THE SUMMER OF 1983 may go down as the one for the most unusual crossings of the country by those with crusades, or projects, or events to promote.

In May we had Jennifer Roy with her little donkey and covered wagon, making a cross-country walk, in our community. Mrs. Roy is attempting to raise money to build a facility to house Vietnam veterans on the West Coast.

Then, this past week, Bob Wieland, who also has a Vietnam background, came through on Highway 60.

We have to admit that in over 20 years of meeting, visiting and photographing these "cross country addicts," that Wieland was the most unusual. He is making the pilgrimage despite the fact that he lost both legs in Vietnam.

When you see Wieland plodding along, with his arms having to also serve as his legs, you suddenly forget that you have any problems at all.

Wieland is crossing the country to call attention to world hunger. He has been on the road for 21 months already, and it may take him that much longer. And we hesitate to walk to the post office, in spite of having two good legs.

Probably the most heralded cross-country project, the Olympic torch relay, came through Parmer County last Sunday, June 17. The relay didn't come through our town, but came fairly close, coming up Highway 84 from Lubbock, through Farwell and Clovis.

As we understand it, this is only the second time for the Olympic torch relay to cross America. The custom was revived for the 1932 Olympics, the last time our country served as host nation. A similar relay and torch-lighting ceremony has been held for most of the Olympics since that time.

This year's relay will set a record, by covering almost 13,000 miles, touching nearly every state. The journey will take 82 days in all, and when the runners were crossing Parmer County on Sunday, the project was exactly at its half-way mark, in its 41st day.

The torch lighting takes place at Olympia, Greece at the altar of Zeus near the stadium where the ancient Olympic Games were held. A relay of Greek runners transport the torch to Athens.

From there, the torch makes its way to the host country, this year arriving in New York by jet on May 8, where it began its step-by-step trip to the West Coast.

The first kilometer of the project was run by Bill Thorpe, Jr. and Gina Hemphill, grandchildren of two American Olympic heroes, Jim Thorpe and Jesse Owens.

Thousands of young Americans are getting the opportunity to carry the torch this year, in more than 1500 communities. Local sponsors are paying \$3,000 per kilometer for the right to allow young men and women to take part in the relay. Proceeds go to Boys Clubs and Girls Clubs of America.

Ye editor and young son Richard saw the torch as it prepared to enter the county on Sunday, and we were fortunate enough to see the changing of runners (they also light a new torch), which happens approximately every five miles. We also had a chance to visit one of the runners, Jim Sloan.

We'll be watching on July 28 when the last runner in the relay lights the flame at the Olympic site in Los Angeles. It will mark the culmination of a lot of steps to continue this proud tradition.

Crippled War Vet Stops During "Hunger Walk"

Bob Wieland, 36, lost both his legs while serving in the Army 13 years ago while fighting in Vietnam. While on combat-medical patrol, he stepped on and detonated an 82 millimeter mortar round. After surgeries, numerous blood transfusions, a 105-degree fever and a bout with malaria, Bob regained consciousness to find his body blown in half.

Before Vietnam, Wieland aspired to play professional baseball with the Philadelphia Phillies—he was negotiating the contract when he was, instead, drafted with a different "team."

After Vietnam, Bob seized weight lifting as a rehabilitation tool and soon began entering amateur weight lifting competitions. Only eight years later, Bob successfully broke the world record in the bantam weight division competing against able-bodied men. But officials refused to sanction the 303-pound bench press lift citing (among other technicalities)

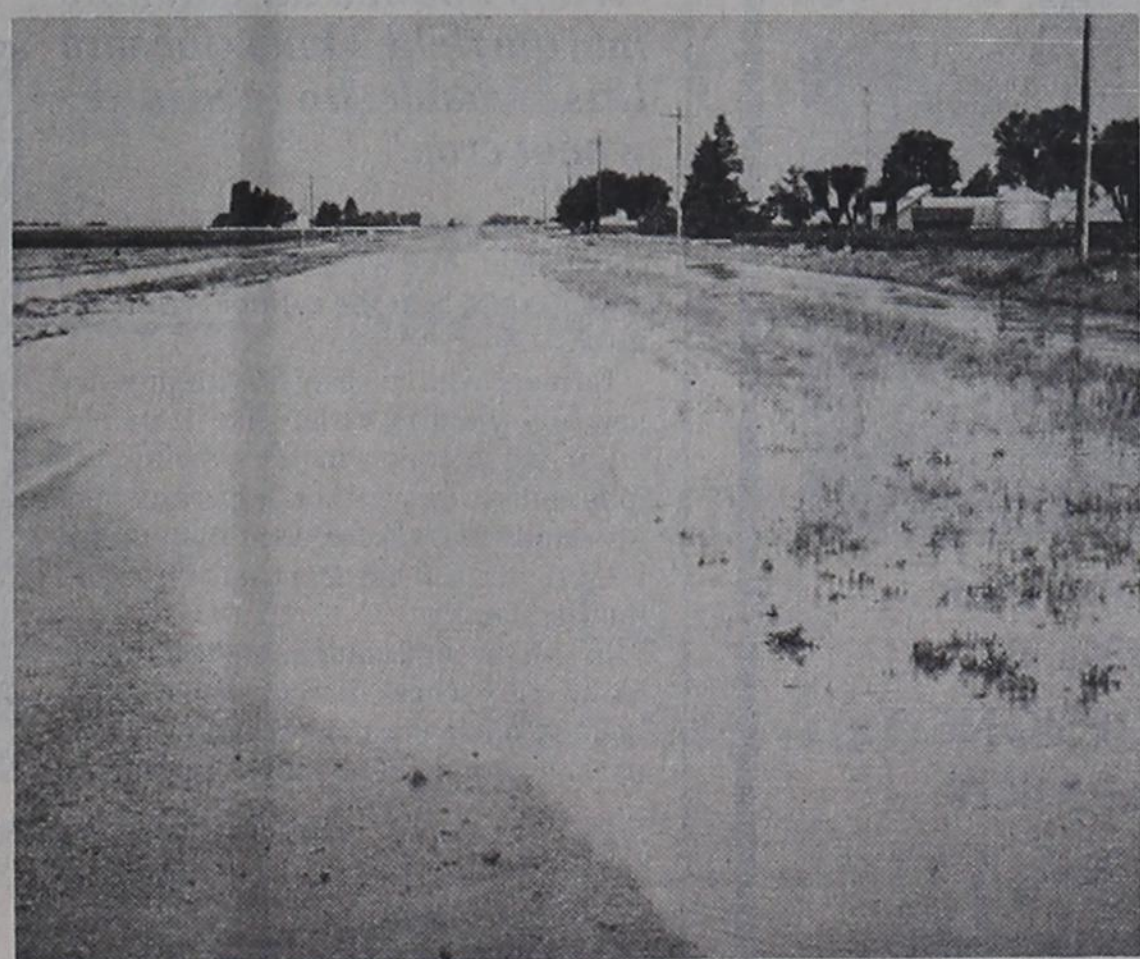

Proceeds from the car wash and bake sale will be used for a cheerleading camp that the girls will attend in July.



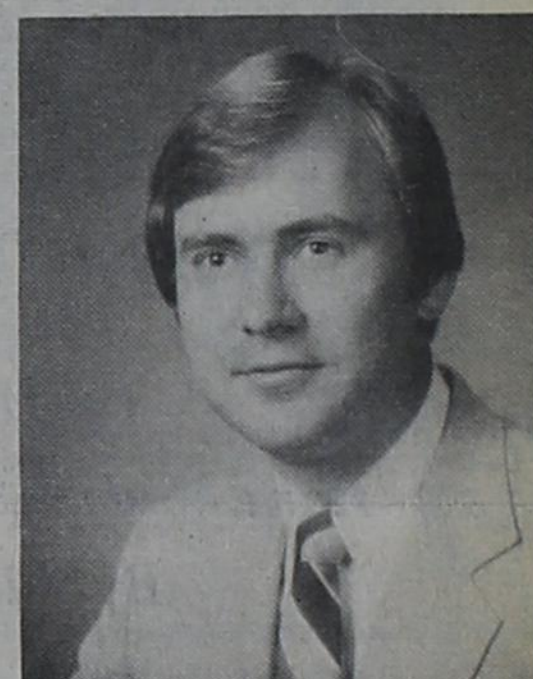

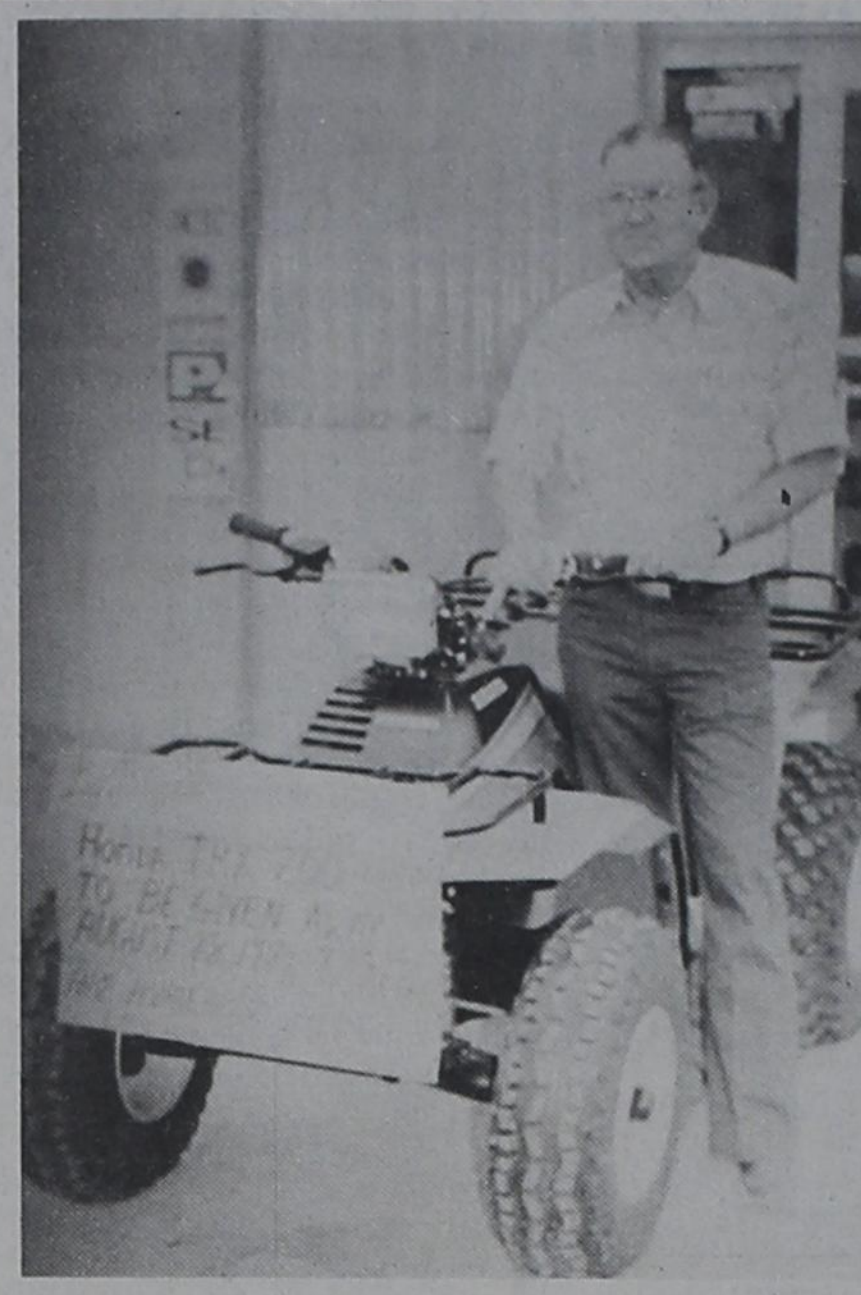

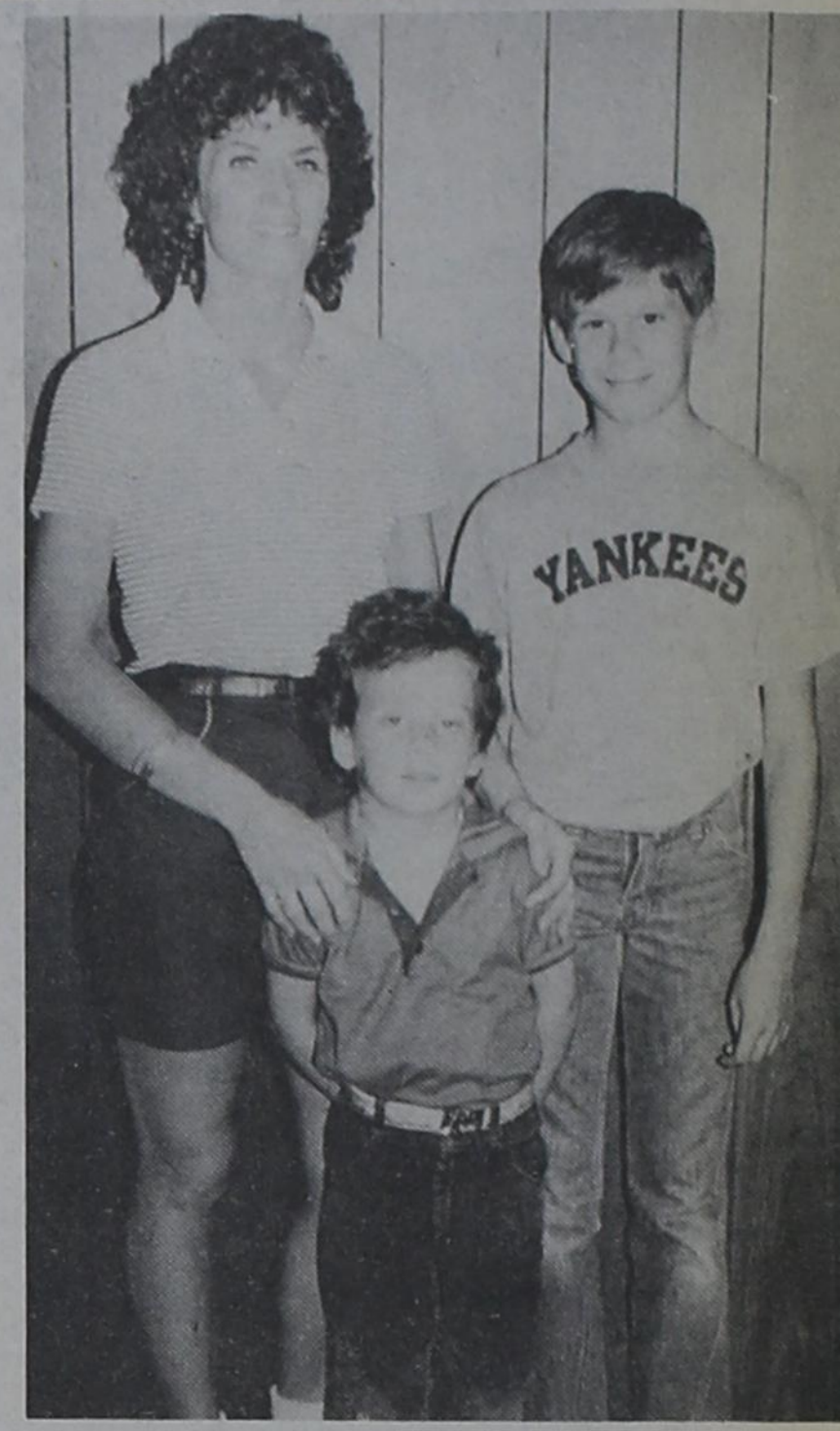

---Letter To The Editor---

To All Citizens Of Bovina Independent School District:

As I have studied public education, the problems facing it and the issues that are so much before us in Texas, I have felt compelled to write this letter.

While I am in agreement with Mr. Perot's Select Committee on Education on the return of learning to the school day, a fair and equitable salary for our dedicated teachers and for excellence to the point we can reach, I am totally opposed to a longer school day and school year. As a parent, I feel that the longer school day takes our children from us without gained benefits. I believe our school day is already long enough for children to learn if that time is used properly. I am told the longer school day is being supported by the

lobbyists of the big cities because there would not be the need for providing care for children after regular school hours until the parents are home from work. I certainly want the children to be cared for, but I believe this action would usurp the responsibilities of the home. This seems to me just another danger the family would face.

As a taxpayer I am also opposed to the longer school day and school year. Someone will have to be at school to teach our children during these extended hours and days. This means additional funds will be needed to pay our teachers for their time. So often the state laws mandate programs but do not make the necessary funds available to implement and continue such programs.

We are now faced with House Bill 246 which is already law. This law, among other things, mandates two high school curriculums in every school district. I see that the provisions of this bill alone will necessitate more personnel, if not in this year, in the years just ahead.


Of course, with all the recent publicity, you are all aware of the Select Committee's recommendations to Governor White and that the legislature is now in a special session working on new legislation for education. Nearly everything I read and hear points to the fact that not only will state expenditures for public schools increase, but it is also likely that each local school district will have to increase its share of the burden proportionately.

If you have strong feelings about educational issues--and I hope that you do--I would urge you to call or write our elected state officials this week and let them know your feelings.
