actually be the start of skin cancer.

"As people age, they are increasingly at risk for skin cancer," said Dr. Leonard H. Goldberg, an associate professor of dermatology at Baylor. "Some people ignore a mole or a sore that has grown in size over months and even years and assume it is not serious and will go away on its own."

Skin cancer first appears as a small reddish or brown ulcer, pimple or mole commonly found on the face, neck, hands or soles. In advanced stages,

the cancer can spread through the bloodstream to the kidney, liver, bones and lymph glands, causing severe illness and even death.

Of the three forms of skin cancer — basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma and malignant melanoma — the latter ranks as the most life-threatening. All three are associated with long-term sun exposure.

Malignant melanoma may appear spontaneously or form in existing moles containing melanocytes, pigment-producing cells that give color to the skin. An estimated 25,000 cases of malignant melanoma are diagnosed each year resulting in 8,000 deaths.

Elderly people with pale

skin, freckles and blonde or red hair who have been exposed to intense sunlight for many years are particularly vulnerable to skin cancer.

"People with a history of outdoor recreational activity run the greatest risk of developing skin cancer," Goldberg said. "While participating in water sports like fishing or boating, they have exposed their skin to the sun's harsh rays. Adding the reflection from the water results in a double dose of sunlight."

Nearly all skin cancers diagnosed early can be successfully treated, Goldberg said. The five-year melanoma survival rate is 100 percent, which is attributed to early detection. For advanced melanoma, the rate falls to 50 percent. Changes or new growths should be examined by a physician who may surgically remove the cancer and perform a biopsy.

Goldberg says the elderly can do their part in decreasing their risk of developing skin cancer.

"Wear long-sleeved shirts, hats and sunscreen lotion while outdoors," he said. "Avoid the sun between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. when the sun's rays are most damaging."

He recommends undressing in front of a mirror monthly and looking for a change in the

size, shape or color of moles, blemishes or birthmarks, or a waxy-looking lump or a sore that has not healed or crusts or bleeds.

In some cases, the elderly are unable to look at their entire body because of impaired vision. Goldberg suggests that a family member perform a careful examination.

He advises the elderly to use common sense when exposing the skin to sunlight.

"Even though older people do not feel the need to get out in the sun as much as young people, there are many senior adults who still enjoy the great outdoors," Goldberg said. "Take the necessary precautions and see a physician if you are suspicious about a new or pre-existing mole or sore."

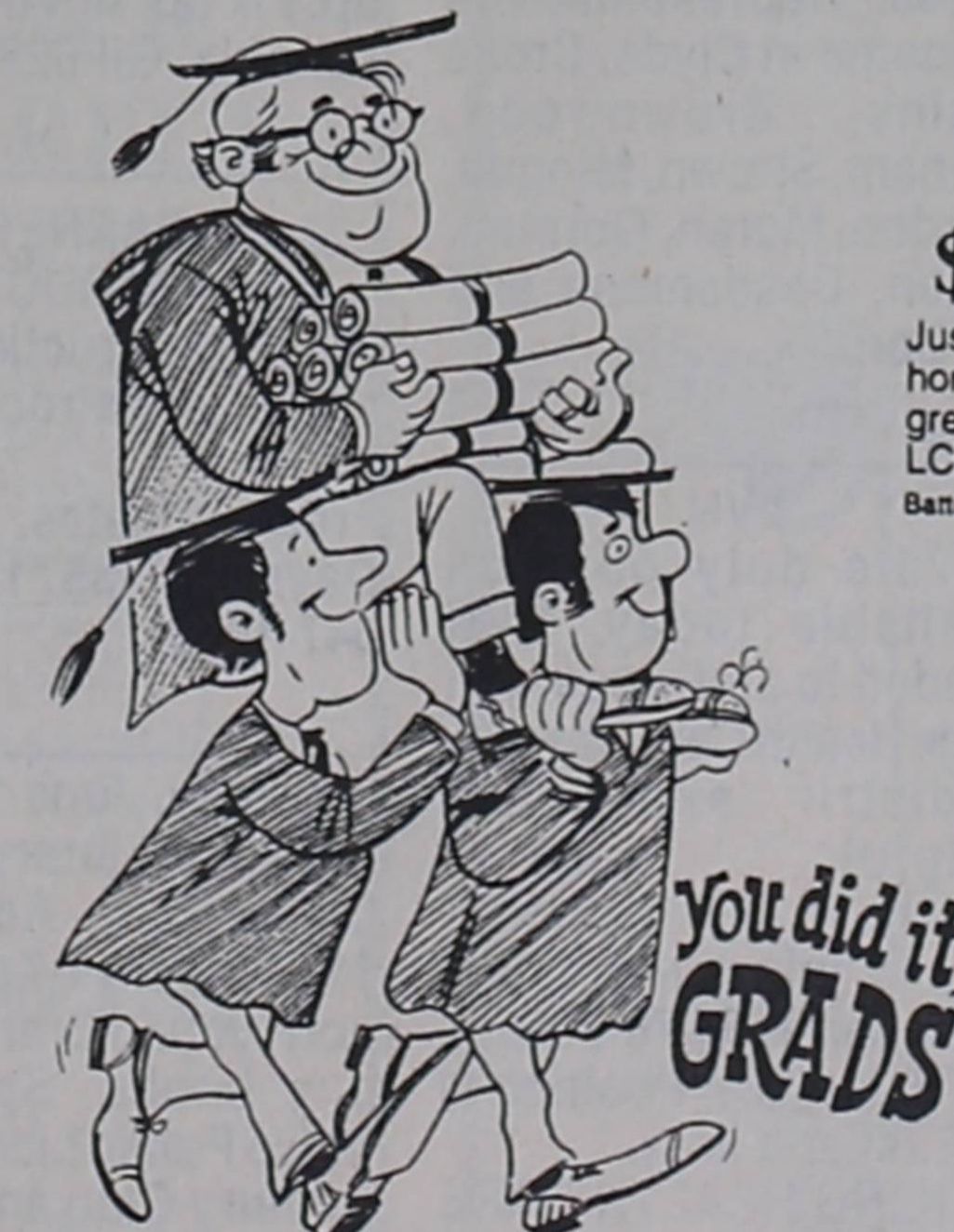

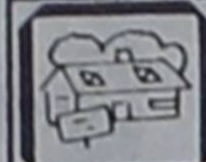

Olen and Mary Crenshaw went to Fort Worth to a state bowling tournament recently, they represented the Brown Pharmacy. Keep on the ball folks!

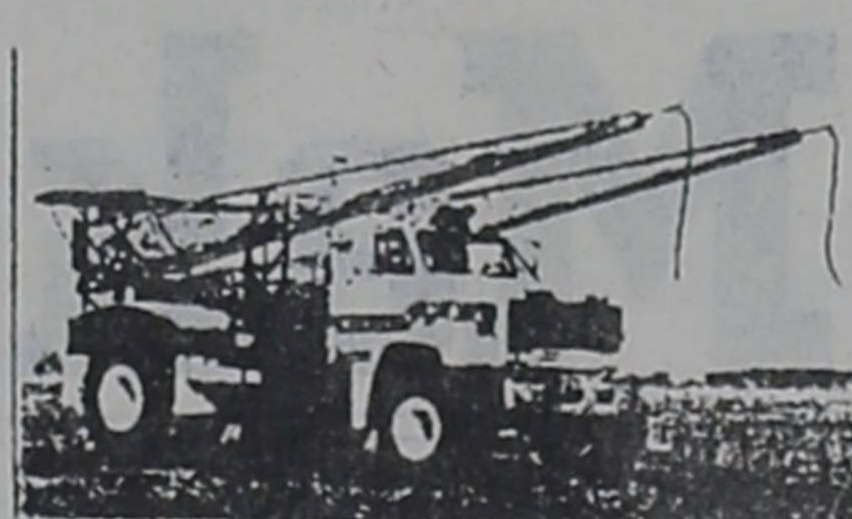
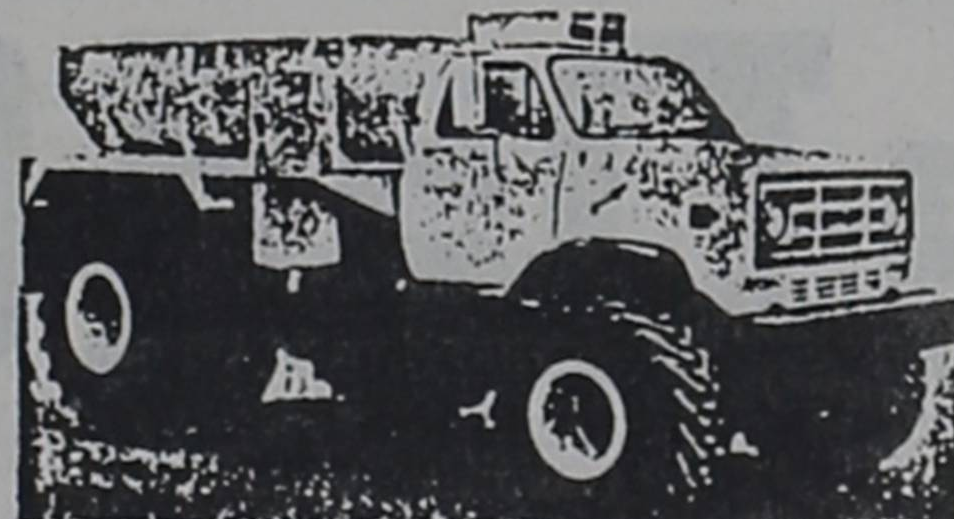
