COURTHOUSE LAWN SPRINKLER SYSTEM INSTALLED

Persons visiting the Courthouse these days are sure to notice that a lot of work is going on inside and outside the building. Calvin Ainsworth, Comm. of Pct. 2, is supervising these long-range plans and projects. An underground sprinkler system has been installed on the lawn, and it is scheduled to be hooked up by the end of the week. Ainsworth says that only minor setting and adjusting is expected after the system is once hooked up. New cut-off valves have been installed for the Courthouse, the weeds on the lawn have been cut back, Ainsworth says, and plans are to sow grass seed between Sept. 15-25.

This will be fescue grass, as recommended by David Tunmire, County Extension Agent. Fescue is supposed to be a year-round grass, attractive both summer and winter.

Among those working on the beautification project are David Cross and other Courthouse employees. David may be seen each morning out sweeping the sidewalks, part of the daily maintenance of the grounds.

Calvin Ainsworth says he looks forward to seeing a nice lawn around the Courthouse.

"We're going to keep working on it and hope to make it green," he declares.

LIFELINE SERVICE AVAILABLE

For some citizens of Ranger, Southwestern Bell Telephone's new Lifeline Service will provide local telephone service at a fraction of its cost today.

Beginning September 3, 1991, customers who are in a household with an income at or below the poverty level (as determined by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget) will be eligible for a \$7 reduction in Ranger's monthly residential rate.

The Lifeline program is part of a negotiated settlement approved last

year by the Texas Public Utility Commission. The settlement includes customer benefits of \$1.2 billion over the next four years.

To be eligible for Lifeline Service, customers must be the head of their household, have income at or below the poverty level or qualify for an assistance program, such as Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), Food Stamps, WIC or Supplemental Security Income.

The discounted rate

applies to all classes of residential local exchange service. No optional extended area service may be provided to a customer who qualifies under the discount.

Lifeline customers may subscribe to other telephone services such as Touch-tone and Custom Calling features, but the discount will not apply to those services. The discount is good for one year after the customer qualifies and then recertification is required.

The \$7 reduction is cal-

culated by subtracting \$3.50 from the local service charge and waiver of the current \$3.50 subscriber line charge. The subscriber line charge was instituted after the divestiture of the Bell System in 1984 to compensate local exchange companies for loss of long-distance revenues.

Customers may obtain Lifeline Service eligibility forms by calling toll-free 1-990-2850 8:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,
On the front page of the paper this past week you reported on a meeting of the County Commissioners. The main thrust of this meeting was the budget request submitted by various departments.

In past issues the paper has reported and well documented the counties money short. Fall problems for the coming year. The solution to this problem, at least in part, is to make another tax increase. The minimum amount of this increase would probably be the maximum amount allowed by law and not be subject to a tax rollback.

With all the above in mind it would suffice to say that I was shocked to read that two of our County Officials requested huge pay raises for themselves. These officials are Sheriff White wanting a \$19,000.00 (90%) increase from \$21,000.00 to \$40,000.00 and County Judge Bailey wanting a \$17,520.00 (70%) increase from \$25,246.00 to \$42,766.00.

As I read it, the basis for both their requests for these absurd amounts is the fact that they are not

making as much money as someone else! So - what else is new? A recent news report said that the oil rich sultan of Brunei is the richest man in the world being worth 31 billion dollars. He is probably the only man in the world who cannot say that someone else is making more money than he is.

What these gentlemen seem to forget is that they were not asked to take these offices but instead they asked the voters to give them these jobs. They knew, or should have known, what their salary would be before they took their last oath of office. A small salary increase might have been in line, this I don't know, but with the reasons given for it, and the amounts asked for, if it were up to me I would say no. If they didn't like it they could resign and go elsewhere for the \$40 to \$50,000.00 jobs they want.

These are my feelings on the matter but I was wondering if you have heard anyone else about this or am I the only one who thinks this way?

There are still openings for several more contestants, but you must act quickly.

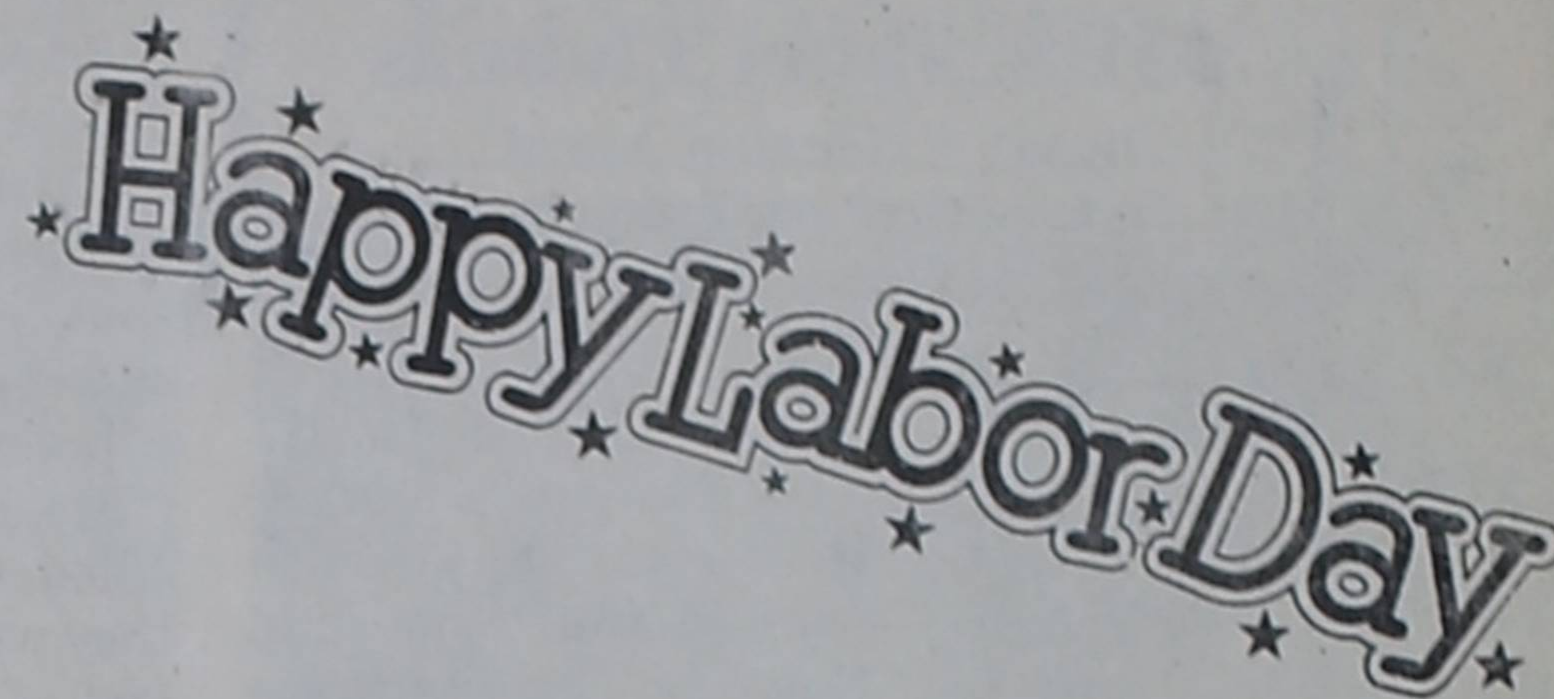
All events for the pageants have been arranged around school activities for convenience to the contestants.

FALL WEBWORMS MAKING ANOTHER APPEARANCE

Another generation of fall webworms is making appearance in Eastland County. Depending on the weather, there can be as many as four generations of fall webworms a year.

Fall webworms are the larval stage of moths. The larvae are about 1 inch long and are pale yellow or green. They are covered by tufts of long whitish hairs. A dusky stripe bordered by a yellow stripe will be on the back. The main identifiable characteristic of the fall webworm is the web it builds in the tree or limb.

Newly hatched larvae begin feeding and spin a web over the foliage as they feed. These webs can cover an entire branch. A large amount of defoliation can weaken a tree and could result in the tree dying.

Control can be accomplished without insecticides where they are only one to two webs in a large tree. Simply prune out the web and destroy it.

In trees which are too small or the webs are too numerous for pruning an insecticide may be re-

quired. Before applying an insecticide, use a large pole to break up the web. This will help the insecticide reach the larvae. A high pressure spray will also be required to reach the taller trees and help penetrate the web.

These are several insecticides which can be used for fall webworms. Some of these products are Dipel, Sevin, Diazinon and Malathion. Whichever product you select make sure you read and follow the label instructions.

CONTINUE TO MONITOR FOR PECAN WEEVIL

Pecan producers should continue to monitor for pecan weevils. Pecan weevils emergence as adults from the soil generally in late August and continue through mid-September when soil moisture is adequate. Rains in early August simulated some emergence of adult weevils, but additional emergence is possible. For this reason weevil activity should continue to be monitored.

Spray applications for adult weevil control should not begin until pecans have begun enter-

When hungry children return home from school, have on hand this healthful snack. Bake it on the weekend and freeze without the confectioners' sugar topping. Thaw and dust with sugar before serving.

AFTER SCHOOL FRUIT'N

NUT SNACK BREAD
(Makes 1 12-inch round flat bread)
3 to 3 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1/2 cup chopped dates
1/2 cup chopped dried apricots
1/2 cup chopped walnuts, toasted
3 tablespoons sugar
1 package rapidrise yeast
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup each: milk AND water
1/4 cup butter or margarine

Confectioners' sugar
In large bowl, combine 1 1/2 cups flour, dates, apricots, walnuts, sugar, undissolved yeast and salt. Heat milk, water and butter until very warm (125 to 130 degrees F); stir into dry ingredients. Stir in enough remaining flour to make soft dough. Knead on lightly floured surface until smooth and elastic, about 4 to 6 minutes. Cover; let rest 10 minutes.

On lightly floured surface, roll dough to 12-inch circle or 10x15-inch rectangle. Place on greased pizza pan or baking sheet. Bake at 400 F for 20 minutes or until done. Remove from pan; cool on wire rack. Sift confectioners' sugar on top. Cut into wedges, strips, or squares to serve. Serve with whipped cream cheese or creamy peanut butter, if desired.

For women troubled with hirsutism, a combination treatment of flutamide and oral contraceptives can clear up the excess hair within seven months, according to a study at Laval University Research Center in Quebec. Drugs block the action of androgens in the body.

Boron deficiency affects general alertness and reaction times, a researcher with the U.S. Department of Agriculture reports. Apples, pears, grapes and carrots may be better sources than supplements.

To dry up a drippy nose that has no obvious cause -- doctors call it non-allergic chronic rhinitis -- an asthma drug, ipratropium bromide, has shown promise in tests in Denmark and at St. Louis University School of Medicine. Atropine also seems to inhibit mucus production.

...NEW BOOK RELEASE from GPC, Inc: **ANGLO-AMERICANS IN SPANISH ARCHIVES, Lists of Anglo-American Settlers in the Spanish Colonies of America**, by Lawrence H. Feldman. We often forget that a large chunk of colonial America was once under Spanish control. Indeed, between 1766 and 1784 Spain consolidated its domination, claiming jurisdiction over all or part of what are now the states of Louisiana, Florida, Mississippi, Alabama, Arkansas, and Missouri. Eager to exploit this territory, Spain opened it up to settlement and encouraged people living in the English colonies to the north and east to take up the land. When early in the 19th century this territory came under U.S. jurisdiction, the records of the colonial administration were sent to Cuba, thence to Seville, Spain, where they were housed in various archives.

In Seville, the researcher can still find the papers relating to the administration of the Spanish-American colonies, in particular, census lists, militia lists, oaths of allegiance, surrender lists, lists of land-

owners and slave-owners, and arrival lists. From the principal archives in Seville (e.g. Archivo General de Indias), and from other archives, Lawrence Feldman has extracted the names of about 7,000 Anglo-American settlers, arranging them in tabular format by state. Thus, from the records mentioned above, Mr. Feldman has compiled name lists and associated data (places of residences, dates, occupations, etc.) from the records dealing with Mobile and Tombeche (Alabama), Pensacola and Saint Augustine (Florida), Baton Rouge (Louisiana), Natchez and Nogales (Mississippi) and New Madrid (Missouri), with smaller lists for Belize in Central America.

Not only is this data unique, but it is otherwise totally inaccessible to the American researcher. Now, rescued from almost total oblivion, it is published with an informative introduction to Spanish archives and a complete index of names. 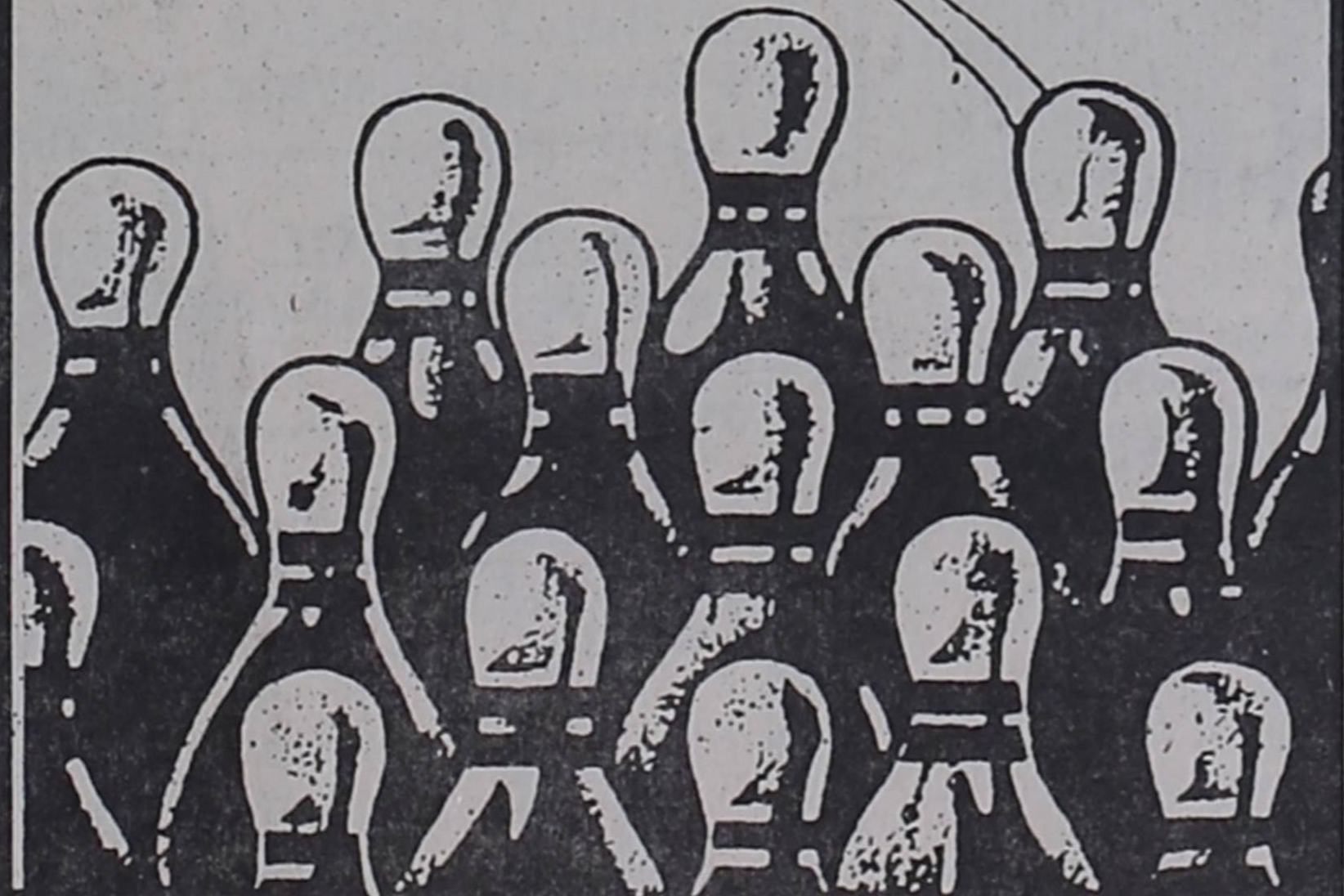

Katy and Becca Siebert of the Eastland Junior 4-H Club, Holly Greenwood and Joanna Wallace of the Ranger 4-H Club, Amy Agnew of the Rising Star 4-H Club, Leigh Henke of the Cisco 4-H Club, Jeremy and Jessica Keith of the Olden 4-H Club and Ricky Agnew of the Nimrod 4-H Club and their families separated their household trash for 7 days to collect information on recycling.

The 4-H members and their families represent an average family of 4. Their household trash was separated into paper, aluminum, glass, HDPE plastic, compost material and other. Weights were taken individually for each trash type by family.

How did the Eastland County 4-H families' trash measure up to other Americans' trash? Research has shown that 84 percent of Americans trash is recyclable while in this study only 74.3 percent of the Eastland County 4-H families' trash was recyclable.

The composition of the local families trash was very similar to most American families trash. The composition of the local families trash was 40.9% paper, 5.7% glass, 3.0% aluminum, 4.8% plastic, 19.8% food waste, and 25.7% other, while the average Americans' trash is composed of 40% paper, 7% glass, 8.5% metal, 8% plastic, 7.4% food waste and 11.6% other. Yard waste was not collected locally, but it makes up 17.6% of the Americans total waste.

Recycling can make an important impact on the environment by reducing

the amount of wastegoing to landfills. Recycling will not make the average family money. Not one family in the study would have made \$1.00 from recycling materials based on present values being paid by companies for paper, glass, plastic and aluminum.

Recycling for the money

is not the reason to recycle. The impact that recycling can make on the environment is through reduced waste produced and energy saved. With Texans only recycling approximately 2% of their trash, the total impact of recycle has yet to be realized here in Texas.

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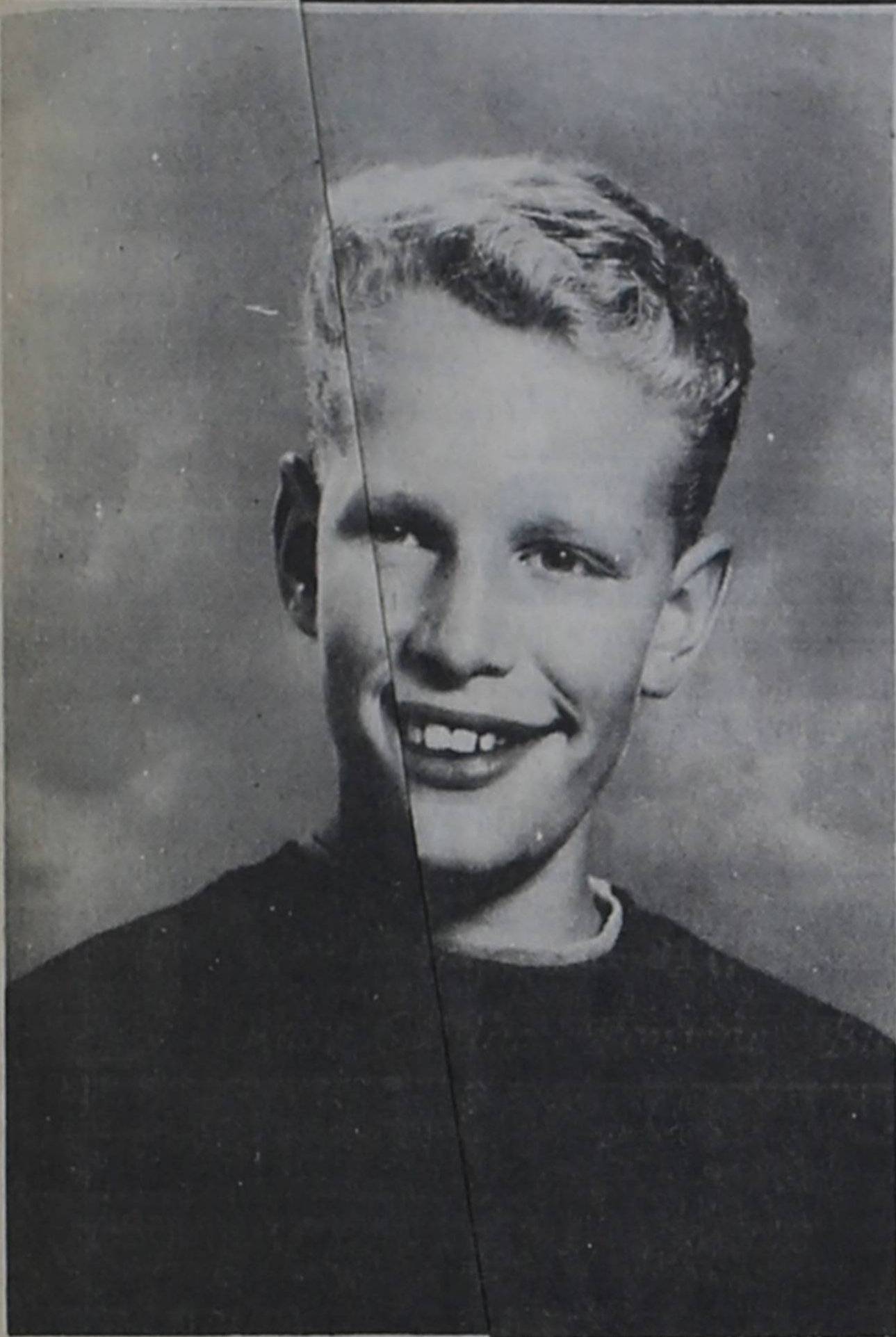

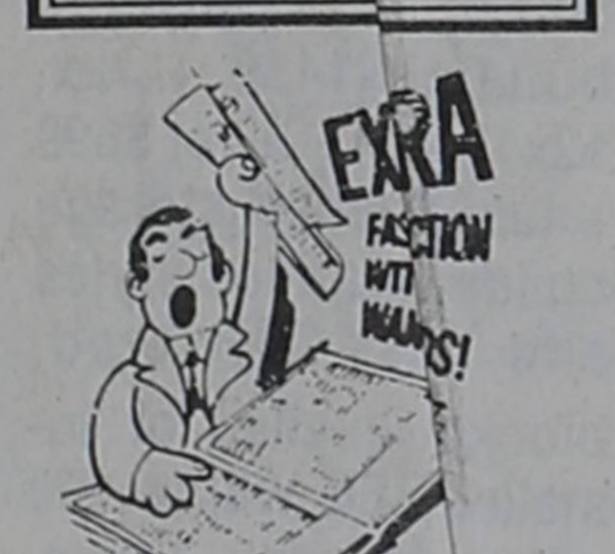
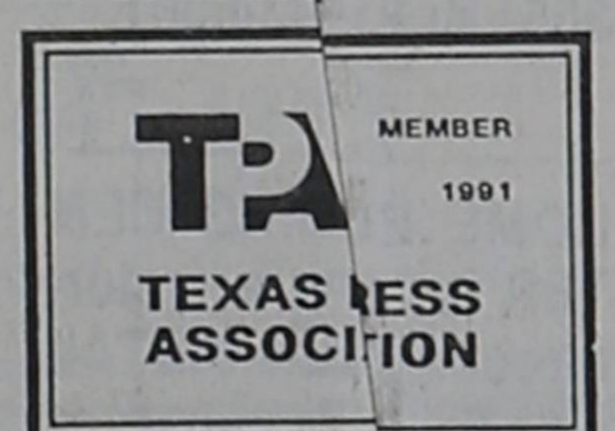

These days, many spouses enter marriage with previously acquired property, debts, investment portfolios, and sometimes significant financial obligations to the children of their first marriage.

One of the first big money management decisions you will face is whether to keep separate accounts or merge your finances. In the past, when most families had just one breadwinner, families generally kept their finances in a joint account. Today, some couples prefer to maintain separate accounts with each partner responsible for certain bills and expenses.

Other couples choose to pool some of their money in a joint account for living expenses, while maintaining separate accounts for personal expenses. There's no right answer. Financial experts advise couples to experiment and then do what works best.

Once you decide how to handle your paychecks, the next step is to set up a budget. Start by identifying your financial goals. Most newly married couples need to begin thinking about such long-range plans as buying a home, raising a family, and even planning for retirement.

Be truthful and realistic if you want your budget to work. Begin by determining your combined income from wages, salaries, part-time jobs, divi-

dends and interest, and any other regular income.

Next, calculate your expenses, both fixed and variable. Fixed expenses are those you must pay regularly and include mortgage or rent, car payments, insurance premiums and child support payments. Be sure to include the amount you plan to save each month.

Variable expenses generally include utilities, food, clothing, entertainment, recreation, personal care, gifts, repairs and medical expenses.

Make sure you calculate how much tax you will owe if you file jointly as opposed to married, filing separate returns. In most cases, filing jointly will result in somewhat lower tax liability.

Once you determine how marriage will affect your tax liability, file a new W-4 form with your employer to adjust the amount of withholding from your paycheck.

Newlyweds also need to compare credit cards to eliminate redundancies and save money on annual fees. If you both have many of the same credit cards, look into the features and fees that accompany each card to determine which cards you should keep.

Most two-career marriages also have overlapping benefits that may be costing you unnecessary dollars. For instance, if your spouse's health insurance plan is completely paid for by his or her company and yours isn't, you may save money by switching to your spouse's plan as a dependent, rather than paying for coverage for yourself.

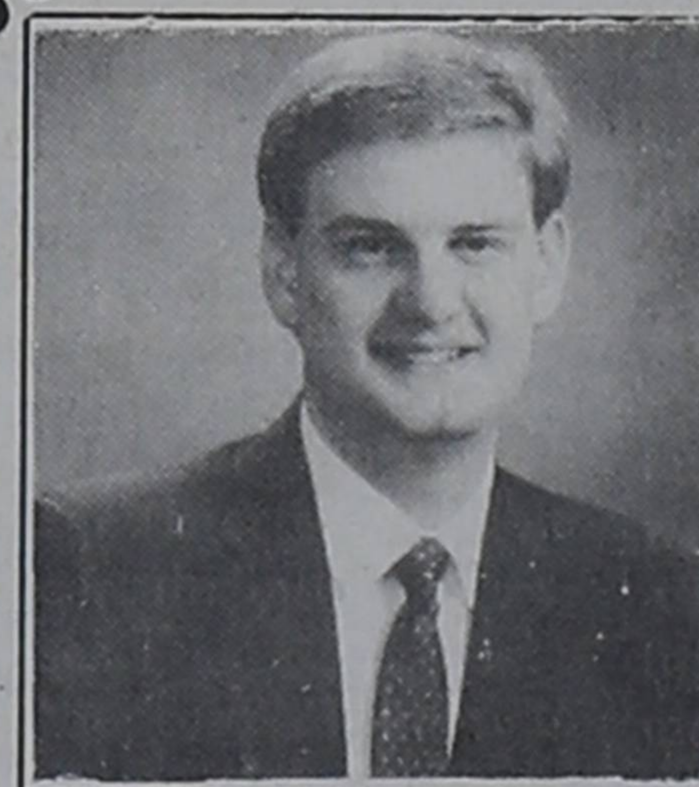
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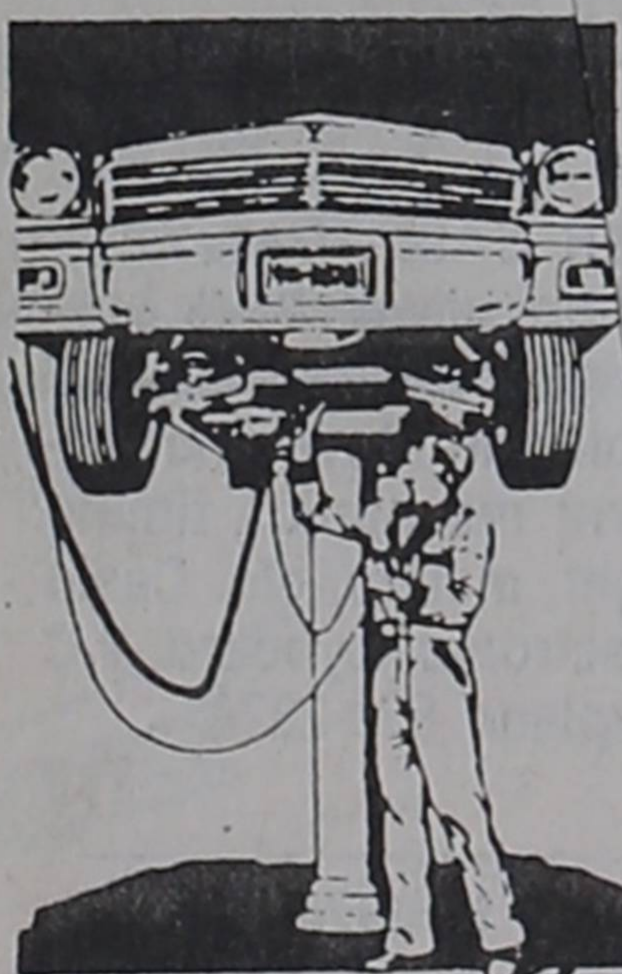

Fishing Outdoors

Hunters anxiously awaiting the beginning of fall hunting on Sept. 1 can expect a good dove opening.

Mourning dove surveys in late May indicate the statewide mourning dove population index up 21 percent over last year, well above the long-term average, said Ron George, dove program leader at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The greatest increase occurred in the Central Zone, which was up 45 percent.

The North Zone showed a 24 percent increase while the South Zone declined 15 percent. George said these figures reflect the numbers of adult mourning doves at the beginning of the breeding season.

From all indications, Texas has had good numbers of adult doves and good production of young during the 1991 nesting season, he said. Most of the state has adequate rainfall this summer for surface water and plant seed production (critical components of dove habitat). Much of the state has been spared the violent thunderstorms with high winds and large hail that disrupt mourning dove nesting in Texas some years.

Current field reports indicate good numbers of mourning doves throughout the state, but George said that changing weather patterns and food supplies, such as continuing seed ripening and/or fall plowing, will undoubtedly affect local dove distribution during late August and early September.

There is encouraging news for white-winged dove hunters, he said. White wings, once common only along the Rio Grande, now have expanded their range northward throughout much of South and Central Texas.

They have been reported as far north as Waco.

The daily bag limit during the regular mourning dove season has been changed this year to allow hunters to take six whitewings as part of their 12-dove aggregate daily limit statewide, except for Cameron, Starr, Hidalgo and Willacy counties where hunters may take only two whitewings daily, George said. A \$7 white-winged dove stamp is required in addition to a valid Texas hunting license to legally take whitewings anywhere in Texas.

Whitewings, which has distinctive white stripes across each wing, should not be confused with white-tipped doves, which are named for the white on the tip of the tail, he said. Whitetips are a legal game species throughout Texas, but hunters most likely will find them south of a line from Corpus Christi to Laredo.

Mourning dove season dates are: North Zone, Sept. 1-Nov. 9; Central Zone, Sept. 1-Oct. 30 and Jan. 3-12; and South Zone, Sept. 20-Nov. 11 (ends Nov. 9 in the Special White-winged Dove Area) and Jan. 3-19. The statewide daily bag limit, except for the Lower Valley, is 12 mourning, white-winged and white-tipped doves in the aggregate to include not more than six whitewings and two whitetips. For Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr and Willacy counties, the daily bag limit is 12, including not more than two whitewings and two whitetips. Possession limit is twice the daily bag. The two-day special whitewing season will be Sept. 7-8. The daily bag limit south and east of Del Rio is 10 white-winged, mourning and white-

tipped doves in the aggregate to include not more than five mourning doves and two whitetips. North and west of Del Rio the daily bag limit is 10 white-winged, mourning and white-tipped doves in the aggregate to include not more than two whitetips. Possession limit is twice the daily bag limit.

Shooting hours for the regular mourning dove season are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Shooting hours in the Special White-winged Dove Area are noon to sunset.

More information on Texas dove hunting regulations is printed in the 1991-92 Texas Early Season Migratory Game Bird Hunting Digest that should be available where you buy a hunting license.

Drowning, the leading cause of water and boating fatalities in Texas this

year, increases during holiday periods. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials urge swimmers and boaters to take extra caution during the Labor Day holiday, the final summer fling for many.

Drownings are divided into three classifications: swimming or playing in the water; non-swimming, including falling into the water from docks, bridges, shores and during ship repair, home accidents and on-home premises; and boating. During Labor Day weekend, many Texans will engage in these activities.

'Don't become part of the statistics,' warns Jack Nasworthy, TPWD boater education specialist.

Nasworthy lists some precautions to take when hitting the water. One, don't go into the water

alone. Swim with companions, friends or relatives. Two, make sure to wear a life jacket (personal flotation device) if you can't swim, even when only wading. Three, don't go near the swimming pool unless there is a lifeguard on duty.

He also suggests avoiding alcohol while participating in water activities. 'Alcohol is a major factor in drowning. Many victims had significant levels of alcohol in their blood. Water does not help to sober up a person, only time will do that. Alcohol reduces coordination, senses are distorted and eyesight is blurred.'

Boaters are reminded that every recreational water vessel must carry at least one U.S. Coast Guard-approved PFD for each person on board. Texas requires those

under 13 years old to wear a PFD while a motorized craft is underway. Boaters also should carry a fire extinguisher, be able to display running lights after sunset and before sunrise and carry a bell or honor on board.

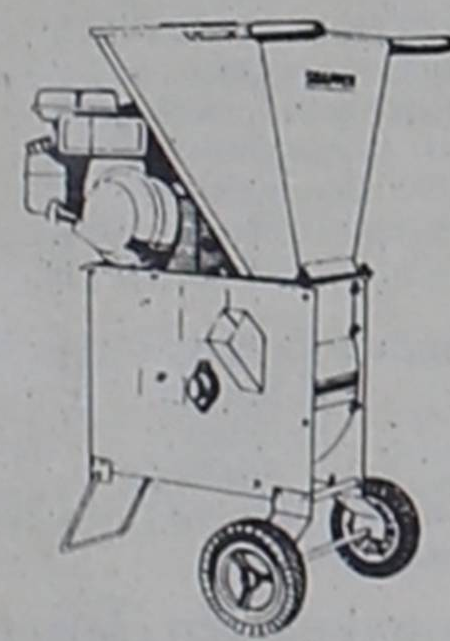

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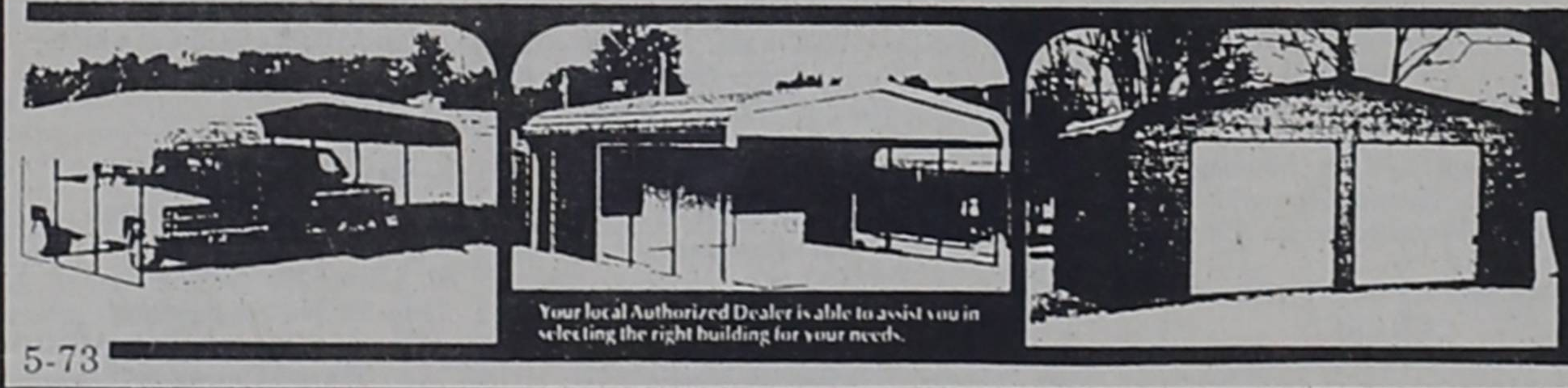
