





CANOLA OIL

Canola oil is derived from old varieties of rapeseed that were selectively bred in Canada to be very low in erucic acid - no more than 2 percent canola oil can be included in a diet designed to prevent coronary heart disease. While some vegetable oils contain large amounts of the saturated fatty acids shown to raise serum cholesterol, canola oil contains less palmitic acid (only 4 percent) of total fatty acids than any vegetable oil. Most of the fatty acids in canola are unsaturated and may reduce plasma cholesterol to the same extent as dolinoleic acid and low-fat diets, although this point is controversial.

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Thus, the intermediate polyunsaturated fattyacid content of canola oil in combination with its high oleic content, may give it an advantage over oils that are very high in polyunsaturated fatty acids, which lower both low-density and highdensity lipoproteins.



Clothing Helps Beat The Heat

ways to keep cooler in the Texas summer heat, a clothing specialist suggests taking a look at your wardrobe.

The type of clothing you wear can make a big difference in how comfortable you are indoors and outdoors, said Dr. Ann V. Beard with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Color, design, fiber, finishes and the fit of a garment are factors that affect clothing's ability to keep you cool," Beard said. "Choosing clothes that allow your body heat to escape, and those that reflect rather than absorb radiation in direct sunlight will make you more comfortable."

Clothes can absorb moisture through evaporation - the primary means of body heat loss to help keep you cool. However, if moisture stays on the surface of the fabric, you will feel hot and sticky, Beard said.

When selecting outfits to wear on hot summer days, keep these tips in

 Absorbent fibers such ascotton, linen, silk, rayon and wool are good choices, although wool is seldom worn during summer months in Texas.

 Soil-release finishes increase absorbency while stainresistant and wrinkle-resistant finishes decrease absorbency.

 Loose-fitting clothing is cooler because it allows for air circulation and the evaporation of body moisture. Look for garments with open or large necks and armholes. Wear full skirts or pants with straight rather than fitted legs. Wear shirts and blouses outside skirts and pants for maximum comfort. Avoid anything that fits tightly. One layer is cooler than several.

· Inner garments, accessories and cleanliness of clothing affect heat retention, too. Wear absorbent inner garments and be sure to keep all clothing clean. Choose loose, lightweight accessories that do not restrict air flow.

"By making the right clothing choices," Beard says, "you'll be a step ahead in beating the Texas heat this summer."

Sleep study indicates that an afternoon nap taken on a bed is more refreshing than one taken in a chair. Sleeping in a bed seems to allow longer deep-sleep periods than sitting half upright, researchers at the Institute of Pennsylvania found.

Scientists at St. Mary's Hospital in London have discovered a tiny mutation in a single gene that seems to cause Alzheimer's disease. While there may be other causes for the widespread disease, the researchers feel they've at least found a focus for study.

Unlike adults, allergic youngsters stung by bees don't seem to have worse reactions by subsequent stings, a study at the Johns Hopkins Asthma and Allergy Center in Baltimore found. The children did just as well if they didn't get desensitizing injections.

New vaccine to protect babies from hemophilus influenza type B bacteria -- the germ that causes meningitis -- has been approved for use in children as young as 2 months.



The El Paso City Transit Department received a monthly payment of \$1.1 million and hospital districts in Baylor, Ector and Reeves counties were sent a combined total of \$725,267.

Merchants collect the state's 6 1/4 percent state sales tax and any local sales taxes levied in the areand send them to the Comptroller's Office with their tax returns. Businesses file returns monthly, quarterly or annually, depending on the amount of sales tax they collect. The state retains its share and returns to cities, counties and other taxing entities their local portion of the sales tax.

All local sales taxes must be approved by area voters. Most local governments use the money for services such as fire fighting, road maintenance and law enforcement. City sales taxes may also be used for local economic development and property tax reduction.



1991 CAMERON SPEECH-THEATRE-DEBATE CAMP LARGEST EVER

Students from Oklahoma, Texas, Kansas, Montana, North Carolina, and Maine converged on the campus of Cameron University in Lawton, Oklahoma. There were 58 high school teachers and college professors that served as staff for the one week camp (July 7-12, 1991).
