This facility has been very low on supplies, but Robinson said there had been good response to an appeal in the local newspaper, for food.

"There has not been much response on workers at the Pantry, however," Robinson said. "There is a critical need for more volunteers to help. Only two volunteers are keeping the Pantry open - while the calls for emergency food are increasing."

Several days after Mr. Robinson made his report Corrie Cowley and two

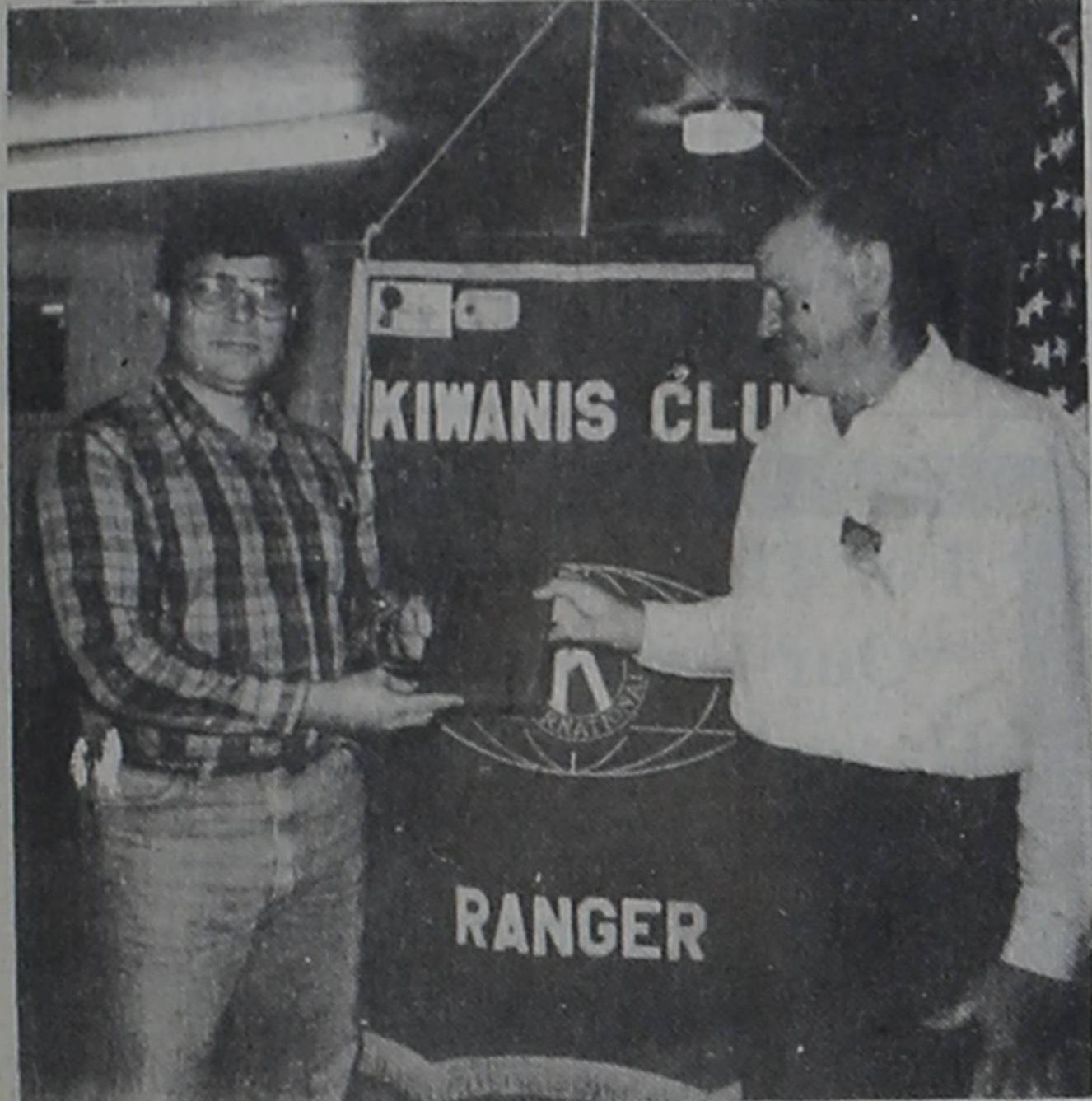
Girl Scouts helped unload food items for Mrs. Richard (Lois) Robinson, one of the regular volunteers. These were items purchased by money donated to the Pantry.

The Food Pantry is located in a trailer at 204 N. Lamar, Eastland. It is open Monday, Wednesday and Fridays 1-4 p.m.

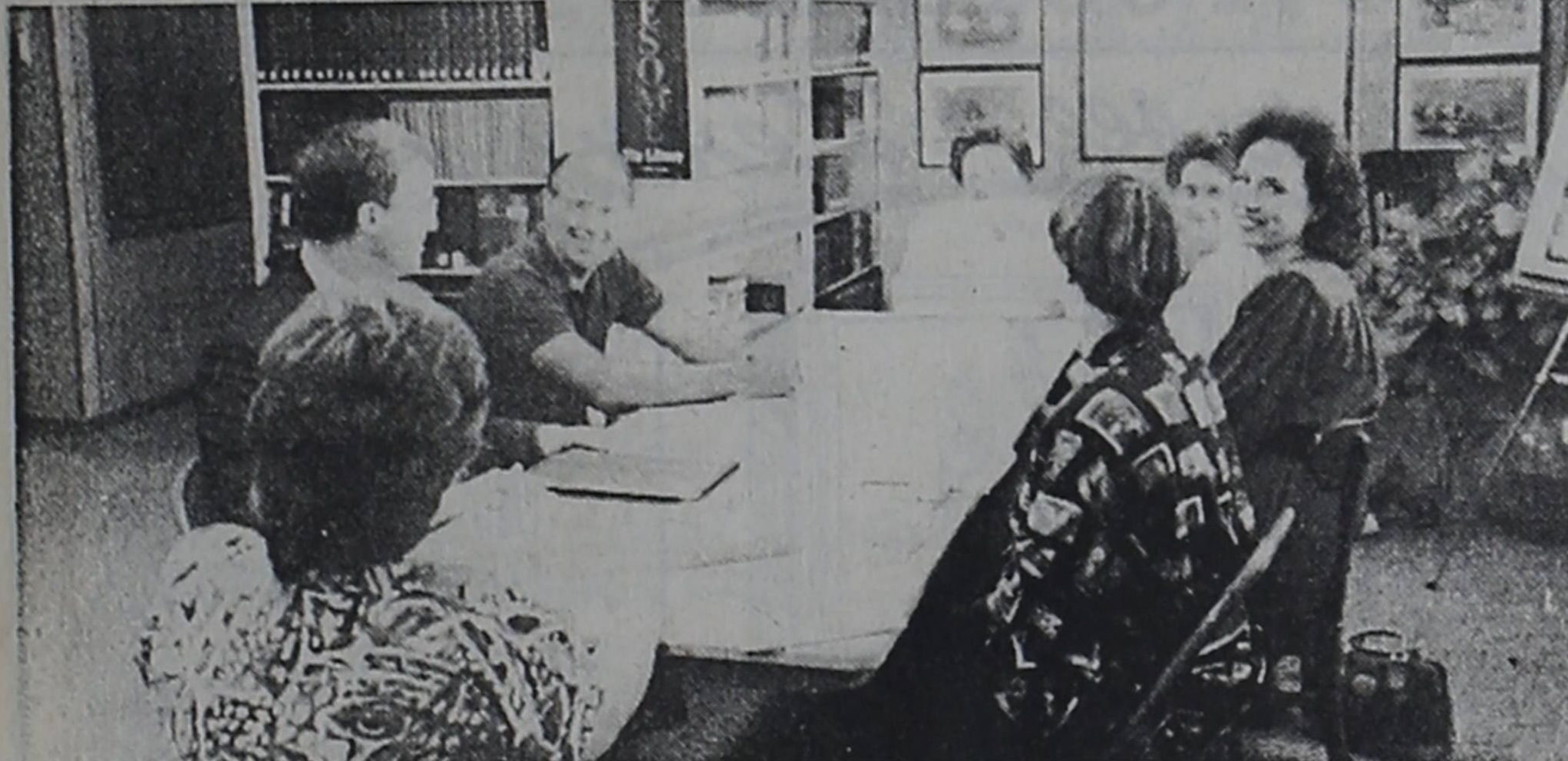
A Clothes Closet is also maintained at the Food Pantry. Right now the volunteers are beginning to stock winter clothing, and would appreciate some good practical items for all ages.

MEMORIES IN A PILE*

It makes me sick when I drive by my dear old school house and see it pushed up into piles of brick. I know that this is what we, the tax payers paid for. We had no notice that the school was going to be destroyed, but you can bet that we will get notice of our taxes each year.

I am sure this old school was not condemned, because it was in use just a couple of years back.

Surely we are not stupid enough to have used such a dangerous building for the education of children.

This building could have been used for so many good purposes. We, the City, could have charged for the use of the building for Homecoming, as a Community Center, for garage sales, even children's birthday parties. It also could have been used for other, more humane purposes, such as the Clothing Closet. (which, by the way, is

sorely in need of more room and better storage. Ruby Ainsworth does a magnificent job down there and the clothing goes to people who really need it. It is the best thing in the City, no charge. I lived here in Ranger when there was a blessed Salvation Army, and the Clothing Closet reminds me of the same good works that those people did. I hope that our City FATHERS can find a better place for this cause.)

I have a lot of memories

of my school days at Hodge's Oak Park, I began school back in 1930. Miss Eva Long was my Teacher, the prettiest woman at the school and I loved her very much. That was during the Depression and my brothers and sister walked to school. We had to walk all the way from the old sand farm, Warin Rigger lived out there, and every morning Cecil Cook and his brothers and sisters would wait for us so we could all walk together. Of course there were no busses back then and it was a mile there and back. We took our lunches, that was usually a great big biscuit with sausage, or bacon, or eggs, or potatoes, or whatever we had.

I sure didn't want the other kids to see what I had brought from home. Now, just check out the prices for that kind of lunch. It is pretty high, and you can bet that the kids today don't get the kind of milk we got, it came in a quart bottle and an inch and a half of cream on the top.

Miss Long gave me a spanking one time, because I would not drink that milk. I did not like the cream on the top of my milk, at home Mommy would skim it off, and while she made breakfast, Daddy would shake it up in a big jar. We always had a garden and plenty of chickens back then.

Every Saturday night, if the weather was nice enough, we would walk about a mile to my Aunt and Uncle's house, and to see Ada Falk, where we would listen to the Grand

Ole' Opra on the Radio, that was a real treat for all of us.

All of this is part of my memories of Hodge's Oak Park, like Fannie Dale Swaney was my best friend in the first grade and she would invite me to her house for tea parties. Mrs. Swaney would prepare cookies and sandwiches for us. She would give me dresses, Fannie's dresses were so pretty and I just loved them. So many memories. . . .

I was brought up in a Christian home and always shown that we should respect those that are in authority, well it is hard to have respect for the authority of our City Hall. For instance, over a year ago, after the body of Leslie Roberts was found on the Lover's Lane, it was voted to close that road, with a gate at either end of it. This was to be done immediately, well immediately has passed and it still is not closed off. I know for a fact that a friend of mine donated one gate to the City for this purpose, so that they would come out to his house and get it. He is still waiting and the road still has not been sealed off.

Getting back to the old school, I am just wondering what all the old timers are going to say when they come back for Homecoming and see that the school is gone. Frances Duffield, us older ones can remember when we were children. That is the most important time of our lives. Ask me what happened a few years ago and I may not get it straight in

the telling, but ask me about my school years and I can give you every detail. It is so important to pass all this onto our children. Frances, if the City of Ranger keeps on pushing and plowing, there won't be any City History to worry about, there may not even be any City.

Frances Duffield, I agree with you when you say that the beginning of school is so important in our life. The first grade is just about the most wonderful part of a life, as I said before, Miss Long was my Teacher, and taught my daughters and then my grandchildren. She was really something and I guess I can remember that she drove a Model T, when there weren't many cars around I Love You Mrs. Eva Long Bobo. May the Lord always be near you.

I thank God for people like Delores Vinson Britt. She only said what was in her heart. I am so glad that she put it all in writing, she is an honest person. I have known her most of her life, and she has always said what she was thinking and you just have to Love her for that. Delores, I agree with you 100%.

By the way, if there is anything in this letter that you do not agree with, put it in a letter and send it to the Editor the way I and other honest people have done. These people that call you on the phone and say a lot of nasty things are not honest. Be careful what you say about me or you may bet on that you will be talking to my daughter, or my

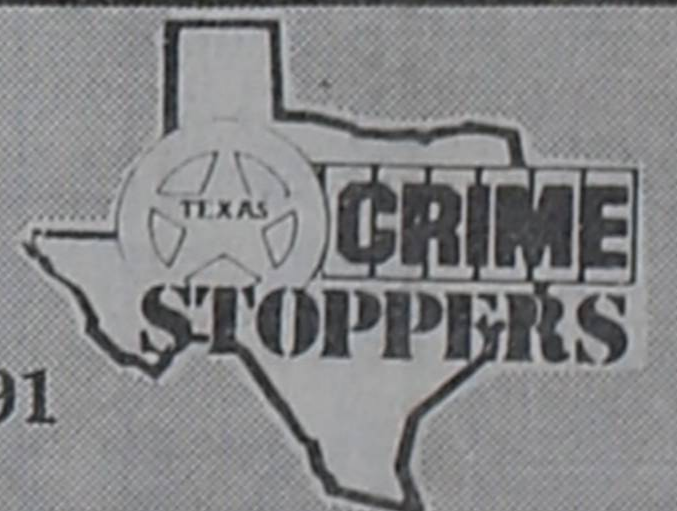
voicing your opinion. You may not want your children to be in that building, but it was okay for the teachers and other peoples kids to be there when they were using it as an alternative school.

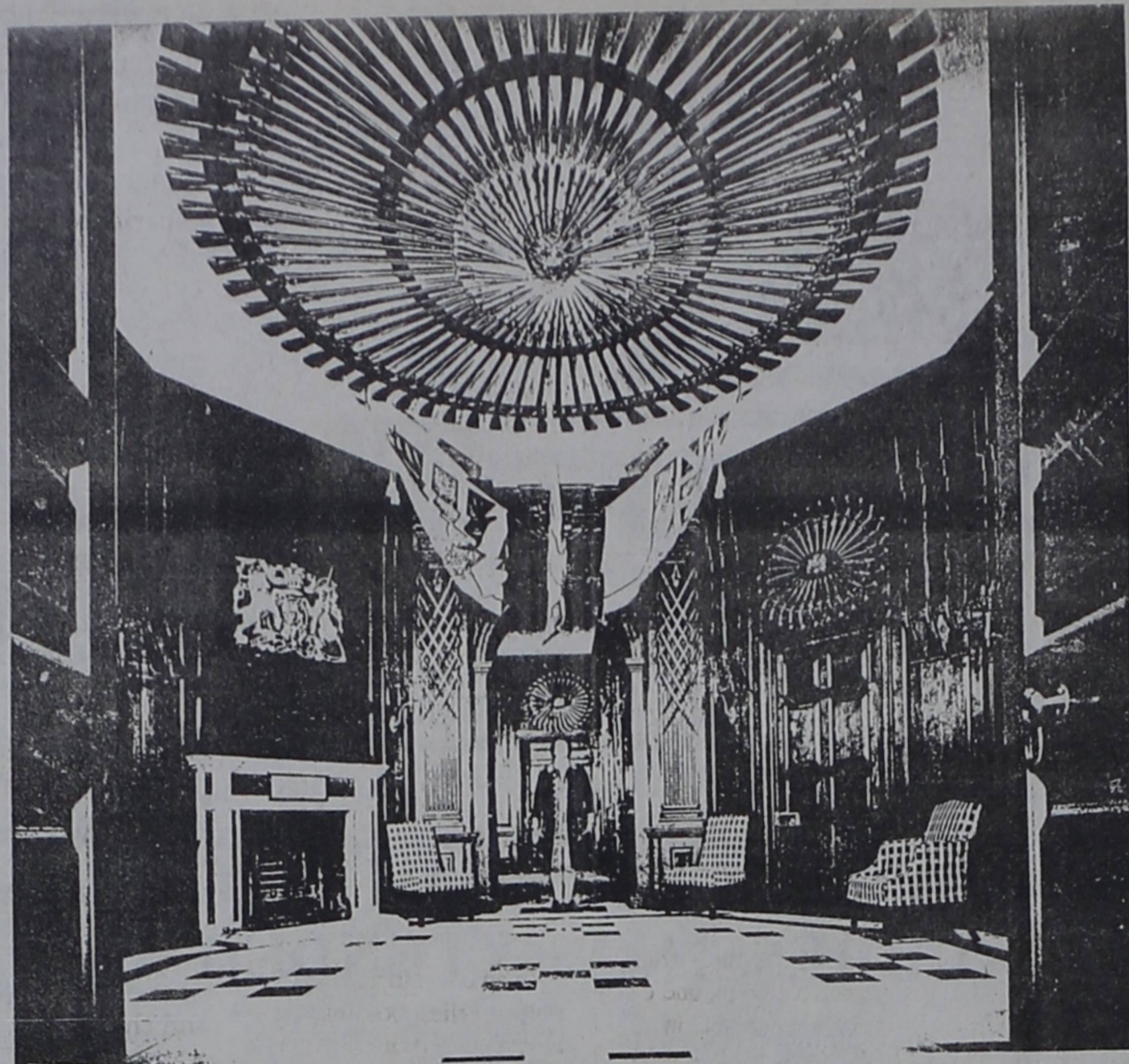

MOST IMPOSING of the many re-constructions at Williamsburg is the Governor's Palace, residence for seven royal governors and the first two governors of the Commonwealth of Virginia--Patrick Henry and Thomas Jefferson. Within its walls are a stable, kitchen, gardens and a privy.

This first was a Colony, and the crown exhorted (repeatedly) the General Assembly to build a home and 3,000 pounds was voted and work begun in 1706, and proceeded slowly, and when Gov. Alexander Spotswood arrived in 1710, it was little more than enclosed shell. He pushed for and got additional legislation to "render the new House Convenient as well as Ornamental." Ornamental, it is, today. A local said in 1711 that he saw a magnificent display of weapons in the entrance hall "nicely posited," by the ingenious contrivance of Col. Spotswood. They're there today "to display strength."

Spotswood moved in, in 1716 and work continued for six more years, and after work on the gardens, a canal, members of the Assembly finally expressed alarm at the expenditures being spent for refinements. "In disgust, Spotswood removed himself entirely from any further involvement with the house and the grounds," and you wonder today, surely the seeds of revolt included those planted in the dispute over how grand the governor's (a representative of the crown) home should be.

The house was completed in '22, but had fallen into "runious condition" by '51 and Gov. Dinwiddie moved next door. Reconstruction and the addition of "grand rooms" for public entertaining was carried out in the mid-'50s. Gov. Berkeley launched a thorough redecoration in '68, and with the coming of the Revolution, Virginia's last royal

governor, John Murray, fourth Earl of Dunmore, fled Williamsburg. Later when Jefferson lived there, he drew some plans for the remodeling of the Palace, but they were never carried out because the seat of government and governor's residence moved to Richmond in 1780. The vacant Palace was used as a hospital following the siege of Yorktown and the orchard by the canal became burial

ground for 156 American soldiers. The building burned to the ground on Dec. 22, 1781.

Judging from the material today, the activities of these "great Houses" were patterned, as much as possible, after the royal gatherings of Europe, in which the elegantly-furnished rooms became a stage on which the governor and his guests acted out the latest forms of etiquette and displayed themselves as being in touch with the world's most fashionable and civilized manners and conversation. A dance (or routs) in one room, refreshments in an adjoining "supper room," with open doors to the gardens, which even feature a maze for amusement. If on business, visitors would be screened at the entry, and admitted directly or indirectly to the governor, either in his bedroom, private dining room or private library.

The elegance of the governor's residence did not just happen; it was the product of hard work by many servants, butlers, footmen, cooks, laundresses, maids, gardeners, grooms, and laborers. The kitchen, scullery and laundry, along with other support

buildings involved in the task of maintaining the household, are in the west yard. Of special interest is the hexagonal "bagnio" or bathhouse, a luxury rarely found elsewhere in Virginia.

All who called the Palace home were not without merit. Gov. Fauquier is credited with directing the attention of the burgesses to the need for better care of "Persons who are so unhappy as to be deprived of their reason." The General Assembly responded and opened in 1773 the earliest facility in North America devoted entirely to the care and treatment of the mentally ill. The restored hospital is now the entry to the excellent DeWitt Wallace Decorative Arts Gallery to be detailed later.

Eastland Hospital To Sponsor Cancer Detection Unit Oct. 7

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, Texas "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90%-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

HOW WILL WEATHER AFFECT PEANUTS?

Last week a cold front brought in cool weather and lot of rain. You can realize the importance of crop to a county by who's asking questions about it. Just about everybody I talked to last week would sooner or later ask how will the weather affect the peanut crop. With the prospects of a good crop throughout the county, this is an important question.

The short cold spell we experienced was not long enough to cause a big problem for the peanuts. The cool weather did slow the peanuts maturity up a little, but not much. The quick return to warmer weather reversed most of the effect of the one or two days of cool weather.

Peanut producers need to remember that it is still just the end of September. Dr. George Alston, Extension Agronomist, warns producers not to let cool weather push you into doing something too quick. Wait for peanuts to mature as long as weather conditions permit.

The wet weather does bring one concern this time of year for producers and that is pod rot. Wet, warm conditions are ideal for the development of pod rot.

This time of year peanut producers are like all other farmers in the country. They are at the mercy of the weather. This fact is the same throughout the growing season, but it is at this time of the year when producers are left helpless. The peanut crop is almost made and the money has all been spent

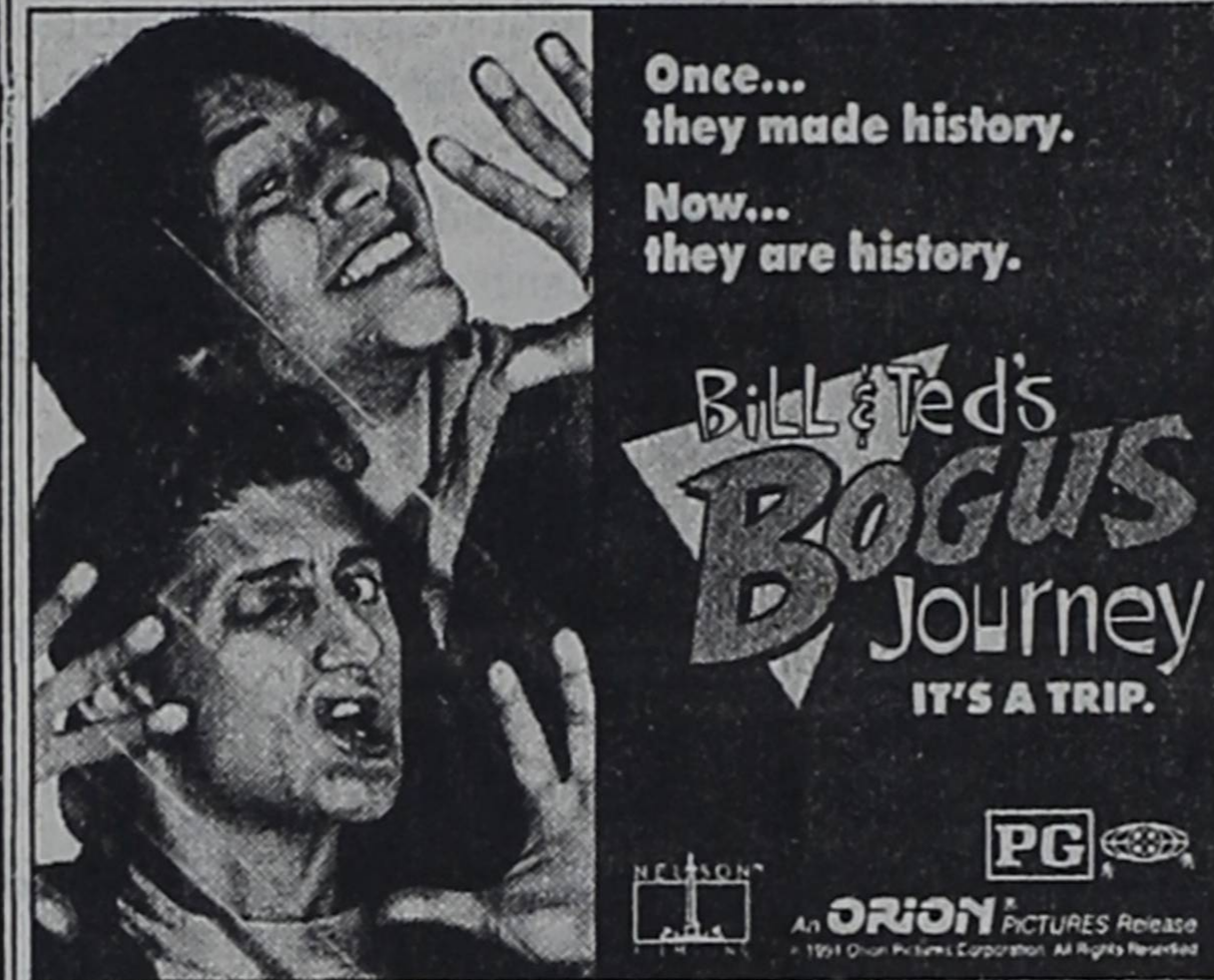

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

Fire Prevention Week To Be Observed In County Oct. 6-12

The Eastland County Farm Bureau, in conjunction with all fire departments in the county are working together to emphasize fire prevention and protection throughout the county.

Fire Prevention Week is always the Sunday-through-Saturday period in which falls October 9, date of the Great Chicago

Fire of 1871. The Chicago disaster killed 250 people and destroyed 17,430 buildings.

In his proclamation, Judge Bailey has called upon the citizens of Eastland County to participate in Fire Prevention Week activities such

as locating and eliminating fire hazards; checking smoke detectors and developing a home escape plan; as the 1991 theme suggests..... "FIRE WON'T WAIT...PLAN YOUR ESCAPE"

Charles Walker, President of the Eastland County Farm Bureau said, "Fire is both friend and foe. We can't live without it, but its destructive power is a threat we must control." Protect yourself by keeping fire a friend:

* Regularly inspect your house and out-buildings for fire hazards. Check the electrical system, electrical appliances and equipment, fuel storage, heaters and heating system. Make needed repairs or

replacements without delay. Don't overload circuits or bypass fuses.

* Remove trash, stacks of papers and other unneeded combustibles that could feed a fire.

* Read and follow instructions with portable heaters. Place them where they won't ignite combustibles or be tipped over. Never use gasoline in a kerosene heater, and make certain gasoline and kerosene containers are clearly marked to avoid a mix-up. Never use a kerosene or gas-fired heater in a closed area - have ample ventilation.

* Check your heating system prior to the heating season. Install and use wood-burning stoves as directed in the manuals or other literature. Screen fireplaces. Keep chimneys and flues free of obstructions and creosote buildup.

* Keep matches and lighters out of children's reach.

* Don't smoke in bed nor when drowsy. Don't smoke when using flammable materials nor in places that have readily combustible materials such as hay, straw, dry weeds, grain dust, etc. Store flammable liquids in well-marked, closed containers. Make sure your cigarette or match is "out" before discarding.

* Be prepared for fire should it strike. Have operating smoke detectors and fire extinguishers. Develop and practice a home fire escape plan. Teach children how to call for help. Have a water supply available to fight fire.

* Choose and regularly inspect fire extinguishers that are the right size and type for the fires that might occur.

* Consider installing a sprinkler system in all new construction.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has taken the lead in recovering damage from fish kills caused from pollution with an innovative methodology for determining the value of this resource.

Don Pitts, field response coordinator in the resource protection division, presented the paper, 'Assessing the Value of

Fish and Wildfish Killed During Pollution Events in Texas,' during the American Fisheries Society conference Sept. 8-12 in San Antonio. The paper was co-written by David Sager, chief of the environmental contaminants branch, and Dennis Palafox, formerly of the department.

While not new - the department began using this new formula in the spring of 1986 - TPWD is the only state using the computer program, which was developed by the department.

'We're one of two or three states that have the ability to look at the recreational value, economic value, commercial value and habitat loss value,' Sager said. In 1985, the Texas Legislature authorized the TPWD to place a value on the state's resources.

Most states use a value placed on the fish by the AFS. The department goes further. The TPWD formula takes the AFS value multiplied by the inflation rate plus either the recreational or commercial value plus impairment value (lost recreational value) plus investigative costs. 'It's probably still a minimum value but it's more accurate than what was used before,' Pitts said. 'Other states charge usually whatever it costs to get the fish from a hatchery.'

The difference in value placed on a fish between

the AFS and TPWD can be considerable.

A 14-inch largemouth bass is valued at \$5.55 under the AFS formula and \$55.83 under the department's system. The state record largemouth (27 inches) is worth \$70.68 to AFS, \$210.21 to TPWD. A 15-inch spotted seatrout for AFS and TPWD is worth \$6.06 and \$27.42, respectively. A 33 inch trout, the state record, is valued at \$70.55 (AFS) and \$148.56 (TPWD). A 20-, 28- and 45-inch red drum, under the AFS system, is valued at \$16.41, \$45.65 and \$275.52. Using the department's formula, those three fish are valued at \$124.10, \$216.74 and \$630.19.

The new formula was developed because of a lack in the previous plan for recovering the full value of fish. Fisheries branch and resource protection division personnel looked at what other states charged, pooled their information together and came up with this plan.

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POINTS TO PONDER

The other day as I listened to the radio I heard a person make a statement that I wished I had written down. Essentially what he said was he practiced dedicated procrastination. He explained that it was a studied effort to put off doing the trivia so he had time to do what was really important. I felt that was the most profound statement I have heard for a long time. It is too bad I didn't practice what he said otherwise I would have an exact quote. It reminded me of a passage of scripture, as well as one of the problems we all share today. How can we take time/make time for all that we seem to think we must do?

In Exodus chapter 31 verse 17 are these words. "On the seventh day God rested and drew breath." Also in Exodus are the words "Remember the Sabbath day, and keep it holy." 20:8. For most of us the suggestion that we should clear our calendars once a week brings a cynical smile or a wishful sigh to our face. A whole day set aside to quietly and carefully landscaping our souls instead of bulldozing our way through the personal, economic, and professional stumps we face the rest of the week. Even as a minister I devote very little time to rest on the Sabbath. Even we

stay home from our place of worship we devote a tremendous amount of time to trivia. The average person spends about 40 hours a week watching television.

Before you disagree, think of how much time is devoted to just one football game on TV. Instead of having intellectual conversations with our families we drug our souls with trivia. Our lives have become more and more wrecked by devotion to trivia. In many respects, we have become living zombies who live in over scheduled, over medicated, over tired state of existence. I asked Dr. Gohlke on a office call why I was so tired? He replied, "You probably are just tired."

There is a natural rhythm to life. To work without a Sabbath leads to a dysrhythmic life with all sorts of dysrhythmic diseases - like chronic fatigue syndrome, pain, depression, and low energy. Our Sabbath - less culture suffers from "Timesickness" - where we have no time to do the important things because we are so involved doing the trivial things.

Starting the week by worshiping not only prepares us for the week ahead it provides us a space of time to take stock of ones life and to deter-

mine what is really important and put them in the proper sequence of life schedule. Take your family to Church this Sunday, talk to each other at Sunday dinner. Forget the trivial things like Nintendo and football for at least one Sunday and do something important like taking a family walk in the fall afternoon.

The Eastland County Resources Association began a new season with a meeting September 12 at Eastland Memorial Library. Attending were a number of people interested in community service. Director Corrie Cowley presided over the meeting.

Dr. Vaughn Baker, pastor of the Eastland First United Methodist Church, presented the Association with a check for \$168.19. This represented contributions from children of all churches who attended the Vacation Bible School at the Methodist Church last summer.

The money will be placed in the special Travel Fund for children who need to go out of the county for medical attention.

Dr. Baker, who is President of the Eastland Ministerial Alliance, also told of the charitable work of this group. Among other things, the Alliance has helped transient people with emergencies and local people with utility bills.

Dr. Baker said that the Ministerial Alliance will hold a Community Thanksgiving Service on Nov. 26, 7 p.m. at Bethel Baptist Church.

Corrie Cowley gave a detailed report on the use of the Travel Fund for chronically ill and disabled children. The Association is the local provider of funds for children who need to go out of the county for specialized treatment.

The State Department of Health administers this service, and reimburses

the County Resources Association with much of the funds used. So actually this is a revolving fund, Corrie Cowley explained.

From January 1991, through August 1991, the Fund had assisted eight different children on various trips for medical treatment, Ms. Cowley said. Total expenditures from the revolving fund were \$2373.74. Most had been reimbursed.

On other reports, Peggy Roberts of the Multipurpose Center (Central Texas Opportunities), said that her government funds were currently depleted.

More funds were expected to be available after Oct. 1.

She said donations were coming in from the First Christian Church - "One of our biggest supporters."

Along with other programs, the Homeless Program was short of funds, Mrs. Roberts said. She reported that people were needing places to live - needing deposits to turn on utilities.

"I can't believe the amount of people needing help, especially on utilities," said she. Some needed transportation to apply for jobs.

Lois Robinson, a Volunteer for the Food Pantry, also reported on needs at

this facility. Food items had been depleted, and the need for volunteers to work at the Pantry were also pressing.

"Only two people are keeping the place open," she said.

Hours for the Food Pantry are 1-4 p.m., Monday, Wednesday and Friday. The phone number is 629-2132. Anyone wishing to volunteer was urged to call.

Rhonda Pipkin reported on needs related to work of the Department of Human Services. She included needs of the aged and disabled.

She also said the American Cancer Society has received gas donations for travel of patients to treatment centers. There are also several volunteers who will drive people. A full report on this project will be forthcoming.

As the County Resources Association meeting ended it was decided to have future meetings on the first Thursday of each month. The next one will be Thursday, Oct. 3, at 12 noon. The public is encouraged to attend.
