Jedco Personnel Give Progress Report On County Addressing

Jim and Sue Madison, representatives of Jedco-Design, gave a report on rural addressing to the County Commissioners.

The husband-and-wife team is working for Jedco on assigning addresses to all occupiable buildings outside the towns of Eastland County. This job requires them to go down all county roads and contact people who live there.

The information on addresses, phone numbers and names of residents needs to be complete before the 9-1-1 Emergency System can go into operation.

The Madisons told the Commissioners they began their work on Tudor Rd., which is located on the east side of the county, Pct. 2. They finished that area, and have since

addressed all the Desdemona area and part of Lake Leon. They are now working in the area of Rd. 534 and 531.

As they address homes with Rd. numbers and house numbers they may also include the names of rural roads in some cases. That is when the names of roads are posted and already familiar to the public.

The Madisons said they are out working from around 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays. When they come to a rural home they will show credentials. If no one is at home they will return several times and then leave a questionnaire to be filled out and returned to Jedco-Designs in Clyde.

They hope to finish this work in September.

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COUNTY COMMISSIONERS WORK ON BUDGET

Declining revenues, higher costs of almost everything, changes in state laws, more demands for county services and requests for Departments for salary increases were items County Commissioners attempted to balance in a budget workshop Monday. The next fiscal year begins Oct. 1.

As various Departments brought their requests County Auditor Ray Pruitt estimated that if all were approved there could be a \$200,000 shortfall.

One of the first items to come up was the Emergency Medical Service contracts, which are being drawn up with all four Precincts. The Commissioners indicated they would not sign any contracts which did not put a "cap" on County spending in each precinct. The budgeted amount in each Precinct was said to be \$15,000 annually.

Sheriff Ronnie White brought a budget request for his department. He asked for \$488,000 for the next fiscal year, which is \$56,000 above the \$432,000 budget for 1990-91.

Some of this increase would come in salary raises, which he requested for himself and personnel in his Department. He suggested that his own salary be raised

from \$21,000 to \$40,000.

White said he believes he is worth as much as the District Attorney private investigator David Ward who is paid \$40,000. But White said his chances of getting his requested raise is "almost a joke deal."

The Commissioners said part of Ward's salary comes from State Grant money. Certain types of equipment also come with the grant.

Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1 said that if the county didn't match the grant it was still no guarantee that the District Attorney would let Ward go.

Robinson defended the Sheriff, saying that his salary was "nowhere near to top, compared to other counties this size."

The Sheriff mentioned several ways he was working on to save money in the operation of law enforcement and the jail. But he also mentioned a special problem for the lawmen right now - a computer which is not working "more than 50 percent of the time." He was not certain of the cause of the problem.

This is the system which is supposed to be tied in with Departments in the Courthouse, as well as law enforcement agencies elsewhere.

The Commissioners

were told that Harley Gwyn, computer specialist, will be working on the problem.

White said that 24 inmates were currently in the jail. He is keeping records on all prisoners being held here because of overcrowding in TDC. There is a possibility that he can collect from the state on this, if a court ruling goes in favor of the counties.

After several hours of budget discussions, County Judge Scott Bailey gave his request for a salary increase as County Trial Court Judge.

"I've been listening to you, but I'm going to give you my request anyway," he said. "Right now its three years behind what other courts pay."

He asked that his salary as Trial Court Judge be raised from \$25,246 to \$42,766. He said the increase, plus his County Judge's salary, would put his pay at about 80 percent of the District Judge's salary.

Robinson said: "My personal opinion is that we don't need to consider any salary increases."

The District Attorney's office turned in a request for a Budget increase from last year's \$88,391 to \$104,088. Salary raises are asked for Assistant District Attorney Bill

Dowell and secretaries in the office.

Not all departments asked for increases.

District Court Judge Jim Wright turned in a lower budget request for the next fiscal year than last year. He requested \$155,000 for the District Court, compared with \$163,000 last year.

Joann Johnson of the County Clerk's office did not request any salary increases for her department. The increase in her operating budget was less than \$600.

Another small increase was from the County Auditor's office. Ray Pruitt put in a request for \$236 more this year than last year.

L. T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3 was in the enviable position of having his budget request for the Precinct (\$218,000) less than his projected Road and Bridge income (\$318,000).

The other precincts found considerable R & B shortfall between requests and projected income.

It all added up to a long day and some things to iron out. The Commissioners will hear more requests and possibly make some decisions next Monday, Aug. 26. The meeting will be open to the public.

Crime Stoppers To Issue Warrants

In an announcement made today by the Eastland County Crime Stoppers, Inc., warrants will be issued in the next few weeks for many citizens of Eastland County. Rena Kirk, Chairman of Crime Stoppers stated that "Our Representatives will be out in full force in the next few weeks making final investigations and will be taking the information to the "Judge" for issuance of the warrants. Mrs. Kirk also stated that "the charges will vary and many are of a very serious nature."

According to information supplied by Mrs. Kirk and Crime Stoppers, most of those arrested on the warrants WILL BE serving time in "Jail."

Arrests should be set for September 21 in Eastland, September 28 in Ranger and finally on October 5 in Gorman. Crime Stoppers have set a goal of having 100 total "warrants" issued and with at least that many arrests.

Details of the investigations and warrants by Crime Stoppers were limited due to the continuing "investigations," but Louise Nelms (aka Judge Ma Buzzard) stated "Crime Stoppers Board Members and Representatives involved in the Investigations will be seeking out those witnesses to the crimes and after collecting the required warrant fees (ranging from \$10 to

\$50), the fee and information will be brought before the judge and warrants will then be issued."

Mrs. Nelms told that the warrant fees will vary due to the nature of the crime, as in the difference between misdemeanor and felony crimes. She also added that Crime Stoppers will be contacting businesses where suspects are employed. "Many of our witnesses will be employees, employers, and just "old friends" of the suspected parties," Mrs. Nelms stated. "The witnesses that wish to be involved in our cases, may each pay a portion of the warrant "fee" so that each parties legal fees will be less."

Once the warrants have been signed by the "Judge," Crime Stoppers will contact each suspect and will give a date and time so that they may "turn themselves in" and make the arrests easier.

Crime Stoppers will release more information in the next few days. Also if anyone has a "suspect" that they would like to have "investigated" and a warrant issued, please contact any of the following Crime Stoppers investigating committee members:

Perry Awards \$2 Million Loan To Cotton Unlimited In Post

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry today awarded a \$2 million Texas Agricultural Finance Authority loan to Cotton Unlimited in Post — a move expected to create 150 new jobs.

The loan is part of a \$2.2 million loan package in which TAF and the Post Economic Development Corp. are participating.

"This funding will help Cotton Unlimited create new jobs and spur economic growth in Post," said Perry, in the city to personally award the loan to Joe Pate, the company's president. "What's more, this is another important step forward in our effort to create a thriving fiber processing industry in Texas."

The loan will help Cotton Unlimited underwrite its manufacture of oil absorption material, cotton-based insulation and other products, such as disposable biodegradable diapers, blankets, tent material, casket liners and furniture stuffing. The company has worked to develop a cotton-based insulation as an alternative to fiberglass.

As America's top producer of cotton, Texas last year harvested five million bales or a third of all cotton produced in the United States. However, more than 90 percent of Texas' cotton leaves the state for processing - the stage where value is added to the raw commodity.

"By exporting our raw commodities, we are, in effect, exporting jobs, opportunities and dollars that otherwise would go into Texans' pocket-books," Perry said. "It's time we changed all that. It's time we kept our jobs at home."

To do that, Perry in June launched "Make it TEXAS," a new program aimed at increasing the state's level of commodity processing. Texas currently processes only 8 percent of the goods it generates. The national average is 20 percent.

"Texas is the second largest agricultural pro-

ducer in America," Perry said. "We're the nation's top producer not only of cotton, but of cattle, wool and mohair and a leader in the production of a number of other commodities. So, it makes good common sense for Texas to process more of our raw food and fiber - and turn those raw commodities into jobs for Texans."

TAF was created by the Legislature in 1987 to make or guarantee loans for agribusinesses in commodity processing and packing. Voters in 1989 gave the authority the green light to issue \$25 million in general obligation bonds to finance the loans. Sale of \$10 million of the bonds was approved in late May by the state Bond Review Board. The first of the bonds was sold in late July.

A total of 1,111 drilling permits were issued by the Railroad Commission in July, according to RRC Chairman Lena Guerrero. In June, the total was 1,025. July 1990's total was 1,166.

The July total included 627 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 45 to re-enter existing well bores, 50 to deepen existing holes, 146 to plugback existing holes, and 97 for other wells. Operators were also issued 146 amended drilling permits.

Guerrero said permits issued for new oil and gas holes in July included 33 in the San Antonio area (District 1), 27 in the Refugio area (District 2), 44 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 56 in deep South Texas (District 4), 29 in East Central Texas (District 5), 49 in East Texas (District 6), 99 in West Central Texas (District 7B), 83 in the San Angelo area (District 7C), 66 in the Midland area (District 8), 49 in the Lubbock area (District 8A), 91 in North Texas (District 9), and ten in the Panhandle (District 10).

In the first seven months of 1991, the Commission has issued 8,397 drilling permits, a four percent decrease from the 8,712 issued during the same period of 1990.

The 1,111 permits issued in July included 534 oil permits, 153 gas permits, 362 oil and gas permits, 22 injection permits, 17 disposal permits, and 23 other permits.

House Bill 70 Becomes Effective September 1

Beginning September 1, 1991 House Bill 70 allows a Texas Driver to take a Texas Education Agency State Certified 8-hour driving safety course every year to dismiss most moving traffic tickets.

In 1981 it became mandatory for judges to allow a ticketed driver to take a driving safety course every two years. Since then traffic deaths on Texas Highways have

decreased by more than 50%.

By allowing a ticketed driver to take the 8-hour course every year the Texas Legislature hopes to reduce driving related deaths even further.

Pharmacy Topics

Youngsters on a limited fat diet seem to grow as well as those on a standard U.S. diet, say researchers at Loma Linda University School of Public Health in California. Study compared students at public school with Seventh Day Adventists, who eat less meat and dairy foods.

New radiation technique to fight bladder cancer directs the radiation directly at the tumor without damaging the bladder, bowel or rectum. In this intra-operative radiation therapy, the bladder itself does not have to be removed.

High stress jobs do not seem to put pregnant women at higher risk of miscarriage, stillbirth or other child-bearing problems according to a survey by the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development. The researchers compared women medical residents with the wives of male medical students.

Researcher at MIT is working on an anti-cancer material - derived from shark cartilage - that seems to inhibit the growth of the capillaries needed to supply the blood for tumors to grow.

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CAPITOL COMMENTS
by Bob Turner
State Representative 65th District

The Texas Legislature finished its work on the budget about 6 1/2 hours before the clock ran out on this special legislative session that began July 15. For taxpayers, the Legislature's action means a nickel increase in the price of gasoline and increases in taxes and fees that range from concert tickets to country club fees, used boats to answering services. For businesses, the tax bill allows the state for the first time to levy a tax, in some cases, on corporate income. The following are some of the highlights of this legislative session that will impact our part of Texas. They are:

* Adequate funding was added to the Department of Human services to retain Medicaid caps at the federal level, which will mean that a lot of elderly people in nursing homes will be permitted to stay there comfortably.
* The farm and off road fuel tax exemption was retained.
* Retailers who collect state sales tax will continue to retain the 1/2% of 1% for their collection service, as they have traditionally been allowed to do.
* Funds were provided to create a new branch of TSTI (TSTI-Sweetwater) at Brownwood. We had already gotten this approved by the Higher Education Coordinating Board pending funding by the Legislature.

* A state funded District Attorney position is provided for District 42 (Coleman County only).
* The state contribution to the Teacher Retirement System at 7.31% for the biennium will increase to 8% next biennium. It will also provide for an increase in retirement for those who have been retired 5 years or more at the rate of 1% per year the teacher has been retired (i.e. a teacher who retired 4 years ago gets no increase, one who retired 10 years ago will get a 10% increase in their retirement check).

* The Texas Cooperative Meat Inspection Service was kept as it currently is - in the Texas Department of Health.
* The state portion of funding for Junior Colleges was kept at, or very near current services level.

* We fully funded Senate Bill 351 - the education bill - which was the action ordered by the Federal Courts in an attempt to provide equity in access to funds for public education. The Court ruled last week that this approach was legal, if the Legislature fully funded SB 351. This full funding of the foundation education fund will take some pressure off of local prop-

erty taxes, and provide a known amount of dollars to the local school districts.

* The Career Ladder, length of the school year, the voluntary 3 year old pre-K items will remain as they were - no changes were made.

* Campensatory Ed Funds will continue to be distributed just like they have been in the past.

* A state wide personal income tax was avoided.

* An across the board increase in the state sales tax was avoided.

* Eleven health and welfare agencies were consolidated into a new Health and Human Services Commission.

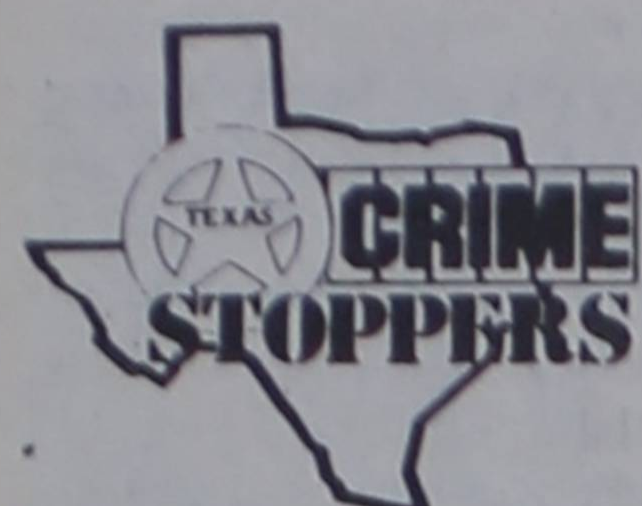

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

Texas lawmakers fully expected a second special session would be needed for unfinished budget business, but who could predict the stranger twists which marked legislative history last week?

For the first time in recent memory, frustrated House leaders sent mocking senators a deficit revenue plan, one that spends \$32.5 billion.

House tax leader James Hury went to the front microphone to defend his \$3.3 billion plan for new taxes; members rebelled and cut it to shreds, actually killing it before reviving it at a mere \$30 million level.

Embattled House Speaker Gib Lewis, in an understatement, said "it was not our finest hour." But it did set up the Senate to take it all for a new tax bill: the control, the praise, the blame.

The senate leadership, which wanted to spend more money than the House anyway, had a scant week to draft, adopt and coax it past the House.

House Passes Lottery
Another historical first: the Texas House narrowly passed, 101-46, a proposed constitutional amendment creating a state government-operated lottery which author Rep. Ron Wilson said

would raise \$1 billion by 1994.

As Wilson was defending his bill, his 16-month-old son went into fever convulsions in the House gallery and was rushed to the hospital.

Wilson bolted from the House floor to go with him and debate was suspended for more than an hour while doctors stabilized his son.

Lottery Filibuster
The lottery has been regarded as a cinch to pass the Senate, where it sailed through in previous years.

But Sen. John Leedom, R-Dallas, threatened to filibuster it, and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock has been known to call the lottery "a sleazy way to raise money." Also, the cast of senators has changed.

Its passage, once thought a certainty if it could pass the House, is as uncertain as any other measure.

Drugs Found
At mid-week, lawmakers were rocked by the news that a colleague, Rep. Larry Evans, D-Houston, was discovered dead in his apartment and police cited "unusual" circumstances based on

evidence found at the scene.

After an inconclusive autopsy, authorities ruled out a heart attack and said crack cocaine, drug paraphernalia and sexually explicit material had been found at Evans' apartment.

Foul play was ruled out and the probe continues.

Bullock Lobbies Lobbyists
As the tax bill moved to the Senate, Bullock and other Democrats struggled to beat the Aug. 13 special session closing by proposing a \$2.1 billion package of new taxes and fees.

He started by gathering 80 prominent business lobbyists in his reception room to hear his outline for new taxes on gasoline, cigarettes, business income and other diverse items.

Bullock, who favors a site income tax, warned them to remember: "Tax reform is an income tax and those who say 'give us tax reform'... get ready!"

Governor Supports Taxes
Few, if any, business lobbyists want new taxes and fees but no one wants

to oppose Bullock either, so initial reaction was deemed generally non-committal.

A worried Gov. Ann Richards, who has never promised to veto new taxes, promised a second special session if the House and Senate could not agree on new taxes.

The Legislature has until Aug. 31 to draft and fund a new budget, when the fiscal year ends. Failing that, shut-down of state government looms.

Wisely sidestepping which taxes she prefers, she said, "It's real hard to discuss a laundry list with you, when you know good and well that a quarter of the laundry list isn't going to be there."

Other Action
• The House, on a bill by Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi, voted to lower the state's share of the take of parimutuel wagering at greyhound tracks.

• House members also unanimously passed a bill by Rep. Dan Kubiak, D-Rockdale, to protect Texas property from seizure to pay income taxes levied by other states.

• The House approved

a plan to boost regulation of trade schools, an industry that drew complaints when some closed without refunding students' tuition. The bill by Rep. Wilhelmina Delco, Daustin, was amended to take out a currently existing fund providing for tuition refunds in such cases. The amendment by Rep. Kubiak also removed part of the bill providing that annual fees for schools be based on their gross tuition.

• Private businesses could lease highway rest areas under legislation approved by the Senate. The measure also would allow U.S. Highway 59 from Houston to Laredo to be designated as the Sen. Lloyd Bentsen Highway, honoring Texas' senior U.S. senator. Another provision of the bill transfers duties of the board that oversees construction of a high-speed train to the Texas Railroad Commission in 1995.

Those changes were part of a compromise bill creating a new Department of Transportation that would merge the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation

Texas Legislature

The Texas Legislature adjourned on Tuesday, August 13, with the expectations of returning on Monday for the Second Called Session to deal with prisons and congressional redistricting. The session was a success with passage of landmark legislation in most areas of state government, as well as the state's budget and finance crisis resolved.

Consolidation recommendations addressed in Comptroller John Sharp's Texas Performance Review were the basis of many of the bills passed. The budget total for the biennium is 59 billion. This is an increase in the overall budget totals, but is a decrease in state services. A 2.1 billion dollar tax increase was necessary to balance the budget. The potential for more taxes was looming, however both the Texas House and the Texas Senate passed the tax bill with a two-thirds majority in order to give immediate effect, therefore reducing the tax bill. A contingency plan was in

place in the event a two-thirds vote could not be secured. The plan included higher taxes on some items, including cigarettes, car washes, and hotels among other things.

Among the issues funded in the appropriations bill is the public school finance plan passed by the Legislature last spring. Judge Scott McCown had ruled last week that the recently passed plan was constitutional contingent on full funding by the Legislature. The State has been under court order to equalize its public school finance system since October of 1989.

Lieutenant Governor Bob Bullock praised the Members of the Senate and the staff for their hard work and congratulated them on their success. Several members pointed out that it was Bullock's leadership that helped pull the compromise together. Lieutenant Governor Bullock worked closely with Governor Richards, House Speaker Lewis, and the members of the Texas House to hammer out the differences between the two Houses.

Senate Approves Benefits Increase For Retired Teachers

Lt. Governor Bob Bullock today applauded Senate approval of a pension increase for Texas' retired teachers, which will be funded from the Teacher Retirement Sys-

tem and not require new money from the state.

The retired teachers will get raises of 1% for each year since they took retirement. A teacher who retired in 1980, for instance, would receive an 11% increase in benefits. "This legislation will help older, retired teachers who left state service before pension benefits reached a realistic level," Bullock said. "For a retired person, living on a fixed income, that extra money means a world of difference."

Bullock cited an example of a teacher who retired in 1970 after 30 years service. Currently, that teacher receives only \$650 dollars per month while a teacher who retired in 1985 after the same 30 years of service

receives, on average, \$1,251.

Under the Senate plan, the older teacher's average benefits would go up 21% or an additional \$136 per month, while the teacher retiring in 1985 would receive a 6% increase or \$75 on average.

The raises will take effect in September, Bullock said.

The legislation now goes to a House-Senate conference committee.

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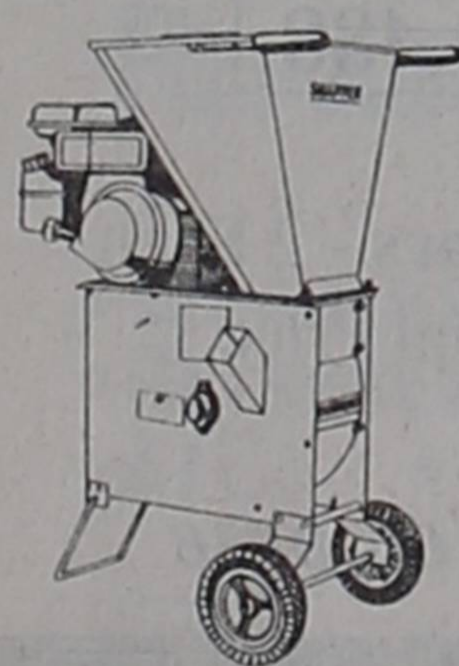
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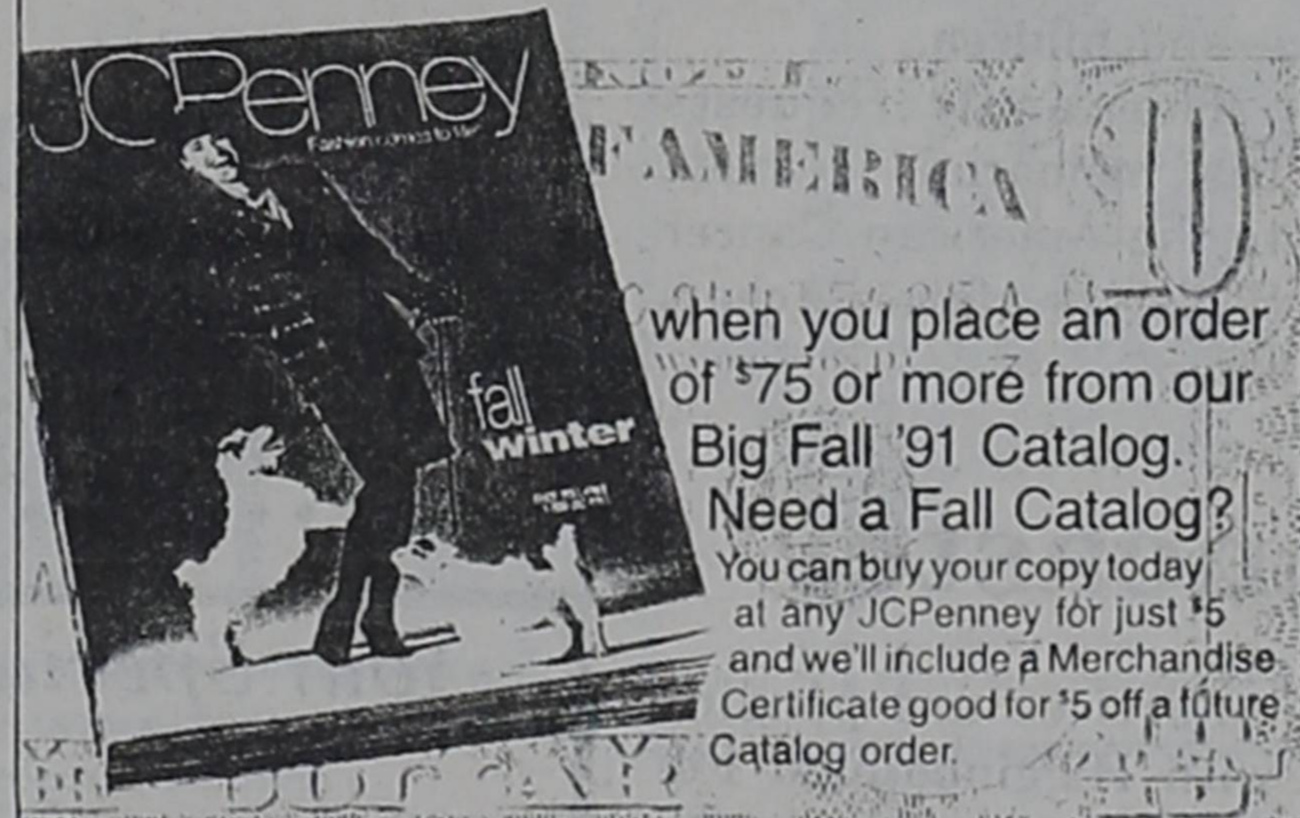

Texas Coastal Cleanup Volunteers Will Hit The Beaches Sept. 21

AUSTIN — The Sixth Annual Texas Coastal Cleanup is set for Saturday, September 21, Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro said in a call for volunteers.

Mauro and Center for Marine Conservation (CMC) regional director Linda Maraniss said the statewide cleanup is expected to draw more volunteers than the almost 16,000 who cleaned Texas beaches last September.

"We have some new corporate partners that have committed their resources to cleaning up Texas lakes and beaches," Mauro said. "Pure Water 2000, a project of the Coors Brewing Company and the Institute for Resource Management, is donating manpower, money and advertising to help create public awareness of the marine debris problem."

"And Mobil is continuing its support of Texas Adopt-A-Beach by resupplying us with 500,000 trash bags worth \$50,000," he said. "Programs such as ours simply could not exist without the backing of the private sector. Clean beaches and clean lakes are everyone's concern, but without public/private cooperation those concerns would go unmet," Mauro said.

"The Texas Adopt-A-Beach Program has seen great improvements on our beaches in its first five years," Mauro said. "The benefits of the MARPOL Annex V treaty that bans ships from dumping plastics in the oceans are now visible in many ways."

Public awareness from the cleanups and efforts by Mauro led to approval of that International Maritime Organization treaty. "This is good news for all Texans, especially the thousands of dedicated volunteers who clean our beaches three times a year," he said. "But there's still much to be done."

Mauro said the next step is implementation of "special area" designation under the IMO treaty of the Wider Caribbean Region including the Gulf of Mexico which goes into effect July 1992. Last November, a resolution was approved by a key IMO committee to expand that special area protection to those areas to prohibit any dumping except for finely ground food scraps.

Almost 65,000 Texas volunteers have picked up 1,608 tons of garbage since the first Adopt-A-Beach cleanup in April 1987.

"Texas beaches are too important of the world's shipping industry," Mauro said.

"Cleaning our beaches protects our coastal tourism industry that produces \$6 billion a year for Texas," Mauro said. "It also helps protect marine wildlife from entanglement or ingestion of plastics and protects our coastal sports and fishery industries."

"I want to ask for more volunteers to come to the beach on Saturday morning, September 21, from 9 a.m. to noon, to continue improving our natural heritage, Texas' beautiful beaches," he said. "To find out how you can help, call Texas Adopt-A-Beach, toll-free, at 1-800-85-BEACH or CMC at 512-479-0206."

one proposition, for example, read, "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the recovery and further development of the state's economy, with goals of increasing job opportunities and other benefits for Texas residents, through state financing of the development and production of Texas products and businesses."

You would have never known by reading it, but that proposition's passage led to the creation of \$75 million in state debt.

As a candidate and as state treasurer, I repeatedly have argued for a state debt policy because our debt growth has not been monitored and prioritized. At the heart of this policy is developing a relationship of honesty with Texas voters.

To their credit, state lawmakers have agreed. Because of the leadership efforts of Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, Speaker Gib Lewis and state Sen. John Montford, Texas voters on Nov. 5, 1991 will have the chance to consider a constitutional amendment that would make it mandatory for debt-authorizing measures to include a statement regarding the purpose of debt, amount of debt, and source of repayment - all in plain English.

If this constitutional amendment passes, voters should never again face a repeat of Aug. 10, 1991 - being asked to support the issuance of state debt without knowing what it will cost them in the future and from what source it will be paid.

Passage of this constitutional amendment on Nov. 5 will help solve part of the problem voters faced on Aug. 10. But even with this policy in place, there still needs to be leadership in the State Legislature to assure that all ballot propositions - not just debt issues - be stated clearly. Texans have a right to expect this much from us.

It finally happened! Texas voters rejected a constitutional amendment to create state debt for a desirable purpose because the ballot language was confusing and ultimately misunderstood.

I am referring to the defeat of Constitutional Amendment 2 on Aug. 10, 1991. This amendment would have authorized the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans for students.

I favor the issuance of these state bonds to fund the Hinson-Hazlewood College Student Loan Program. This program provides low-interest college loans for students to attend our colleges and universities.

I support this program if it is 100 percent self-supporting; if it is administered at no cost to the state; and if it is payable from student loan repayments guaranteed by the federal government. Unfortunately, this constitutional amendment was not presented to voters in clear, concise, easy-to-understand English. These shortcomings led to its demise.

This statewide constitutional amendment did not even reveal the amount of bonds voters were being asked to consider. The amount was \$300 million. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, the state agency which issues such bonds, failed to fully explain the importance of this issue.

In the end, this constitutional amendment failed because confusion reigned and voters were skeptical about what they were being asked to approve.

Sudden Death For Football Fans

HOUSTON—(August 15, 1991)—Sudden death for football fans is only a tiebreaker. But for families who have lost young athletes to sudden death from heart complications, it is a tragedy.

Hypertrophic cardiomyopathy, long Q-T syndrome and Wolff-Parkinson-White syndrome are just some of the "quiet" killers of a segment of today's teenage athletes, says a Baylor College of Medicine pediatric cardiologist.

"What is devastating is that most of these young people appear perfectly normal but then, during the stress of athletics, they die from heart failure," said Dr. Jeffrey Towbin, an assistant professor of pediatrics and molecular genetics at Baylor. "Many were aware they had heart conditions, but how many were never evaluated and monitored? If we knew they were at risk, we could recommend therapies and possibly prevent them from participating in sports."

While the number of sudden deaths among both athletes and non-athletes under age 22 is low—less than 1 percent—statistics show that a city of 1 million will lose 15 to 20 young people in a year. For a school losing a star quarterback or a popular basketball player, the emotional toll can be considerable.

"These are kids in their prime," Towbin said. "Their numbers may not be great, but their deaths are very noticeable."

Chief among the causes of sudden death is hypertrophic cardiomyopathy, a genetically transmitted heart condition causing defects in the left ventricle—the main pumping station for the body's blood flow or from heart rhythm disturbances called arrhythmias.

Recent studies by the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute showed that, in one study group of 29 athletes who died be-

tween the ages of 13 to 30, 76 percent had cardiovascular disorders, mainly hypertrophic cardiomyopathy.

Long Q-T syndrome is the most sinister of silent heart conditions because, in children, there are rarely symptoms prior to sudden death. The disorder results from irregularities in the heart's natural rhythm leading to seizures, sudden fainting and death.

The "Q-T" refers to measurements of heart rhythm from electrocardiogram (EKG) readings. People with long Q-T measurements are at high risk for cardiac problems. "Although they may show no prior symptoms, long Q-T measurements can be diagnosed early on," Towbin said.

Another cause of sudden death in athletes, Wolff-Parkinson-White syndrome, also results from abnormal heart rhythms caused when the left ventricle is stimulated prematurely by electrical waves gone awry.

Wolff-Parkinson-White syndrome may disappear with maturity, but arrhythmias associated with the disorder sometimes occur later in life and can cause sudden death.

All three heart disorders can be detected in infancy through EKG readings and electrophysiological studies. One common symptom is syncope or sudden, unexpected fainting.

"Syncope results from exercise, loud noises, extreme surprise, anger or from no apparent cause," Towbin said. "The victim just drops with no warning sometimes resulting in injury. The faint may last for more than a minute."

Although no guidelines have been established for prescreening of young athletes, Towbin stresses increased awareness of heart disorders when considering demanding activities such as sports.
