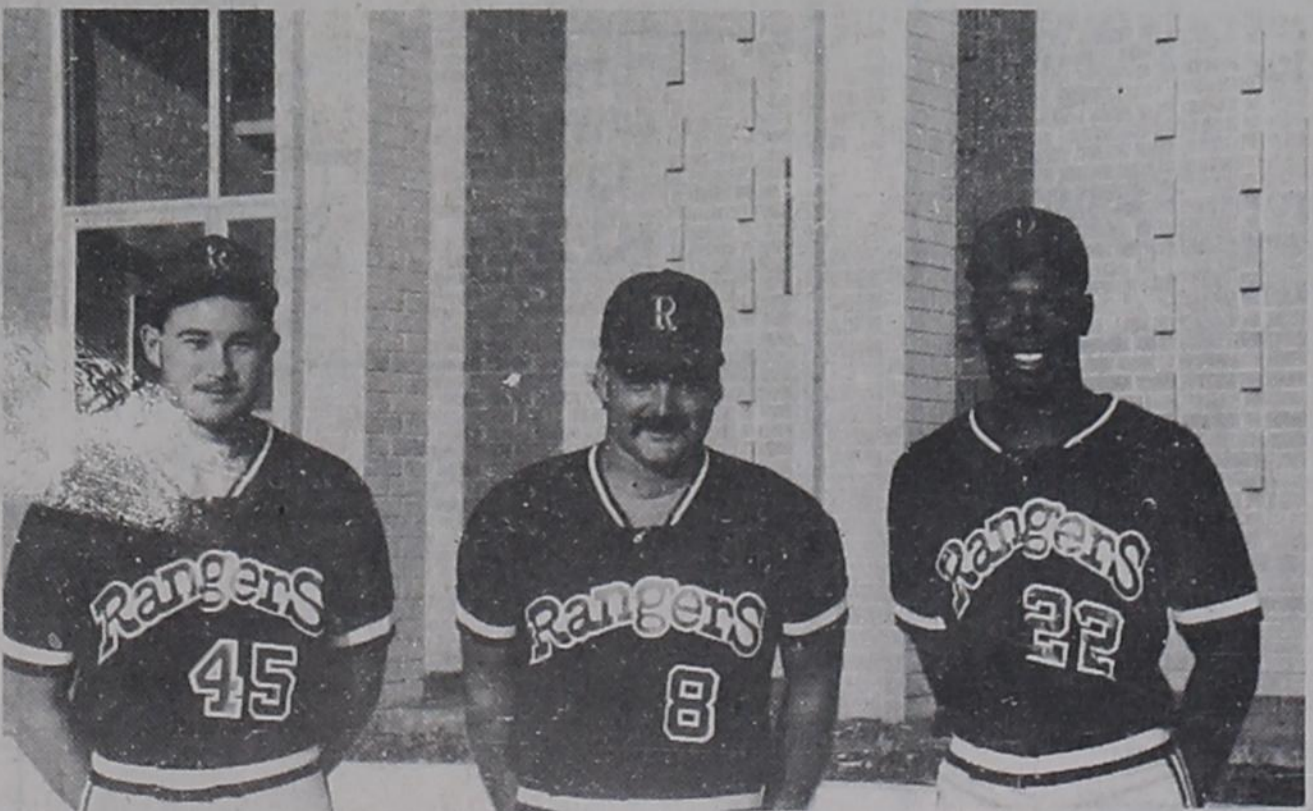
4-H provides many training clinics. I have

### County To Gain 55 New Jobs

Eastland County Industrial Development Corporation will hold a public meeting at 1:00 p.m. on Oct. 22, 1991, at the Commissioners Courtroom, Eastland County Courthouse, 100 West Main Street in Eastland, Texas, on the proposed issuance by the Issuer of one or more series of revenue bonds to finance the cost of a manufacturing facility or facilities, consisting of the acquisition of land and construction and equipping of a plastic and tire shredding, processing and manufacturing plant to produce various composite rubber plastic products and related facilities.

The maximum aggregate amount of the tax exempt portion of the Bonds is anticipated to be \$9,935,000.

The Project will be situated on approximately 151 acres of land located approximately 3 miles east of the City of Eastland, Texas, on the southwest corner of Inter-

state Highway 20 and County Road 438, in Eastland County, Texas and will be owned initially by South Texas Tire Recovery, Inc.

All interested persons are invited to attend and express any comments they have regarding the proposed issuance of the Bonds, the Project to be financed thereby and the plan of financing relating to the Project.

Also, you can take this opportunity to get better acquainted with your state representative, the man who works for you in Austin, Bob Turner.

## Pharmacy Topics

There's a mini baby boom going on in the United States, with more than 4 million births estimated for last year, the biggest number since 1964. One reason is that the babies of the last baby boom are now of child-bearing age.

Research in Zurich, Switzerland indicates a correlation between migraine and depression. Usual route, say the scientists, seems to be anxiety disorders in the young teens, then migraine, then depression.

Though it's mostly female teens who are deficient in iron, Physician and Sportsmedicine magazine reports that many young males may also be low in iron, limiting energy and sports performance. Puberty and strenuous exercise may cause the deficiency.

Tetanus most often develops not from the proverbial rusty nail, but from minor household injuries. Doctors recommend everyone be immunized against tetanus, with a booster shot every 10 years.

# STATE CARTOON PREMIERE SET FOR MAJESTIC RUN

The Majestic Theatre in Eastland will be the site of the official Texas Premiere of a new film: LOONEY TUNES HALL OF FAME, Friday, October 11 at 7:30 p.m.

In a festival of un-cut cartoon classics, top "Looney Tunes" and "Merrie Melodies" favorites return to the big screen in an 85-minute compilation of twelve of the most acclaimed Warner Bros. cartoons. Selected for their appeal to adults as well as children, this program of timeless energy is made up of sparkling new prints struck from new negatives.

The scene of this gala event, the Majestic Theatre, originally opened in 1920 as the Connellee, is particularly appropriate for this exclusive showing due to its Art Deco exterior and interior neon-enhanced architectural themes which were added in a 1947 remodeling by Interstate Theatres Circuit.

The 825-seat Majestic was reopened in 1987 by the Eastland Fine Arts Association, a non-profit corporation created to operate and maintain the historic structure, one of a handful of Texas theatres to be an official State of Texas Historic Landmark.

Manager, Ed Allcorn, formerly longtime Manager of the Paramount Theatre in Abilene, was able to schedule this exclusive showing by working directly with Kit Parker, owner of the theatrical exhibition rights to this 1991 release.

While LOONEY TUNES HALL OF FAME will receive national publicity and exhibition in November, Allcorn wanted to give his regional audience the first chance to see this film at their home theatre. The Majestic will be the only theatre in the country to exhibit the film.

This exclusive Eastland showing will continue through Monday, October 14 and will feature 2 p.m. matinee showings on Saturday and Sunday. All tickets will be sold at \$3.00.

Prior to a special press showing of LOONEY TUNES HALL OF FAME, area media representatives and special friends of the Majestic have been invited to a catered backstage dinner at the theatre.

The final cartoon in LOONEY TUNES HALL OF

FAME, Chuck Jones' "One Froggy Evening", depicts a demolition worker tearing down an 1892 structure and finding in the cornerstone a live frog. Does this sound familiar?

Kit Parker Films, of Monterey, California, a long-time leader in film distribution, has the rights to well over a hundred Warner Bros. cartoons in addition to those in the current compilation. These are also likely destined to find their way to the big screen at the Majestic in Eastland.

Recent classic film restorations by Kit Parker Films include: "Long Day's Journey Into Night", "Macbeth" (starring Orson Welles), "The Man Who Fell to Earth", "Rebel Without A Cause" and "A Streetcar Named Desire".

Other classics in their catalog include: "Around The World In 80 Days", "Giant", "Whatever Happened To Baby Jane?" and "Camelot".

Speakers for the morning session are Dr. Don Dorsett, Extension Forage Specialist, Dr. George Alston, Extension Agronomist, Dr. Gary Fambro, DVM, Dr. Matt Sanderson, Forage Physiologist and Assistant Professor with Soil and Crop Sciences, and R. L. Dalrymple, Forage and Crop Management Specialist with the Noble Foundation.

Following the sponsored lunch, Charley Scruggs, Retired Editor of Progressive Farmer, the keynote speaker of the clinic, will address the producers. His presentation is called "Ten Unexpected Issues That Will Affect Cattlemen in The 90's".

#### ADOLESCENT SEXUALITY

Did you know that Texas ranks #1 in the nation with the largest number of births to girls 14 years of age and younger? This is shocking, but very true! In fact, a county near Eastland County is ranked the #1 county in Texas with births to girls 14 years of age and younger.

Adolescence is a time of physical, emotional and social development. Young people are coming to grips with body changes, deciding what it means to be a man or a woman, confirming a system of values—including sexual values—and developing the capacity for expressing both emotional and physical intimacy beyond the immediate family. The adolescent years can certainly be a time for confusion and un-

certainty.

Some facts that are very serious are:

- 44% of girls and 64% of boys report they are sexually active by their 18th birthday.

- More than one in every 10 teen females get pregnant each year.

- The younger the teens are at first intercourse, the less likely they are to use contraception.

- Teen pregnancy has increased 11.8% since 1973. Pregnancy is the #1 reason why girls drop out of high school.

- One-fifth of all premarital pregnancies among teens occur within the first month after commencing sexual intercourse; one-half occur the first six months.

Postponing sexual involvement is the only approach to solve the problem of teen pregnancy, plus the spread of disease, including AIDS. It is smart when we help young people to say "NO". The book "Raising Positive Kids In A Negative World" states "that the tragedy today is that many parents never even tell their children that sex outside of marriage is not something 'everybody does'. Nor do they tell them that it is absolutely wrong; and the possibility of pregnancy or venereal disease".

### FESCUE LAWN PLANTED AT COUNTY COURT- HOUSE

It has been a week and a half since the County Courthouse lawn was planted in a tall fescue blend. If you have been by the Courthouse lately, the lawn is starting to green up. The grass is far from being established at this time.

The young fescue grass is still very tender. It takes very little effort to break off the young seedlings.

Now that the pecans have begun falling from the trees around the Courthouse, it is very tempting to step out on the lawn to pick them up. The thought is often, well one foot step won't hurt. Each step on the young seedlings can be very damaging.

Fescue grass does not have runners like Bermuda grass or St. Augustine to spread. It has to be planted to the thick-

ness wanted, so every seedling in the lawn is important

I have received a lot of questions about the differences in the grass growing in the lawn. The tall fescue blend which was planted has three varieties. The varieties in the blend were 54% Willamette, 37% Shenandoah and 7% Mojave. All three of these varieties are a turf type tall fescue.

The lawn was seeded at the rate of 10 pounds per 1000 square feet. A pre-plant fertilizer of 18-46-0 was applied at a rate of 4 pounds of phosphorus per 1000 square feet.

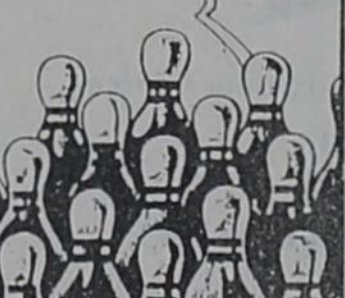

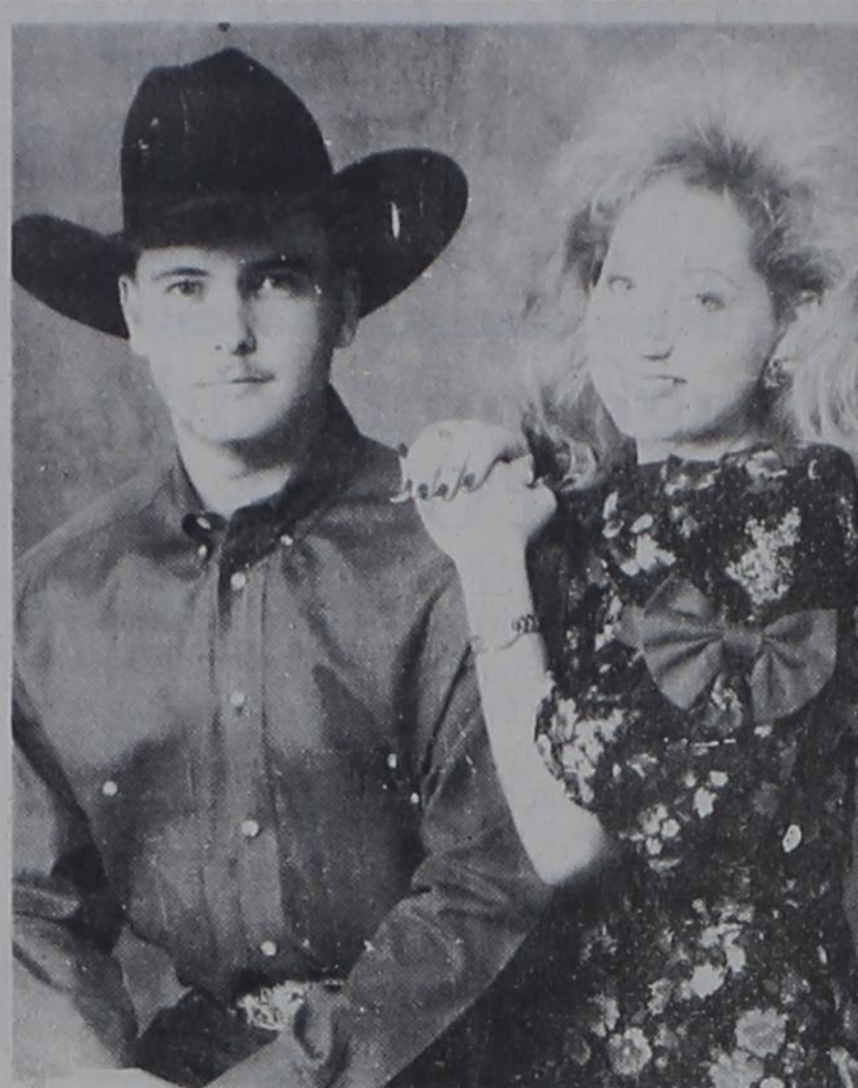

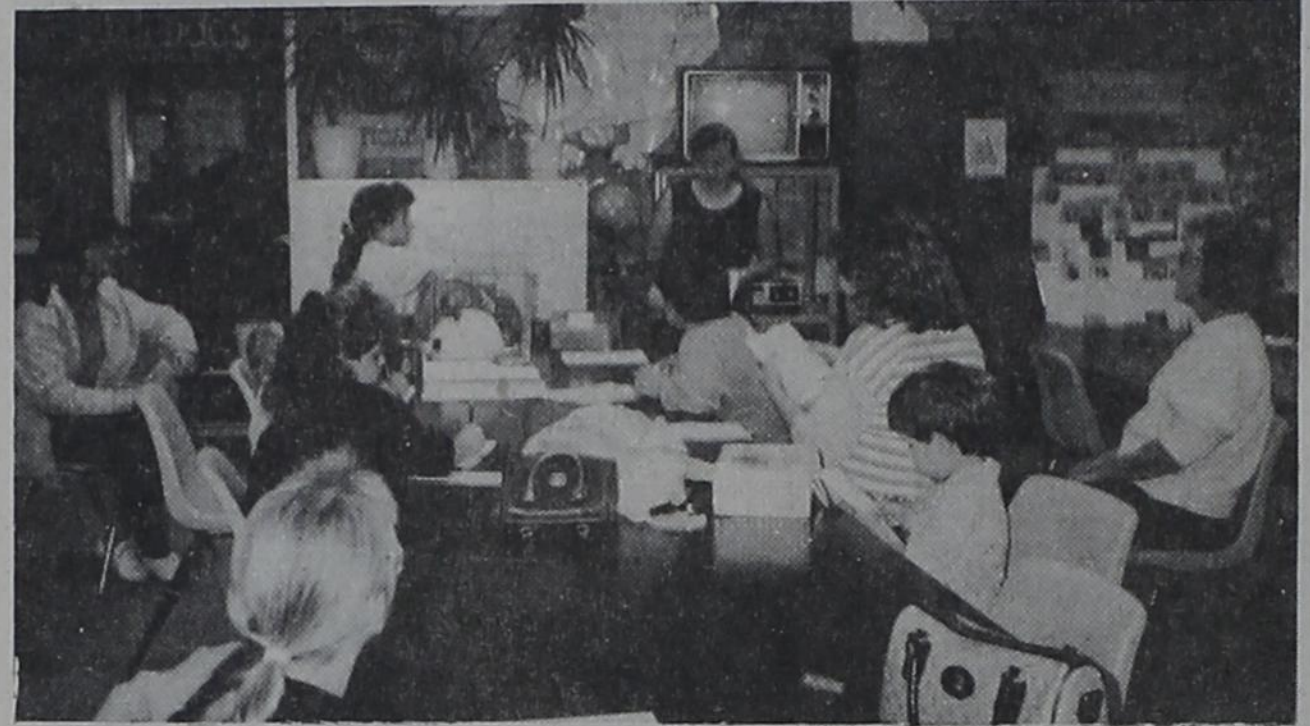

## Weight Loss Puzzles

WASHINGTON—A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the project of National Dietary Research, aptly named Food Source One, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the formula which has since been improved with other

natural colloids has been a windfall for some overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.

The bond may be in cash or a cashier's check payable to the U.S. Department of Justice or provide a surety. If you are indigent (needy and poor), you may not have to post the bond. To request a waiver of the bond, you must fully disclose your finances in a signed statement called "Declaration in Support of Request to Proceed in Forma Pauperis." You can obtain this form from the FBI Field Office listed below. File the signed declaration and a claim of ownership of the property with the FBI by NOVEMBER 5, 1991. If you want to request a pardon of the forfeited property, submit a petition for remission or mitigation of the forfeiture (an original and two copies) to the FBI Field Office identified below. This petition must include proof of your ownership interest in the property and the facts and circumstances which you believe justify return of the property or return of your interest in the property. For the regulations pertaining to remission or mitigation of the forfeiture, see 28 C.F.R., Sections 9.1-9.7, dated August 7, 1987 as amended in 52 Federal Register 32785, dated August 31, 1987. The criteria for requesting remission of the forfeiture are found at 28 C.F.R., Sections 9.5(b)(1),(2),(3),(4), and (5). The criteria for requesting mitigation of the forfeiture are found at 9.5(c). You should file the petition within thirty (30) days following receipt of the mailed notice of seizure. The seizure number 3190-91-F-0046 has been assigned to this forfeiture action.
