The 11th Court of Appeals in Eastland has overturned a murder conviction and returned the case to 91st District Court for a new trial.

The decision was made in the case of Johnny David Robinette, given a 75 year prison term on Sept. 21, 1990 for the murder of Richard "Country" Williamson.

Williamson was shot six times, and his body was found in a storm cellar southeast of Cisco April 25, 1990.

AG DEPT RESTRUCTURING PUT INTO ACTION, AIMED AT MAKING AGENCY MORE EFFICIENT AND RESPONSIVE

A sweeping restructur- assigned to these and ing and streamlining of Texas Department of Agriculture field offices takes effect this week actions aimed at making the agency more serviceoriented.

Under the changes, TDA is consolidating its statewide network of offices to create five regional centers and seven satellite offices. Regional operations will be based in Lubbock, San Juan, Dallas, Houston and San Antonio. Satellite offices will be located in Amarillo, El Paso, Tyler, Stephenville, Brenham, Beaumont and Corpus Christi. "By realigning our districts and making the most of our existing resources, we'll be able to offer Texans even better service," Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said of the changes. "We aim to make TDA a model of efficiency and the most service-oriented agency in state government." Under the restructuring, TDA offices in Amarillo and El Paso, once district offices, will become satellite offices of the regional center in Lubbock. Also, one-time district offices in Tyler and Stephenville now will be encompassed by the Dallas regional center. A staff entomologist is being reassigned to the Dallas region from Austin. other "district" offices are field inspectors, meaning they spend nearly all of their working hours outside an office. These employees will not relocate, but will simply begin reporting to their respective regional office. "These changes will not result in a reduced presence of TDA personnel in these areas," Perry said. "To the contrary, our customers will receive more service. For the first time in years, commodity marketing specialists will be assigned to many of these areas to help farmers and ranchers sell their goods and products." Another realignment will occur in the Rio Grande Valley. Previously, district offices were located within 50 miles of each other in San Juan and Brownsville - a waste of taxpayers' dollars. As a result of the new structure, the Brownsville office will be consolidated into the new San Juan regional center. TDA field inspectors who had been assigned to the Brownsville office will now report to San Juan. The Corpus Christi office, formerly a satellite of Brownsville, will now report to San Antonio and, as a result, will benefit from additional marketing specialists and an entomologist being as-

signed to that region. In addition, district offices in Beaumont and Brenham will become satellites of the Houston region. Additionals marketing expertise will be provided to the Houston area, including an expert specializing in Latin America.

The office realignment is part of a system-wide restructuring of the Department of Agriculture initiated by Perry earlier this year and unveiled in late June. As a result of the changes, the department is turning to innovative ways to be more effective. For instance, TDA's print shop will be



Also, TDA's laboratory and a staff chemist in San Juan are being consolidated with the department's main lab staff in Brenham.
