## SMOKE DAMAGE TO DANNY SCHAEFER'S HOME

At 1:49 p.m. Monday two Cisco Fire Department trucks responded to a call on a fire at the home of Danny Schaefer, about 10 miles south of Cisco. The house is on County Rd. 185, 2 1/2 mi. east of S. H. 183.

The Schaefer family was gone at the time, but a meter reader from Comanche County Electric Co-op noticed smoke coming out from the house and turned in an alarm. The meter reader also cut off electrical power to the house.

A fire truck from Carbon also responded to the call. A Cisco ambulance and a truck from the Rising Star Fire Department were enroute when notified that the fire was out. By the time the Cisco

Fire Department reached the scene the fire had apparently smothered itself out, a fire department spokesman says. All windows in the well-insulated brick home were closed, and the flames ran out of oxygen. If the fire had continued for 15 more minutes however, the structure would probably have been engulfed in flames.

There was little dispersal of water, but firemen did enter the house. Some of the Schaefer family arrived about this time too. They found that the basic structure had not been damaged, but there was heavy smoke damage over the whole house.

No cause for the fire has been determined at this time.

## CLARA SIMER, PIONEER TEACHER: "I LOVED EVERY MINUTE OF IT"

Education is constantly in the news these days, with various ideas on the best way to accomplish it.

Clara Simer, pioneer Eastland County educator, began her experiences long before most present-day experts were born. And, to judge from the results of her work, her methods must have been excellent.

Her career spanned 54 years in the classrooms - from Eastland County rural schools in 1917-18 to her retirement around 1972 at Ysleta, a large school system down the valley from El Paso.

Now 93 years of age, Clara Simer's eyes still light up when teaching is mentioned.

"I loved every minute of it," she says. "If I was younger, I'd do it again. The kids were sweet. I still think they are."

Miss Simer's own schooling began in Eastland County. She was born in 1898 on her parent's farm south of Thurber. But a few years later they moved to a farm north of Eastland so that Clara and her sisters, Laura and Wilda, would have more opportunity to attend school.

Clara Simer attended rural schools through the 7th grade, then spent a year at Eastland High School. She studied two years at Britton's Training School at Cisco (now Cisco Junior College), one summer and sub-College at Simmons College, Abilene (now Hardin-Simmons University), and one summer at West Texas in Canyon.

Some of this summer training was accomplished between terms of teaching, for Clara Simer taught her first school at Bedford in 1917-18.

Bedford was a two-teacher school on a hill about 3 1/2 mi. north of Eastland, above where Eastland Lake is now.

Continuous education became a part of Clara Simer's life. She attended Southwest College at San Marcos during summers from 1920 through 1928, receiving her permanent Teaching Certificate there in 1922.

At various times she attended the University of Texas at Austin, University of Colorado, Colorado State College, Sul Ross College, Palo Alto Guidance Center, and Reading Clinics in West Texas at Canyon and George Peabody in Nashville, Tenn.

Her B.A. Degree was obtained at Sul Ross in

August, 1932, with a Major in History. Her Masters Degree was obtained at Colorado State College in 1948.

During these years Clara Simer's sisters also became teachers, and had long careers in the profession.

Along with her dedication to teaching, Clara Simer also became dedicated to Christianity at an early age. She was baptized while in her teens, and became a member of the Church of Christ. The baptism took place in a tank at a rural area.

Clara loved the family farm and out-doors, so its not surprising that much of her early teaching years were spent in rural communities. Books could be written about her experiences there - having to walk to the school, ride horseback, or (rarely, she says) use a horse and buggy.

After teaching a year at the Bedford School, during 1917-18 Miss Simer taught in 1918-19 at Corner, a school north of Ranger on the Caddo Highway. Then she taught a year each at Reagan and Yellow Mound, both two teacher schools located northwest of Eastland.

She taught at Colony, a five-teacher school west of Ranger, and Frankell, a three-teacher school north of Ranger. Then she went to Caddo, where she taught four years.

In 1928 the popular Clara Simer was hired for Eastland High School, and she remained back at her home school for three years. But in the depression year of 1931 she accepted a position at Archer City, where she taught until 1935.

Then she worked at Olden for a year (1935-36), and went to Crane and then to Mertzozon for several years.

In 1943, at age 45, Clara Simer began what was probably the most rewarding part of her career - more than 25 years at Ysleta High School in the Social Studies Department. She was named Chairman of the Department in 1948, and directed work which expanded into various areas of civics and government.

Ysleta, in the then-beautiful "Lower Valley" of El Paso, was a challenge to her from the start. It was, and still is, a multi-racial school, with most of the races of man attempting to learn the American way of government.

Young people at Ysleta also came from every economic situation - farm workers from the irrigated fields, industrial workers, children of Ft. Bliss soldiers, children of University professors, and children of owners of the hacienda-type farms, who often had servants, cars and money at their disposal.

To all she was the same - full of energy, full of fun - with plenty of encouragement to spare. She set up and directed a National Honor Society, pointing the youngsters toward high achievement.

In 1963 Clara Simer was honored as "Teacher of the Year" in El Paso. The El Paso Times and Herald Post had a number of articles about her, listing her accomplishments in and out of the classrooms. They told how she helped young people on weekends and at night. They told how she began the Future Teachers Club, and recruited members; also mentioned was her teaching in a Church camp in New Jersey during the summers, and that she taught Sunday School in the Church of Christ in El Paso.

The Ysleta High School newspaper, "The Pow Wow," described Miss Simer and her honor in this way:

**"Simer Wins Hearts With Sense of Humor."**

"An all-time favorite of everyone around Ysleta High School is the one, the only Miss Clara Simer, Head of the Social Studies Department, Future Teachers Sponsor, and National Honor Society Advisor..."

"Her glowing personality has touched the hearts of many around Ysleta and will continue to do so, for she intends to keep on teaching..."

Miss Simer did teach about nine years after these special honors. When she retired around 1972 she came back to Eastland County and lived in the family home with her sister Laura, who had also retired. Her sister Wilda had married and had a family elsewhere.

Her retirement was still a happy and busy one for Clara Simer, for she had many friends in Eastland County. Sometimes when her "honors" were mentioned she recalled what she had written while at Ysleta: "My greatest honors are from the students who come back to say 'Thank you.' Among my students I point proudly to a member of the House

of Representatives, one Astronaut, numerous lawyers, teachers, school superintendents, doctors, reputable coaches, army officers, successful farmers, ranchers, and those whose names are listed on tablets at the front entrance who died for the American government I'm teaching..."

In November, 1990 Clara Simer's sister Laura died - a sad milestone for her life. But Miss Simer still carries on with faith and courage.

"I never saw a hopeless day," she is quoted as saying.

Friends are fond of quoting some more of her sayings. This statement, which she called "Philosophy," was also written during those teaching years at Ysleta High.

She said: "My philosophy is simple and brief. I learned early that no effort one puts into a child is wasted. I had often felt that I had failed, but the years have brought results in proportion to the investment. Teachers have a great opportunity to leave a worthwhile and lasting influence. Much depends on energy and effort."

There is little that can be said after a great thought like that - only that Texas education needs many more Clara Simers.

## GREINER, WALTER, RECEIVE MIRABEAU B. LAMAR AWARD



RANGER-In an award ceremony held June 6, 1991 at Ranger Masonic Lodge No. 738, James Clayton Greiner and Shawn Marie Walter were the recipients of both a medal and plaque.

Young people who are outstanding achievers; who overcome personal difficulties and hardships; and those who accept the challenge to excel and help make our communities, state and nation stronger, such as James and Shawn, are eligible to receive awards and honors such as this Rev. Bill Reed presented the awards.

You may wonder why a Masonic Lodge makes these awards. The Masonic Fraternity has existed in Texas since before the revolution which won our independence from Mexico. In fact, the official Charter for the first Masonic Lodge in Texas was carried in Anson Jones' saddlebags as he fought in the Battle of San Jacinto.

Many of the early Texas heroes were Masons - Sam Houston, Anson Jones, Lorenzo de Zavala, James W. Fannin, Antonio Navarro, William B. Travis, Several Texas governors have been Masons. And there have been hundreds of very famous men who were Masons - such as George Washington, "Teddy" Roosevelt, Harry Truman, Rudyard Kipling, Burl Ives, Roy Acuff - this list is very long indeed. That fact alone tells you there

are some pretty fine men who are Masons.

Masonry was begun in England in the days when the mighty Cathedrals were being built. The craftsmen who designed those magnificent buildings and those who built them organized themselves into lodges. Each lodge elected a Master to head the group and other officers to lead it. And those ancient lodges were the beginnings of Masonry.

The fraternity of Freemasonry still uses the square, compasses, the plumbing and many other tools used by the stone masons as symbols in its teaching of fine moral principals today.

The object of Masonry is to make good men better. It is not a "secret" organization as some people believe, although we do have a few signs of recognition and other parts of our lodge activities which we do not make public. They help bind us together in our common purpose of improving ourselves and in helping make our communities better places to live.

The Masonic Fraternity is known for its charity work, it has long supported public schools. The second president of the Republic of Texas, Mirabeau B. Lamar, was a Mason and is known as "the father of the Texas Public School system," because his work resulted in the State of Texas setting up a public school system.

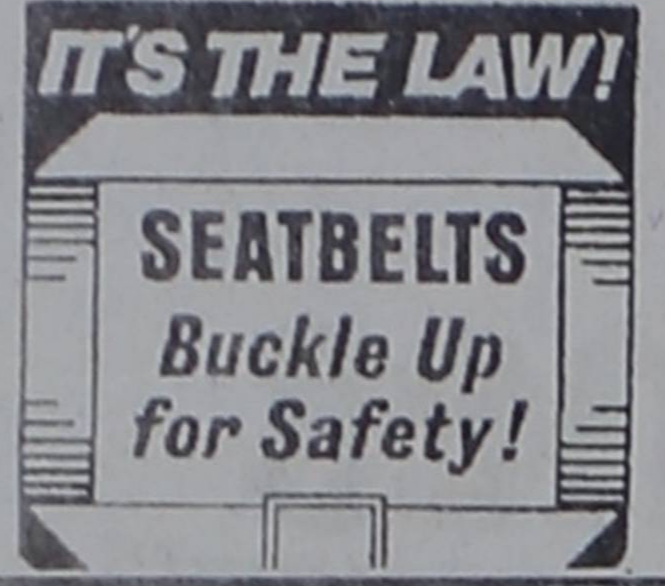
Royce Manning, from the Comptroller's Abilene Enforcement Office, will

be in Room B10, (Social Security room) at the courthouse from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.

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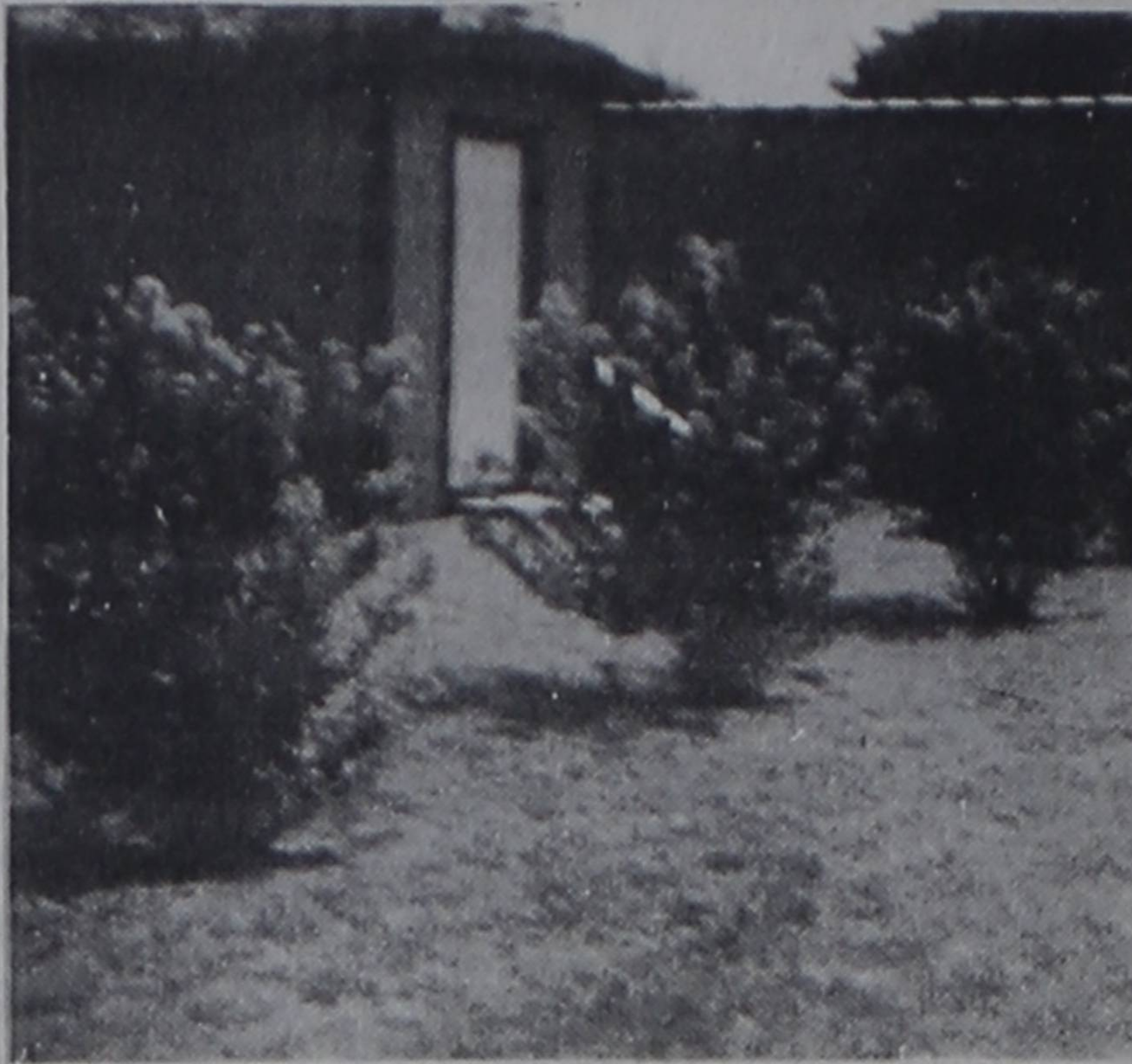

**LESS TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS DURING THE JULY 4TH HOLIDAYS**

AUSTIN — Fewer persons were killed in traffic accidents in Texas during the July 4th holiday period than at any time since at least 1970, according to preliminary figures released by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"While we regret that we had seven fatalities in Texas during the 30-hour July 4th holiday period, we were pleased to see that we fell short of our estimate that 12 persons would die on Texas' streets and highways during the holiday," said DPS Assistant Director Lt. Col. James Wilson.

The previous lowest July 4th traffic death count was in 1973, when 9 persons died during the 30-hour holiday period. Four others later died of injuries, pushing the final total to 13 deaths that year.

"Of the seven deaths reported this July 4th," Wilson said, "three were motorcycle accidents, two in auto-pedestrian accidents and two in vehicle accidents. In both the vehicle accidents, the victim had not been wearing a safety belt. The count might have been even lower if they had been buckled up."

All available Highway Patrol Troopers were on the roadways during the holiday period, which Wilson said may have discouraged drunken driving and speeding, the two leading causes of traffic deaths.

"Texas motorists also deserve our thanks for helping make it a safer July 4th," Wilson said.

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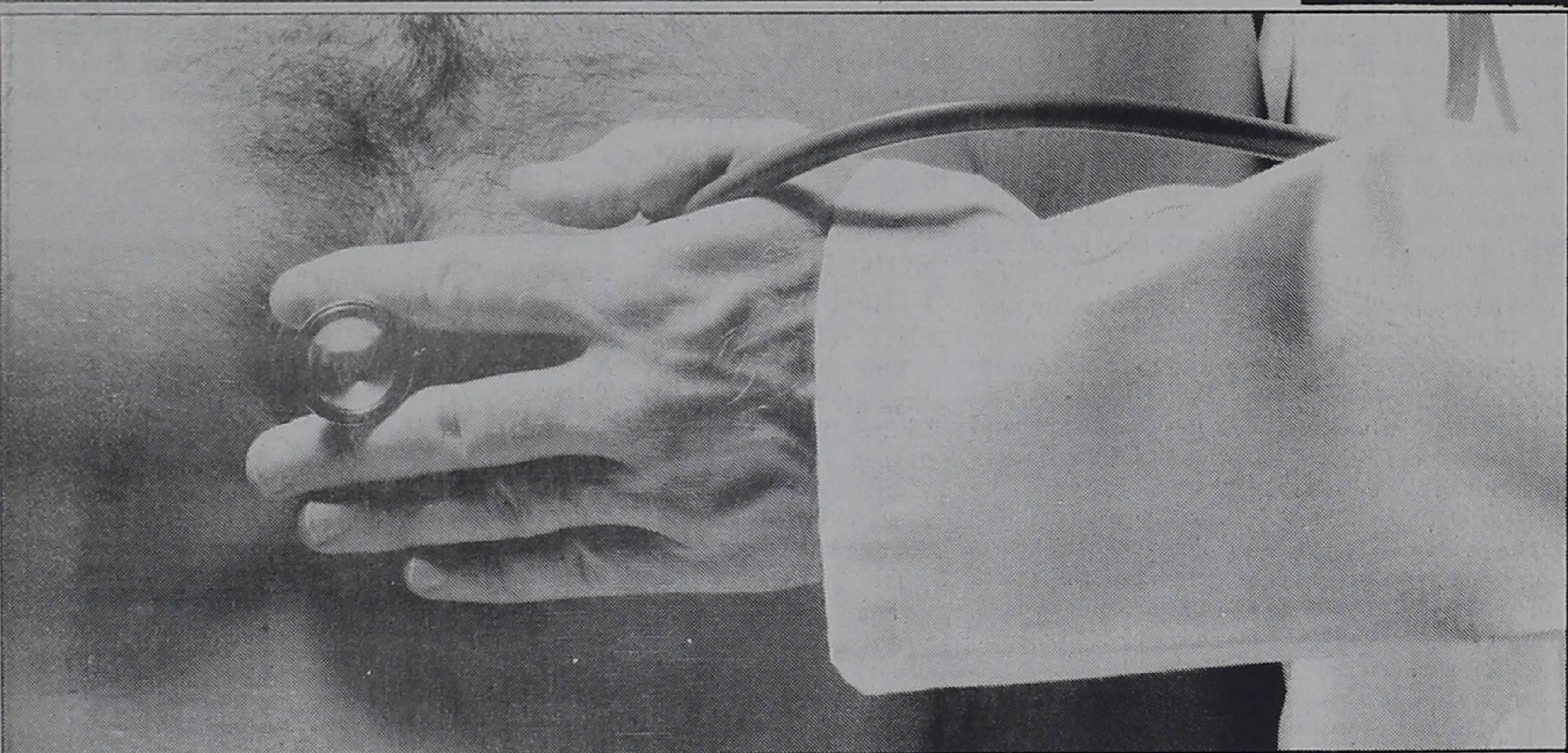

### Gator Hunts Announced

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will conduct public hunts for alligators on five departmental areas during September. Officials said completed applications from prospective alligator hunters must be received in Austin headquarters by 5 p.m. August 6. Applicants selected by drawing will be required to pay a \$50.00 permit fee. A \$35.00 alligator hunter's license (4300.00 for non-residents) also is required for each permitted hunter. An additional \$120.00 tagging fee will be assessed only for those successful hunters who choose to have their alligator tagged for commercial sale.

Last year 587 people applied for the hunts and the 235 participating hunters harvested 136

surplus alligators. This year officials expect to issue about 400 permits.

Hunts are scheduled on the Guadalupe Delta Wildlife Management area in Calhoun County, the J. D. Murphree WMA in Jefferson County, the Mad Island WMA in Matagorda County, the Old River Unit of the Lower Neches WMA in Orange County and Sea Rim State Park in Jefferson County.

### ITS HONEY-DEW TIME ALREADY

It's that time of the year again when the bees begin to rain honey-dew on everything under them. Based on the number of telephone calls some people are already covered in honey-dew.

Honey-dew is the by-product of the yellow aphid feeding on the pecan tree leaves. Generally the yellow aphid will make it's appearance every year. When large numbers of these pest build up a large amount of honey-dew will be the result.

The yellow aphid feeds on the pecan leaf by sucking the fluid from the leaves. A heavy population can affect the pecan tree and reduce pecan yield.

A general recommendation is to control yellow aphids when an average of 20 aphids per compound leaf is found or when excessive honey-dew is produced and aphid populations persist. There are other facts that you the homeowner should consider before you apply any control measures.

When you apply any insecticide to control the yellow aphid you will also eliminate most of your beneficial insects such as the ladybird beetle and lacewing. The beneficial insects take longer to build up their population than the yellow aphid. Most often once you make an insecticide application to control the yellow aphid the population will build back up.

This means you will probably have to make repeated insecticide applications because there will not be enough beneficials to control the yellow

aphid. Even under natural conditions the beneficial insects often do not keep the yellow aphid populations under control.

There are several insecticides available to control the yellow aphid in pecans. These include Diazinon and Malathion. Which ever product you select make sure you read and follow the label instructions.

### 5 CEUS FOR NON-COMMERCIAL AND COMMERCIAL APPLICATORS

Use of Air Purifying Respirators, and Safe Chemical Handling.

Rules adopted by the Texas Department of Agriculture established continuing education requirements as a require-

ment for renewal of non-commercial and commercial pesticide applicators licenses.
