

CRIME TASK FORCE CONTRACT APPROVED

Commander Frank Cleveland of the West Central Texas Crime Task Force stated Tuesday that a contract has been approved with Eastland County for another year's operation.

Eastland is part of the 12-county area covered by the Interlocal Task Force. It was set up in 1988 with illegal drug activities as a special target. The fiscal year for the Task Force began June 1.

County Judge Scott Bailey and District Attorney Leslie Vance signed

the Contract in Eastland County. A stipulation was placed in the contract that Eastland County may withdraw anytime it wishes, with proper notice.

Commander Cleveland says that the desire of the Task Force is "to rid the streets of drugs." He states that he appreciates the support of County Officials and citizens of Eastland County.

Much of the work of the Crime Task Force is funded by government grants.

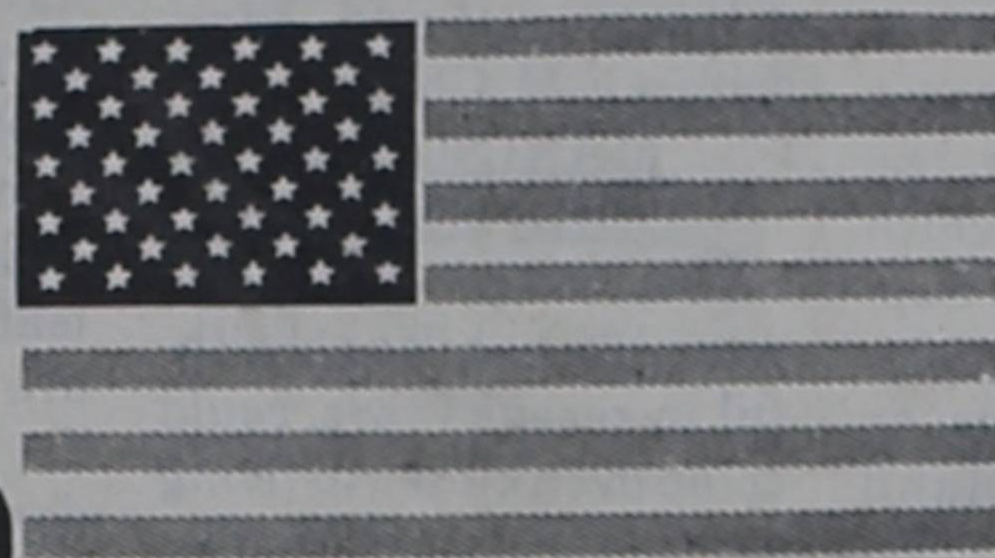

AREA TOWNS COOPERATE WITH GIRL SCOUT CAMP

Camp Director Corrie Cowley says that one of the greatest things about the Eastland County Girl Scout Day Camp was the cooperation and friendships that developed between the Scouts and Leaders from all the towns involved.

"Eighteen girls attended from Eastland, 42 from Breckenridge, 31 from Cisco, and 17 from Ranger," she reported. "There were also some pre-school children of the Leaders, and these went into a special unit."

"Over 30 Leaders came from the four towns, as well as other individuals who helped in various ways."

She mentioned Linda Kiser with ceramics, Mary Matthews with sketching, Ricky Morton, Gary Ford, and others who shared

special skills.

"The assistance of Eastland Memorial Hospital is also greatly appreciated," Corrie Cowley said. "Becky McIntire, R.N. gave instruction on Safety and First Aid to the older girls."

"Girls from the various towns all mixed together, and signed up for Units they were interested in," Ms. Cowley explained.

"More than half the Camp Leaders were from Breckenridge, so the girls had contact with adults from other locations too."

Corrie Cowley declared that she had never been director of anything where people were so willing to help.

"They brought supplies, they knew what to do - and we had a tremendous time!" she said.

Consequently they have no time or energy to enjoy their children as human beings, or to talk to them one on one. It is something like the cartoon of a family on vacation. The father has just snapped a picture of his family in front of the Grand Canyon and says, "Let's hurry maybe we can get to Mount Rushmore while the light is still good enough to get a picture." people who live like that miss some of the good things in life.

The Sabbath means seventh and should apply only to Saturday. We who have transferred our worship to the first day of the week in perpetual remembrance of the Resurrection should refer to Sunday as The Lord's Day, and not the Sabbath.

My suggestion is that we observe the Sabbath, Saturday, as a day of rest and relaxation. Do something with your family and friends. Sleep in, rest, have a good time, but most of all get to know your children. I think if we do we would have less drug problem, less teenage pregnancies, less stress. Then on the first day of the week take your family to Church and start the week right.

4-Hers may apply for special awards which include:

The **BRONZE STAR** Award - is to be awarded to a 3rd grade - 11 year old 4-Her. Nominees must be involved in 2 projects, participated in 3 activities, attended 2/3 of the regularly scheduled meetings, and have 1 year of 4-H work. Must submit a 4-H Record Book.

The **SILVER STAR** Award - is to be awarded to a 12-14 year old 4-Her. Nominees "must have 2 different projects, been

involved with either a leadership lab or served as an officer, and attend 2/3 (6) of the regularly scheduled 9 meetings". Submits a 4-H Record Book.

The **GOLD STAR** Award - is the highest county achievement award. Requirements must be met (as stated in Texas 4-H Opportunities Handbook, p. 29).

The **DANFORTH "I DARE YOU"** Award is recognition of excellence in character and well-balanced personal development as well as demonstrated leadership. No age requirement.

To be eligible for any of the above awards you must submit a 4-H Record Book.

Record Books show growth in project work, leadership, and community service that a 4-H member has accomplished.

Texas Show Steer Validation for Eastland County is scheduled for Wednesday, June 26, 1991 at two locations. Validations will be conducted from 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. at Jim Moylan's cattle barn located on Highway 3101 on the left approximately 2 miles past the County Show Barn. The second validation location will be from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m. at the Cisco Rodeo Arena. 4-H and FFA members planning to show a steer in any livestock show other than the county show, must have the steer validated with a Texas eartag to be eligible.

Steers that are validated will be eartagged, nose printed and photographed. There will be a small charge for the materials required for validation. This will be collected at validation.

4-H and FFA member and parent or guardian must be present at the validation.

4-H or FFA should contact their Vo. Ag. Teacher or County Extension if they plan to have a steer validated.

**WATCH FOR
FUNGUS ON
TOMATO PLANTS**

All the rain and hot temperatures has made everything in home gardens grow wonderfully. These same conditions have made it ideal for early blight and gray leaf spot to develop rapidly on tomato plants.

Early blight and gray leaf spot are fungi that are usually present but do not cause extensive damage to tomato plants. The high humidity and warmer temperatures have been perfect for the rapid development of these fungi resulting in severe leaf loss on the tomato plant.

The symptoms of early blight and gray leaf spot are very similar and it is difficult to tell which fungus you may have. It is very likely that you have both fungi present.

The first symptoms of early blight and gray leaf spot occur on the lower leaves. The lower tomato leaves turn yellow and have small leaf spots in the early stage of development. The leaves will then develop a burned up appearance. These dried up leaves are generally the first symptom when most people realize they have a problem. Left untreated the fungi can move up to

the tomato plant until just the top of the plant has green leaves.

There are many fungicides available to control early blight and gray leaf spot. Some fungicides that may be available locally are Manzate,

Bravo. Most fungicides will require repeat application if ideal conditions for the fungi continue.

Read label instructions for recommended days between application and harvest restrictions. Always read and follow label instructions.

season. To balance worm control benefits with treatment costs, summer herd dewormings should be timed approximately three to four and six to eight weeks following turnout for stocker calves. In cow-calf operations with spring calving schedules, summer deworming should be done when calves weigh approximately 200 to 250 pounds. Both cows and calves should be dewormed at this time.

Summer dewormings are critical. Conditions that are best for pasture grass growth are also best for worm eggs to develop into the infective larval state. The level of pasture contamination rises in most geographic regions during June and remains high until cool fall weather returns. Even during hot, dry summers, eggs can survive by staying protected under vegetation, in manure pats and in the soil itself.

Deworm the whole herd. Rough hair coat, diarrhea and more advanced signs, such as bottle jaw or sunken flanks, indicate that cows and calves may not be performing up to

their capability due to parasites. Often when animals are spotted with these signs, they are pulled out of the herd and dewormed. That's an effective treatment only helps the individuals temporarily. Symptoms exhibited by infected animals are usually only the tip of a much more extensive problem. With a high level of parasites on the pasture, even treated animals are rapidly reinfected.

"Parasites infection is really a herd problem," says Dr. Don Bliss, director of Mid America Agricultural Research, a Verona, Wis. independent agricultural research firm. "By the time overt symptoms are apparent, parasites have already caused significant losses in a herd's production efficiency."

Parasites affect animals differently, depending on the total worm load and physical state of the animal, according to Bliss. 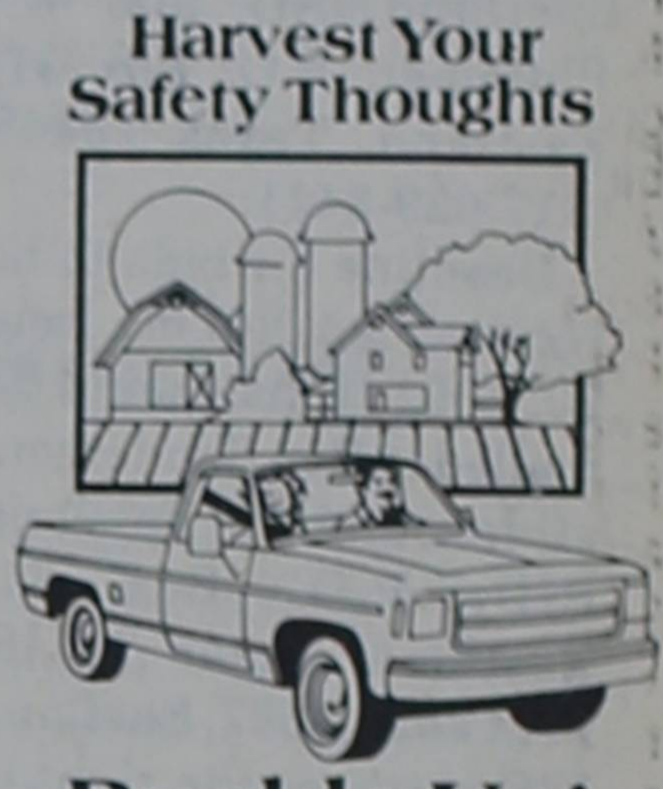

Fishing Outdoors

With the black bass fishing so great at Lake Leon, we are fudging a little on this weeks column and bringing you a prepared piece from our good friends at Berkley. See ya on the lake.

McCarty said the donation will enable the department to cover three acres of ponds at the hatchery. The department hopes to have the project underway in the next month.

"Cormorant predation traditionally is a problem on fish hatcheries," he said. "They zero in on 8- to 12-inch fish. We plan to cover ponds where we can protect this size of fish."

McCarty said the department would like to put netting on ponds at other hatcheries as well. In the past we've had problems at Jasper and Tyler. Given the opportunity, we'd do it at the other ones, too."

"I can remember being in school. The kids would be eating apples and I would ask them to please give me the cores I ate a lot of them, seed and all," he wrote in an article published by the retirement center.

As a little boy, he worked on a truck farm where vegetables were raised and was given dinner and paid 50 cents a day. He slept in barns on hay along with several other kids.

He managed to finish the eighth grade at W.K. Sullivan School and later attended Hyde Park High School for two years, both in Chicago. While attending high school, he was a caddy at a local country club and never told the men that he was an orphan.

He and a friend joined a circus called, "Gentry Horse and Dog Show," helping put up tents. They traveled with the circus for four years.

Then he and a friend headed to Ranger, Texas, because of the oil boom.

They got a job digging ditches for the laying of pipe to pump oil through for the Gulf Pipeline Company. He got laid off and returned to Chicago.

On Oct. 1, 1921, a foreman for the Gulf Pipeline Company contacted Happy and wanted him to come back to Ranger to work. He did and worked for the company a total of 41 1/2 years, retiring as chief engineer in December of 1962.

E. P. Mayfield of Abilene, a former Gulf co-worker, and his wife and son adopted Happy as their grandfather after finding out that he was ill in the hospital.

He lived with them until Mayfield passed away. Then he moved into Sears Retirement Center. The center proclaimed Dec. 8, 1986, as "Happy Harrison Day now and forever more" and presented a sign that marked an area outside the dining room as "Happy's Patch."

It was named in reference to his daily feeding of bread crumbs to the birds outside the dining room through the years.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Opal Snyder Harrison.

Survivors are his friends that made him their adopted grandfather Modena Mayfield and Mr. and Mrs. Mike Mayfield, all of Lubbock.

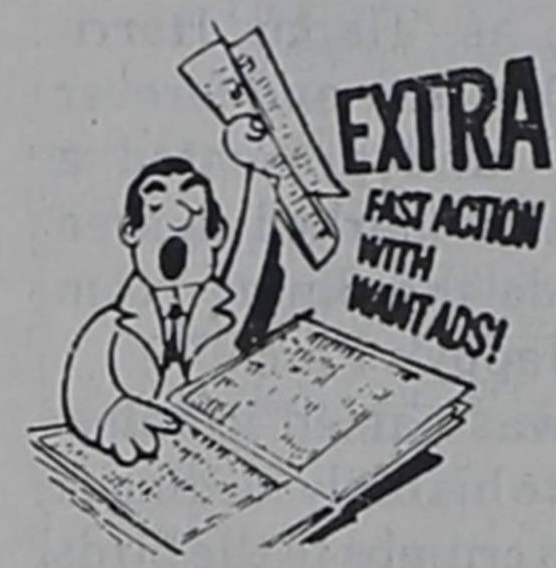

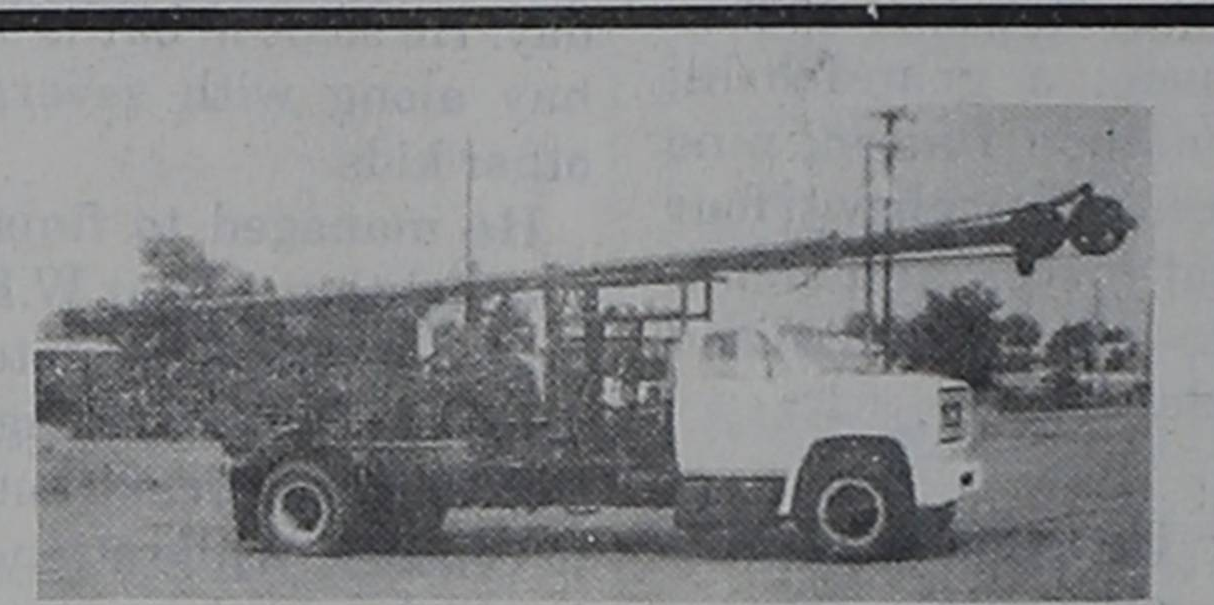

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Open Records Making Slander Safe?

Suppose you are in the cafe business and the local health department gets an anonymous letter accusing you of using horsemeat in hamburgers?

Or suppose an unsigned letter to the animal control office says you keep vicious dogs and let them loose on a children's playground?

Or, let's say, a mysterious note in your credit file at the county hospital says you were arrested for shoplifting? Or prostitu-

tion? Or suspicion of murder?

And suppose none of it is true. Suppose the health department, the animal control office, and the hospital thoroughly investigate the charges and conclude that they are absolutely false - malicious lies with no basis whatever.

Since the messages are all from unidentifiable persons, there is no one you can sue for libel or slander to clear your name and that of your business - but there is nothing to worry about, is there,

because the health department, the animal control people, and the hospital know the truth? So you're not going to suffer any damage from it, are you?

Unless someone asks for the file under the Texas Open Records Act!

The Texas Open Records Act says all information collected, assembled, or maintained by or for governmental bodies in Texas is public information and available to the public unless certain limited exceptions apply. The false information about you is "information collected, assembled, or maintained." Does that put your interests at risk?

More than you know! Courts have the last word on the meaning of Texas statutes, but the Attorney General of Texas

has the first word about the Texas Open Record Act. Governmental bodies receiving questionable requests for information may ask the Attorney General about it. He, according to the law, "shall forthwith render a decision consistent with standards of due process." As a practical matter, he refers all such requests to his "Opinion Committee," which drafts the answer to be given.

The granddaddy court case about the Open Records Act was handed down in 1976. It said that information in governmental files made available to the public under the Open Records Act is sufficiently "publicized" to invoke the protection accorded such matters by tort law. What that means is that information about you released

under the Open Records Act is the kind of public information anybody can loudly and often repeat and for which no successful privacy suit can be brought!

Until recently, personal information that a governmental unit's investigation showed to be false was considered protected from disclosure by the catch-all exception for "information deemed confidential by law." That was before the Opinion Committee convinced the Attorney General to issue Open Records Decision No. 579 (1990).

As explained in this column a couple of weeks ago, Open Records Decision No. 579 ordered the release of a file about sexual harassment claims. Not only did the Opinion Committee refuse to consider the "facts" disclosed in the complaint and interviews of some 58 employees to be "private facts," it said that even if the "facts" were known to be false, they had to be released as "public information." The 579 decision effectively overruled all previous Open Records Decisions that applied the law of "false light" privacy to keep material from required public disclosure.

Since 1973, Texas courts have recognized an "invasion of privacy" tort (i.e., civil wrong). It is actually a recognition of

several privacy interests deserving of protection. Among them is the interest in being free of publicity which places you in a false light in the public eye. The Opinion Committee offered several excuses in Open Records Decision No. 579 for refusing any longer to consider "false light" information to be judicially deemed confidential by law, but the real reason is confessed in the part of the decision that says: "Our conclusion that the legislature did not intend this office to make [deemed confidential by law] determinations based on false light privacy doctrine is fueled by the difficulties this office has encountered in applying the concept."

In other words, the Committee - by making indisputably false information about them "public information" - is willing to allow people and businesses to be mercilessly slandered without remedy because protecting their rights would require the committee to work hard.

The Open Records Act was not intended to make slander safe! If you discover that false information about you is about to be ordered released by the Opinion Committee, your attorney should show the Committee the error of its ways, failing that, bring a court action to put a stop to it.
