AN UPDATE FROM ESTONIA

Small countries of the world often find their pleas for freedom lost in the political maneuvering between larger powers.

One of these countries is Estonia, which came alive for some Eastland residents last summer. This was mainly because in August 1990 Estonian citizens Urve Margus and her son, Roland visited here in the home of Mrs. Charles (Rosalie) Loreto.

Friends and family of Mrs. Loreto helped entertain these charming guests, who were thrilled with this glimpse of America and the way of life here.

While visiting last year Roland Margus celebrated his 16th birthday, and the Perkins family and other friends helped him enjoy the occasion.

A highlight of Roland's stay in Eastland was getting to play tennis with John Mark Vermillion. He felt he learned a lot from this skilled and friendly honor student.

The stay last summer gave Urve Margus some relaxation from her mission in America as a Program Leader (Administrator) of a training school teaching free enterprise to Estonian young people.

She explained that 50 years under communism had made it necessary to re-train people in freedom and its business principles. Her main destination was California, where Americans assisting the business school worked on job placement for Estonian young people.

For many years Urve Margus had hoped to visit the Loretos in America. Her only regret last August was that Judge Char-

les Loreto had died about a month before.

She first met the Loretos in 1971. She was a college student waiting tables in a hotel in Czechoslovakia, and they were tourists glimpsing life under Russian control. Urve's long blonde hair and serene expression caused them to refer to her as 'Our little Angel.' When they left they continued to exchange letters, hoping to meet again someday.

After the visit in the Loreto home last August, Urve and Roland went to the West Coast and back to Estonia.

The last letter Mrs. Loreto has received from Urve came in March, and it gave an update on her work and several other matters. She also sent copies of photographs made during the stay here in Eastland.

Portions of the letter are as follows:

My Dear Mrs. Rosalie Loreto:

Thank you very much that you have not forgotten me and Roland. You are always in my mind, and we are very thankful that we had a nice opportunity to visit you and all last summer. It was such a lovely trip.

We returned from Texas back to California and then to New Jersey (we lived in Princeton) and finished our trip in New York.

We had a lot of good removes (parts of the trip) but Texas and meeting you was the special experience. We like and remember all your friends who are so lovely, and send a warm greeting to

BANK PRESIDENT GROVER HALLMARK: "YOU'VE GOT TO LIKE WHAT YOU'RE DOING"

Recently Eastland National Bank President Grover Hallmark took time from a busy morning to reflect on his career, the Eastland Bank, and general changes in banking.

He remarked on the stacks of paperwork waiting at the big desk in front of him.

"It used to be that a handshake was as good as signing a note," he said. "There's too much legal work now."

"But I will have to say that one reason this Bank has been successful is that we have kept up with the times, especially in the use of computers."

"What would you say are some of the main qualities a Bank President needs these days?" Grover Hallmark was asked.

He glanced from his office across the spacious building, past employees and their desks, to the teller's windows and the flow of Eastland County citizens.

"You've got to enjoy what you're doing," he answered. "I guess it's the same way in any line of business."

Then he listed other very important ingredients of a successful Bank President: 1. Compassion for people, 2. Good common sense, 3. The ability to manage a business in accordance with sound business principles, and 4. The ability to learn new things and adapt to change.

Those who knew Grover Hallmark would say that "learning" has been part of his life as far back as they can remember.

For there is more than one way to become a Bank President - and he took a long, detailed route.

Hallmark learned about various departments by working in them. He added to practical training by graduating from the Southwestern Graduate School of Banking, Southern Methodist University, Dallas.

He has also attended many seminars and workshops, one two weeks ago in El Paso.

Hallmark began his work at Eastland National Bank Nov. 1, 1956, "filing checks and sweeping floors."

"I'd like to give my credit in banking to Tom Wilson," he said. "He was aspects of the bank, including the spacious building, which was first occupied in Oct. 1980. Previously the bank had been located at 114 S. Seaman, a site occupied since 1918."

The customer service, computerized systems, motor bank facilities and innovative programs are

part of banking at First National.

In Dec. 1990 Eastland National Bank received a Five Star Rating from Bauer Financial Reports Inc., a nationally known research firm. A Five Star is the highest rating this firm gives, and signifies that the institution is one of the safest, most credit-worthy in the United States. The bank has received this rating in six of the last seven quarters.

"The economy here is on the upsurge," Hallmark says. "It is not a very rapid comeback, but a slow growth."

"We don't need a boom growth again. That led to the conditions after the oil prices dropped, with an effect on all service-related industries."

"We thought of ourselves as being rural, ranching, until oil was found. We hadn't really realized it was a solid rock under the economy - until the rock broke!"

Hallmark says the agricultural economy is basically strong now, and this has a good effect on banking. Good local industries have also contributed to financial stability.

The main thing he is worried about is political decisions and regulations, he says.

"Would you believe that 360 bills that affect banking are trying to be presented to the Texas State Legislature? About 350 of these are reported to be detrimental to banking. the Eastland National Bank President at that time, and also my loan officer." He chuckled. "I was farming south of Carbon - married for only three years to my wife, Ruth (Beaty) - trying to support a family during a seven-year drought."

"Yes, my father had been a successful farmer, and I thought I could be just as successful as he was. So after graduating from Carbon High School in 1950 I began farming peanuts and raising hogs."

Hallmark achieved the National Farmer Degree in 1953, and this was awarded to him in Kansas City. But by 1956 he was working two days a week in Eastland to buy groceries, and trying to farm at the same time.

Once in his banking job, Hallmark found that he "enjoyed the work, and choose to stay with it."

He was appointed an assistant cashier Sept. 1, 1959, and promoted to cashier in 1963. He was elevated to Vice President and Loan Officer the next year, and named Senior Vice President in 1972. He was elected to the Board of Directors in Jan., 1973, and made Executive Vice President in

September of that year. Grover Hallmark became President of Eastland National Bank on April 8, 1976.

Hallmark points out that Tom Wilson has reminded as the Chairman of the Board of Directors, and his service have been very important.

"Our Board of Directors, Officers and employees have carried this bank through the difficult times of the 1980's," he says. "They are all honest, caring people, and actively involved in the community."

He is also proud of other "The banking environment is changing faster month by month than it did the previous 20 years!"

Hallmark was asked how a young person could get into banking.

"Well I wouldn't advise him to try my route, simply because I don't think it could be done anymore," Hallmark replied.

"In these days, I don't think a young person would even get a chance to work in a bank until he had been to college. He'd never get to know whether he liked the work or not."

"So I do advise young people to get all the education they can," Hallmark said. "That's part of the times we live in."

SHARP STATE AUDIT TURNS UP \$5.2 BILLION

State Comptroller John Sharp revealed a plan Wednesday to save and raise \$5.2 billion, covering the projected \$5 billion deficit in the 1982-83 State budget. The total budget requests were expected to reach around \$48 billion.

Sharp's report, called "Breaking the Mold," was the result of around 54,000 hours of work by 100 auditors. Volume 1 of the report is sub-titled "The Texas Performance Review," and goes into many ideas on how to make State Government more streamlined and efficient.

Sweeping changes are advocated for schools, the management of State Offices, and a number of State services. These proposals, if approved by the legislature, could affect every county in the state. The legislature will convene in a Special Session July 8.

After unveiling his "Breaking the Mold" plan, John Sharp met with Governor Ann Richards, House Speaker Gib Lewis and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock Wednesday night and Thursday, reportedly to discuss the upcoming Legislative Session.

FOUR MORE SENTENCED IN AREA DRUG ACTIVITIES

Four more area individuals arrested on drug-related charges were sentenced Wednesday in Federal Court. All had pleaded guilty to participating in an Eastland County-based drug ring.

Sentenced was Bobby Will Seider, 39 of Brownwood, who received 33 months in Federal prison and five years of supervised release. He pleaded guilty to one count of manufacturing less than 100 grams of methamphetamine.

Also sentenced was William Steven Terry, 37, of the Necessity Community, (Stephens County), who was given a 21 month prison sentence and three years of supervised release. He pleaded guilty to two counts - maintaining a place to manufacture a controlled substance, and manufacturing a controlled substance. The charge of manufacturing a controlled substance was dismissed as

This would consolidate the Water Commission, Air Control Board, Water Well Drillers Board and Structural Pest Controllers Board.

Place a cap on school district administrative costs.

Consolidate state funds. Treat Permanent School Funds capital gains as investment funds.

Instill better debt management.

Privatize certain state services, such as certain prison experiments, vehicle and highway maintenance, ect.

Implement state employee incentives for innovation and efficiency.

Utilize new technologies to administer food stamp benefits.

Obtain more federal funds for Medicaid and child support.

Eliminate tax filing exemptions and raise certain user fees.

Among the fees would be increasing the term of a driver's license from the current four years to five, and raise the fee from \$16 to \$25.

Sharp's proposals are expected to eliminate 1,043 state jobs and a number of offices and agencies. Discussion on all these proposals is certain to be intense.

But Sharp says: "What we have proposed in 'Breaking the Mold' is very much like a string of Christmas tree lights. Every bulb is important. If you pull one of them out, the whole string goes dark."

"For those of you who oppose one or two items but like the rest of our report - remember you can't have it both ways. We can either streamline state government as proposed... or we can pass a tax bill to pay for the old way of doing things."

Reorganize the Texas Education Agency.

Merge 25 health and human service agencies into one.

Create a Natural Resources Commission.

EASTLAND COUNTY 4-H JUNIOR LEADERS HOST FRIENDS FROM WEST TEXAS

Many people in Eastland County may remember our trip to West Texas the previous summer. In June of 1990, several Eastland County 4-H Junior Leaders had the chance to spend four days near a community called Van Horn, located in Culberson County. Parents of Eastland Junior Leaders also brought food for the occasion. After the Italian meal, Tommy Seay entertained us with his 'cowboy poetry'. Also, Adeline and Georgia from Breckenridge shared various 'tall' tales with our group. We stayed four days at Camp Inspiration, and Tuesday night was spent in the swimming pool.

On Wednesday our two groups were up by six o'clock and at McDonald's for breakfast around seven-thirty. After we ate, we were off to Six Flags in Arlington. This was a special treat because practically no one from Culberson had ever been there before, and by ten Wednesday we were walking through the large gates leading into the park. Janet Thomas and David Tunmire, our County Agents, instructed us to meet back by the carousel at two that afternoon for lunch. At that last note, we were into groups and off to ride the rides. Because it was a weekday, there were very few people in the park. The longest lines were at the Log Ride, the Flashback, and Roaring Rapids. After several rides, we were all flocking to the water rides to get drenched. Time sped, and after our check-in at two o'clock we were once free again in the park. Wednesday was an unfor-

gettable day for us all at Six Flags, and our ten hours there felt only like minutes. It was definitely worth the minor sunburns and many blisters on our feet. At eight that night, we drug ourselves out to the parking lot and into the four vehicles. From there we went to Cheddar's, an excellent restaurant just outside the park, for our long-awaited evening meal. Afterwards, we again piled into the cars. It was an exciting night - especially when we got lost and made four circles around some hotel in it parking lot. Several hours later we drove through Eastland - probably around twelve. Even the beds at Camp Inspiration seemed comfortable after being tossed around on rides all day and then being packed into vehicles for the drive home.

Six o'clock came extremely early Thursday morning; however, we were all up and dressed...well, everyone except for three anonymous guys from Eastland County. Soon, though, we were again eating breakfast at McDonald's. That morning's agenda: Fossil Rim, an enormous wildlife park located in Glen Rose. The animals there were fascinating, and the trip was worthwhile when R. W. Daskevich got attacked by an overly-friendly ostrich. Tanner, a toddler from Culberson whose mother is Crystal Wilbanks, spent most of the time hanging out of the suburban's window enjoying the animals. Ushers were Dean Strickland, brother of the groom, and Scott Brinkley, both of Eastland.

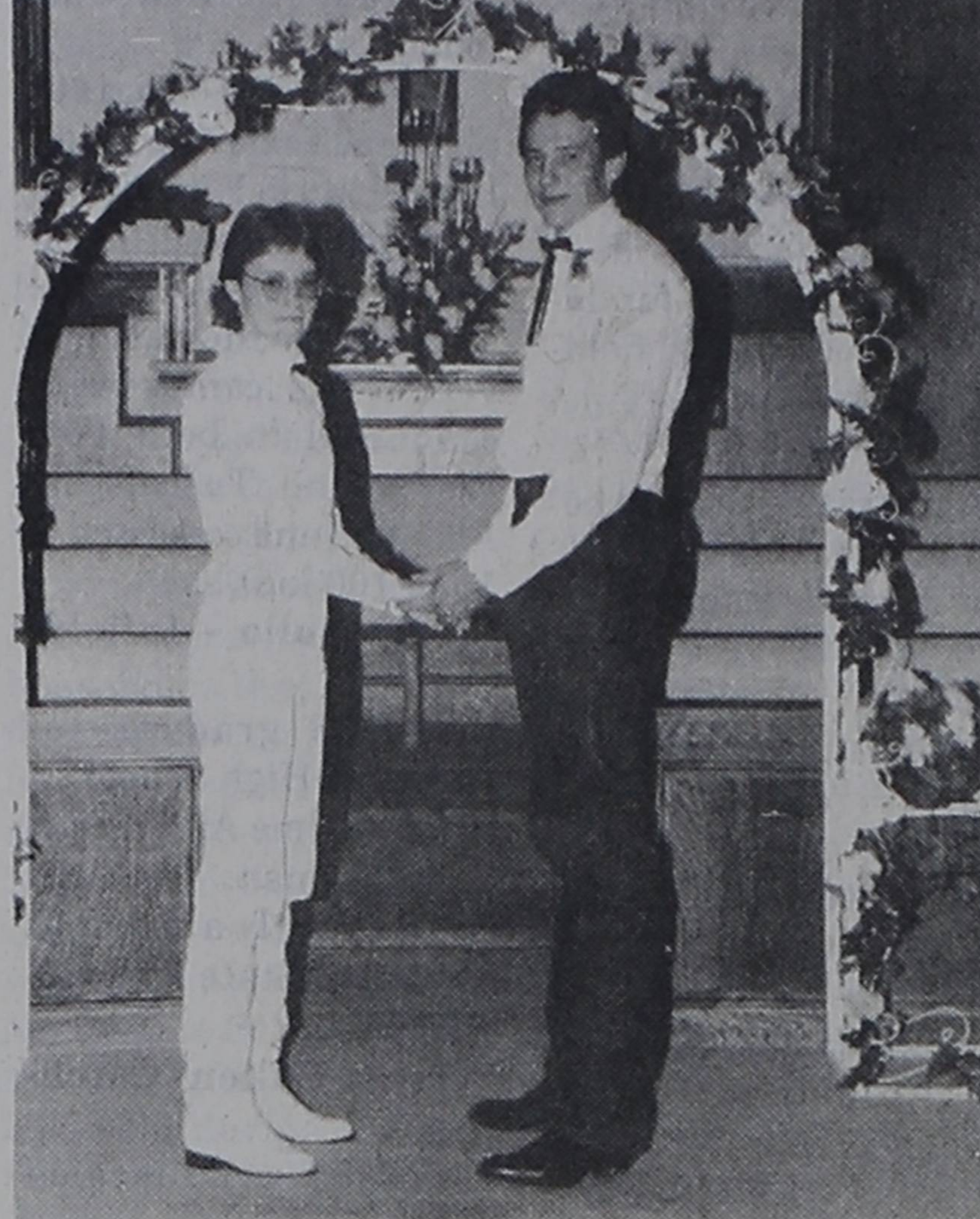

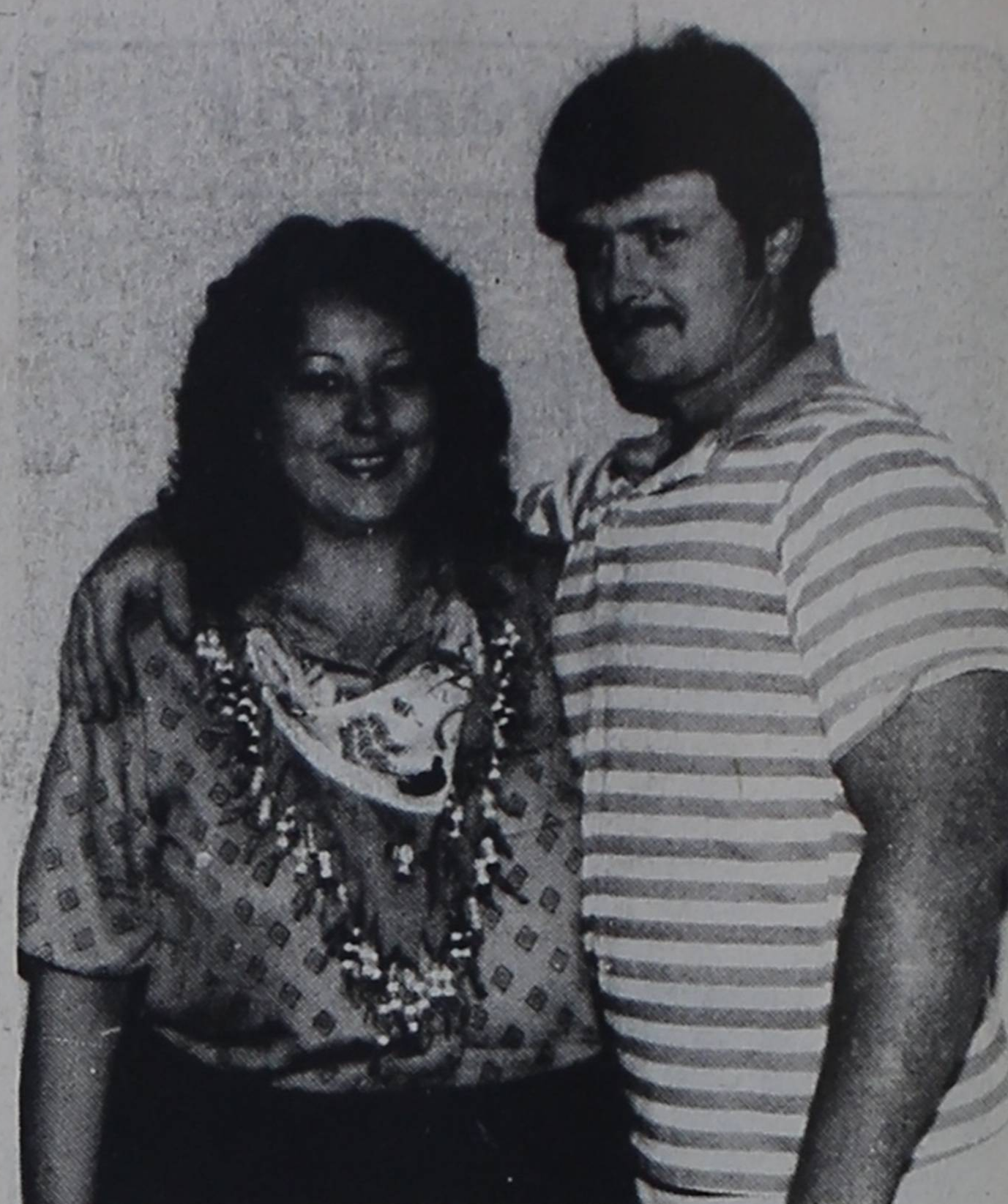

HOT WEATHER NOW STRESSING TREES

Trees throughout Eastland County are beginning to show signs of stress. This is the result of the dry late winter and early spring, then extreme wet conditions of late May and early June combined with the extremely hot conditions now. This combination of conditions is resulting in trees developing moisture and heat stress. Leaf scorching is the first sign of this stress people will notice.

The most typical signs of these types of stress in trees is the browning and

drying up of the leaf edges. As the condition worsens, the drying area on the leaf will increase until almost the whole leaf is dead. I have seen these symptoms on red oak and pecan trees. Many trees like the cottonwood, will have leaves turning yellow and drop off like it does in the fall.

Moisture stress and heat stress can be reduced by periodically watering to a depth of 6 to 8 inches. This can be accomplished by slow application of water along the drip line of the tree.

A soaker hose or drip irrigation system are the

most effective methods of applying water around a tree. Using a hose turned on at a very low pressure will also work, but will require more time to water all the way around the tree.

The key to reducing moisture stress and heat stress is applying the water slow enough for penetration into the root zone.

Generally a good watering once every two weeks should be enough water if there is no rain. As a rule of thumb, continue your watering program if you don't receive at least one inch of rain. Remember a hard, fast one inch rain may not all be absorbed into the soil.

Do not over water. This is expensive and can compound the tree's stress.

Each species of trees is different so keep that in mind. Some species of trees are more drought tolerant than the cottonwood or fruitless mulberry.

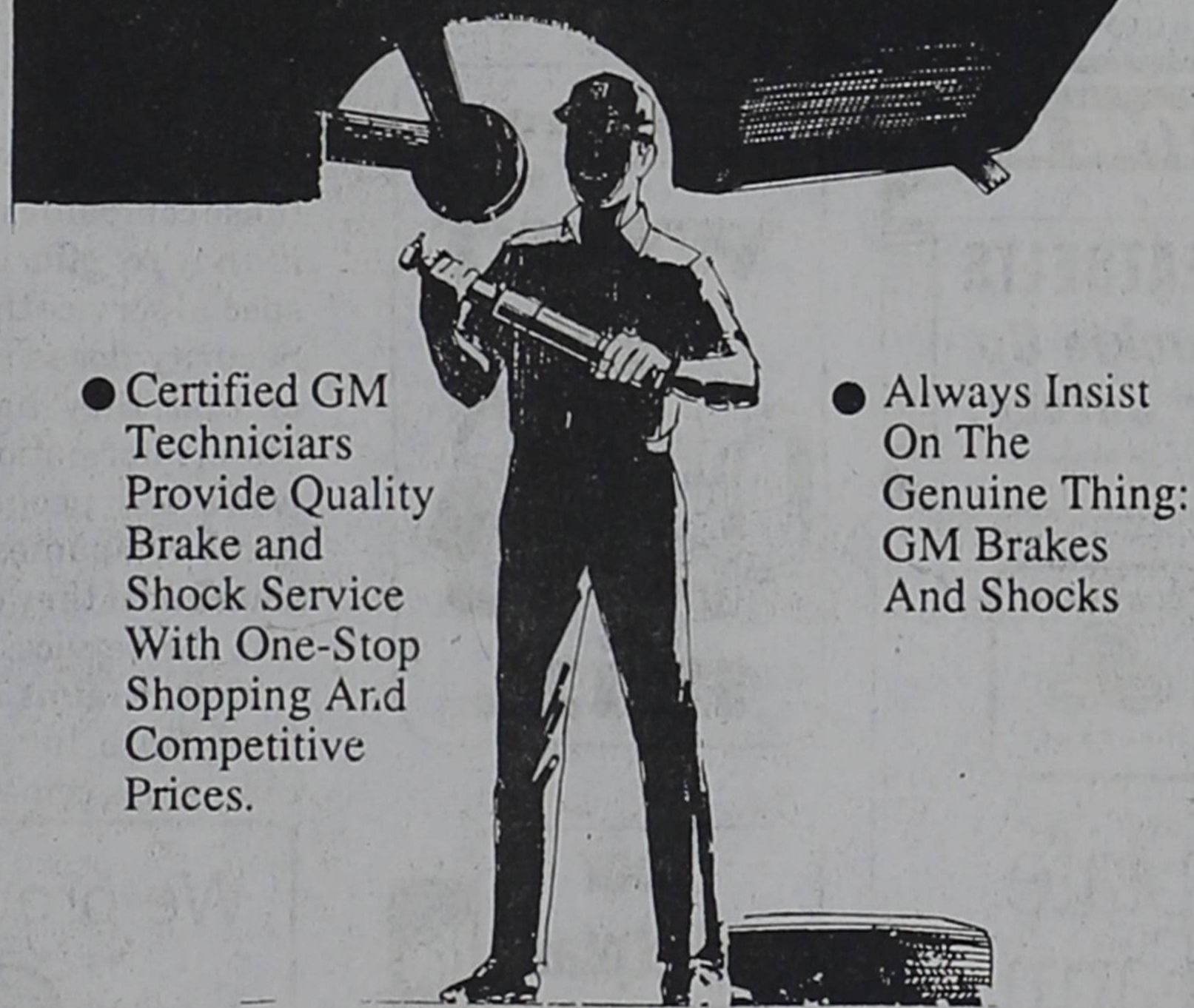

Points To Ponder

The other evening I was watching a classic western movie on the American movie channel. The movie was the "Ox Bow Incident" It involved a mob who hanged three men for a murder that they thought the three men had committed. Several people went with the mob hoping to prevent what happened. One of these was a black lay preacher. After the hanging of the men the black man knelt in the dirt prayed and sang a spiritual hymn.

For some reason the next day I was humming or singing spirituals under my breath. Spirituals like "Swing low sweet chariot, comin' for to carry me home." Spirituals were born in the period of slavery and was an expression that there would be better time after the misery of the slaves earthly life was over.

The theme in the spirituals were theologically correct because Jesus did say in His Sermon on the Mount that those who suffered insult and persecution for His sake are "blest." The concept of a reward in heaven was a new element introduced by Jesus. For Him there was nothing more certain. He said, "In my Father's house there are many mansions," or in some translations, "many rooms." (John 14:2) It seems to reflect a "pie in the sky when you die" concept of Christianity.

Was this what Jesus meant when He spoke of "a rich reward in heaven?" Was He offering inducement to good behavior, generous acts, works of charity, accept everything that happens with a stiff upper lip by holding out the promise of compensations in the after life? Conversely was He

threatening punishment beyond death for failure to live a good life?

When He spoke of the "rich reward in heaven" it was not in the sense of material reward. But there is, and there must be a reward for a life of good works, otherwise Christianity wouldn't make any sense. The reward is, however not to be measured in commercial terms but in terms of inner satisfaction, peace of mind and a clear conscience. This kind of reward is more real and enduring than any financial gain. There is nothing wrong in looking for that kind of reward. If this is God's world, and I believe it is. Any action which is in harmony with God's will is therefore bound to be rewarded.

I would suggest that we here in Ranger start doing things not for what we can get out of it materially, but because it is the right thing to do. I would also suggest that you take your family to church this Sunday and you will find the rich reward of worship.

DANGEROUS WORKS

HOUSTON—(JUNE 18, 1991)—Fireworks injure nearly 10,000 people every year. A physician at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston says statistics show that many of these injuries are preventable.

"Most injuries from fireworks occur in teenage and pre-teen boys," said Dr. M. Bowes Hamill, assistant professor of ophthalmology at Baylor. "The injuries we most often see, to the hands and eyes, can be prevented by proper, adult supervision."

Children frequently throw firecrackers at each other, causing injury as severe as blindness or deafness when they explode in midair near the head. Injuries to the hand and face occur when fireworks with short fuses go off while they are still being held.

"I recommend that parents take their children to organized fireworks shows, but if they do purchase fireworks, it is important to know how to use them safely and properly," Hamill said.

— Never allow fireworks to be used without adult supervision.

— Never use fireworks in prohibited areas.

— Always place firecrackers on the ground before lighting them.

— Never throw firecrackers.

— Rocket-like fireworks should be launched from the ground, not the hand, and pointed away from people.

— Select an open field away from buildings to launch fireworks.

— Carefully read the instructions and warnings on fireworks.

Hamill says anyone planning to use fireworks should know first aid

measures should injuries occur.

Minor burns, the most common injury, should be treated by running cold water over the site immediately. Apply a cold water compress until the pain subsides and cover with gauze or similar material.

If the eye is injured, inspect the area for any foreign object on the eyeball or the eyelids. If it is embedded in the eye, if there is bleeding, if sight is diminished or the pupil is not round, attempt no treatment and take the patient to an emergency room immediately. Otherwise, gently rinse the area with clean water until the object is removed.

In the case of an explosion near the ear, perforation of the eardrum is possible. Cover the ear with a clean, dry pad to prevent infection and have a physician examine the area.

A first aid kit is recommended for any outing involving Fourth of July fireworks.

SAVE MONEY-- CONTACT SOCIAL SECURITY

Curious about how much your Social Security benefit will be when you retire? Need a Social Security number for your child? Changing your name because of marriage or divorce?

All you have to do is contact Social Security. There is no need to pay for these services. Many times people will get advertisements from companies that offer to assist people in their dealings with Social Security—for a fee. But there's absolutely no reason to pay a middle man for services that Social Security offers for free.

Advertisements for these companies sound as if they're offering some special service that Social Security doesn't provide, or that they have some secret information that we won't tell people about. Some companies make it sound as if they can expedite the service.

These claims are absolutely false. In reality, the companies come to Social

Security to get the information. They just act as a go-between, which adds an extra step to the process, thus slowing it down.

So why do people pay for services they can get for free? There are a number of reasons. Some people just don't realize that Social Security offers the service. Others are leery of dealing with the bureaucracy so they are willing to pay for the "assistance" that they really don't need. And sometimes, people get official looking mailings and think they're from Social Security.

How can avoid paying for a service Social Security offers for free? If you need help with a Social Security question or problem, contact Social Security directly. And you get an official-looking letter offering a Social Security service and requesting a payment, it's probably from a private company. Contact Social Security for help before you respond.
