#### POLLS OPEN 7 TO 7 FOR 2 VOTES SATURDAY

"school-tax decision day." Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday, August 10, at 14 locations in Eastland County, and in other counties throughout the State of Texas.

The results of the voting, will to a large extent, determine the amount of additional school taxes we'll all be paying in the School Cafeteria. future.

Voting in this county will be at the nine usual state voting sites AND five in five school district voting sites.

Absentee voting ended Tuesday at 5 p.m.

There are two ballots one for state constitutional amendments and one for County Education District decision choices and the two are linked together.

The first amendment choice, if passed statewide, would give the CED the right to do certain things. The other amendment would, if passed, authorize bonds for higher

education scholarships. The three school ballot choices (provided the Amendment one decision is affirmative) are "for" or "against" personal property taxation, overage and homestead exemptions.

All eligible voters are urged to vote in both elec-

tions: 1. At their regular political voting site for the amendments; and 2. at their regular school-related voting site. Voting may be at either site first,



#### TDA ENDORSES RESOLUTIONS APPROVED SOUTHERN ASSOCIATIONOFSTATE DEPARTMENTS OF AGRICULTURE

AUSTIN - The Southern Association of State Departments of Agriculture (SASDA) met in Nashville, Tenn., this month and adopted several resolutions having a direct impact on Texas agriculture. Of particular importance to Texas producers are resolutions relating to boll weevil eradication, honey bee production and pesticide waste disposal.

"Many of the problems facing Texas producers don't stop at the state line," Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said. "For instance, boll weevil eradication programs won't work unless all of the cotton producing states are allowed to participate. Currently, North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Arizona and California are participating. By working and cooperating with my counterparts in these other states, we'll be able to put together a uniform, cohesive plan of attack."

A resolution proposed by Perry and adopted unanimously by the SASDA representatives encourages the remaining cotton producing states to adopt a boll weevil eradication program. A boll weevil eradication bill was approved by the Texas Legislature this year, but vetoed by Governor Ann Richards, who cited several environmental concerns. Efforts to modify and reintroduce the legislation i the upcoming special session are under-

"The boll weevil is the

number one threat to cotton production in the United States, with annual losses estimated at close to \$1 billion, with a \$20 million loss in Texas annually," Perry said. "Eradication programs one vetoed by Governor Richards, would allow Texas cotton produced like those in North Carolina and California to become boll weevil free." The resolution on honey bees asks the U.S. Department of Agriculture to develop improved methods to quickly and accurately identify Africanized honey bees and to establish a certification program for shipping queen and packaged bees. More than 50 Africanized honey bee swarms have been found in Texas so far this year, but in each instance, samples had to be sent to Beltsville, MD., for official verification.

The resolution also asks USDA to develop nonchemical alternatives to managing honey bee pests - including the development of honey bee stock resistant to Varroa and tracheal mites. Southern beekeepers have reported heavy winter mortality from hives infested with the tracheal mite and it appears that the Varroa mite will have a similar effect. The resolution also calls for developing an effective miticide to minimize the development of

#### ALTERNATIVES BEING CONSIDERED IN THE HOUSE REGARDING TAXES

WACO - Texas farmers and ranchers are alarmed by what they understand are alternatives being considered in the Texas House of Representatives regarding taxes, according to S. M. True, president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

"Proposals to increase the state fuel tax by 13 cents to a total of 28 cents a gallon is bad enough for all Texans," True said "But, changing the offroad exemption for tractors and other production equipment to a once-ayear refund — as proposed -substantially increases producer's up-front pro-

duction costs." The president of the state's largest general farm organization said the damage becomes even more severe with the concept of allowing the refund to equate to only

75 percent of the charge. "That would result in a new 7-cents-per-gallon tax on fuel used for food and fiber production,' True said. "That is unacceptable and intolerable. We strongly urge that this

#### PERRY CALLS FOR FEDERAL WEATHER-RELATED ASSISTANCE FOR AG

AUSTIN - Commis- incurred damage to their sioner Rick Perry is urging members of the Texas congressional delegation to help America's farmers whose crops have been devastated by weatherrelated disasters during the 1990 and 1991 crop years.

In a letter to the delegation, Perry said poor weather conditions during the past two growing seasons have dealt severe setbacks to many Texas producers. Without additional assistance, Perry said, many "will face farm ruptcy."

"Weather conditions in our state have drastically impacted production outputs," Perry said. "So far this crop year, it is estimated that farmers and ranchers in more than 60 Texas counties have been adversely affected by floods, hail, high winds, tornadoes and drought. More than one million acres of Texas farmland have been impacted resulting in tens of mil-

lions of dollars in losses." In addition to major losses to farm program and specialty crops, Perry said Texas producers have

homes, service buildings, machinery and land. Land damages are estimated to be as high as \$800,000 during the 1991 crop year, with at least that abount expected in losses as a result of damage to farm dwellings and service buildings.

During the 1990 crop year, many growers harvested less than 50 percent of their potential crop because of severe weather. The result was more than \$1 billion in losses due to the year's end.

For some farmers, 1990 and 1991 marked the third and fourth consecutive year of poor yields.



#### AG COMMISSIONER FIGHTS TO KEEP PESTICIDE REGULATION AT TDA

AUSTIN — Commissioner Rick Perry is urging members of the Legislature to resist efforts to move pesticide regulation from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Perry said he is hopeful that legislators will turn a thumbs down to a recommendation from Comptroller John Sharp that would place regulatory authority for pesticide use at a proposed new Department of the Environment The Comptroller's Of-

fice proposed creating the DOE by merging a number of other state agencies and programs. Under the proposal as approved by the Texas Senate, oversight of the department - and its regulations would come from gubernatorial appointees and an executive director hired by the governor. That, Perry said, would lessen accountability for

the pesticide program. "Let's leave responsibility for pesticide use under an elected official - who is directly accountable to the people of Texas. Let's not place this important duty in the hands of a mega-bureaucracy."

Moving pesticide regulation, Perry said, would not be in the best interests of agricultural producers, consumers — or taxpayers as a whole.

"Creation of the DOE is aimed at cost-effectiveness. But to move pesticide regulation would not produce any cost-savings," Perry said, "and it certainly would not be more efficient. In fact, this move would cost the state more than half a million

dollars each year."

"The typical agricultural pesticide user does not have the resources or time to work with a complex bureaucracy. Agriculture needs to be able to work with an accessible and knowledgeable entity such as TDA," Perry said, noting that TDA has offices throughout the state to serve constituents' needs at the local level.

#### \$1.3 MILLION BRAHMAN CATTLE SALE MADE TO THAILAND, SALE LARGEST BY TEXAS RANCHERS IN PAST 20 YEARS

HOUSTON—Commissioner Rick Perry standing beside hundreds of Brahman heifers and bulls being prepared for transport to Thailand today announced the state's largest single cattle sale to a foriegn country in the past 20 years. The \$1.3 million cattle sale is the largest ever by Texas ranchers to Thailand.

Perry made his announcement at the Texas Department of Agriculture Livestock Facility at Houston Intercontinental Airport, where 600 head of the purebred cattle are being prepared for transport to Thailand. The cattle are from 62 ranches throughout Texas.

"This is a great day for these ranchers and a great day for the cattle industry in Texas. This sale truly shows that 'Texas advantages in our favor Livestock is the Best in Any Language," Perry said, referring to TDA's new livestock marketing slogan.

The government of Thailand has been buying purebred Brahmans from Texas ranchers since 1986 as part of an effort to enhance the country's livestock programs.

The cattle was to be transported to Bangkok

in two stages. A specially outfitted 747 jumbo jet was scheduled to depart for Thailand at 9 p.m., Monday, July 15. A second transport was made late Monday, July 22. The trip takes about 24 hours.

Perry said the \$1.3 million sale underscores the tremendous opportunities for similar export trade with other Pacific Rim buyers. He said TDA's new slogan, 'Texas Livestock is the Best in Any Language,; will serve at the "backbone of our thrust to develop a new market in other Pacific Rim countries.

"Our strategy is to diversify our marketing opportunities, thus attracting new customers for Texas livestock - such as our Brahman cattle, he said. "We have many For instance, our climate prepares cattle for other climates. We also have close working relationship with breeders, breeder associations and the U.S. Department of Agricul-

"This sale didn't happen overnight," Perry said. "But through a close cooperative effort with the American Brahman Breeders Association and the Texas Brahman Association, we were able to show off the best of our Brahman cattle and help arrange the sale."

From Jan. 1 through July 1, Texas farmers and ranchers have exported \$41.8 million worth of livestock, representing 409,377 head of Texas cattle, sheep, horses, goats and swine.
