JEANNIE SADOWSKI TO ANNOUNCE AS CANDIDATE FOR 17TH SEAT

Beverly Jean Sadowski is expected to announce Saturday, July 13th, as a candidate for the U.S. Congress, 17th District, the post now held by Charles Stenholm.

Jeannie Sadowski, a native of Breckenridge, is a professional hearing specialist, an ordained minister, author, public speaker and lecturer and is presently director of Texas Home Missions for the Apostolic Church of Jesus Christ in Texas.

She and her husband, Dr. D. P. Sadowski operate hearing offices in Eastland and Breckenridge and work in several area hospitals.

Mrs. Sadowski reportedly has been visiting and talking throughout the 17th District for the past three months, "testing the climate," before making her decision to seek the office.

In announcing her candidacy, she is expected to make the following statement:

OBJECTIVE

"I have grown increasingly concerned over some political issues until I felt like I HAD to step out and do something. So here I am! I am not a polished politician - I am not a lawyer - Cannot give you a long resume of political offices I have held. But what I CAN give you is a genuine concern for America, the way she is heading, and an honest heart.

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Points To Ponder

I don't want to appear to be un-patriotic this Fourth of July but I find some of the celebrations are in themselves rather un-patriotic. I don't feel that the service personnel that served in "Desert Storm" should have to be continually placed on public display by having to march in parade after parade. It seems as if we as Americans will be more patriotic by some of the honor of the men and women of the military will rub off on us.

Patriotism is something that comes from the heart. It is not flaunting a nation's military might. Patriotism is a willingness to make what sacrifices necessary to make one's country great.

It is sad that today we were handed little American flags, printed on them were "made in China." I read of one patriotic celebration that is going to be sponsored by Japan.

Patriotism is more than parades and yellow ribbons all designed to make us feel good. Patriotism is a sense of pride in one's country, in a job well done, in serving in the armed forces as it is required. Down through the years millions of people who call themselves Americans have done that. 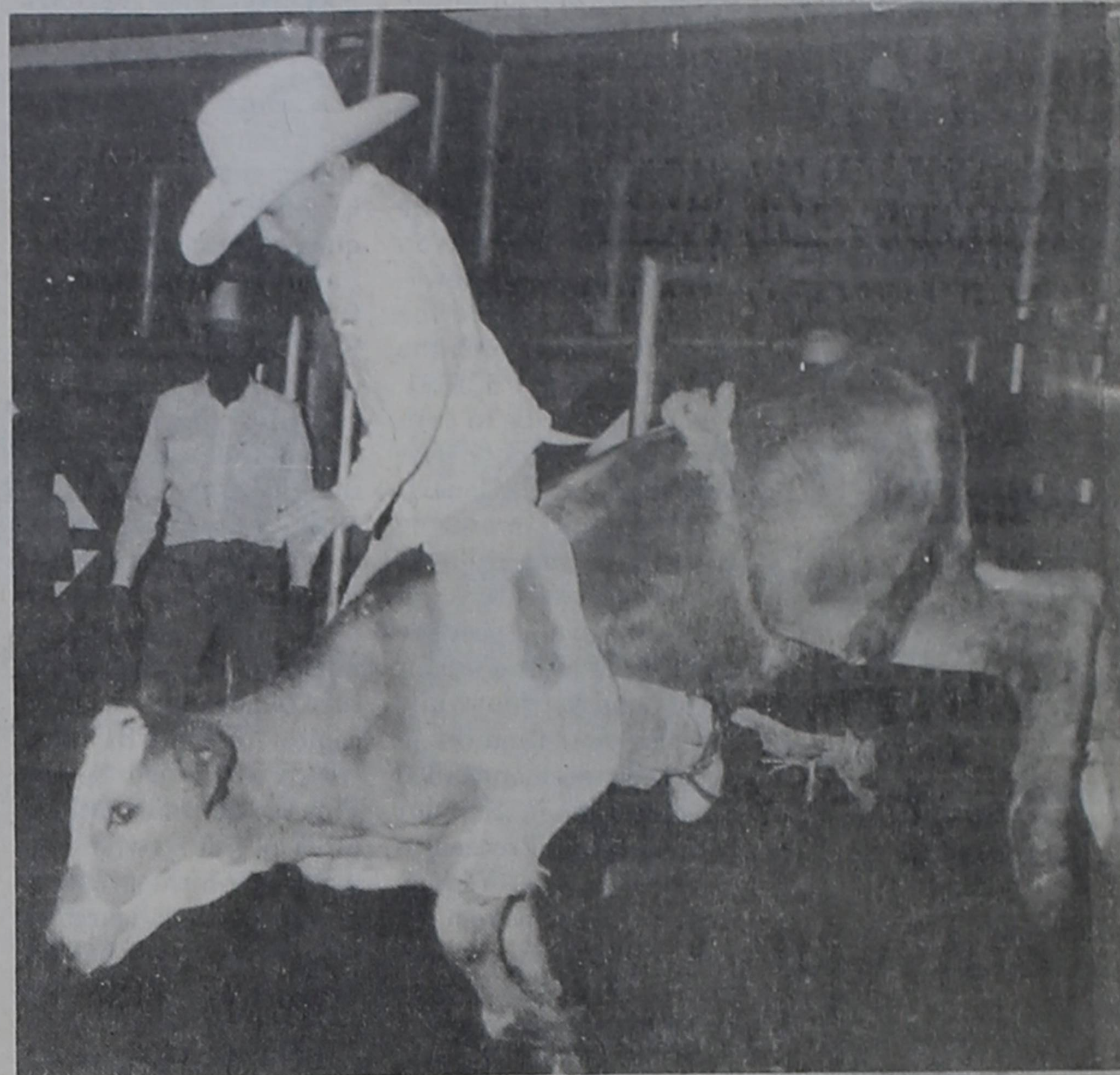
A book sale will be held this summer as a fund raiser for the library. All proceeds will be used for library renovation and the purchase of new materials. A clean-up day will also be held in the near future.

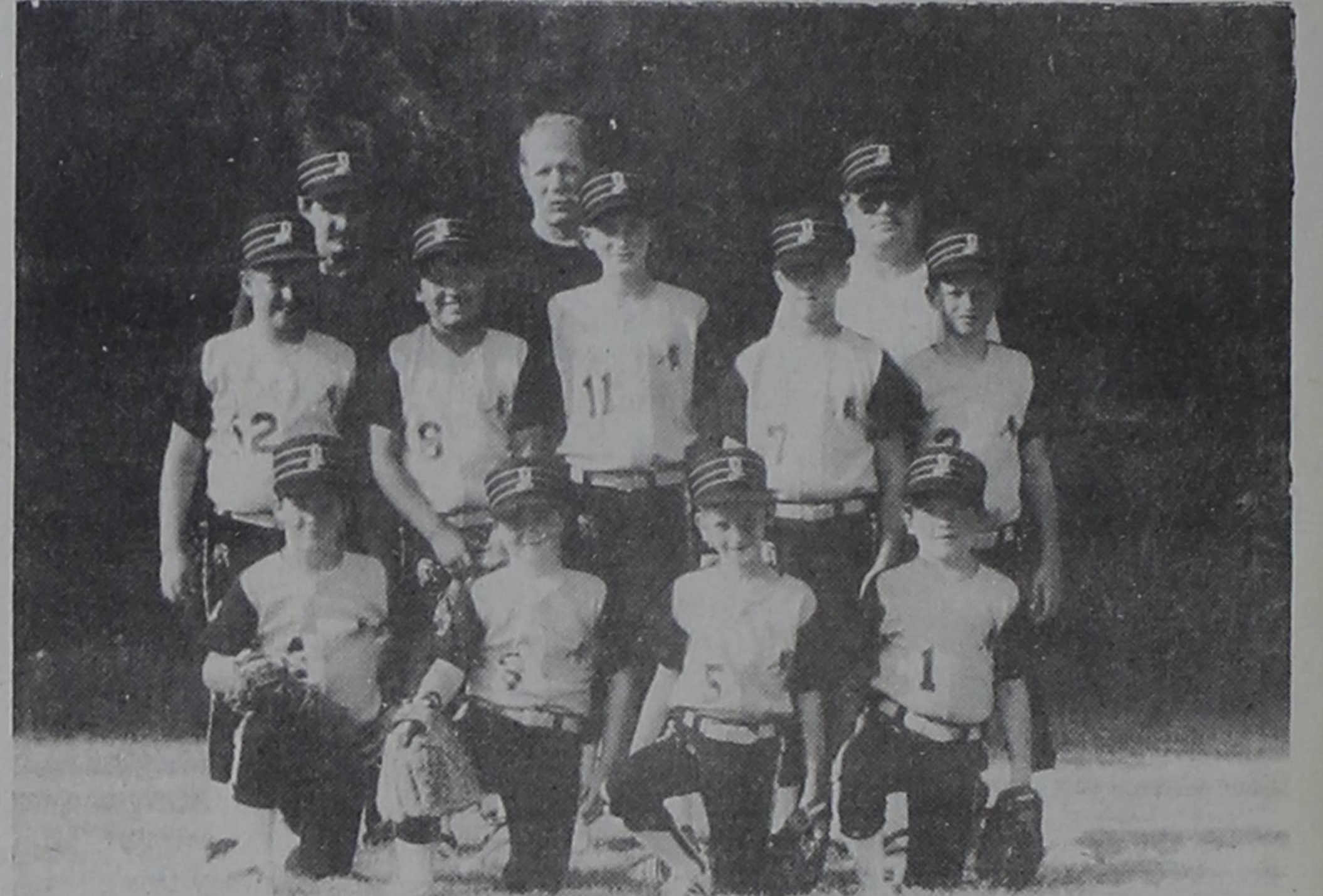

A genetically engineered human protein seems to cut significantly the death rate from septic shock, which is an overwhelming infection of the bloodstream. The drug was given special FDA approval for use in the Persian Gulf War.

Aspirin and alcohol are a bad combination, even on a full stomach, according to research reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association. Aspirin seems to inhibit the stomach's ability to break down the alcohol, so more of it goes directly into the bloodstream.

Capsaicin, made from hot peppers, seems to offer relief from arthritis pain, say researchers at Albert Einstein College of Medicine. Topical use of pepper-packed cream cut pain by a third for those with osteoarthritis, by more than half for the rheumatoid arthritis group.

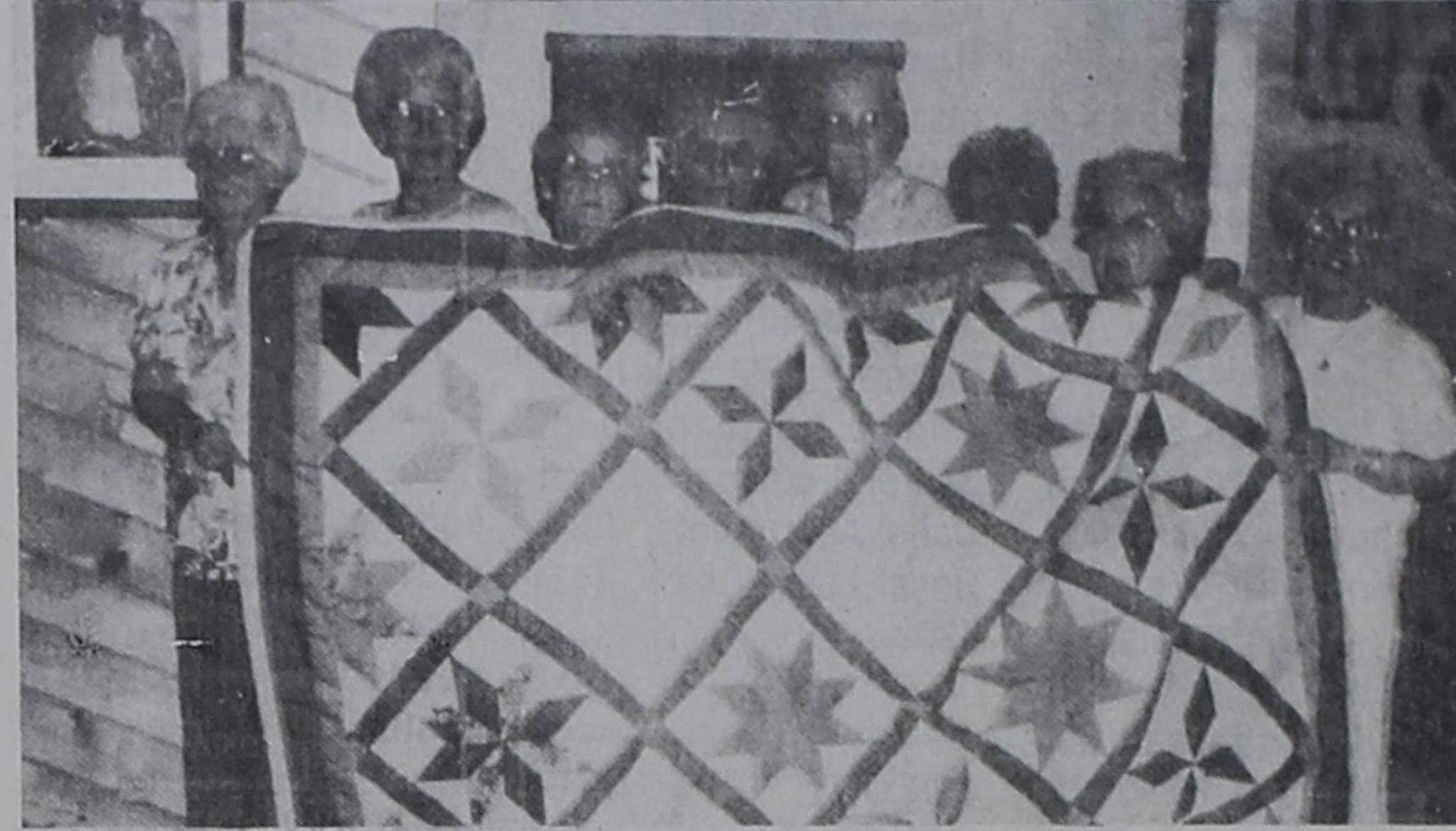

Eight Step Oak Wilk Management Program

Lately I have received many telephone calls about oak trees with problems. The first thing most people assume is that they have oak wilt because that is the worst thing that can happen. If you have red oak or post oak trees oak wilt probably will not be the problem. You can fight oak wilt if it is diagnosed as the problem.

An eight-step oak wilt management program, developed by researchers and specialists with the Texas A & M University System, can save valuable trees when correctly implemented.

Dr. Jarrod D. Johnson, plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Dr.

David N. Appel, plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, have developed the plan for reducing losses to oak wilt.

Johnson also wrote a short publication recently on oak wilt control. His basic recommendations follow.

* First, identify the problem correctly. Diagnosis can be done by leaf symptoms, pattern of spread, rate of tree death, or by tissue sampling. Live oak trees will take from 3 to 6 months to die, while Spanish oaks or black-jacks die within 3 to 5 weeks.

* Create a buffer zone to help stop the spread of the fungus. Major losses result from spread by the fungus through common or grafted roots between

trees of like species. The buffer zone can be fashioned by digging a trench 100 feet from the last tree that is symptomatic of oak wilt. Roots should be cut to at least a depth of 36 inches. The trench may be immediately back filled. An alternative strategy is to remove all the trees in the 100-foot zone, including stumps to destroy roots.

* The third step is careful sanitation. Dead or diseased trees in the affected area should be removed and destroyed by burning or burying. This prevents beetles from feeding on the tree sap and having the spores stick to the beetles for transporting to freshly injured areas on nearby trees.

* If pruning is necessary, cut only diseased, damaged or hazardous limbs. Best time to prune is from January 1 to February 15 or during July,

August and September.

* Be sure to paint wounds or pruning cuts with asphalt or latex-based paints. When paints are applied immediately after the wound is made, a protective barrier is formed between the cut or wound surface and the fungus-carrying beetles.

* Firewood cut from trees that have oak wilt has been known to spread the fungus to new areas. If there is a possibility that the wood is diseased, cover the wood pile with a clear plastic sheet to keep beetles from leaving the fungal mats on the diseased logs and spreading the pathogen to adjacent healthy trees. In addition, all firewood should be burned in the season it is obtained.

* The next step is to inject trees within the buffer zone or in a diseased area with the systemic fungicide, Alamo, to prevent tree loss. Trees showing disease symptoms also can be injected with the treatment, if it is applied before the symptoms are applied to more than 30 percent of the tree's canopy.

* The final step is replanting. Live oaks, Spanish oaks and Shumard oaks can be replanted in areas where oak wilt has been a problem or is a

potential problem. Take special precautions to prevent infection by avoiding wounds or pruning except at the proper season of the year. Apply wound paint immediately after any pruning is done. It is best to plant a mixture of trees instead of a large group of only one tree specie.

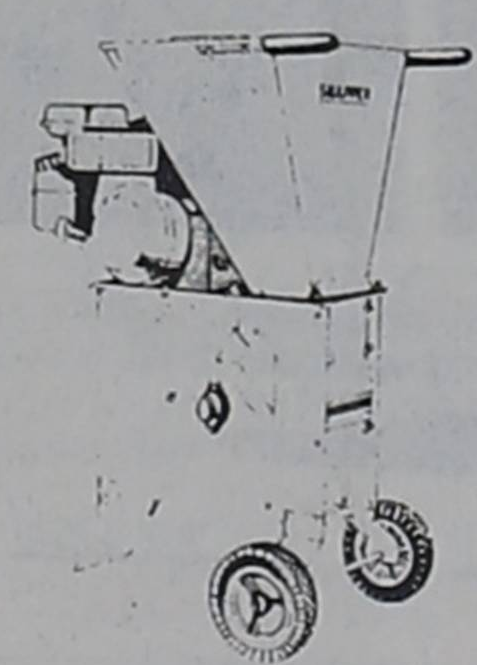

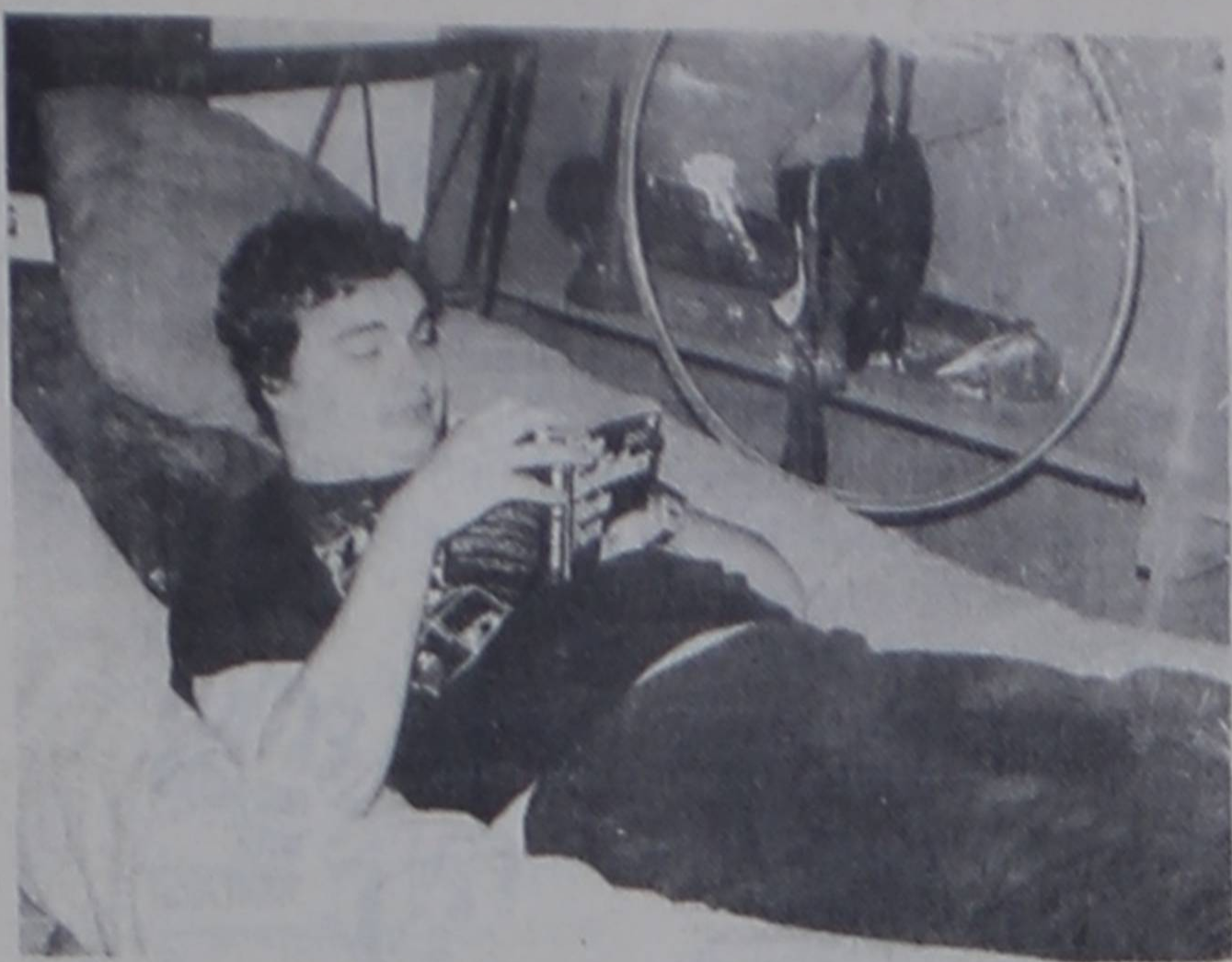

Conservation Reserve Program Sign Up To Begin On July 8

Texans will have an opportunity to get more of a good thing during the 11th Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) sign up July 8-19, 1991.

The CRP pays a fee to land users who agree to put land into permanent vegetative cover for 10 years.

During the first 10 sign ups, most Texas cropland farmers could count on bids of \$40 or less per acre being accepted.

However, Secretary of Agriculture William Richards says farmers should not rely on that formula when making their bids this time.

"Under the new CRP provisions, bids on eligible land will be accepted based on environmental benefits obtained per dollar of cost," Richards said. "Producers who wish to enroll in the CRP should be aware that there is increased competition."

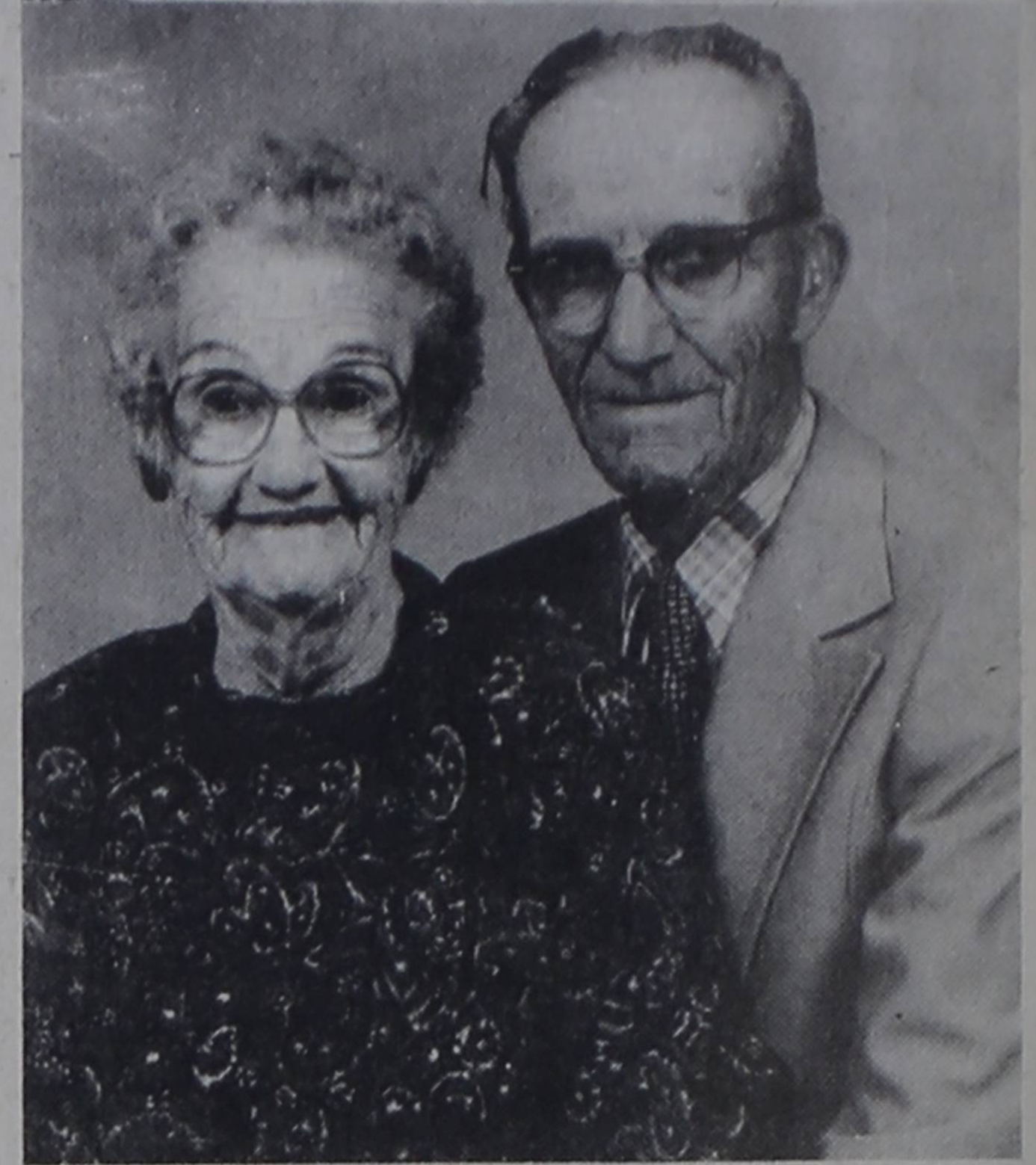
Texas' State Conservationist Wes Oneth says

that land eligible for previous CRP sign ups included land that was highly erodible, land useful as filter strips next to permanent bodies of water, cropped wetlands, or areas subject to stream scour.

Oneth says land eligibility requirements will be expanded for this sign up to include cropland acres that could affect water quality and well heads, which are sources of water for municipalities. It will also include alley cropping which would allow producers to plant strips of hardwood trees and continue to farm between tree rows.

Richards says that to increase water quality benefits under CRP, producers offering areas such as filter strips, grass waterways, windbreaks, shelter belts and contour grass strips will receive additional consideration during the bid evaluation process.

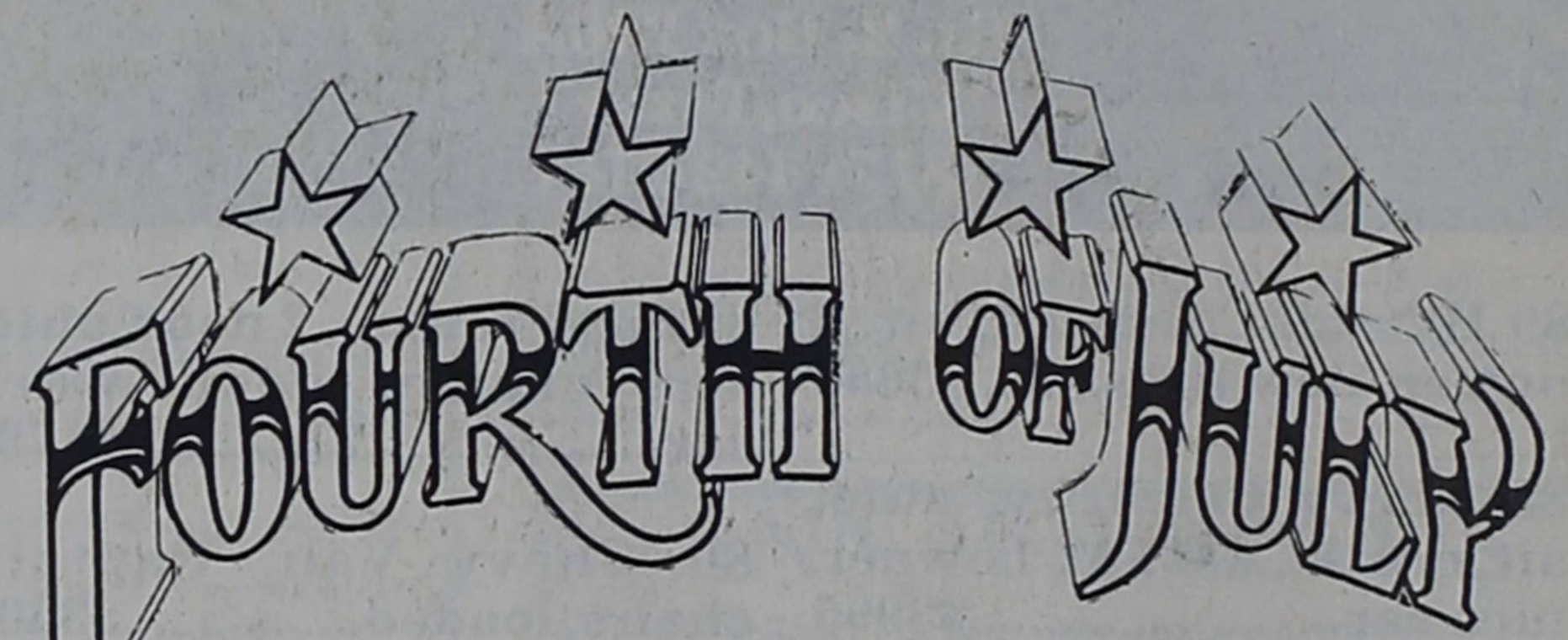

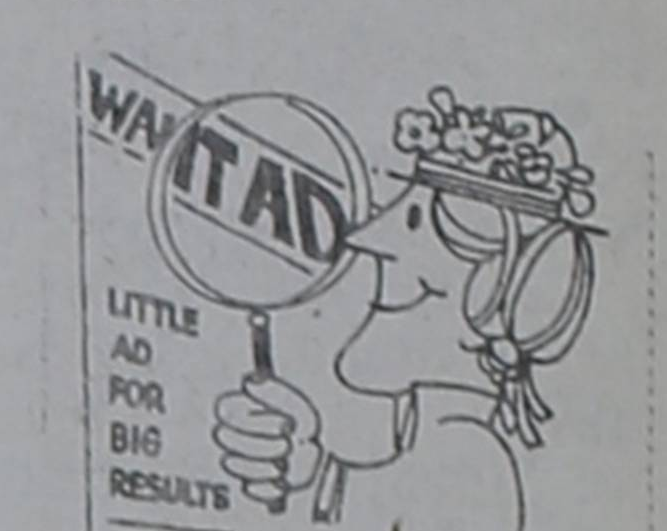

Tid Bits

VERY FEW things are "like they used to be," -- and the way things seem to be going, we someday may not even be able to recognize the trees for the forest.

Some things, like polyester shirts and double-knit pants, pass on, and you rejoice, and others; well, don't you kinda miss being able to eat a greasy-fried egg without having a cholesterol-conscience nag you to death?

The things we generally miss the most, are the things that we normally take for granted: turning a faucet, and seeing water run, turning a key and hearing an engine start, and flipping a switch and having the lights come on.

And the way things seem to be headed in Austin, the light-switch flip just might become something very special to us in the not-to-distant future. Folks around here, weaned on the dependable and fairly-

priced electricity from what was Texas Electric Service Co., have seen and are seeing changes in that company as it restructured into Texas Utilities, finally got nuclear-generated power and attempted to keep up with the growing demand for its product, and though there have been drastic changes, the service and fair rates have remained constant and dependable.

That may not always be the case. And the really sad thing is that it could happen as the result of probably well-intended, but less than totally informed bureaucrats who through inconsistencies in relentless regulation, squeeze the lifeblood out of what has got to be one of the nation's out-front power companies.

Most everyone is an electricity user so rates are important, and the company's rate increase request of 10.2% cut to a recommended 8.2% by the PUC examiners doesn't sound like much, but it could have devastating effect on the company. The company's rate are 25% below the national average, and rates have declined some 10% since 1984, so the new request would just bring them up to that point, even though inflation has hiked 30% since '84.

And this could deal TU a most severe blow because other cumulative decisions have dropped the company's credit rating, and this could be extremely harmful to future growth needs in view of ever-increasing customer loads. They need to be able to borrow to build for the future.

Naturally, Comanche Peak, the nuclear plant, has been a big cost item for TU, and after careful audit, the examiners now hold that all but about 6% of the costs there were "prudently" incurred. This resulted in a \$500 million disallowance, and a disallowance of more than a billion dollar related to the required sale and repurchase of 12.2% ownership of the plant; all of which pretty much defies logic, and according to the company, cannot be supported by facts.

TU is even being tabbed for \$160 million in gas-cost refunds on the holding that they did not negotiate the "best contracts" possible during that turbulent period, even though the company's fuel costs (thanks to their own lignite plants, etc.) were and are the lowest in the country.

This is not an appeal for support; we don't own stock in the company; and like you, only want the best service possible for the money we pay. Major hearings and decisions are upcoming, and heaven only knows how they'll turn out.

Certainly, it's a complicated thing, and not only do we not know the answers, we're not sure we even know the questions. If you'd like to ask specifics, we'd venture that Local Manager John Berry has or could get you the answers.

This is probably just an advance notice that "things could be a 'changing'" depending on what happens in Austin. Let's hope for the best.
