Hunting Lease License Required

Hunting Lease License is required of anyone who leases hunting rights or charges a fee for hunting on property they own or property they control. The manager of a Hunting Lease must maintain a record book provided by the Department with each hunter's name, address, license number, dates hunted, and number and

species of birds or animals hunted and killed. Hunters are responsible for providing the required information to the manager. License fee: \$25 for 1 through 499 acres; \$50 for 500 through 999 acres; or \$75 for 1,000 acres or more. RURAL ADDRESSING UNDERWAY

The Eastland County Commissioners have been informed that personnel from Jedco-Design in Clyde are now doing rural addressing in Eastland County.

This is the company previously hired by the Commissioners to number rural roads and now to address rural homes. The addressing is needed before the 9-1-1 Emergency Service can begin in the county.

The Jedco crew will assign a number to every occupiable building that is outside the corporate city limits of the towns. The road numbers will begin with 1- where each rural road originates and go up one digit each .2 of a mile. House numbers will depend on density of homes.

Decals with the number will be placed on meter loops. The term "County Road", and its number will be followed by the number of the building.

When the Jedco people stop at a rural home they will want information, including names and telephone numbers.

They will all wear identification badges and the group will carry a letter from Judge Scott Bailey. They will not be permitted to go inside a home.

If no one is at the home they will go back several times, than leave a packet where information can be mailed to the company.

This information collected by Jedco will go into a data base to be used by the Eastland County Dispatch in relaying 9-1-1

emergency messages. Fire departments, law enforcement officers and ambulances will respond when needed.

The addressing will also be used by the U. S. Postal Service for a new mail address system. In this new system rural routes will be phased out and county road numbers and houses be used to designate buildings.

Citizens are requested to cooperate with Jedco-Designs in their work. For 9-1-1 equipment is expected to be installed at the County Dispatch by September 15, with the Service fully operational by January 1, 1992.

There are expected to be over 4,000 households and 6,000 buildings listed in rural Eastland County. City residences number several times that total.

Ideas For Back-To-School Clothes

By Sandra Avant Shopping for children's clothing gets intense twice a year — Christmas and right about now, when clothes for school are in high demand.

"Clothing is probably the most expensive item on parents' school supply list," said Dr. Ann V. Beard, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A U.S. Department of Agriculture study indicates that middle-income urban families in the South each year spend about \$780 on clothing for each child age 15 to 17, \$830 per child between 12 and 14, and \$500 on each younger school-age child.

Shopping a variety of sources for children's clothes can help reduce back-to-school expenses, Beard said. By planning ahead, consumers can find bargains at outlets, thrift stores, discount stores and garage sales.

When shopping for clothes, she suggests following these steps:

- Know exactly how much you can afford and what you can spend on each item.
- Take your child shopping — Before you go, prepare the child for what you are looking for, and shop only for him or her, not for the entire family, since young children get tired easily.
- Know sizes — Take along your child's measurements and a tape measure. You cannot always depend on sizes to be accurate.
- Consider the child's growth patterns — Don't buy more than what's needed. Children grow rapidly and may outgrow what you buy before the school year is over.
- Consider purchasing two or three outfits that can be mixed and matched for a more useful wardrobe.
- Consider what special clothing will be needed for your child's activities. Decide if parts of these garments could be worn with regular school clothing as a wardrobe extender. Less expensive tops such as brightly colored T-shirts can add variety to a wardrobe.
- Choose styles and fabrics that will grow with

the child. Raglan sleeves, cuffs on pants, adjustable straps and waistbands, large hems in dresses and tops can add to the wear-life of a garment.

- Also, consider the care factors. Knits, especially cotton or cotton/polyester, are easy to care for and stretch for comfort. Choose durable fabrics such as denim and corduroy to withstand children's activities and repeated laundering.
- Buying from discount sources can save money, but you need to be careful, Beard said. To make sure you are satisfied with what you buy and getting a good deal, ask yourself these questions before buying the merchandise:
 - Are all parts of the garment the same size? One sleeve may be smaller than the other.
 - Are collar and lapel points the same length?
 - Is the lining the correct size for the garment?
 - Will wrinkles press out?
 - Are the top and bottom the same size and color?

Are ties and belts the right size and a good color match?

- Is the fabric design pleasing?
- Are there defects in the fabrics — holes, runs and imperfections? Hold the garment up to the light to find out.
- Is the fabric durable and suitable for the child's activities?
- If there are flaws or worn spots, can you repair them easily?

Social Security Childhood Disability Rules Revised

New regulations make substantial changes in the way the Social Security Administration evaluates disabilities in children applying for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments. One of the regulations, which is the result of the February 20, 1991 Sullivan v. Zebley Supreme Court decision, significantly changes the process and standards used to evaluate childhood cases. Two other regulations make specific revisions to the medical criteria used to evaluate disability in children with Down syndrome, mental impairments and other serious hereditary, congenital, and acquired disorders.

In the Zebley decision, the Supreme Court found that Social Security used a narrower test for evaluating the disabilities of children under 18 than it used for evaluating the disabilities of adult workers. The determination of disability for children was based solely on evaluation criteria contained in Social Security's "Listing of Impairments." However, when evaluating adults, Social Security provided additional steps which considered an individual's work-related functional capacities and vocational factors such as age, education, and work experience.

allows a determination of disability based on the child's ability to function. A child whose disability does not meet or equal specific "listings" will be given an individualized functional assessment to determine how the disability limits the child. All the child's functions and behaviors will be examined and evaluated, including cognitive, communicative, motor, social, and personal skills.

Since children's functioning varies enormously from age to age, the new regulation reflects this variability. It includes specific "age-appropriate guidelines" for children in various age groups: from birth to age 1, ages 1-3, 3-6, 6-12, 12-16, and 16-18.

The other new childhood disability regulations provide detailed guidelines for evaluating mental disorders in children, and, for the first time, specifically cover drug addiction and alcoholism, anxiety disorders, hyperactivity, personality disorders, autism, tic disorders such as Tourette's syndrome, and anorexia.

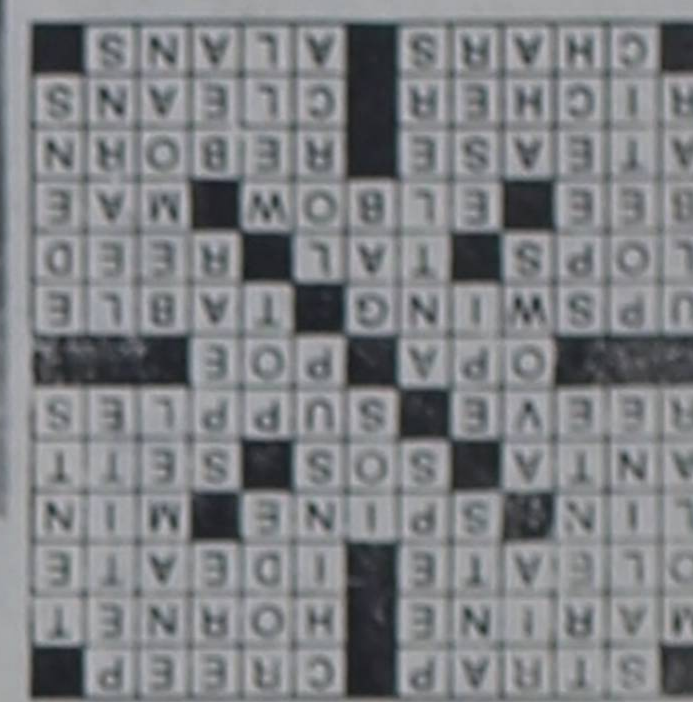

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Nutrition Program

Many older people, those over 65 years of age, on Medicare not being able to qualify for Medicaid could be eligible for a program passes by congress qualified Medicare beneficiary or QMB. This program was designed to meet the needs of older people who would not be eligible for Medicaid. The program would pay the premium for Medicare - \$29.90, plus the hospital deductible \$628.00, plus the \$100.00 deductible for part B of Medicare, or that portion dealing with the doctor, ect. The QMB also pays 20% toward the doctor bills that exceed the allowable Medicare payment.

To be eligible you must be receiving less than \$560.00 of income per month, and have a total asset of \$4000. We have many people in Eastland County that are eligible...in fact it is estimated 138,000 older people living in Texas are eligible for the QMB.

Col. William J. Ehrie, who retired last month as commander of the 96th Bombardment Wing at Dyess Air Force Base, will join the McMurry University administration beginning Monday, announced McMurry University President Dr. Thomas Kim at a news conference.

Ehrie will serve as senior development associate in the university's office of institutional advancement, headed by vice president Kenneth J. Comerford. Institutional advancement also includes the offices of church relations, university relations, special projects, Annual Fund, and alumni relations.

"I consider it a great privilege for McMurry to be able to have the services of Col. Ehrie in our work of institutional advancement," Kim said. "His outstanding achievements in his previous career, together with the respect and admiration the Abilene community has for him makes Col. Ehrie a valuable addition. We welcome Bill and Vicki Ehrie to McMurry University."

Ehrie's responsibilities will include administering McMurry's planned giving program, which entails providing service to current and prospective donors as well as planned giving specialists such as tax and probate attorneys, trust officers of financial institutions, and estate planners. Other responsibilities include cultivating corporate and business underwriting of university projects and working with the Abilene district of the United Meth-

He was promoted to colonel in 1986 and came to Dyess upon completion of Air War College in 1987. He served as wing vice commander and was named commander in February 1989.

A native of New York City, Ehrie received his bachelor of business administration degree from Manhattan College in 1966. He earned the master of science degree in systems management in 1975. Ehrie also is a graduate of the U.S. Air Force's Air Command and

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CAPITOL COMMENTS

The Texas Legislature, as several late nights - running into the morning hours - doesn't seem to be much closer to a budget or a finance bill than when the special session began 30 days ago. In a session that lasted until 5 in the morning, the House simply scrapped its finance bill, and then sent it on to the Senate. Now the Senate finance plan is the basis from which the state plan will be created it appears. If completed and approved by both the House and the Senate both the off road and farm fuel tax exemptions are still going to be safe - and it is probable that those merchants who collect state sales tax will still

get to retain the 1/2% of 1 percent for the collection effort, as they presently do. The Senate bill will have to be agreed upon by both Houses and differences ironed out in a Conference Committee. The school bill (HB 2) seems to have met an irresistible force in the Senate. The Senate and House versions differed greatly, requiring a Conference Committee, however, the Senate's members to the

Committee have never been appointed. This probably means the bill will die, leaving SB 351, which passed in the regular session basically unchanged. As you know by now, Judge McCown decided this week that SB 351 and the equity in funding provided by that bill is legal - IF - the foundation school fund is fully funded by the Legislature. Perhaps the continual law suits an available funds for education per student being equally accessible is settled. Now we have to provide money to fund the foundation program for schools. This continual

changing of positions and opinions, and school's attempting to prepare a budget, set school calendars, etc. has been the worst fiasco I have ever seen.

This week, the schedule has been the worst in recent years in the State House. Monday session ran on and an until 3:40 Tuesday morning. This wasn't difficult at all, compared to Tuesday's session which lasted until 5 Wednesday morning. I assure you, it doesn't take very long to spend the night in Austin!

Legislation has been approved by the House and sent to the Senate, providing for more legislative oversight for appropriations and appointment of commissions, etc. This will help legislators better know what goes on between sessions. One of the major issues has been the finalization of the redistricting U. S. Congressional Districts. This is similar to what we did in our own redistricting

during the Special Sessions. As you know, the one person, one vote requirement, and the population changes reflected in the 1991 census, will make many changes in Counties in our U.S. Congressional Districts. This plan, like ours, will likely be challenged in the Courts, so there is no way to know the final outcome.

The whole budget, and finance issue is constantly moving and changing. Last night Speaker Lewis, and Ways and Means Chairman, James Hury, held a briefing for all freshman members of the Texas House, in which the latest possibilities for change were presented.

There is simply no way of predicting if the problem will be solved by next Tuesday night, August 13th, when this Special Session must end. If there is no solution worked out, another Special Session will be called, in hopes that the problem can be resolved by September 1st.

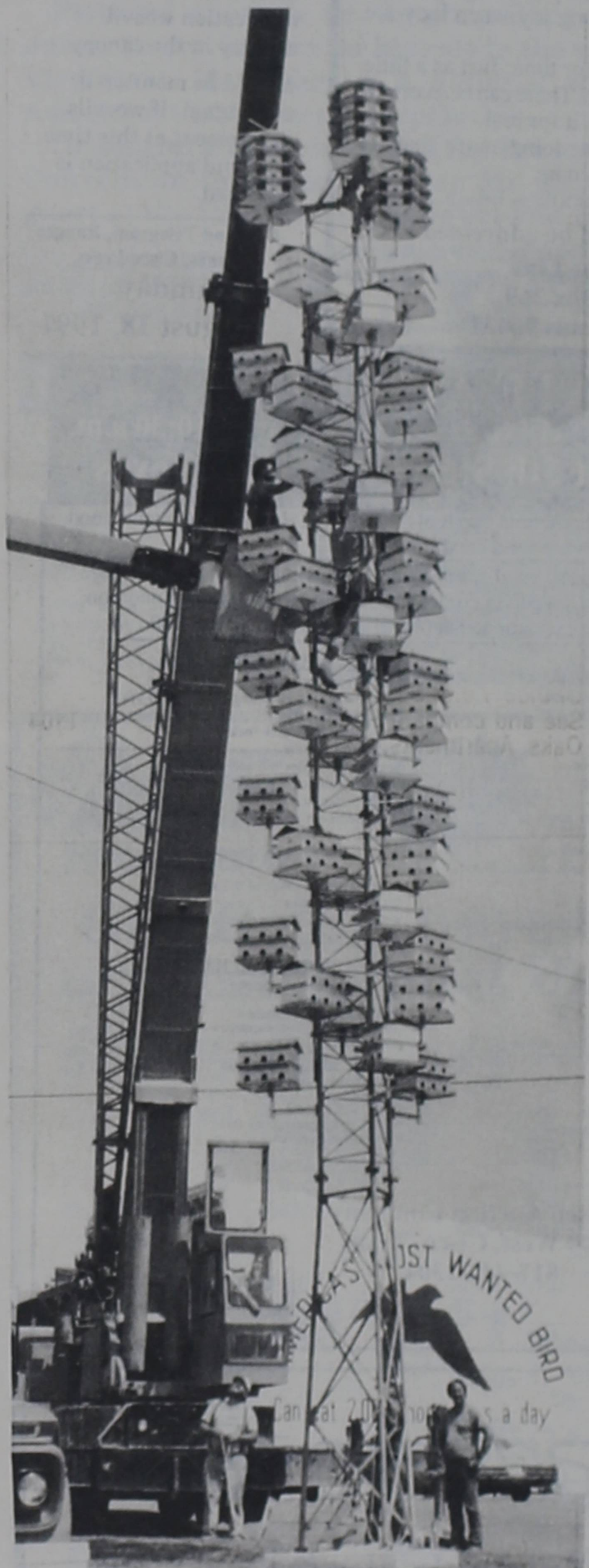

MONITOR FOR PECAN WEEVILS

Now is the time for pecan producers to start monitoring orchards for pecan weevil activity. Dan Childress will be trapping and monitoring pecan weevil activity in his orchard near Cottonwood as part of a pecan weevil control result demonstration.

Traditionally, the pecan weevil begins an

emergence as adults from the soil during the third week in August and continues through mid-September when soil moisture is adequate. The pecan weevil must have pecans in the gel stage to deposit eggs. Trees with a history of pecan weevils is a good location to start monitoring.

Weevil activity in the trees can be determined

by a number of methods: (1) a sheet of plastic can be placed under the low hanging canopy limbs and the limbs either shaken or bumped to dislodge weevils onto the plastic sheeting, (2) a small number of canopy limbs can be sprayed with an approved insecticide to knock weevils down onto the plastic, and (3) nut clusters can be examined for the presence of weevils.

Spray applications for adult weevil control should not begin until pecans have begun entering the gel stage of development. Insecticide applications prior to this time may kill the weevils in the canopy, but lose its effectiveness prior to the time when the majority of weevils emerge from the soil and enter the canopy and when the majority of the pecans have entered the gel state and are highly susceptible to female weevil oviposition.

Seven to ten days after the first insecticide application weevil activity in the canopy should be monitored once again. If weevils are present at this time, a second application is required.

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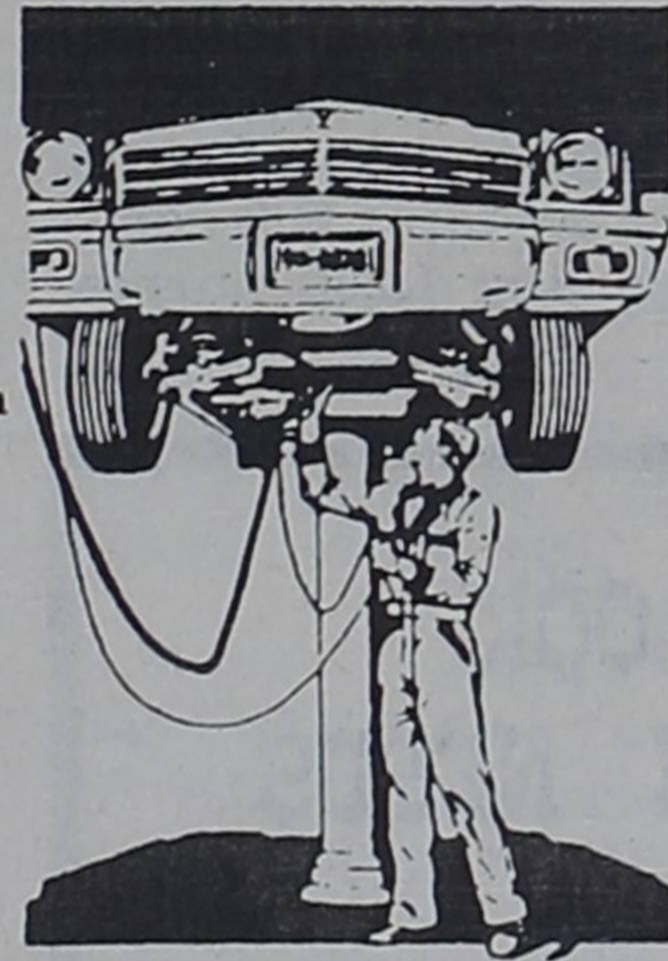

Sportsmen To Celebrate Hunting And Fishing Day National Hunting and Fishing Day, designed to spread the word about the sportsmen's role in conservation, is scheduled for Sept. 28. This is the 20th Anniversary.

President George Bush, an avid quail hunter and fisherman, will serve as honorary chairman. "I am honored to be a part of a special day that highlights safe and ethical hunting," he said.

Many uninformed people believe that the white-tailed deer is an endangered species, when in fact there are more than 12 million whitetails today, said Bob Delfay, executive director of the National Shooting Sports Foundation. "Few non-sportsmen realize that hunters and fishermen have contributed more than \$12 billion for conservation programs over the last 50 years through special excise taxes on their equipment and license fees. We continue to contribute to habitat and species restoration program at a clip of \$3 million per day."

Delfay said in 1990, sportsmen have contributed \$354 million for fish and Wildlife restoration programs through the special excise taxes on their equipment. These

funds are derived through an 11 percent excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition, a 10 percent tax on pistols and revolvers, and 11 percent tax on certain archery equipment and a 3 percent tax on electric trolling motors and sonar fish finders.

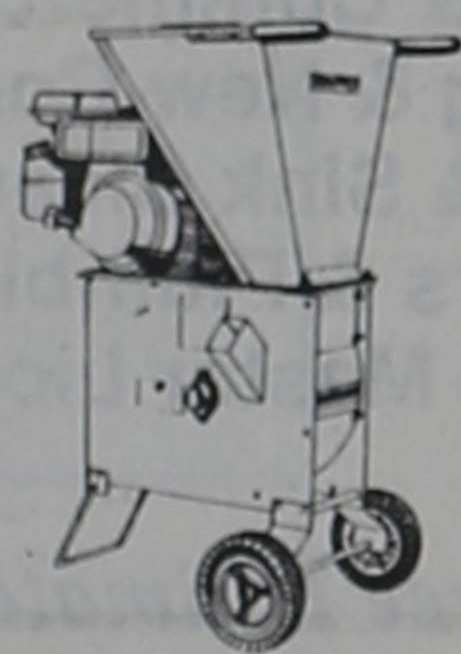
"Hunters and shooters contributed \$157.4 million last year to be used exclusively for wildlife restoration programs and fishermen contributed \$196.5 million for fish restoration programs," he said. Distribution of the funds depends on the land and water area and the member of hunting and fishing license holders in each state.

Children of parents with allergies are more likely to develop asthma, according to a study reported in the New England Journal of Medicine. Research noted a correlation between the dust-mite allergen in the home in infancy and childhood and the risk of asthma.

Toxic chemicals may be dangerous to would-be fathers as well as to pregnant women, the Western Journal of Medicine reports. Harmful substances can reduce fertility and may damage sperm, too.

TO GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all the children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

VERIFICATION: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

FAIR HEARING: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You also may ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: Jerry M. Jackson, Superintendent; Rt. 3 Box 12D; Ranger, Texas 76470; 817-647-1187.

REPORTING CHANGES: If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50.00 per month or \$600.00 per year. If your children get meals because they get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

CONFIDENTIALITY: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

REAPPLICATION: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, complete an application then.

IN THE OPERATION OF THE CHILD FEEDING PROGRAMS, NO CHILD WILL BE DISCRIMINATED AGAINST BECAUSE OF RACE, SEX, COLOR, NATIONAL ORIGIN, AGE OR HANDICAP. IF YOU BELIEVE YOU HAVE BEEN DISCRIMINATED AGAINST, WRITE IMMEDIATELY TO THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, WASHINGTON, D.C. 20250.

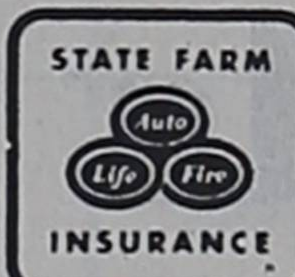
