EASTLAND COUNTY TAX ASSESSOR CLERK FIRED FOR THEFT

Ellen Cozart Kanady, a clerk in the Eastland County tax assessor/collector's office, was charged Tuesday with theft over \$750 and under \$20,000.

Kanady, 43, of Carbon, a six-year employee of the office, is accused of stealing cash from the office.

Eastland County District Attorney Leslie Vance estimated Kanady may have taken as much as \$15,000, while Tax Assessor/Collector Nancy Trout said the loss could total \$20,000.

Trout fired the clerk when she reported for work Monday. Last Friday Trout discovered that

money was missing. She said she asked for help from Vance and had locks on her offices changed over the weekend.

Vance said he is holding Kanady's paycheck and retirement account totaling about \$12,000.

Auditors began going over the record books Monday. On Tuesday morning, Eastland County Sheriff Ronnie White and district attorney investigator David Ward went to Kanady's residence and drove her to the office of Justice of the Peace Vernon Walker.

After the arraignment, Kanady posted \$15,000 bond.

1991 PROPERTY TAX RATES IN RANGER JUNIOR COLLEGE DISTRICT

This notice concerns 1991 property tax rates for Ranger Junior College. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

The Eastland County Crime Stoppers, Inc. Crime of the Month for July 1991 is that of an aggravated assault of an 18 year old white male in Cisco.

The offense occurred around 9:00 p.m. on Sunday July 21, 1991 Near the Quick Six on Conrad Hilton Avenue.

According to the victim, he was driving North on Conrad Hilton Avenue near the Quick Six when a car flashed their lights at him. The victim thought it was some of his friends so he pulled off Conrad Hilton onto a gravel road. The other vehicle stopped in front of the victim's car and two white males approached him. One of the males asked "How's it going?" And the victim saw a knife. He threw up his arm to block the knife and was cut. The victim then was hit in the back of the head and was then stabbed in the stomach with the knife which was then dropped to the ground. One of the males picked the knife up and they left.

EASTLAND COUNTY HISTORY

The Gilbert boys located ranches on Hunting Shirt and Sabano creeks where they remained for a few years before returning to Parker county after the killing of Sing Gilbert by the Indians at Ellison Springs in 1884; J.B. McGough settled in Erath County some miles East of Desdemona where he resided until his death some years ago; Lewis Ellison, on whose farm a part of the town of Desdemona is located, was a lad of eleven years at that time and lived with his father, J.M. Ellison Sr. on that farm. Nothing is known of the later residence of other members of the party.

Around the settlements mentioned the principal growth in the population of the County and adjacent territory in the next fifteen years took place.

There is nothing on the location at the present time to indicate that Blair's Fort ever existed there.

By 1873 a number of families had made their homes in the vicinity of Hog Springs and when Silas C. Buck, a young lawyer who at that time made his home with the family of "Uncle Peter Davidson" in what is now known as the Tanner neighborhood, circulated a petition asking that the Legislature of the State of Texas that the County of Eastland be organized, he found the following who were qualified to vote: J.W. Watson, J.H. Henry, C.F. Henry, C.M. Henry, J.A. Howard, John Howard, W. Funderburk, and B. Funderburk.

Others who came later but are entitled to be called early settlers, and who contributed much to the development of the community are Tom and William Prater, John P. Wynn, J.H. Woodard, J.J. Rushing, W.J. Nabors, McAfee, Ben Hawkins, Lafayette Fonville, C.H. Genoway, Lee Yardley, F.M. Daniels, James Foote, A.C. Brown, G.W. Daken, John N. Abernathy, Pascal Askew, John Caruth, (Probably in Erath County), and three doctors without whose names the list would be very incomplete, T.W. May, A.C. Martin, and S.E. Snodgrass. Am sure that some of the people connected with the development of the community have been overlooked but if so not intentionally.

The first post office to be established in this community was Winona, usually spoken of as "Old Winona", which was located about one mile East of Desdemona in Erath County. Part of the old house logs may still be seen on the location but are pretty badly decayed. A Mr. McKinney was probably the only Post Master to serve this office.

The Desdemona Country was first in precinct number four (1874) and was composed of, approximately, what is now Justice precinct No. 8 and that part of No. 5 (the Gorman Precinct) which lies East of what was then Jewell community. J.W. Watson was Justice of the Peace and performed the first marriage ceremony after the county was organized. The contracting parties were J.L. Duffer and Mary Bowlin, parents of Dr. Duffer of Brownwood and Mrs. Tom Jones who lived in Eastland until a short time ago.

An order of the Commissioner's Court at its February term, 1876 directed "That Election Precinct No. Eight shall include all of the territory embraced in Justice precinct number eight an that all

elections within same shall be held at the town of Crystal Springs in said county and precinct." F.N. Roche was appointed to hold the elections.

Another order of the Commissioners Court at its November term 1876 created a precinct about as it is now. J.J. Wynn was appointed Justice of the Peace and was directed that Justice Courts of Precinct number eight should be held at Crystal Springs on the third Monday of each month.

Order number twenty six of the same term of Court directed that William Brown be appointed as Presiding Officer of elections in Election Precinct Number Two of said county. Order No. thirty of the same term of court directs "That all elections in precinct number eight be held at Crystal Springs in said County."

The foregoing is the last order of the Commissioner's Court which the writer has been able to find in the records referring to this community as "Crystal Springs" but thereafter the neighborhood has always been referred to as Desdemona or Desdemonia. In fact, when the post office was first established, and for more than twenty years afterwards, it was officially "Desdemonia". It seems that the name was given in honor of the daughter of Esquire Wynn, at the suggestion of a young lawyer from Eastland who occasionally practiced law in the Justice of the Peace Court.

In the County's earlier years Desdemona was very much in its political picture, majority of its voters living in its Eastern part. Of its first officers Sheriff H.S. Schmick, County Clerk A.J. Stuart, County Treasurer Ike P. Schmick, came from the Mansker's Lake community in this section of the county and County Surveyor, and afterwards County Judge, G.W. Daken, County Judge J.T. Hammons and District Clerk S.R. Dickie came from the immediate vicinity of Desdemona; but after the center of population moved further West and the railroad towns gained in numbers, no other of the principal county officials have been elected from this section.

The only white person who is known to have lost his or her life in the neighborhood of Desdemona in the raids of the Indians was Billy Cross who was killed just East of Armstrong Creek, near where the old Stephensville road crosses that creek. The Indians had stolen a number of W.H. Mansker's horses and were being pursued by Mansker and his son and Tom and Billy Cross who overtook them at the place above mentioned. In the fight that followed Billie Cross was killed and the Mansker and Tom Cross were unhorsed, but made their way home unharmed. This was about 1860 and probably just before the building of Blair's Fort and the concentration of the settlers there.

John O'Rear, a life time resident of Desdemona, says that the old rock building destroyed by fire during the boom was built by R.H. Pierce in 1878 and was used by Pierce as a store building, the upper story was used as a meeting place by the Masonic Lodge. Another early business man was Alec Booth.

A land mark which is missed by old timers is the well which stood in the middle of

the street.

G.W. Bull had a one stand gin and was also the proprietor of a thresher in 1878 as is shown by the county records.

Old time physicians at Desdemona were Dr. C.E. May, coming in the middle seventies, and Drs. Snodgrass and Moorehead who came about the last of the eighteenth century.

DESDEMONA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT
Area 19 1/2 square miles. Total assessed valuation of property \$456,421. Scholastic Population, 219; Bonded Indebtedness, 1940, \$75,000. Per Capita Net Debt, \$83.35. Refinanced in 1940 and has retired \$2,000 of the principal. The following data may be of interest. The total attendance is given on the records of the County Superintendent as being three hundred; that three buses are used in the transportation of pupils at a cost of \$1,970, and that these buses are valued at \$3,500.

The first schools taught in the community were "pay schools" held in log houses with dirt floors which had been built for dwellings but had been vacated by some settler who had become hungry for the leaves and fishes of the older settled country. The teachers were usually men in the community whom the patrons thought capable of instructing in the three R's. One of these was J.T. Hammons, afterwards a practicing attorney at Eastland and County Judge of Eastland County, who seems to have been the first to teach in the Hog Creek country.

The first organized school on the records of the County in this community was Chrystal Springs, number 8-B in 1878, and was reported to having been taught by F.N. Roche.

The following is the description of the lot deeded by William D. Brown to the County Judge of Eastland County, the consideration to be paid by "The Chrystal Springs School Community". Tract of land in the town of Desdemona; begins 207 feet North, 71 feet East of W.C. Whitley's Hotel Lot; Thence South 240 4/10 feet; Thence East 75 feet; Thence North 290 4/10 feet; Thence West 75 feet to the beginning. Part of the Thunderburg Survey."

(From the deed records of Eastland County.)

The following year, 1878-79, the community was known on the school records as "School Community Number twelve," and no session of school seems to have been held in this year, but the notation is made that its public funds are being used for the purpose of the building a school house.

The teachers for the next few years seem to have been A.P. Hightower, 1880-81; C.J. Koll, 1881-82; B.F. Cotton, 1882-83; and Thomas J. Heffner in 1883-84.

Desdemona was first incorporated for school purposes in 1884 and for that reason we find but little mention made of the school on any county record for a number of years as the Ex-Officio County Superintendent of Schools, the County Judge, had no authority over it while it had that standing.

This incorporation was abolished in 1893 but the district was again incorporated in 1906 and continued in that capacity until 1911 when it again became a common school district and continued as such until 1921 when it assumed its present

status and built its first modern school house. The district had the misfortune to lose this building by fire but, erected upon the ashes of the old building, Desdemona has a splendid set up at the present time. Its new high school building and equipment cost them \$62,000, is well arranged and presents a very pleasing appearance. Its grammar school building, which was not destroyed by the fire, cost an additional \$25,000. The system employs a superintendent and eleven teachers who are required to hold college degrees or to be working to that end and has twenty five and one half credits.

The school has a fair football field, a good gymnasium and its basketball team was champion of its district in 1940.

Howard was a school in District No. 23 in 1884-85, reporting 56 scholastics. By 1892 the enrollment had increased to 92 which was probably its high point as it had dropped to 61 in 1896. Howard has been a part of the Desdemona Independent School system since 1925.

Jamison's Peak was school number eight on the list of schools for 1894 and had been a school since 1878 but, with Desdemona about three miles to the South-West and Howard just little over a mile to the West it was probably thought best to close the school and transfer its pupils to Howard and Desdemona.

Part of the Young Springs School District was incorporated in the Desdemona Independent School District,

In so far as the writer has been able to determine, the Desdemona Baptist Church is the oldest organization of any kind in Eastland County. Organized as Rockdale Baptist Church in 1872 by Elders Wm. Northcutt and Wm. Barker, it held its services in a log house about one mile South of the present bridge across Hog Creek at Desdemona until about 1886 when it moved its meeting place to Desdemona and changed its name to Desdemona Baptist church without change in operation.

Some have given 1886 as the date of the organization of the present church body, but in the opinion of the writer backed by the testimony of Mrs. Lizzie Shuler, a member of the organization when the move was made, it was only a change in the place of meeting and not a re-organization.

The names of those participating in the organization according to the information obtainable were, John Caruth, wife and daughter; Mrs. Mary Jasper, Mrs. Sallie Robinson; Nancy Ellison; Mrs. J.M. Ellison, Jr.; Mrs. Parmer and John Cowan.

The church was a member of the Comanche Association in 1875, reporting J.R. Northcutt as pastor and he seems to have held that position for several years. In 1879, H.F. Reynolds was pastor and the church had a membership of 60. The length of this pastorate is not known as there is a break in the Association Records. In 1885, D.N. Holleyman is reported as pastor and was followed in order by W.J. Hicks, 1886; J.T. Cumble, 1887; W.H. Harper, 1890; J.T. Cumble, 1892; J.B. Vincent, 1894; G.R. Ross, 1898; A.L. Castleberry, 1899. No further record found until 1911 when M.R. Cox served that and the following year; L.W. Stewart, 1914; E.L. Springer, 1916; J.A. Kidd,

1919; R.N. Greer, 1922; A.W. Cunningham, 1929; F.N. Allen, 1930; Z.C. Chambliss, 1933; H.N. Balderee, 1935; Melvin Shaw, 1938; Arvil Richardson, 1940; H.D. Martin, 1942.

The Sunday School has had an average enrollment for the last few years of around 100. The church property is valued at, house of worship, \$2,500 and parsonage at \$1,000.

CORINTH BAPTIST CHURCH was located at Howard School House and its place of worship was about one hundred yards South of the Cemetery.

No data has been found as to the time of its organization but it was a member of The Comanche Baptist Association in 1885. It is reported to have had a membership of three hundred at one time, rating as one of the stronger churches in the county.

In its petitionary letter the bearers, D. Lewis and G.W. Daken, were named as messengers, W.J. Hicks, Pastor, and G.W. Daken, Church Clerk. A membership of 125 was reported that year.

In 1886 the church was represented by letter only, and reported J.T. Cumble, pastor and J.J. Lindsey, Church Clerk.

The church does not again appear on the minutes of the association until 1889 when J.T. Cumble is again pastor and J.R. Horne is Church Clerk. Pastor Cumble seems to have served through 1890 and maybe until 1893, the next appearance of the church on the minutes of the Association, this time naming A.L. Castleberry in that position and A.B. Wells, clerk. Mr. Castleberry was followed by G.R. Ross, 1899, and B.H. Bell, 1901. From this time to 1918 no record of those serving the church has been found but at that time W.R. Shelby is reported as

pastor and the church is affiliating with the Round Grove Association. The messengers at that time were I.N. Haygood, Pearl Powers, and Letha Hogg. Mr. Shelby continued to be pastor in 1917 but no later information has been discovered as to this church. The Methodist Episcopal Church, South at Desdemona was probably organized in 1877, according to Mrs. A.C. Brown, the only person now living who was in its organization. As she remembers the incident, the organization was perfected by Rev. George Fair, then residing at Eastland, and the members were her husband, A.C. Brown, herself, and J.T. Hammons and wife. She thinks that Rev. Law was presiding Elder at the time. The writer has no information as to the accomplishments of the church body until its appearance on the conference reports in 1894 when it is stated that Desdemona Church was in the Dublin District and that J.E. Stephens was its pastor. In 1895 it was Desdemona Mission in the Abilene District and the same pastor was reported. The value of the church property at that time was given as Mission \$100.00 and Parsonage, \$150.00 and the membership was 200.

Since that time the following pastors have served; 1896-H.K. Agee, 1898-M.H. Hudson, 1901-J.M. Owens, 1903-T.W. Ellis, 1904-J.T. Owen, 1908-M.J. Vaughn, 1910-F.A. Ray, 1911-W.H. Whitworth, 1913-J. Fred Patterson, 1914-S.P. Gilmore, 1915-J.O. Gore, 1918-C.H. Ledger, 1919-M.A. Turner, 1921-E.R. Patterson, 1923-W.T. Jones, 1927-J.T. Furguson, 1928-H.B. Landrum, 1929-Paul W. Evans, 1930-R.A. Walker, 1932-Z.L. Howell, 1934-E.M. Dalley,

1936--O.D. McDonald, 1940-W.E. Anderson, Circuit composed of Desdemona, Victor and Salem.

The membership of the church has been reported from 200 in 1915, to 438 in 1925. The value of its house of worship is given in the conference reports as being \$5,000 and that of the parsonage as \$2,000.

The Church of Christ has been an important factor in the religious life of the community but it keeps no records it is hard to get any particulars as to its history or accomplishments. Among the early ministers of the organization those best remembered are John Martin, Jack Nabors and Lish McCoy. The church has a house of worship in Desdemona.

The story of events leading to the development of Desdemona as an oil center is so much better told by that inimitable writer, Boyce House, than this poor pensman can hope to do, he will quote, with the authors permission, from "Were You In Ranger," as follows;

"There came an Englishman into the region and bought a farm. He tramped among the hills and examined rocks. Folks allowed as how he might be a bit 'Off'. He talked about oil possibilities but few gave heed to him. At last he died.

But F.M. McDaniel, a merchant, turned over in his mind the thought and finally decided that there might be something to the notion that the stranger had held after all.

So the storekeeper succeeded in interesting a number of farmers and townpeople, and enough money was subscribed for a test. Daniel sent to Oklahoma for a machine that had been used to drill water wells. The location chosen was half a mile North of Desdemona, on the farm of Walter Caruth, Daniel's son-in-law and owner of the town Barber Shop.

A showing of oil and gas was struck at less than a thousand feet, but the funds were exhausted. Time drifted by and nothing was done. The well was not plugged but for one - for some obscure reason, or perhaps by accident-drooped a fence post in the hole.

In 1917, however, two men from the outside world, learning of the test, enlisted the aid of "Shorty Caruth", in leasing three thousand acres. Then they cast about to find someone who would finance the well they had agreed to drill. Happening to read in the newspapers that T.M. Dees, of Midlothian, had just disposed of some oil holdings in Oklahoma, they decided that here might be their man. Dees was offered the block of acreage and an additional two thousand acres if he would take over the enterprise and give the trio a share. Interested, the lumber yard owner said he would visit Desdemona.

Upon his arrival, he was met by Caruth and numerous citizens who escorted him to the old well on the bank of Hog Creek. The hole was almost filled with water but the barber lowered a bottle on a string as he had done many times before for visitors and brought it up full of oil. Dees lowered the bottle himself, but succeeded only in obtaining water. He had heard of "Salted" gold mines and this looked like a "Salted" well to him. He so expressed himself.

But the farmers present who were on hand when the well was drilled declared that they had seen a "Rainbow" of oil in the slush pit and that the test had made gas. So Dees decided that Caruth, through long

practice, had acquired the knack of lowering the bottle to just the right depth to skim the oil from the top of the water, and that there was really oil in the hole.

The visitors were sufficiently interested in the possibilities that he asked and was given ten days; whereupon he bought a star machine, which is a type used for drilling shallow oil wells, and employed a driller. It was found that the fence post could not be taken out of the old well but the drill was able to drive the post deeper and the work of bailing out the water began.

A few days later, Dees saw something that shimmered emerging from the mouth of the well. He lighted a hand-full of matches and tossed them into the quivering "something" and there was a flash. It was gas.

Convinced now of the potentialities, he plugged the well and moved to a location a hundred yards away. Water for the drilling was hauled in a wagon as Hog Creek was dry, not an unusual condition for late summer. The boiler was fired with wood, chopped from the forest of mesquite and post oak where the hogs scamped about.

With drilling in progress, Dees returned to Midlothian to the task of managing his lumber yard. One day a farmer walked into the office, asked how much Dees had spent on the Desdemona enterprise and upon learning that the outlay had been three thousand dollars, returned in a few minutes with an equal amount and told his friend that he wanted to invest in the undertaking. And so the venture, until then un-named, was christened the "Hog Creek Oil Company".

Other citizens in Dees' little home town in central Texas wanted a part in the affair. No one ever was asked to buy stock, but almost daily, some of his own volition would drop in and purchase a share, usually handing over ten or twenty dollars and agreeing to pay the remainder of the one hundred dollars at ten dollars a month. No stock certificates were given the investors for the reason that none had been printed. Dees simply recorded the purchase in a dime note book.

He discouraged the widows and aged from buying at all. One woman wanted to put her entire savings, five hundred dollars in the company. Dees refused but at last yielded to the extent of accepting two hundred dollars. Soon afterwards a farmer walked in, planked down one hundred dollars on the desk and said "I want a stock". Well it was not until months afterwards that Dees learned that the woman had the farmer make this purchase for her.

As drilling progressed on the Hog Creek well, the McCleskey gusher came in at Ranger and Dees bought several leases between Ranger and Desdemona. A representative of R.O. Harvey of Wichita Falls visited the Hog Creek test and Dees offered to aid in getting up a block of acreage South of his company's building. He agreed to put in some of his own tracts if Harvey would drill on the Northern part of the block to be leased, which of course would place the wild cat well near the Hog Creek company's land, and if the Wichita Falls Company's man would give Dees his choice of one hundred and twenty acres offsetting the well.

The leases were obtained and the Joe Duke farm was chosen as the location for the well, a mile a half South of Desdemona and over the line in Comanche County.

While the drill was pounding away on the Duke, the Hog Creek well reached the depth at which the showing of oil and gas had been struck by the early well, and not the least sign of oil or gas was found. The crew kept busy, however, tinkering around as the outcome of the Duke wild cat was awaited.

That well reached the level at which most persons had expected that oil would be encountered, if it was found at all, but passed through the formation without result. So it was the general belief that the Duke would be a duster. But still Dees did not abandon his well. If he had done so, there was the chance of forfeiting the leases. So day after day, the fire flared in the boiler, the steam hissed, the crew was busy, with the drill, it was said later, ten feet off the bottom of the hole. It was Monday night, September 2, 1918. The crew was drilling away on Harvey's test, expecting nothing out of the ordinary. The people in Desdemona had gone to bed at an early hour, just as the inhabitants had always done in the serene half century of the hamlet's existence.

There was a roar; a tower of oil soared towards the stars; then instantly there came a flash and the derrick was flaming. Scant minutes later, the machinery was a twisted mass of metal, the derrick was in ashes and the oil was a column of billowing, billowing fire.

So vivid was the glare that in Ranger, twenty five miles away, a night watchman thought it came from a blaze at the edge of the city. The entire population of Desdemona came pell-mell to talk and marvel.

The next day hundreds gathered as near the gusher as safety permitted. Estimated as making 10,000 barrels "of oil," the well represented a daily loss of wealth that was the equivalent of the yield of hundreds of sandy acres planted in peanuts and harvested in back breaking toil.

A pillar of cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night it symbolized deliverance from hardship and sacrifice and unending toil and entrance into the land of milk and honey, the inhabitants felt.

The flaming well emblazoned the name of Desdemona on the consciousness of the nation. At night a newspaper could be read in the town by the intense light of the huge torch, a mile and a half away.

The news of the strike was not long getting to thousands watching the Ranger district and the night after the discovery many slept in the cold on the vacant lots in Desdemona. Some were accommodated by the residents of the village but with all they could do many could not be cared for.

Although in March, 1919, only eight wells were completed, by July the operations had so multiplied that fifty four new wells, besides nine dry holes, was the month's record.

In October 1919, there three hundred wells drilling and seven hundred fifty were awaiting equipment.

The reason for the more frenzied operations at Hogtown was that a vast amount of land was not leased when the discovery was made and so the pool was a paradise for men with nothing more than the proverbial shoe string. Of two hundred and eighty eight wells drilling at one time, the companies and individual putting them down numbered ninety seven, not counting those having smaller interests in the ventures.

Damaged Or Malfunctioning Retinas Cause Blindness

More than 100,000 Americans are blinded because of damaged or malfunctioning retinas. Curing these patients will require an understanding of how sight occurs at the cellular and molecular levels.

Dr. Samuel Miao-sin Wu, an associate professor of ophthalmology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, is studying how the eye turns images into electric signals sent to the brain. This

is an important first step in the future development of replacement parts for the eye or the advent of new drug therapies.

The cells responsible for the process are located in the retina, the passageway from the lens to the optic nerve that leads to the brain.

"An image goes through millions of cells from the time it enters the eye until it reaches the brain. Each synapse, or transmission, of the image from one

layer of cells to the next is unique," Wu said.

Wu and his team of researchers are recording the action of these cells by inserting them with tiny electrodes. The eyes of tiger salamanders and goldfish are used because they are large, making them easy to study.

It is a tedious process that involves following an image through layers of retinal tissue, an action which must be recorded thousands of times in the laboratory.

DAVID TUNMIRE TIME TO CONTROL PEACHTREE BORER

The peachtree borer is a very damaging pest of peach trees. Many people have seen first hand what kind of damage the peachtree borer can do.

Timing is very critical to the control of the peachtree borer. The time to control this pest in Eastland County is mid-August till the end of August.

The peachtree borer can be controlled by using one of these pesticides, Lorsban 12.9%, Lindane 20% emulsifiable concentrate or Thiodan 9.7% emulsifiable concentrate. Read and follow label instructions for mixing and rates.

The pesticide solution should be applied to thoroughly wet the base of the tree up to the first scaffold limbs. Don't apply to leaves or fruit. Read label for any harvest restrictions.

Two publications, "The Peachtree Borer" and "Homeowner's Fruit and Nut Spray Schedule" are available free of charge at the County Extension Office. The office is located in the basement of the County Courthouse.

Brazos Electric To Refund \$2.9 Million To Customers

Customers of Brazos Electric Cooperative in August will receive a \$2,994,535 refund for fuel overcollections. The refund is due to the availability of economical power that Brazos Electric purchased during the first five months of the year combined with lower than expected gas costs at the cooperative's generating plants. Based on projected sales in August, this refund will mean a savings of \$5.50 per 1,000 kWh of usage at the wholesale level. It will have different effects on the retail consumers of Brazos Electric's 27 wholesale customers over the next few months. The refund will be passed through to end consumers of Brazos Electric's member cooperatives as an adjustment to the power cost recovery factor. This is the second fuel refund the Waco-based generation and transmission electric cooperative has provided customers this year.

It provides wholesale electric power to 20 member cooperatives, six municipal electric systems and Texas A&M University. The electric cooperatives include Bartlett, B-K, Belfalls, Comanche County, Cooke County, Denton County, Dickens, Erath County, Fort Belknap, Gate City, Hamilton County, Hill County, J-A-C, Johnson County, McLennan County, Mid-South, Navarro County, Navasota Valley, Tri-County and Wise. Municipal systems served by Brazos Electric Cooperative are Granbury, Hearne, Sanger, Seymour, Weatherford and Whitesboro. These systems serve 245,000 consumers in a 66-county area of Central and North Texas.

Funding For State Student Loan Programs Is Vital For Keeping Students

Voter approval on Aug. 10 of a proposed constitutional amendment authorizing the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to sell general obligation bonds to fund state student loan programs is vital for keeping thousands of students in college, said Coordinating Board Chairman Harry Reasoner.

"Without approval of Proposition 2, we will soon exhaust the funds we have available under the Hinson-Hazlewood College Student Loan Program to help students pay for college," Reasoner said. "In recent months, we've had to temporarily suspend making new loans to middle-income students to make sure we had funds to loan to low-income students," he said.

"Even those who were approved for loans through the Board last year received only partial payment until more funds became available through a January bond sale. That sale exhausted the Coordinating Board, authority for issuing general obligation bonds and is the reason additional authority is needed," Reasoner said.

Between 1977 and 1989, the Hinson-Hazlewood program functioned as a revolving fund. No bond sales were needed because loan repayments covered the cost of making new loans. No state general revenue has ever been used to retire student loan bonds.

"But since 1986, the annual loan volume has grown from \$12 million to almost \$80 million in 1990," Reasoner said. "The annual need is expected to reach \$100 million by 1992."

The unprecedented growth in demand for these loans has been attributed to changes in federal financial aid programs, the creation of the College Access Loan program for middle-income students, and the relatively low interest rate on the state's loans, he explained.

"The Hinson-Hazlewood program as served 200,000 students since it was created, and there is every indication that the need will increase as college costs goes up," Reasoner said.

Since it was created, Hinson-Hazlewood has produced \$362 million in revenues through returns on investment, interest on loans, the federal subsidies. Of that amount, \$287 million has been used to retire previous student loan bonds, leaving the remaining \$75 million available for loans to Texas students, Reasoner said.

What has two beady eyes, a whiskery face a mother could love? It's a catfish, of course, one of our most popular and best-tasting sportfishes. Here's how to catch "Mister Ugly."

First, the rigging. For beginning anglers and veterans alike, most catfish can be reached with a spin-cast outfit like a Zebco reel-and-rod combination. It comes with the right line for average catfish and just needs a 2/0 short-shank hook to bury into the bait.

Then, the bait. There are two general types for these uglies, the nice and the messy. The nice include gumdrops, marshmallows, licorice chunks, and whole corn kernels. The messies are bloody chicken liver, rancid meat,

stinky shrimp, or cut chunks of fish... all appeal to the catfish's sense of taste through buds in its sixteen whiskers.

Now, the catching. Cast into the stream hole where the current disappears into quieter water and let the current carry the bait downstream. A couple split shot weights are required in deep water. In lakes, cast out and retrieve slowly.

When you begin catching catfish, remember to cut off those three spiny fins before unhooking. Then clean 'em, fry to a golden brown, and try not to overeat!

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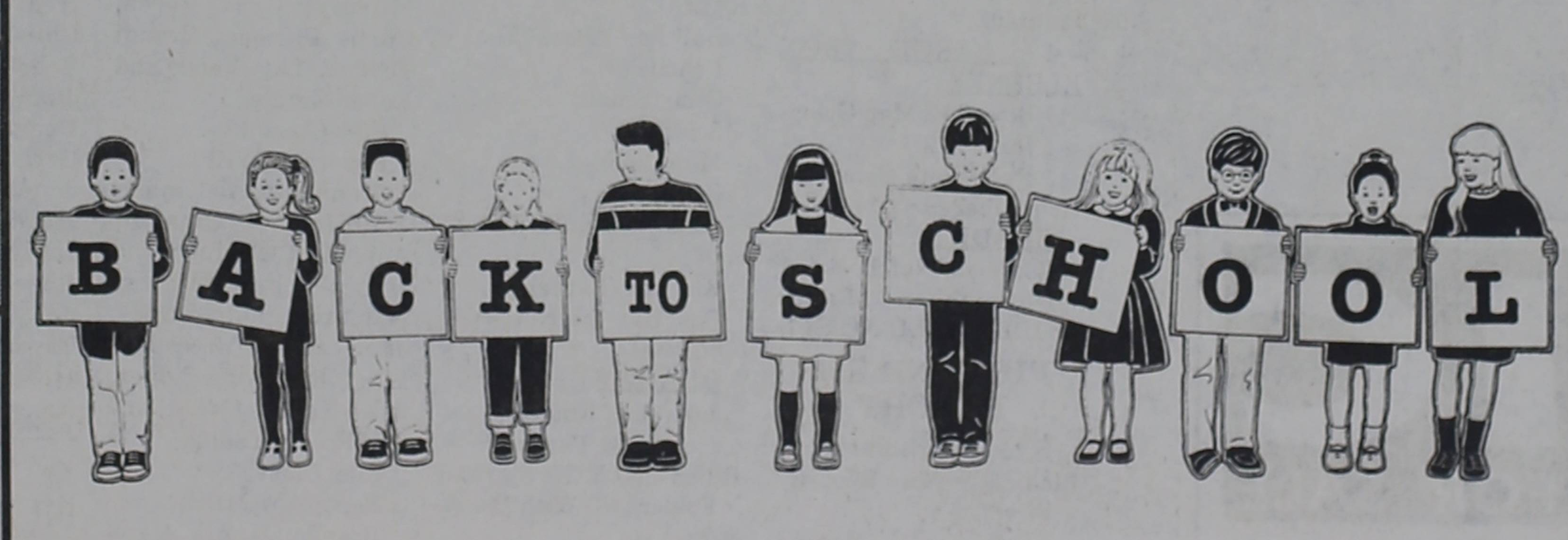

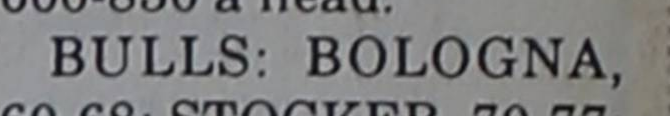

1991 Property Tax Rates in Ranger Junior College District

This notice concerns 1991 property tax rates for Ranger Junior College District. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would improve the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's millage tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax millage procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.
